There were 21 arrests, but none was related to the on-field celebration. Pepper spray was used on fans to keep the goal posts standing as police remembered a similar episode two years ago,

when car windows were broken by a group of people who paraded the goal posts down a street.

In Columbus, Ohio, state troopers used pepper spray on fans to keep them away from one of the goal posts after No. 2 Ohio State beat Michigan 14-9. Some fans climbed the goal post, but couldn't knock it down.

Eight people were arrested for disorderly conduct and open-container violations, and at least a dozen small fires were reported near the campus after the goal of the state of the stat

#### Saudis examining money link to 9/11

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers pressed for answers Sunday on a possible Saudi money trail in the Sept. 11 hijackings and said regardless of whether one exists, the kingdom must stop its "duplicitous" coddling of terrorists. Saudi officials spent the weekend having bankers pore over the records of Princess Haifa al-Paisal, wife of their ambassador to the United States, to see how thousands of dollars from her account might have ended up in the wrong hands, said Saudi foreign policy adviser Adel al-Jubeir. But he said it was "crazy" to suggest she had done anything intentionally to support terrorism. In a harsh turn bound to be uncomfortable for administration officials as they seek Saudi assistance in a possible war with Irraq, senators upbraided the Saudi government for what they see as years of complicity in anti-American radicalism.

Their colors are stuning and vase lives long, but they've little fragrance. Genetic engineers are also busy bringing science to bear on diseases and pests that affect the world's 120 different rose species, which have blossomed into a \$10 billion-a-year business worldwide.

FRANKFORT — For decades, tobacco has been the icon of Kentucky politics, an unassailable commodity to which all had to pledge fealty. It wasn't terribly long ago, for example, that some legislators threatened to punish the University of Louisville for daring to suggest a nonsmoking policy on parts of campus. Kentucky was one of the last states to grudgingly impose federally mandated restrictions on sales of tobacco to youth. The arguments have ranged from health to finances. There is a school of thought that higher cigarette prices help curdemand, especially among the youngest smokers and would-be smokers.

The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce has even whis-

pered about a tobacco tax increase, perhaps to draw attention away from the fact that low corporate tax payments have contributed to the current budget problems.

The semiserious attempts to light up the cigarette tax over the last decade or so offer some evidence of the hazards associated with that kind of smoking.

## **Labor dispute** may be over

WASHINGTON — West Coast dockworkers and ship-ping companies reached a tentative six-year contract agree-ment early Sunday potentially ending a long, caustic land dispute that closed the ports and prompted presidential

ment early Sunday, potentially ending a long, caustic labor dispute that closed the ports and prompted presidential intervention.

Chief federal mediator Peter Hurtgen praised both sides, saying lead negotiators "demonstrated statesmentike leadership, which made this agreement possible."

Hurtgen, head of the Federal Mediation and Concilation Service, would not offer details of the tentative agreement, but characterized it as "historic."

Hurtgen said the tentative agreement provides "substantial improvements in wages and benefits for union members and also provides the necessary technology and dispute-resolution improvements needed to ensure that America's West Coast ports continue to modernize and increase both efficiency and productivity."

The agreement still must be ratified by the entire membership of the International Longshore and Warehouse Union in a vote likely to take place after the Thanksgiving holiday, Hurtgen said.

President Bush, in a statement issued early Sunday, said: "This agreement sig good for workers, good for employers and it's good for the American economy. I congratulate labor and management for working together to successfully resolve their disagreement."

The Pacific Maritime Association, which represents the sipping companies, had locked out dockworkers at the 29 major Pacific ports for 10 days, causing Bush to invoke a little used law to open the docks Oct. 9 to avoid an economic crisis.

The ports handle more than \$300 tillion in trade yearly.

The ports handle more than \$300 billion in trade yearly. Some economists estimated that the US. economy lost \$1 billion each day as cargo piled up at the docks and ships waited at anchor offshore. Some factories shut down, lacking supplies. Bush was the first president in 24 years to invoke the emergency provision of the Taft-Hartley Act in an attempt to halt a labor dispute. He also was the first president in history to use the act to stop a lockout, not a strike.

Taft-Hartley has been invoked 11 times in port disputes in the past, of which only nine were successfully resolved.

The union's contract ended in July, Sticking points had centered on shipping companies' desire for computerized cargo tracking systems that will make dockside work more efficient, but also cost jobs. The union in return wanted increased compensation and pension benefits.





# Iraq: Inspections pretext for war

Objection: Iraq sends letter to the United Nations; Iragi complaints won't interfere with inspections

BAGHDAD, Iraq — In a long, stern letter to the United Nations, Iraq's foreign minister complained that the new Security Council resolution on weapons inspections provided a pretext for the United States to wage war against his country.

"There is premeditation to target Iraq, whatever the pretext," Foreign Minister Naji Sabri wrote to U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan, in a letter dated Saturday and released Sunday.

The Iraqi complaints are not expected to interfere with the scheduled resumption of U.N. weapons inspections on Wednesday.







Nothing seems different about the art now on display at the Rasdall Gallery — except that all of the works were cre-ated by artists with disabilities. Minds Wide Open, a program of the Arc of the Blue-grass Inc., sponsors these artists as part of its mission to cultivate artistic talent in those who have disabilities.







#### MONDAY

State legislators discussed the idea of foregoing the successful Bucks for Brains programs and building research space instead, the Associated Press reported.

UK President Lee Todd said the plan might work because of the need for additional research space on campus. But he said he wanted to see more of the plans details.

For the last few budgets, the General Assembly has appropriated \$1.00 million for UK and the University of Louisville to underwrite research endowments. The money must then be matched by private contributions but has created many endowed professorships and chairs.

This years budget was to contain \$120 million through the sale of bonds. But the plan never happened because the legislature was unable to pass a budget.

#### WEDNESDAY

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Council's Town & Gown Commission decided Wednesday to delay the initiative to place a non-voting student representative on the Urban County Council because it conflicts with the city charter the Kernel reported.

The charter sets the size of the council at 15 members, and the student liaison would be an additional member, said Michael R. Sanner, corporate counsel for the city.

Rioting sparked by a newspaper article about the Miss World pageant began in Nigeria. The article suggested the Prophet Mohammed would have approved of the context. It was seen as insulting to Muslims, especially since it was published during the holy month of Rannadan. Muslims rioted and then Christians retaliated. The violence continued through late Saturday in the northern city of Kaduna. The president of the Nigerian Red Cross said about 175 people were killed. About 12,000 people were injured. At least 22 churches and eight mosques have been destroyed.

Violence broke out despite front-page apologies by the newspaper. ThisDay. The newspaper's office was burned down.

The contest, which was to held in the Nigerian capitol, Abuja, has been moved to London.

A senior leader of the terrorist organization Al-Qaeda described as its chief of operations in the Persian Gulf has been captured, U.S. officials said.

The suspect, Abd al-Rahim al-Nashiri, was described by officials as a key planner of the 1996 embassy bombing in East Africa and the 2000 attack on the U.S. Cole. He is said to be the No. 3 official in the network.

U.S. officials said Nashiri was captured three weeks ago at an airport in a foreign country.

#### FRIDAY

Israeli forces took control of Bethlehem and searched for those responsible for a suicide bombing that killed 11 bus passengers in Jerusalem Thursday.

Soldiers arrested about 20 suspects and took control of the Church of Nativity to prevent militants from taking refuge there as they did during a similar streal offensive in April.

With Bethlehem occupied, Israel is again in control of all major Palestinian cities in the West Bank except for Jericho. The April and June offenses because of U.S. pressure to limit Middle East violence as Washington concentrates on Iraq.

#### WHATTOEXPECT

A United Nations team will resume inspections of possible weapons sites in Iraq Wednesday after a four-year suspensions.

Inspections were suspended after disputes about U.N. access to sites and Iraqi complaints that the United States placed sples on the inspections team.

# **Next police study** should probe deeper

A recent study of Kentucky police agencies shows there is no conclusive evidence that officers use race as the sole reason to stop drivers. But the study's author, University of Louisville professor Deborah Wilson, warned its findings are "limited and exploratory."

For example, only Kentucky State Police and 36 local belied departments, including LIK nolice.

For example, only Kentucky State Police and 3b local police departments — including UK police—were studied. Neither the Lexington or Louisville police departments took part in the analysis.

Results of the study did include some alarming figures concerning Hispanic motorists. In general, Hispanic drivers faced more and longer searches than did whites or blacks. Officers searched the vehicles of 14 percent of Hispanic drivers, as compared with 6 percent of blacks, 5 percent for whites and 2 percent for Asian Americans. The rate of contrapercent for Asian Americans. The rate of contraband found in searched vehicles was 12 percent for Hispanics, 15 percent for blacks and 22 percent for

While it is certainly good that the study finds that the racial percentages of traffic stops virtually

matches the state's racial breakdown, its findings

should not be taken as being absolute.

The fact that only a small portion of police departments in Kentucky was examined should make anyone think twice before accepting the conclusions

Nor will the study do anything to erase the negative feelings of many within minority groups who have had negative encounters with the police.

It will take much more than these findings to convince some that the police are not specifically target-ing and people with darker skin, especially after the events of Sept. 11.

More information should be taken and analyzed before any final conclusions are accepted. Future studies should also involve more police departments, especially those in Lexington and Louisville.

Undoubtedly there are positive signs within the statewide study of racial profiling. But it alone is not an answer to the problem. Until more complete studies are done, we will not have necessary conclusions on which workable solutions may be built.


