

State University of Kentucky, June 2nd, 1913.

The Faculty met at the usual place at 3:30 P.M., those present being President Barker, Professors Anderson, Boyd, Chalkley, Dantzler, Davis, Easton, Farquhar, Frankel, Freeman, Garman, Gillis, Good, Lieutenant Gullion, Hamilton, Hooper, Jones, Dr. Kastle, Lafferty, Mackenzie, Mathews, Melcher, Miller, Noe, Norwood, Pence, Peter, Pryor, Roberts, Rowe, Strauss, Tigert, Turner, Tuthill, Tuttle, Zembrod.

By consent, there was next read an invitation from Director Kastle to the University Faculty, to attend the exercises of the dedication of the new addition to the Experiment Station building.

On motion of Judge Lafferty, seconded by Dr. Kastle, it was ordered that the usual order of procedure be suspended and we proceed at once to a consideration of the candidates for graduation.

Professor Anderson then called attention to the names of two others, Mr. Armistead and Mr. Kurozawa, who had not yet quite completed their work but who expected to remain into the summer and would probably be able to complete their thesis work within six weeks. Professor Rowe, seconded by Professor Norwood, moved that the degrees for these two men be withheld and the diplomas be given only when the work has been completed. Some discussion followed, in which the idea was expressed by Professor Miller and others, that a ruling had previously been made that such cases should not be considered as graduates.

On motion of Professor Davis, seconded by Professor Roberts, a substitute was offered and carried, upon an aye and no vote of 32 to 1, "that an applicant for a degree, before this faculty, shall not be recommended for said degree, until his work has been completed.

Some discussion then arose over the fact that, in the case of Mr. Jetton of Professor Miller's list, the circumstances were similar in that Mr. Jetton has not completed his work. Thereupon, on motion of Professor Frankel, seconded by Professor Tigert, it was ordered that the faculty



reconsider the list of candidates presented by Professor Miller, and after a considerable discussion of Mr. Jetton's case, it was ordered, upon motion, that the list submitted by Professor Miller, with the exception of Mr. Jetton, be recommended to the Board of Trustees, for the degrees named.

Remarks were made relative to Mr. Hudson's case, by Professors Rowe, Norwood and others, but it being shown, upon statement of Dean Rowe, that his thesis was not acceptable, further consideration of Mr. Hudson's name ceased.

Professor Miller, while insisting that no personal feelings were involved, and agreeing that it was doubtless too late to propose any change in the list offered, gave expression to his views upon the matter of honorary degrees, to the effect that it was not in good taste and not in accord with current practice among the great universities of this or other countries, for such an institution to award honorary degrees to members of its own staff or official representatives, as in the list now proposed. He thought furthermore, that the greatest care should be used to award such degrees only by painstaking investigation and careful discrimination, and that hereafter, names proposed for such degrees, should be presented to the faculty much earlier in the session.

On motion, duly seconded, it was ordered that the list as read, be recommended to the Board of Trustees, for the degrees named.

It was announced that the arrangements for the commencement procession were in the hands of Lieutenant Gullion who made brief statement regarding the plans.

On motion, the meeting then adjourned.
