### LexTran offerina free rides

Get on the bus: City exploring campus routes

Traffic around campus may not be as congested now that city buses are offering free rides to UK students and faculty, city and UK officials

faculty, city and UK officials say.

LexTran, which runs bus routes throughout Lexington, is starting a new program that allows students and faculty to get free rides around town when they show their UK identification.

Normally, bus rides cost \$1 for a one-way ride and \$60 for a semester pass.

LexTran received a \$1.6 million grant from the National Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Improvement Program, which covers the cost of the free rides for the next three years. LexTran had to match the grant with \$400.



## 26 bikes stolen in last month

Bicycles are becoming a hot commodity around campus as bike thefts near dorms and classroom buildings reach record highs. In the past month, 26 bikes have been stolen, said Cmdr. Travis Manley UK police communications director.

So far, police have no suspects.
The bikes — usually expensive models. The bikes — usually expensive models in the properties of the properties of the models of the common state of the common state of the cital center, during anytime between 6 a.m. and 1 a.m. Some bikes had been sitting at a rack for several days and others for only a couple hours.

Manley said bike-stealing sprees happen once or twice a year, and when students go back to school. The thieves will either try to pawn the bike around town or ride it for awhile and dump it somewhere.

"Some people are sick in the head and like the thrill of stealing things," he said.

In the past, the police department has had a 50 percent recovery rate for the stolen bikes.

That number would be larger if the owners knew their bike's serial numbers, Manley said.

Owners may also want to engrave their bike with their name or unique number in an inconspicuous location, he said.

Only three of 26 stolen bikes' owners knew their serial numbers, he said. One similarly is that all but one bike was secured with a cable and lock. Manley said these security devices can be cut with simple boit cutters.

Buying a U-shaped kryptonite lock, usually \$30, would keep a bike more secure, he said. Most thieves don't have the equipment or time to break this lock, he said.

Bike owners are also encouraged to secure bikes in highly-visible, well-lit areas.

Bicycles are sometimes covered under insurance plans.

Elections a risk for White House

CRAWFORD, Texas — President Bush's vigorous campaigning to elect Republicans in November could make the elections a referendum on his presidents in the midtern more active than most presidents in the midtern election cycle. He has personally recruited candidates, raised millions of dollars and traveled to dozens of states in an effort to help the GOP take control of the Senate and Keep a narrow majority in the House. The gain or loss of just a few seats could make a major difference in how Congress treats Bush's proposals during the final two years of his term. A GOP gain of a single seat in the Senate could return it to Republican control. The loss of six seats in the House could put the Democratis in the majority. Strategists in both parties say that while congressional elections depend heavily on local issues and trends, the war on terrorism and Bush's hands-on effort in many races have madehim an issue, too. He's always welcomed by Republican candidates, but things don't always go smoothly.

Men indicted on alleged terror support
WASHINGTON — Federal grand juries charged six men with conspiring to support Osama bin Laden's al-Qaida network Wednesday as the government escalated its efforts to stifle the flow of money and assistance from U.S. soil to overseas terrorist groups. American citizen and Muslim activist James Ujaama was accused in a two-count indictment of trying to set up a "jihad (holy war) training camp" on the West Coast and providing support and resources to al-Qaida. The indictment accused him of leading discussions about creating poison to use on the public and firebombing vehicles. Ujaama has reheatedly denied any ties to terrorism. Separately, four men who had been in the United States since at least 2000 were charged in Detroit with operating a "covert underground support unit" and a "sleeper operational combat cell" for a radical Islamic movement allied with al-Qaida. A fifth man whose full name isn't known by the government was also named in the indictment. Their indictment said the men plotted attacks on sites in Turkey and Jordan and possessed a videotage that appeared to case U.S. Iandmarks such as Disneyland in California and the MGM Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas.

The Chicago White Sox called off their Thursday charter to Detroit and said they would travel Friday only if there isn't a walkout. The Boston Red Sox rescheduled their charter to Cleveland for Friday too, and the Atlanta too their charter to Cleveland for Friday, too, and the Atlanta Braves will remain in Pitts-burgh an extra day But thes Louis Cardinals will travel Thursday for the following day's game at the Chicago Cubs, which would be the first game affected by a strike.

Donald Fehr, chief negotiator for the Major League Baseball Players' Association Union, and representatives for MLB owners are getting closer to reaching a deal and avoiding a strike before the Aug. 30 deadline imposed by the union.

"The closer you get to the date, it's tougher." said Selig, who was on his way to New York from Milwaukee.

Lo Duca said the drug agreement included a penalty phase for positive tests, and help would be available for players who have problems. While he said the testing was for steroids, marijuana and cocaine, other players said Wednesday that the agreement included only steroids.

"What they agreed on was once in spring training, and then random tests during the year, which I think is yery good," Lo Duca said. "Once you put the word "random" in there, you don't know when it's going to keep guys off and I think that's good for the game."

Lo Duca was childed by players during Wednesday's union conference call for

Steve Kline said.

Brandon Inge, Detroit's assistant player representative, said players agreed to random drug testing for two years. If 5 percent or more of tests come back positive in either year, mandatory testing would be required for all players. NL player representative Tom Glavine from Atlanta thought the sides were headed to a labor agreement. "I think there are still going to be some ups and downs between now and Thursday," he said. "But ultimately I'm optimistic that we're going to get something done."

Some still expect a strike. "I plan on strikling Friday," Red Sox pitcher John Burkett said. "I think it's going to be long. I'm just going by my experience in "94." Burkett said the players had already given too many concessions to the owners.

Manfred said no new proposals have been made since Brandon Inge. Detroit's

## **Seniors outnumber** freshmen at UK

You can't miss us: UK "top heavy" on seniors

Though UK has a record number of incoming fresh-men this year, the universi-ty's senior class totals far

larger.
UK estimates there are 5,171 seniors enrolled this fall, compared to 3,644 fresh

men. Ruby Watts director

Ruby Watts, director of data management, said UK averages more than 5,000 seniors per year. Heavy on seniors from the first of the seniors and the seniors and the figure includes students who have transferred to UK and those who are taking more than four years to complete their undergraduate degrees. The determination of senior status is based on number of credit hours earned, he said.

Typically, students must

Typically, students must have earned 90 credit hours to attain senior status. Most degree programs require a minimum of 120. But factors such as class availability and switching majors can impact a student's total number of

credits.
Watts said a "high percentage" of students switch majors while they are at UK.

## UK dorms like 'dungeons'

Not an official goal: UK made Princeton Review's Top 20 list of colleges with "dorms like dungeons"

UK has the distinction of making a Princeton Review Top 20 list, but not one that measures athletics or academics.

In the category of "dorms like dungeons," the university ranks 20th.



Todd and other officials should reconsider their desire to increase en-rollment until they have anticipated and addressed the problems it will bring — like ensuring that students will have a roof over their heads.
