Electoral College requires major overhaul

One of the most problematic insti-tutions of American democracy is the Electoral College. Under the current system, which

becomes president.
The 2000 election showed that in its

urrent system, which has been in place (with some minor modifications) since the ratification of the U.S. Constitution, voters in each state choose a set of electors, who cast votes for the presidency. The winner of the Electoral College — not the popular vote — becomes president.



electors is also unfair because it gives very small states a disproportionate influence. Each state has as many electors as it does U.S. senators and representatives — so even the smallest states get at least three electors.

According to USA Today, although California has a population 70 times that of Wyoming, it only has 18 times as many electors (\$6 to 3), meaning that a vote in Wyoming is equal to about four in California.

So how do we fix this broken, undemocratic institution?

The easiest solution would be to abolish the Electoral Collega ditogether and replace it with a simple election of the president by popular vote. But although that would fix many of the current problems, it wouldn't necessarily make things better.

But although that would fix many of the current problems, it wouldn't necessarily make things better.

The election would now be all about turnout. Each party would simply try to get as many possible sympathizers to vote, so Democrats would spend all their time in coastal metropolises while Republicans would just go through the Deep South.

Instead of moving to the center as they normally do when election day comes near, the parties would become more extreme in an effort to turn out as many people as possible.

The overall result would be a more polarized electorate and nation — and voters in many states would remain ignored.

The 2000 election showed that in its present form, the Electoral College simply does not work. Al Gore was the clear winner of the popular vote (and would now be president if our elections were truly democratic), but the race was determined in the end by a few hundred votes in Florida.

Although this election has not been decided as of this writing, the close margins in Ohio and Florida. Combined with the large number of yet-uncounted absentee ballots, make it seem likely that litigation will determine the 2004 election as well.

In addition, candidates have no incentive to visit "safe states" like Kentucky under the current system because the winner of any given state (with a couple of exceptions, since each state decides how to apportion its electoral votes) and the safe couple of exceptions, since each state decides how to apportion its electoral votes.

An ideal first step would be to make the apportionment of each state's electors based solely on the number of its U.S. representatives. Small states would have a slightly disproportionate influence — a Wyoming vote would be worth about 1.3 California votes — but the disparity would not be nearly so extreme. Another important reform would be to adopt a system of proportional

representation of electoral votes: If a candidate gets 40 percent of the vote in a state with 10 electors, he or she would get four electors no matter what. In this system, every state would be competitive, and candidates would still have an incentive to try to appeal to broad sections of the electorate; it wouldn't be sufficient for parties to simply turn out their base.

At the same time, there would be less of the cutthroat competition for large states electoral bounties and less chance of another Floriad-2000-style disaster.

Disputes over close results in a state would determine the allocation of just one electroal vote, not 20 or more. It would therefore be much less likely that litigation would decide an election.

Third-party voters — often ignored, scoffed at, or outright derided because of the essential futility of voting for a third party in the winnertakes all system — would also finally have a voice in the electoral process. We will see in the next few days whether the current Electoral College system has caused American democrator to stumble once again.

Lawmakers failed to address this issue after the 2000 election, but I hope Electoral College reform is a major pri-ority for the nation over the next four years — especially if 2004 is a replay of

2000.

By pushing our legislators to introduce a Constitutional amendment for reform of the Electoral College, we can make it happen — and the outcome will make our votes worth more, while making the United States more democratic.

Everybody would win — and maybe we'd even see some major-party candidates in Kentucky in 2008.

 Lexington voters passed the LexTran tax referendum, which will increase property taxes by six cents per \$100 of land. The tax is expected to rein in a little more than \$10 million annually.




