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## Students discuss keg tagging

Students voice concern over the implications of the policy; SG president will represent students at Council meeting

Students raised a variety of questions Monday night when they met with local government and school officials in the Student Center to debate a keg tagging policy.

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council could formally vote to forward the ordinance to the docket as early as today.

The proposed policy would require retailers to tag kegs and report their sales to the county within 30 days of their purchase. The tags could then be used to identify the person who bought the keg through his or her name, address and drivers license number.

Student Government held Monday's forum to give students and residents the opportunity to discuss the proposed policy with members of the local government, said SG press secretary Will Nash.

Nash asked how the police would be able to differentiate keg beer from the beer partygoers bring themselves.

Other students worried that all the time checking IDs and writing tickets for the purchaser of the keg could tie up the police when they need to be handling other crimes.

Council members David Stevens and Paul Brooks listened to the students' concerns.

Brooks said that under the proposal, the property owner is ultimately responsible whether the beer came from a keg or from another source.

According to Nash, students have stopped by the SG office complaining about loopholes they see within the policy.

"They're concerned with things like underage people bringing their own cups to parties," he said. "They're worried that police wouldn't be able to tell the difference

between that." SG President Rachel Watts plans to attend the council's work session today.

"I'm just going to represent students who want to be involved with this," she said. "If we work together on this, it can be a lot better for the campus and the city. We don't want to turn this into an 'us against them.'"

Watts said students will be willing to make sacrifices for the ordinance.

"If the ordinance goes through a committee with students looking at the possible implications it could have on them, there can be a compromise," she said.

Watts sent invitations to the forum to all of the Council members and other members of the local government Sunday. After problems with former SG President Tim Robinson tarnished the group's relationship with the Council, SG members think events like this could gain the organization some support.

"It's not a rally to gather animosity," Senate President John Weis said before the forum Monday. "These people are going out of their way to come out on our turf," he said.

"If they respected us before, they will even more now."

SG Senator Braghuis Kaalund said relations between the Council and students need to be improved.

"My feeling right now is that there is a growing divide between campus and the Council that we need to bridge," Kaalund said. "They are passing laws that affect us without seeking our voice."

Kaalund said that Watts' efforts to meet with the Council and other city officials should encourage them to seek her input on issues that involve the student body.

Advocates of the keg tagging policy say that it will curb underage drinking.

"I'm amazed by the number of parents and grandparents that buy kegs for high school students," said Lisa Johnson, the Lexington resident who initially suggested the ban to the Council.

Johnson said she has

## Students can get specials, advice at local banks

Financial institutions offer incentives as well as tips and techniques for responsible banking

College students are known for never having enough money, but the problem facing some students is what to do with the money they do have.

That's why many banks are catering specifically to students, enticing them with special offers.

Financial institutions like Bank One, Fifth Third, National City and U.S. Bank advertise special banking options.

For example, U.S. Bank offers a free checking account just for students. Bank One offers 10 free music downloads when an account is opened. And that's just a taste of the offers.

Mary Peniston, personal banker at U.S. Bank, and Elizabeth Ellinghaus, banking center manager at Bank One, said their banks try to accommodate the needs of students.

The UK Federal Credit Union also wants to help students with their banking needs.

The UKFCU is a non-profit financial cooperative, which means, unlike banks, its financial value is determined by money invested into it rather than stocks. This means credit unions are more connected with its customers, said Anne Corley, marketing representative.

The credit union provides banking options for UK and Lexington Community College students, faculty and staff.

It offers free checking accounts with no minimum balance requirements as well as financial seminars for students through UK 101 classes.

But for some students, having money in the bank creates the problem of keeping it there.

"Initially it all goes in the bank, but it manages to work its way out," said Jon Healy, a music education sophomore.

Some students get checking accounts but underestimate the value of having a savings account, said Donald J. Mullineux, director of the School of Management in the Gatton College of Business and Economics.

"The nice thing about a savings account is it gives protection against running out of money," Mullineux said.

That's protection that some students say they need.

Unless a student has an impending reason to save money, such as spring break or a new car, he or she isn't looking for ways to save or invest their money, some said.

Elizabeth Ellinghaus, the banking center manager at Bank One on Euclid Avenue, offers this advice to students: "Start saving very early — it is easy to make small investments grow."

According to Mullineux, the most important

## Record federal deficit ignites blame on Bush

WASHINGTON — The federal deficit soared to \$374.2 billion in 2003, the White House said Monday, a record total that more than doubled last year's red ink and looked like a prelude to even gloomier numbers.

Because the shortfall marked an improvement from a \$455 billion projection the White House made in July, Bush administration officials cited it as evidence that their attempts to fortify the weak economy were working.

White House budget director Joshua Bolten conceded that worse fiscal numbers were on the horizon, estimating the gap for the new year. Bolten said spending re-

straint and policies aimed at bolstering the economy can wrench the budget onto a course to halve deficits by 2008.

Even so, next year's figure could become a political concern for President Bush and Republicans in Congress. With federal budget years running through Sept. 30, next year's figure will be ready less than a month before elections.

Democrats mocked the administration's sunny interpretation and tried to focus attention on the numbers for the budget year just ended. They noted that last year's red ink was more than twice 2002's \$158 billion, and surpassed the \$290 billion record

set in 1992. Democrats blamed Bush for the reversal.

Some Democrats have accused the White House of purposely padding its deficit forecast last July to lay the groundwork for casting the final budget as good news. Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., raised that question anew on Monday when it became clear the actual 2003 deficit was \$81 billion less than the administration projected three months ago.

Republicans have blamed the deficits on the recession and on the costs of opposing terrorism. On Monday, Senate Budget Committee Chairman Don Nickles R-Okla. called the new numbers "encouraging."

tried to make it clear that she is not targeting college students with the policy.

"If anything, I want to work with the students because they are such an important part of the community," she said.

Johnson said that while discussing the policy with students, she has been surprised by how few of them say that they drink, as well as the lack of concern they have with the issue.

"Most of the ones I talked to said they are cool with it because they don't serve minors," she said.

"A lot of the students at UK agreed with me that drinking starts in high school," she added.

Some studies support that belief.

The national Youth Risk Behavior Survey published by the Center for Disease Control in 2001 found that 47.1 percent of high school students had at least one drink within the past month, and 29.9 percent had five or more drinks in one sitting at least once within the last month.

Kaalund, who is also a law student, said that regardless of who the intended targets of the law would be, the council does not have the legal ground to establish such a policy because of Kentucky's Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

"There are a lot of Kentucky Supreme Court cases saying that when a regulatory act is set up by a scheme as broad as the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, for a municipality to supplement that act they would need the general assembly to pass a law giving them that authority," he said.

Bowling Green, home of Western Kentucky University, is the only other city in Kentucky to enact a similar law according to the Lexington Herald-Leader.

## Show some spirit while shopping with 'UK' checks

School spirit can be found in checkbooks not by what people buy but what they pay with, bank employees say.

Many bank customers prefer to show their Big Blue Spirit with checks emblazoned with the UK logo.

Banks around campus, such as Bank One, Fifth Third, National City, U.S. Bank and the UK Federal Credit Union, offer checks with the UK logo.

Anne Corley, marketing representative from the UKFCU, said students can use these specialized checks as a way to express their personalities.

Bank customers can order the checks at their banks just as they would with any other personal check order.

These checks cost anywhere from \$11 to \$25, depending on the bank and type of account.

If a bank customer isn't a UK fan, many banks also carry or can order checks with other college logos on them. Prices for the checks are similar to those for other types of decorative checks.

Some financial institutions, like U.S. Bank, also carry a variety of professional sports logos.

Once a student opens a checking account, he or she can choose the basic check design their bank offers or pay a little more for one of the specialized check designs available.

Boyd's performance against Ohio made Lorenzen proud. Boyd threw for one touchdown, rushed for two more and added his first receiving touchdown this season.

Lorenzen connected with Boyd in the spring and early summer, but it wasn't until the seventh game of the season that they were able to connect again for touchdown.

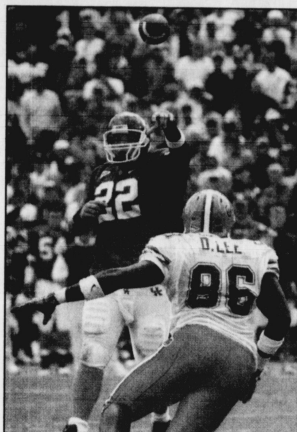
UK head coach Rich Brooks expects to see more of a Boyd-Lorenzen combination.

"I would say you are probably going to see more than you saw of (Boyd) in the first five games," Brooks said. "He's certainly going to be a factor in our offense. I hoped he would have been more of a factor earlier, but we didn't execute some of the packages that we had hoped to use him in."

But Brooks mixed any idea of a quarterback controversy by emphatically stating that Lorenzen is the starter.

"Those guys are competitors and they are good friends," Brooks said.

And Boyd would like to avoid any controversy. He would rather the team play both QBs to their strengths. "It would be a waste of time to be mad about it, when there isn't too much we can do about it," Boyd said. "I mean, he's a good player. In a good player, but we have got to continue to work. Georgia has played two QBs, and it works.

### Three former Cats traded in Mavs-Celtics deal

DALLAS — The Dallas Mavericks acquired former UK Wildcats forward Antoine Walker and guard Tony Delk from the Boston Celtics in a five-player trade Monday.

The Celtics agreed to take center Raef LaFrentz and the four years remaining on a \$69 million, five-year

contract he signed before last season.

The Celtics also get Jiri Welsch and former Cat Chris Mills.

Walker, a three-time All-Star who averaged 17.3 points and 8.7 rebounds last season, goes from playing alongside one high scorer in Paul Pierce to being joined by

four: Dallas' nucleus of Dirk Nowitzki, Steve Nash and Michael Finley plus Antawn

Jamison, who was added in August.

Walker has size (6-foot-9, 245 pounds) but can run the offense. His dribbling and passing skills make him the prototype "point forward" coveted by Mavs coach Don Nelson.

Walker led the Celtics in assists the last three seasons, and he and Pierce combined to average nearly half of Boston's points during that span.

"We see Antoine as a triple-double guy," said Donnie Nelson, the coach's son and an assistant coach. "I know in some form or

fashion at the end of the game you're going to see the Big Three and Antoine Squared."

Delk will be a backup swingman, with Travis Best still the primary relief for Nash. Nelson said Delk may be able to provide some of the intangibles lost when Nick Van Exel was sent to Golden State.

"He's not afraid, he's tough and experienced," Nelson said, referring to Delk. "He's got a knack for making big shots and big plays."

## Extending benefits wise, but should be equitable

Much attention has recently been focused on domestic partner benefits for Lexington employees. UK has also had its share of controversy in dealing with this intricate matter.

Last week, a staff committee unanimously rejected a proposal calling on President Lee Todd and the Board of Trustees to oppose extending benefits to domestic partners of UK employees.

The committee was wise to reject the proposal, which was grounded on the assertion that domestic partnerships, other than those involving the traditional man-woman marriage, create "social pathologies" that erode our society's moral values. Such notions have no business in a benefits policy debate.

It is the mark of arbitrary, prejudiced thinking that shines through best of all when benefits are restricted on the basis of social conventions like heterosexual matrimony.

But before benefits are extended to domestic partners of university employees, the committee should seek to define precisely what a domestic partner is.

In fact, care should be taken to see that if the benefits policy is revised away from its current traditionalist character, the criteria for eligibility shouldn't be specific across social categories

of UK employees' relationships at all.

How could benefits be extended to homosexual partners, while the same benefits are not extended to long-term heterosexual partners? In order to be fair to all university employees, any changes in domestic partner benefits should not be exclusive to homosexual couples.

This also brings up a point that was raised in the rejected proposal: How will domestic partnerships be verified? Extending privileges to partners of UK employees leaves the system open to abuse.

According to Russ Williams, a member of UK's human resources department, nine of UK's 19 benchmark institutions currently offer benefits to domestic partners of employees. Another nine do not, and one is set to begin extending the benefits.

This should lead UK to explore this issue and to eventually extend benefits to domestic partners of employees. Homosexual employees are just as valuable as those employees who are married in traditional marriages.

Yet, so are unmarried employees in long-term heterosexual relationships. UK's benefits should not be exclusively available to married employees; at the same time an extension of benefits should not be exclusive to homosexuals.

### MONDAY

An increase in diversity enrollment at Lexington Community College serves as a testament to the hard work of LCC's multicultural affairs department in attracting more minority and international students.

While LCC achieved the largest enrollment in its history this year — nearly 8,700 students — it also managed to increase the numbers of blacks, Hispanics, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Black enrollment at LCC increased four percent, Hispanic enrollment increased 25 percent, and enrollment of Asian and Pacific Islanders increased by 27 percent.

That LCC has an international student population and is working to better serve those students with a new full-time international student coordinator is also a credit to the school.

### WEDNESDAY

A concrete walkway that will connect the Reynolds Building to the rest of campus is set to be completed by the end of the month, and should serve to ease the minds of students who have classes in the area.

Plans for the project were made after several officials, including President Lee Todd, Vice President of Student Affairs Pat Terrell and Associate Vice President of Facilities Bob Wiseman, took a walk over to the Reynolds Building in April to evaluate the safety of the path.

Terrell said the walk made her feel uneasy and that she would have suspected danger had she not been with her colleagues.

Administrators have served students well in pushing this project. The dilapidated path that students are forced to take is poorly lit and isolated from heavily-trafficked areas.

The path will be well-lit and may be fenced in eventually. It will run between the Taylor Education Building and the Reynolds Building.

### THURSDAY

A proposed beer keg tagging ordinance now moving through the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council is laudable in its ultimate ideal, although it does have some specific flaws that the Council should reconsider.

The proposed ordinance would require a keg-purchaser to register a keg with the liquor store where he or she buys it, and ultimately with local government.

One issue with the proposal is that only one person could register a keg, while multiple people might be responsible for it.

Another common occurrence is for underage drinkers to bring their own alcohol to parties. If they drink out of plastic cups, it could be impossible to determine the source of the alcohol.

Also problematic is the possibility of kegs getting stolen — making it easy to get blamed for someone else's misdeeds.

### FRIDAY

Student Government is living up to its purpose of student advocacy and assistance in an effort to keep WT Young Library open 24 hours a day this week in light of mid-terms. SG officers are volunteering their time to moonlight during the library's normal closing hours of 2 a.m. to 7 a.m. — although they of course, have their own mid-terms to prepare for.

The library changed from its all-night schedule last year, after administrators decided to save money by keeping the lights out during the wee hours. Officials had intended to keep the library open during mid-terms and finals but they didn't have enough staff members — and in stepped SG. Members have also played a role in administrators' decision to keep the Fine Arts library open all night next semester.
