In looking back upon the past year many solemn reflections rush upon the mind

Time mispent - Duties neglected - and sins  
committed. I have much to be grateful for  
I have not been sick a single day, and  
have had but little indisposition. During the year  
God has graciously made me the father of a small  
little daughter and I have been permitted to preach  
almost every Sabbath. My dear wife has been  
in some respects less highly favoured. She has  
had much sickness during the year but has  
now recovered her health in a high degree  
for which with her I desire to bless God.

I fear that I have done but little service to  
the Kingdom of Christ during the year but I have en-  
deavoured to be useful. I often feel that  
I have greater desires to succeed in my prop-  
osition than to do service to the Kingdom of Jesus  
Christ.

joined in matrimony more than twice this number

March 11. Attended the funeral of Deacon  
Bick. This day sent in my resignation  
as pastor the Baptist Church Sandoe. in N.  
This is a dark day. Little know what is  
before me. O Lord prepare my neck for  
the burden. Permit me and assist me to  
be useful.

14. Preached in North Zarmouth on an

15 Monday evening tendered my resigna-  
tion to the church fourteen members were  
willing to dismiss me 12 males and 2 females.  
My friends were silent.

20 Left Portland and all my dear Chris-  
tian friends I leave my friends in tears  
and in great distress. May the good Shep-  
herd preserve the lambs of his flock. This  
is a dying day to me. Jouneyd on the 20  
as far as North Zarmouth spent the Sab. with  
my old friend Hon. The Lord is pour-  
ing his blessing upon him and his people  
Prejd to preach once Sundays very weak.

22. Jouneyd as far as Salem loaded with

23. Proceeded to Charlestown

Found ourselves by no means improved by  
visiting the babe is almost sick - My wife  
is worse. And I am myself taken violently  
sick. I was laid with a fever. This is now  
the third day since I was confined to my room  
through a kind and gracious providence  
I am better. Have been much distressed both  
in mind and body. Was sensible of great  
sinfulness. Am much perplexed as to my  
future course. God give me repentance  
for my sins and guide me by thy spirit  
These are memorable days. They are days of  
trial and will God my heavenly Father by gra-  
ciously pleased to sanctify them to me  
and enable me to adore that goodness which  
dictated them. Amen.

myself away from my fold and flock. Feel  
much weakness down in health and spirits

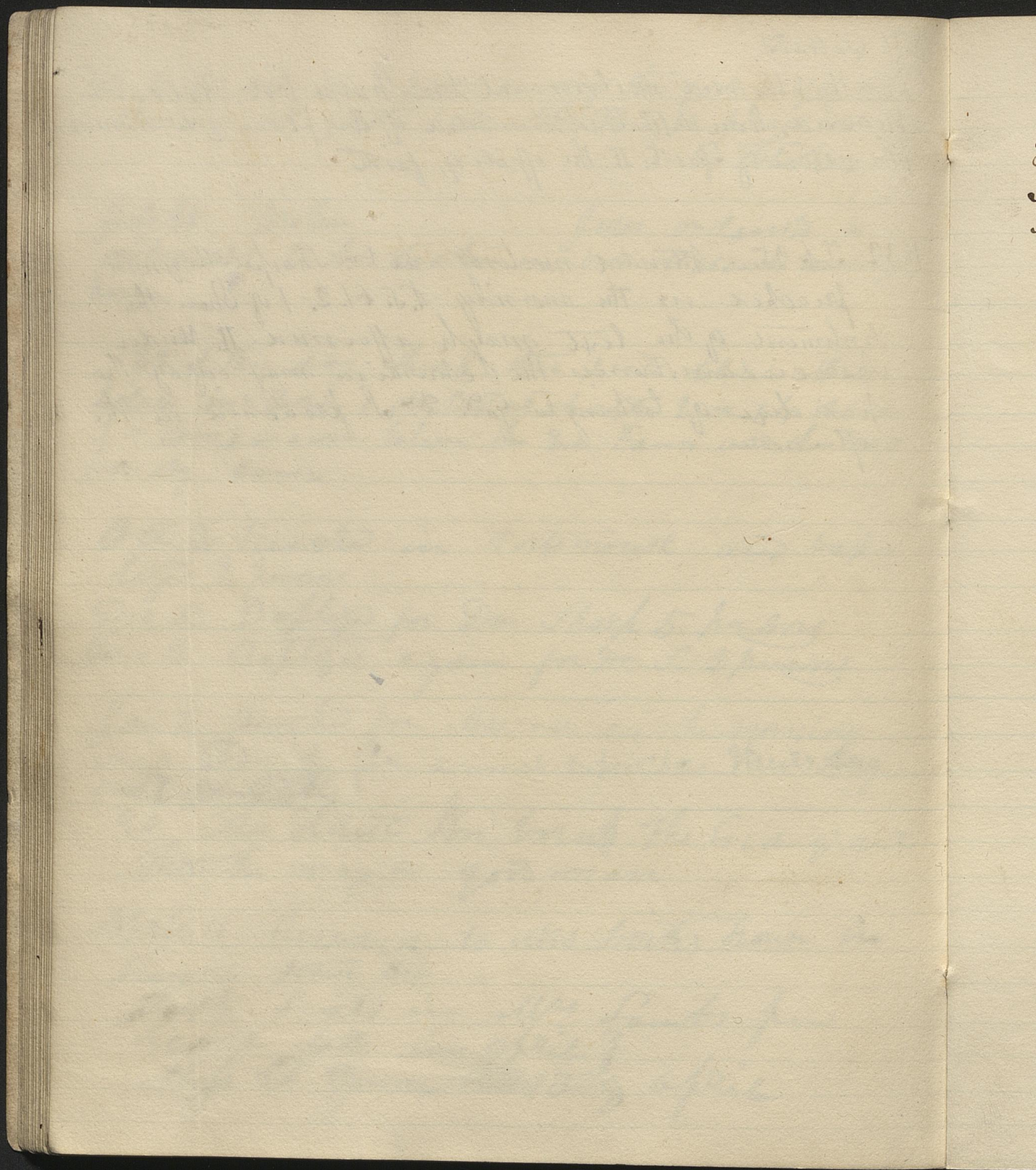

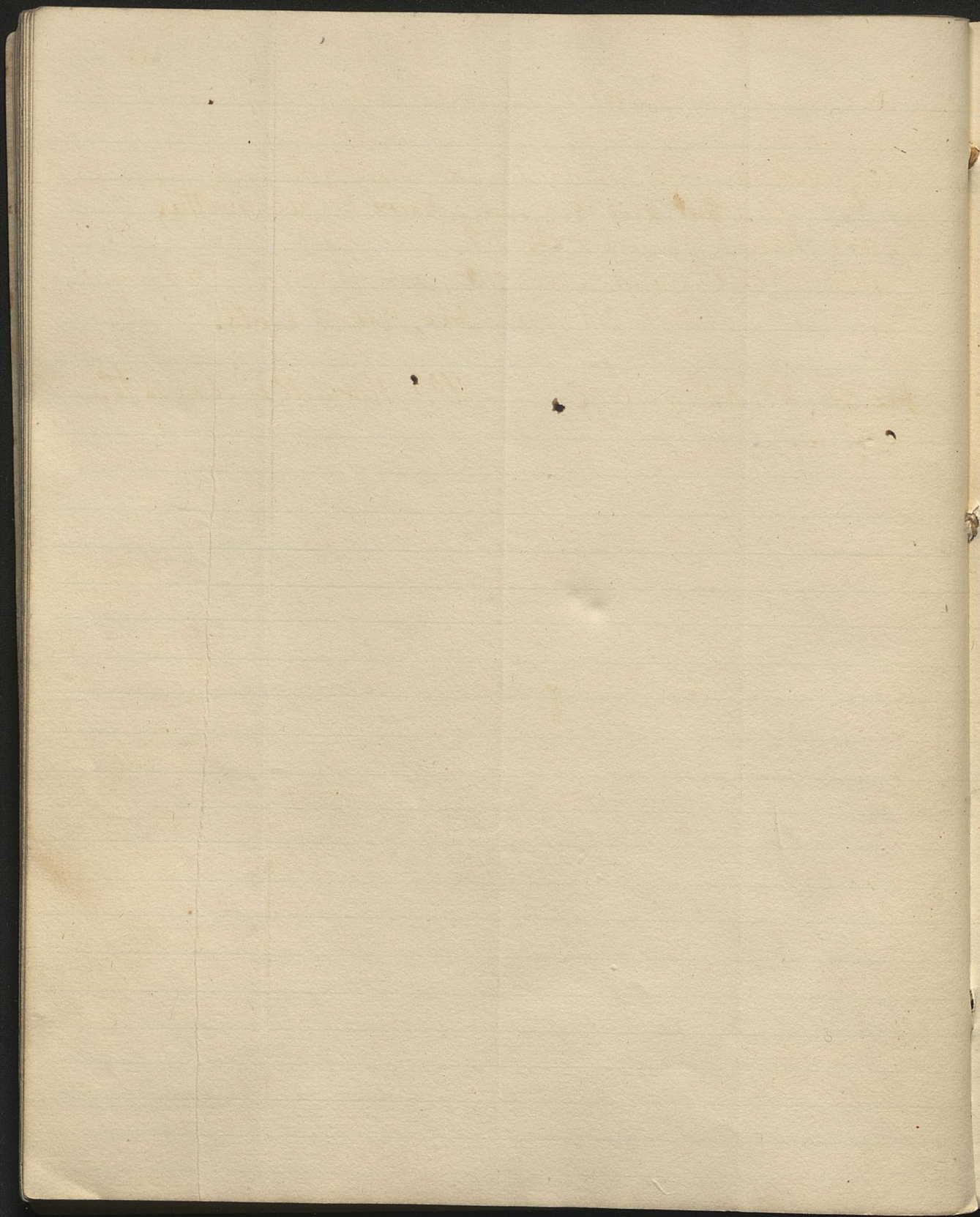
