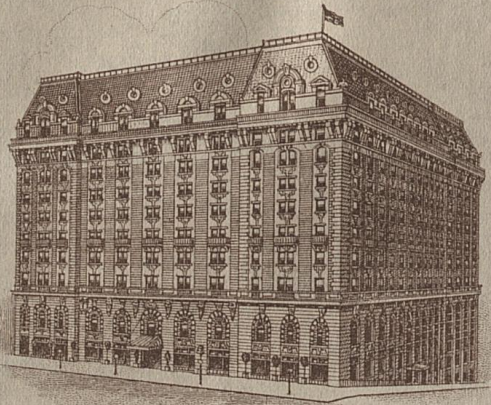

Dear Chick:

It is your time to get a letter from me. as I could not write while you were in St. C because I did not have your address. Both of us have written to Gerch and perhaps you have read our letters therefore I will not give a detail of our experiences here and at Richmond. but sum it all up by saying we have had a very pleasant time every day since we came to Virginia. The weather has been fine, though a gentle shower is now falling, we have had good things to eat, automobile rides every day, and have enjoyed very much the company of Wills family.

There have been many changes in his house and its surroundings since I was here seven years ago besides the change in weather

and my physical condition, all for the better. We expect to leave here next Friday, get on the train at Danwell, which leaves Richmond at one o'clock that day and will bring for a visit to your Frances Helen. We should arrive at Louisville ~~at~~ about noon. (provided the strike does not prevent us.) The C & O folder says 11⁴⁵ A.M. Saturday. Everything about the farm looks well, and the general appearance good in the neighborhood.

Sunday afternoon we went to Bowling Green to visit Mrs George Warner and her daughter Mrs Martin cousin of Annette, and Anna Gish with her husband John Cox and their four little daughters came over to see us. It is difficult to realize Anna, having four children

as she had been married less than a year when I was here before. We have had letters from Shirley written at Grand Rapids. She had written to Madison and obtained permission to register there on Monday (yesterday) instead of last Saturday, as she did not wish to miss seeing one of her friends who was expected in Grand Rapids the day she had planned to go to Madison. This gave her one more day with Mary, much to their satisfaction. I wrote to Kiddie yesterday, and mailed the letter which was directed to Madison which I had not sealed when Will brought her letter from the Post office, and I added a P.S. acknowledging the receipt of her letter. Will's children have

grown some since we saw them in Kentucky on their last visit. Billie has grown more than Frons Hagen and grown in his likeness to his father. Both of them are bright intelligent kids and are as polite agreeable children as you find anywhere. Our family has had a considerable scattering since the middle of June and no doubt it has brought enjoyment to each of us, but nevertheless, we will be glad when we get together again. Hope you are all well and happy - even down to Peggy - Have not had a word from "Billie Cat" since left home but hope he had no clawings from old Tom Maltree. With love to all

Dearest :-

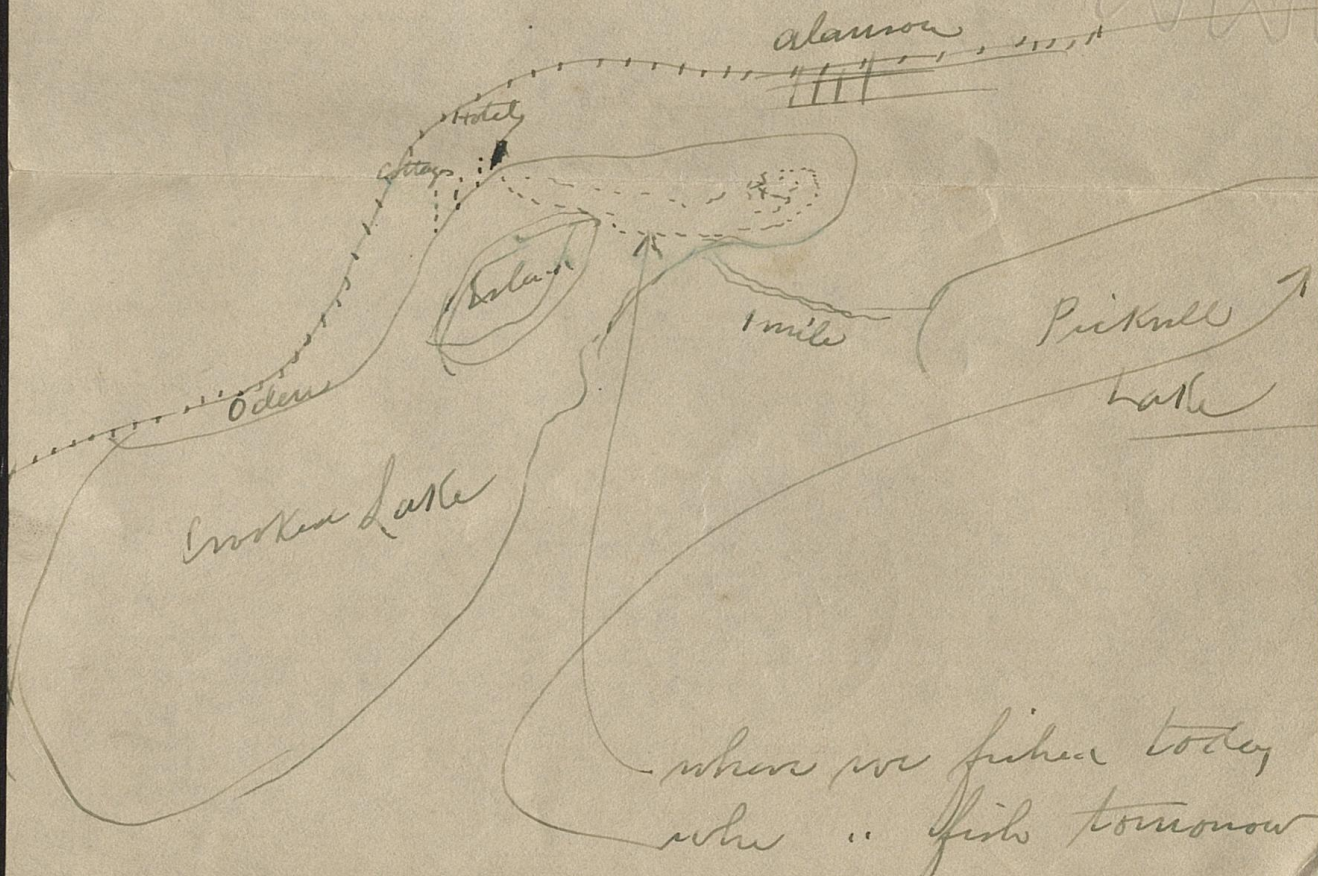
