1979-80 LADY KAT BASKETBALL PROSPECTUS

When University of Kentucky fourth-year basketball coach Debbie Yow unveils the 1979-80 edition of the Lady Kat basketball team, fans will notice a quicker, faster and consistently better outside shooting team, the result of a blend of experienced veterans and promising first-year candidates.

Last season the coaching staff was faced with filling three of its 12 spots with walk-ons, but no such dilemma exists this year as the Kats will be 12-deep in talent.

Starting positions will be highly competitive and some of the players may find themselves snagging hardwood on occasions, but not to their dismay if winning is restored to the Lady Kat basketball program. Coach Yow and assistant coach Diane Beauchamp worked hard in assembling a group of highly skilled athletes to help insure a successful season.

Only three out-of-state players dot the '79-80 Lady Kat roster and all the Kentuckians are former all-state performers. The average height is 5-foot-9 1/2 split among two seniors, three juniors, one sophomore and six freshmen.

UK lost two players via the graduation route including the Lady Kats second all-time scorer and rebounder Janet Timperman, and all-time assist leader Debbie Mack.

The Lady Kats' new look can partially be attributed to this year's freshman class, which figures to be Yow's strongest recruiting effort to date, as she landed four of Kentucky's top prep stars and one of New Jersey's best. All five freshmen figure heavily into Coach Yow's plans for this season. Cathy Barber, a freshman walk-on, is also expected to provide additional help this season.

However, the key to UK's bid to regain the state title and make a serious challenge on the national level hinges on the experience and play of six returning veterans that includes two-time All-KWIC senior Debra Oden and 6-foot-4 Liz Lukschu. Lukschu led UK last season in scoring averaging 14.8 points per game while Oden has been the Lady Kats top rebounder the past two seasons.

Returning to the backcourt is third year performer Geri Grigsby, who handled playmaking duties last season for the Kats, contributing a team high 102 assists and possessing a solid chance of surpassing the all-time assist mark this season.

Back for her final campaign is 5-10 Linda Edelman, who has operated at guard the last three seasons but possibly will see more action at a small forward position, where her strong rebounding and defensive abilities can be utilized.

Adding to the backcourt strength is a dynamic trio of all-state guards surely to provide plenty of excitement for UK fans. Lea Wise, a Lexington Lafayette product, should inject new life in to UK's traditionally lethargic outside game with her sharpshooting skills.

Louisville Western's Patty Jo Hedges should delight fans with her fantastic speed and quickness coupled with her brilliant passing ability that hopefully will result in many points for the Lady Kats and Lori Edgington, a rugged two-time All-Stater from Covington Holy Cross, rounds out the guard corps possessing tremendous jumping ability, excellent shooting ability and fine defensive play.

The forwards will be led by 5-8 Oden and 5-10 junior Maria Donhoff whose combined frontline experience will be vital to the team's success this season. Oden, a rebounding and defensive specialist, completed her second consecutive summer

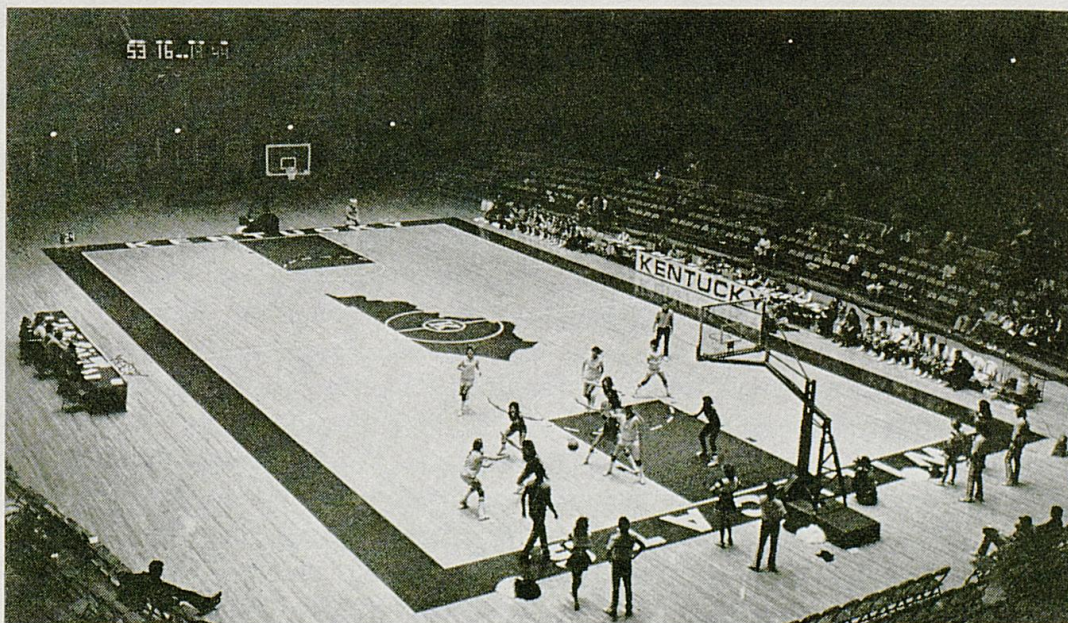
as a member of the Christian News Release Women's Basketball team and should be primed to cap her final year in impressive fashion. Donhoff was the only other Lady Kat to score in double-digits last season and is expected to be much improved after a strenuous summer conditioning program.

Other leading frontline candidates include lone sophomore Tayna Fogle, a 5-10 power forward who averaged a solid 5.4 points per outing last year and 5-10 freshman sensation Sharon Garland, a noted outside shooter who shot more than 59.0 per cent from the field while leading Laurel County High School to a record third-straight Kentucky High School basketball championship.

Battling Lukschu at center will be 6-foot-1 freshman Valerie Still, who averaged 18.0 points and 22.0 rebounds per game as a senior at New Jersey's Cherry Hill High School. The addition of Still certainly favors both players' potential for steady improvement and alleviates a lack of depth in the middle.

Lukschu, at 6-4 and formerly the tallest player in the KWIC, will have the advantage of two years experience and is a likely candidate for post-season honors if she maintains her tremendous field goal accuracy (56.7) and becomes more aggressive on the boards.

UK will match its skills against some of the nation's toughest teams, including 1979 AIAW third-place Tennessee, 1979 NWIT champion South Carolina, 1979 AIAW Small-College National Champion South Carolina State, seventh-ranked Rutgers, Ohio State and Indiana. The Kats will play in their own invitational tournament as well as the first SEC women's basketball tournament.

DR. OTIS. A. SINGLETARY
President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

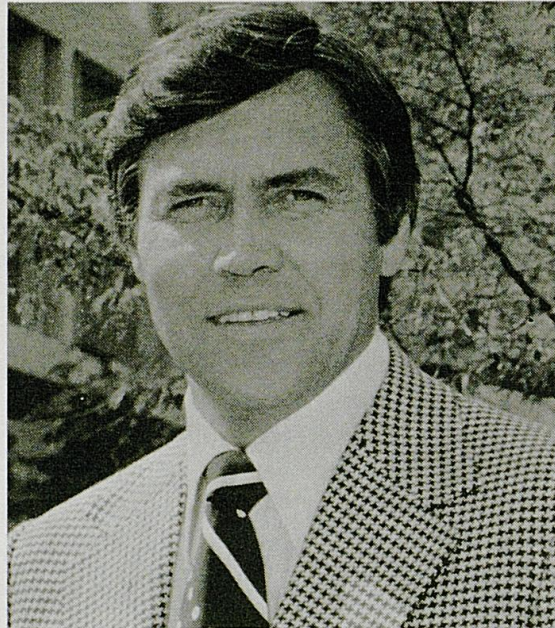
In the ten years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.



CLIFFORD O. HAGAN
Athletics Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics director in July, 1975; during the ensuing school year, Wildcat teams compiled one of the best records in the school's history, with the basketball Wildcats winning the National Invitational Tournament, the wrestling and rifle teams winning SEC titles and the baseball team winning the SEC Eastern Division.

The wrestling team repeated as conference champion the following year, the basketball team finished with a 26-4 record and the football team won seven of 11 regular season games and defeated North Carolina in the Peach Bowl. It was the

best UK football record in 23 years and the Wildcats' first post-season appearance since the 1952 Cotton Bowl. During the past year, the football team finished 10-1 (6-0 in the Southeastern Conference) and the basketball team won the NCAA championship.

With both the football and basketball teams playing to sellout crowds and drawing a big on-the-road following, Hagan has not been content, but has made Wildcat games even more enjoyable by personally designing and selecting the Wildcat Mascot, which has captured the fancy of UK fans everywhere, and by granting permission for publication of "The Cats' Pause," a unique weekly tabloid devoted strictly to UK sports.

Physical improvements during Hagan's regime as athletics director include a 110-yard Astro-Turf football practice field, modern equipment in both the Shively Sports Center and Memorial Coliseum weight rooms, open-type lockers, a new pressbox and new dugouts at the baseball field, and a revamped tennis complex with additional seating and modernized offices. He has also added a strength coach to work with all sports and funds for the popular Parcourse Fitness Trail.

Offices in Memorial Coliseum have been modernized and Hagan is looking forward to the day when he can put on the drawing board an Olympic swimming pool and a field house, which he says are "desperately needed for our program and our students."

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chaparrals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

DEBBIE YOW
Head Basketball Coach

Entering her fourth year as women's basketball coach at the University of Kentucky, Debbie Yow heads a Lady Kat basketball program that has gained nationwide respect under her tutelage.

Since coming to UK, Yow has engineered upsets over several nationally ranked (Top Five) schools, including a victory last season over fourth-ranked Tennessee. She won the school's first KWIC state basketball title in 1978, placed fourth in the Southern Region II championship that year, finished third in the 1978 NWIT, and enjoyed a 20-plus win season (23-12 in 1978) while posting a 55-35 over-all record.

Looking back on last season's 13-16 record, Yow feels it was a great learning experience that will stand the Lady Kats in good stead as they enter the 1979-80 season.

In her first season (1976-77) at UK, Yow directed the Lady Kats to a third-place finish in the KWIC state tournament. It was during that season that the Lady Kats registered their most impressive triumph, upsetting then No. 2 ranked Tennessee Tech, 72-70, and eventually gaining a ranking in the national polls for the first time.

The following year (1977-78) the Lady Kats enjoyed their most successful season by capturing the KWIC state title, advancing to the regionals, playing in the NWIT, gaining national recognition in the polls and winning 23 games.

While many colleges search nationwide for top recruits, Yow has managed to obtain most of her talent from the home state, including four Kentucky all-stars this year. The 1979-80 Lady Kat edition boasts nine of 12 players from Kentucky.

Yow's coaching debut in 1972-73 was in her hometown of Gibsonville, N.C., where she coached the junior high to a 7-8 record. She spent the following season at Walter Williams High, which finished 3-15 in its inaugural year in the girl's high school basketball program. Yow's next coaching assignment, also in North Carolina, was at Eastern Guilford High, which she guided to a 25-3 record.

Coach Yow graduated from Elon College in 1974, earning a B.A. in English. After graduation she went to Eastern Guilford High School, where she doubled as an English teacher and women's basketball coach.

In the spring of 1977, she assisted her older sister Kay Yow, head coach at North Carolina State, in the Hanes All-American game. She spent that summer (1977) touring Europe as head coach of an Athletes in Action team that compiled an 8-1 record against Olympic-caliber teams. The lone loss came at the hands of the Yugoslavian National team.

For the 1977-78 and 1978-79 seasons, Yow was a member of the Wade Trophy Selection Committee that honors the most outstanding women's college basketball player.

A superb prep ball player in her own right, Yow earned All-Conference and All-Region honors as a forward at Gibsonville High School, where she was the team captain two consecutive years.

At Elon College in North Carolina, Yow captained the Fighting Christians to a North Carolina State championship while playing for Kay and alongside her All-American sister, Susan. She considers winning that particular state title as a family her most memorable moment in sports.

Kay is the women's head basketball coach and athletic director at North Carolina State and Susan is in her second year as head basketball coach at East Tennessee.

Coach Yow is a frequent speaker at basketball clinics and conferences and conducts her own girls basketball camp each summer.



DIANE BEAUCHAMP
Assistant

Diane Beauchamp begins her second season as full-time women's assistant basketball coach at the University of Kentucky.

During the 1977-78 season as a part-time assistant, Beauchamp guided the women's junior varsity to a 7-7 record.

A native of Macon, Ga., she graduated in 1973 from Central High School, where she won Most Valuable Player honors in tennis and basketball.

Ms. Beauchamp graduated from Mercer University in 1976, where she was a member of the Teddy Bears' basketball team that finished fourth in the 1975 NWIT. Her senior year, and only her third year of college, she was assistant women's basketball coach at Central High School.

She earned her M.S. in physical education at UK in 1978.

Ms. Beauchamp's primary duties are scouting and recruiting.

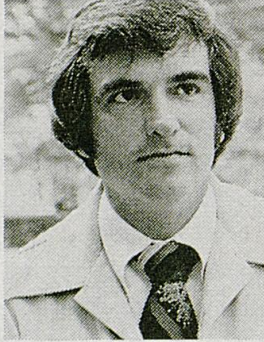

Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

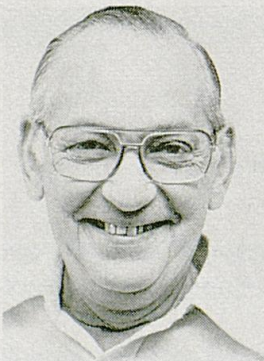

"YOU'VE COME A LONG WAY, BABY"

Women have been playing basketball almost from the game's inception; in fact, Maude Sherman, first of the ladies to play the game, married Dr. James Naismith, who introduced basketball at the International YWCA Training School in Springfield, MA, in the autumn of 1891.

In Kentucky a few years later, girls began playing the new game on "Miss Nettie's Lawn" in Lexington and in match games on some of the state's college campuses.

The first basketball game in which collegians in Kentucky competed against someone outside their campus was played Feb. 4, 1901, when teams from the Art, Bible, Law and Medical schools of Kentucky University (now Transylvania University) selected a squad to represent that institution the following night against the Lexington YMCA.

Basketball that year, consisting of some Friday night games at the YMCA and student exhibitions for fun and amusement, was described by the KU yearbook as "very popular with both the young men and young women."

The men students of the College of Liberal Arts and the College of the Bible at KU played three match games that year while the young women also organized first and second teams and played match games. There were also match games that summer between school and playground teams in Lexington.

Women's basketball at the University of Kentucky, then known as Kentucky State College and not to be confused with its parent Kentucky University, started off near-equal but subservient to the men's game, which in itself was considered merely a winter pastime between football and baseball seasons and of less importance than debating, gymnastics and the glee club.

The first collegiate game involving a basketball team from the University was played Feb. 6, 1903, when the KSC men met the Georgetown men on the State College gym floor in Barker Hall, where spectators sat on a circular mezzanine track containing three rows of chairs.

On the following day, girls at State College, under Coach Jane Todd Watson, engaged in a match basketball game at the gym. Twelve days later, a large crowd attended another match game between the girls, and an upcoming game between the KSC and KU girls was taking the attention away from a game between the boys at those two institutions.

The State boys lost their game to KU, 42-2, but the girls, playing before 500 spectators the following day, defeated the KU girls, 16-10, in the first intercollegiate game between girls' basketball teams in Lexington.

The State boys lost their first four games of the following (1904) season and finished with a victory over Cincinnati while the girls won both their games, defeating Georgetown, 14-10, and the Jessamine Female Institution, 28-1.

The day after their victory over Georgetown, the young ladies filed into the State chapel, gave their yell and counted in unison to 14, their winning total. They bolted for the door when President Patterson took the stand and said the spirit displayed did not exactly fit a religious service.

Giving the girls an "All Hail," the Kentucky noted, "Successful from the start—two years ago—basketball as played by girls caught not only the student, but the public favor as well, and every game played drew an enthusiastic house which packed the standing room to the doors—an appreciative crowd of fellows—mad—riotously mad, over contests abounding in snappy spectacular play."

The yearbook also devoted a full page to an article, written by a male student, about the Georgetown game. The author referred to the girls as "fair Amazons . . . presented to our penetrating stare devoid of all unnecessary weight and curves, and bravely facing the front in skirts barely reaching the ankle. Very barely."

He wrote of how the porters rushed onto the gym floor after the game and made haste "to remove from the vulgar gaze of the public basketfuls of various articles consisting chiefly of buttons, beautiful sleeve buttons and other buttons, hairpins, pins and other pins, vari-colored ribbons and the unknown scattered remains of much cherished voodoo strings."

That was the year a student named Herman Scholtz dressed as a girl and went to Georgetown with the State girls, obviously with their connivance. The heavily veiled Scholtz watched much of the spirited contest, forbidden to all males except those in an official capacity, before the girls noted large brogans sticking out from under his dress and started giggling. Scholtz, ejected from the gym, received a general reprimand.

The Scholtz incident, the chauvinistic write-up on the Georgetown game, and the KSC president's reaction to the girls' enthusiasms point up mores of the time that undoubtedly had much to do with the eventual decline of women's basketball at the University.

However, the progress of basketball in general at KSC was slowed because of inadequate facilities—too many different organizations sought to be accommodated in one building—lack of practice time, substandard coaching and the fact that intercollegiate games were difficult to arrange because few schools had organized teams.

In 1907, for instance, there are records of only two games, both intrasquad affairs, being played by the girls' team coached by Thomson Bryant, who earned his third varsity letter with the men that year.

Bryant, who still resides in Lexington after retiring several years ago as an agricultural specialist at UK, feels they must have played some games outside the campus, but he couldn't remember specific foes.

"They played hard," he said of the girls, "and we had a little spurt of interest, but it kinda died out when World War I came on."

Bryant was succeeded in 1908 as girls' coach by Prof. C. W. Leaphart, a Missourian whose innovations included a training table in Patterson Hall. After the girls won all their games that year, the Kentuckian noted that the training table made the girls "stronger and more enduring."

"Kentucky is just awakening to the fact that basketball is a good, healthy exercise for girls," the yearbook said, "and many small teams all over the state have been practicing this season."

What was hailed as a major move in the development of women's basketball at the University occurred in 1910, when the co-eds were withdrawn from the

women's program, run by Helen O. Stout, and allied with the Athletics Association, a merger that compelled the boys to share practice time and coaching with the girls.

The girls lost their first game that year to Transylvania, 21-13, and then swept the remaining games on their eight-game schedule.

The Kentuckian had no record of games played by the girls team in 1911, but representative schedules of up to six games were played until the war year of 1919, a period during which the girls had such fine coaches as:

Dr. John J. Tigert, a former football and basketball star and team captain at Vanderbilt who attended Oxford on a Rhodes Scholarship and eventually would become president of the University of Florida and U. S. Commissioner of Education.

William Tuttle, former UK basketball team captain and football star (1911-12-13-14) whose six touchdowns and 43 points against Maryville in 1914 are still UK records.

Jim Park, former UK baseball, track and basketball star and football team captain whose five touchdowns-rushing against Earlham represent another UK record. After playing major league baseball and delivering the first home run pitch to a youthful Red Sox pitcher/pinch-hitter named George Herman "Babe" Ruth, Park returned to Lexington and eventually became a noted lawyer and jurist.

After his girls lost to Cincinnati, 19-9, in the final game of a 1-4 season in 1918, Park wrote: "Then came the University of Cincinnati, led by the gallant Nicholoff and his girls' rules of warfare. The less said of the game, the better—they sent one of our guards to the base hospital for five fouls and almost had the entire team wounded by the same weapon when victory was conceded to them and they went on their way rejoicing."

Sarah Blanding, former star on the New Haven Normal School of Gymnasium, who coached the KSC girls three years and then became player-captain in 1923 under a young post-graduate student named A. B. "Happy" Chandler. Blanding eventually would become president of Vassar College while Chandler would become a two-time governor of Kentucky., U. S. Senator and Baseball Commissioner.

Blanding's coaching debut was a rough experience as the girls lost to Cumberland, 19-16, and tied the same team, 13-13, before flu claimed center Lillie Cromwell. After they lost to Cincinnati, 26-14, flu also took forward Bernice Young and Miss Blanding.

Playing without a coach and two star players, the girls lost to Wesleyan, 18-14, and then called it quits after Margaret Harbison was hurt in that game.

While at UK, the popular Miss Blanding was credited with inaugurating an annual spring meet, a spring exhibition of calisthenic drills and intramural games as regular items on the University agenda.

The Kentuckian described Chandler, who prepped at Transylvania and Harvard before matriculating to Kentucky, as a "lawyer, athletic coach, cosmopolite, amateur Caruso and professional Romeo."

Coach of the last UK girls team of that era (1924) was Bart Peak, a UK football (1915) and basketball (1917) letterman who would serve many year as a YMCA career official and, after retirement, become a Fayette County judge noted for such punishment of juvenile offenders as making them kiss their parents.

That 1924 team swept its 10-game schedule and claimed not only the championship of Kentucky, but the championship of the South, since Peabody and Chattanooga were among its victims.

As the 1924-25 school year got under way, the University senate passed a bill abolishing girls' intercollegiate basketball for that season.

President Frank L. McVey, in an interview for the Kentucky Kernel, said basketball had proved to be a strenuous sport for boys and was therefore too strenuous for girls. He said it was also undesirable to have the university girls traveling over the state and throughout the South in order to take part in intercollegiate sport.

"The trips are very expensive because of the necessity of proper chaperonage and provision," he said. "Some very irritating consequences have developed in the past as a result of intercollegiate games."

After women "A" and "B" teams began playing intercollegiate competition again at the turn of the '70s, the women finally gained varsity status again during the 1974-75 school year.

They now play a full intercollegiate schedule. Welcome back!





MEMORIAL COLISEUM

Memorial Coliseum, former home of the Kentucky Wildcats, has been the home of the Lady Kats since the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976.

In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health services, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games and Athletic Department offices, but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as conventions.

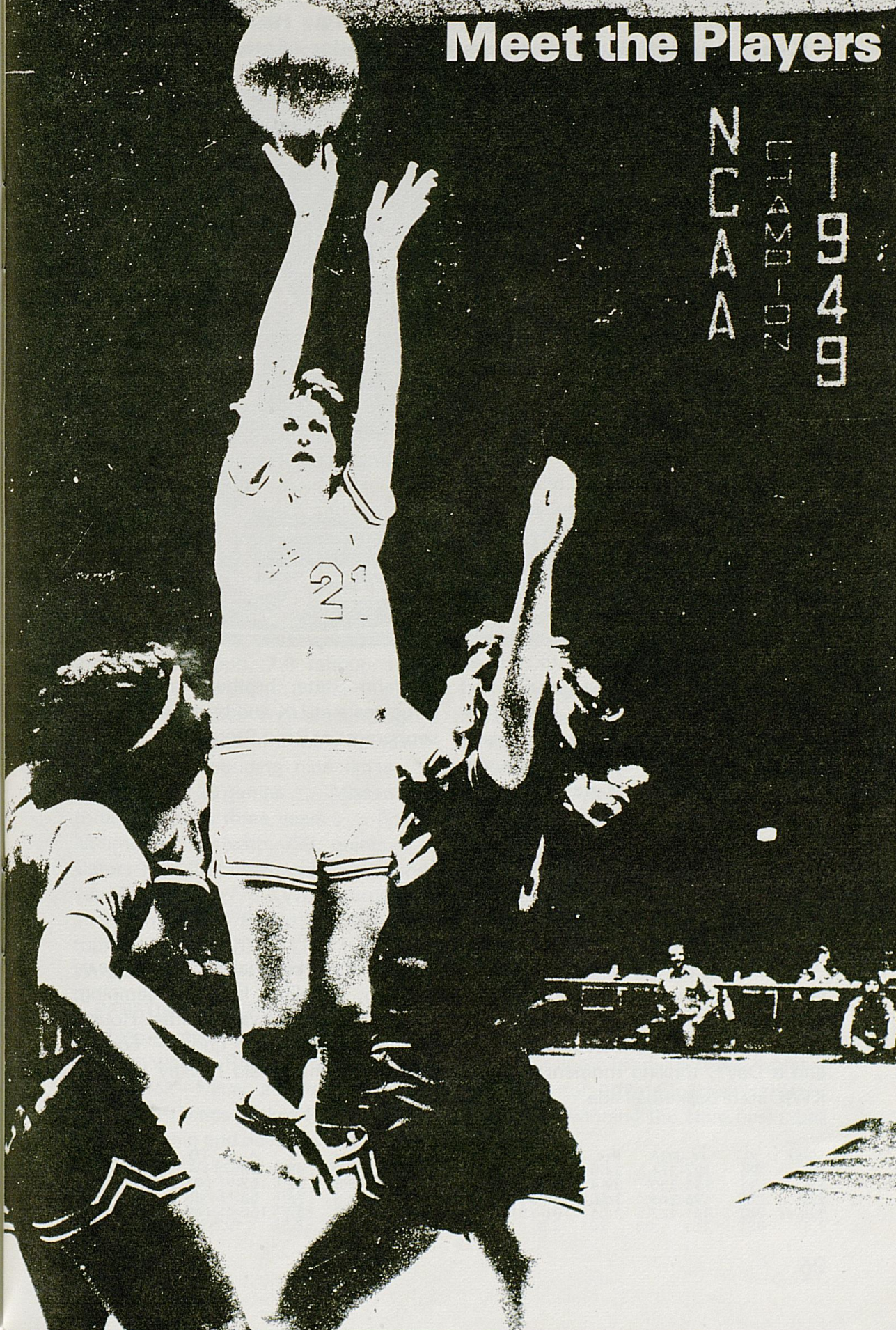

SCORES FROM EARLY YEARS

Editor's Note: The first official compilation of past scores of men's basketball games at the University of Kentucky, published in the 1947-48 Wildcat Basketball Facts, contained many omissions and inaccuracies, as did the first list of UK lettermen, published in 1963, but they were a start in the right direction.

There was a little updating of some early scores in the 1961-62 Wildcat Basketball Facts, but a major revision did not occur until 1969, when Russell Rice, then UK assistant sports information director, began researching for an official count as the Wildcats raced Kansas to become the first university to reach the 1,000-victory mark.

Rice found the needed victories, plus some losses, and along the research trail also began filling in other missing data, such as the first names of some lettermen of past years and some unrecorded records.

That research is continuing today in an effort to make the Wildcat Basketball Facts (Men) even more accurate and to keep it atop such publications of its kind.

And now the process is starting anew with the women's basketball program. The games, scores and letterwomen listed here represent the beginning of a research project that will be long and tedious.

Hopefully it will also be fruitful.
