We asked if we could get supper and ^{he said} he could not give us anything, their dining had been closed sometime but that we could get something at the lunch counter at the station. He said I could come back over there and get a room till train time if I wanted. So there was nothing to do but

proceeded over to the² lunch counter.

When we had finished it was quarter past ten. There were lots of people at the station quite a number of women. The agent had told me the 11:30 train was the first I could get and that he had telegraphed that morning for my ticket. There was such a nice looking lady and her daughter sitting waiting and I asked her if she was going to Washington and she said she was on this 11:30 train. It was so late then only a little over an hour till 11:30 so this lady said she would be glad to have Miss Farnas and me wait there with her and I was so glad to do so for the hotel man had been so exceedingly unaccommodating and

Heaps of love to my husband and my family and ever and ever so many kisses for the dearest, sweetest, bestest man in the world.



Dear Chick.


I had your letter for breakfast this morning, and it was good, so good that I had to share it with the little mother, Shirley and your husband, all of whom enjoyed it. I once had a reputation as a prompt correspondent, possibly lost or mislaid for lack of use, but from old habit I send you this note, to let you know your letter was received, and appreciated, and also to relieve to some extent the lopsidedness of the one of Gertrude asked to have mailed to you, caused by the inconvenient size and shape of the paper on which she writes. I really do not know what to write. I fear repetition of what the others have written, but if no one else had written, it would be easy enough to write you sufficient news & otherwise to fill an average country newspaper, if time were not considered. Possibly others have written of their own affairs, and it is safer to confine myself to the momentful course of my own quiet way. Since my affairs with the U.C.W. Reunion committee have been settled my final report made. I have been trying to find a regular job to sell Coal, Drama and against strikes, accidents and death, but the weather has been such that the mention of a fire, even for next winter, is oppressive to most of those to whom my persuasive appeals are made, and that American courage which all the world knows and admires, seems to take no thought of possible disaster or death, consequently I can join in the chorus of the men in my line "We aint doin' much just now in business. Still we keep up the traps. Keep on worrying them and cross roads, but always hoping to-morrow may be better." He seems to be doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances and has been quite taken up with the entertainment furnished by the Dutchtown Conv. Cen. - "Miss Gutinde Petus is visiting her friend Mrs Mary Davis at Pennc Valley" (that item is my society column.) I saw those performances for me to see. I'll have to see in order to hear it.






