

Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August 1969.

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr.
Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.



Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been the hallmark of Cliff Hagan's nine-year reign as athletics director with outstanding attendance at football and men's basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball games, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

In the coming year, the University will host the 1984 NCAA Volleyball Championships and the Mideast Regional of

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the presitigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena.

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program.

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton.

When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season.

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern
Kentucky University, where Hall
earned her Master's Degree in 1974
and was immediately named head
basketball coach. The Lady Colonels
went 14-6 that season and won the
KWIC title over Kentucky,
Louisville, Western, Morehead,
Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play: "Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players: "I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred
Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record in 1983.

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan.

Graduate Assistant Louisville, 1983

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.


LISA NEAL Manager

UK GETS BREAK FROM SEC ACTION

RECORDS: Kentucky 11-11 DePaul 8-12

SERIES: Kentucky leads 1-0

The Lady Kats take a break from their grueling Southeastern Conference schedule tonight when they take on the DePaul Lady Demons. The Lady Kats faced four straight ranked conference opponents, upsetting fifth-ranked Mississippi and previously 20th-ranked Florida, before falling to No. 1-ranked Georgia and dropping a heartbreaker at No. 7 Tennessee Sunday.

Against the Lady Vols of Tennessee, the Lady Kats courageously struggled back from a 22-6 deficit with nine minutes to go in the first half to pull to within two at 29-27 and 31-29. Tennessee scored the last four points of the half, however, and held a 35-29 halftime lead.

After the Lady Vols went up by eight in the second half, UK roared back and tied at 41-41. After Kentucky went up at 50-47 with eight minutes left, Tennessee converted a three-point play. Although the score was tied several times thereafter, UK never regained the lead. The score was knotted at 65-65 with a minute left. Tennessee missed a shot and Sandy Harding rebounded, but Kentucky turned it over with 27 seconds remaining. Tennessee worked the clock down and Mary Ostrowski's baseline jumper with five seconds left gave UT the win.

DePaul is coming off a loss to Detroit, a team they had beaten earlier in the year. The Lady Blue Demons have had a season similar to Kentucky's—up and down. A big bright spot has been the outstanding play of senior guard Barbara Atsaves, who recently became the school's all-time leading scorer. This year, Atsaves



is averaging 18.4 points a game. She had a seasonhigh 35 points against Evansville and had back-to-back 30-point performances against Connecticut and Georgia State earlier in the season.

Atsaves fired in 18 points against Kentucky last year but the Lady Kats prevailed 72-48 in Chicago's Rosemont Horizon gym. Three other starters are back from last season's team, including forward Janine Douglas, who averages 11.3 points.

Kentucky has four double-figure scorers—Leslie Nichols (18.5), Diane Stephens (12.7), Karen Mosley (12.4) and Lisa Collins (10.3).

After tonight's match, Kentucky resumes SEC play, traveling to No. 13 Auburn for a game Saturday. Then the Lady Kats return home for a very important game with Vanderbilt next Monday. Kentucky lost 77-74 at Vandy on Jan. 22, and need to defeat the Lady Commodores by more than three for a third-place seed in the SEC East division. The top three seeds in each division bypass the first round of action in the SEC tournament.

MILLER HOPING HARD WORK WILL PAY OFF

It's not easy being a red-shirt player for a major basketball program, no matter who you are. Shelly Miller can tell you that from experience. She has been on the sidelines of Lady Kat games since this year's season began in November, while pounding it out every day in practice. The hours are long and hard, and the gratification is little, but Shelly is hoping it will all pay off next year when her time will come to prove herself as a Lady Kat.

Until that time, the days go slowly by for Miller as she does her best to keep her spirits up and her aggression on the court at its peak each day, while going up against her future teammates.

Miller spent her first yeart of college at Penn State, playing volleyball for a team that finished 26-15 last season. Her team went on to participate in the NCAA Women's Volleyball Tournament, but lost in the first round to Nebraska.

A volleyball and basketball player, and a member of the track team in high school, Miller said she decided at the end of the season that she would rather be playing basketball "because I missed it so much and I thought I could do well."

So she began looking around for another college. "I was approached by Michigan, but they don't have much of a basketball program up there, and I wanted to go to a school with a good team," Miller said.

Later, Miller's father was on business in Lexington and, after a talk with head coach Terry Hall, Shelly was invited to come down for a visit and participate in summer basketball camp. "At the end of summer camp, they said I could have a scholarship."

From there, it would be a long year of practice, practice, practice. Every day she would have to work hard to earn the respect from her teammates, coach, and someday, the fans. In fact, it is self-determination that motivates Miller toward her goal of respect, especially from her teammates

"I think my role is different from what they think it is, in what I plan to accomplish. I think I could be a really good player, but I have to prove it to them first," she said. "Now, I am suppose to fill in the positions wherever they need me, but I hope



that situation is different next year. I hope they look at me as a player and not just as somebody to help out."

Miller said she hopes that respect comes with eligibility and by proving herself in game situations.

Back at Medina Senior High School in northern Ohio, Miller was counted on many times, where she averaged 22 points and 13 rebounds per game her senior year. Her team lost in the regional finals of the post-season tournament, and Miller was named to the 1st Team All-State. Later that spring, she was invited to participate in the McDonald's All-Ohio game and started on the same team with Lady Kat Karen Mosely.

Miller was no slouch in volleyball or track, either. She was named as the Cleveland area MVP in volleyball after her team won two conference championships. Miller was also captain of the track team and excelled in running the hurdles, a conference champion twice and a regional finalist once.

But these days, her challenges come on the floor of Memorial Coliseum, where she has big plans for the coming years. "I'd like to be a good, solid rebounder and be able to score when they need me to," she said. "And I want to be fundamentally sound. I'd just like to play wherever they need me, no matter where it is."

BASEBALL TEAM PREPARES FOR '84 SEASON

When the Univrsity of Kentucky baseball team starts its season on March 2, the players will have only two things on their minds: a Southeastern Conference title and a bid to the NCAA College World Series.

After finishing with a 31-14 record overall, the Wildcats will be looking for revenge, after recording a weak 6-11 mark in the SEC.

"It is tough to project how we'll finish," said head coach Keith Madison. "I think we have a chance to win it all, but we have to improve on our conference standings before we can go anywhere."

Last year, the Wildcat pitching staff finished with a 3.37 earned run average, good enough for 13th in the nation. Only one pitcher was lost from the squad

"We have all our pitchers returning except for Jeff Parrett, who graduated," Madison said.

Paul Kilgus led the team in ERA with a 2.39 and a 6-5 won-loss record. Jeff Hellman won four games with a 2.66 ERA and is currently one of the remaining 44 people left on the U.S. Olympic team. The final cut for the Olympic team will be

this spring during the regular season.

On offense, the Cats will be paced by senior Brandt Ely, who finished the season with a .422 batting average. Ely finished second in the conference in batting percentage.

"Offensively, we have a few question marks, but we have a good nucleus around Brandt," Madison said.

During last year's season, the squad compiled a 16-game winning streak outside the conference before losing to Indiana 3-1.

"I think our non-conference record shows how tough our conference really is," Madison said. "We played four teams that made it to the NCAA regionals and beat all four of them.

"Morehead was only one game away from the College World Series and we beat them 11-0. If we can play as well in the conference as we do out of the conference we shouldn't have any trouble getting a bid."

The team opens the season with a five-game road trip against Srping Hill and South Alabama in Mobile, Ala., followed by three games against West Florida in Pensacola.





pportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band—or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available-and there's someone to share it.

There are 22 national fraternities and 16 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.

In addition to supporting the various Wildcat and Lady Kat teams, men and women students take part
