Remembering Stonewall Thursday, June 18th 6:30 Central Library (140 E. Main St.)

Remembering Stonewall is an audio documentary about the events of June 28, 2009. It weaves together the perspectives of many participants including Police Deputy Inspector Seymour Pine, who marshaled the raid on the bar, and Sylvia Rivera, a drag queens who battled fiercely that night.

Several people who lived in New York at this time share their impressions of the riots and how it changed all our lives. You will hear from Randy Wicker, the first openly gay person to appear on television and radio; Joan Nestle, founder of the Lesbian Herstory Archives; and Jim Fouratt, who helped found the Gay Liberation Front on the third night of the Stonewall Riots.

There will be a panel discussion following the documentary. This is sponsored by the Lexington Public Library. There will be free parking available in Library garage.

KY Fairness Vigil

The Kentucky Fairness Alliance (KFA) has been working diligently to pass a statewide fairness bill through the Kentucky Legislature. If passed, the bill would bring equal rights to every citizen of KY, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

Currently, 118 out of the 120 Kentucky counties provide no protection against discrimination for the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) community. The two counties with protections are Fayette and Jeffeson, plus the City of Covington in northern KY.

We can be denied housing and access to public accommodations, such as stores and restaurants, based solely on our orientation or identity. We have been working to gain support for the fairness bill, but we need your help.

KFA will be holding a vigil to bring awareness to this cause.

June 28th marks the 40th anniversary of the Stonewall Riots. We are looking for organizations or individuals who would be willing to host a vigil in their area.

Spotlight on the Beautiful People...

This column shines the spotlight on people in the community who deserve recognition. Beauty is not always skin deep and these "beautiful people" either devote their time and energy to a worthy cause or just plain make our lives better by entertaining us. Either way, it is time that they are recognized for their talents and efforts.

For pride month, our June honor shines the spotlight on Bill Chandler, originally from Chicago, IL but living in Lexington for over 20 years. Bill shares his life with his partner of 16 years, Terry Mullins, and Earl Lee Mullander, a Chiterriawa (made up name: part Chihuahua, part Jack Russell Terrier), as well as a black cat named Alfred.

Bill's beauty that we recognize this month is not only on the outside (what a cutie) but also for his continuous generosity to our community over the years. The GLSO Pride Center is Bill's favorite charity. "I love GLSO because I am an activist and take pride in being a part of the GLBT Civil Rights Movement. Our struggle continues and like the song says 'we who believe in freedom cannot rest until it comes'. I think the GLSO Pride Center - in its existence alone - makes a statement that proclaims we are here and we have a sense of purpose."

"My second choice would be Moveable Feast for their long-standing service & commitment to the Lexington community, both gay & straight. Also, my partner is the Director, and I am his #1 on-call delivery driver whenever he's short handed. We make a great team (love you babe). I'm

also very much aware of, and appreciate and tip my hat, to

the efforts of all groups and organizations working so vigilantly to make this lil' town we call home a better place for all of us to live. Lexington Fairness, AVOL, CKCPJ, The Humanitarium, and The Imperial Court of Kentucky, to name a few. I applaud and thank you all!"

Bill has served on many boards in years past, such as The TSGRA: Tri State Gay Rodeo Assoc., Vice President; The Imperial Court of Kentucky, Secretary; The GLSO, (before employment) At Large; AVOL, At Large; The Commonwealth of Ky HIV/ AIDS Planning & Advisory Council, At Large; CPG Community Planning Group for HIV/AIDS Prevention, At Large; Ebony Male, President; The Metropolitan Community Church (MCC), where he created "The Draggin' For Jesus Show" for which his alter-ego Angel was born). "We raised thousands of dollars presenting this annual show," he said.

Bill also used to sing with The Lexington Men's Chorus; Created The Lexington's Pride Idol Competition and The ActOut Theatre Group. Awards he has won include The GLSO Volunteer Award 2005; The Wasson Award 1999; Henry Faulkner Community Service Award 2004; and The Moveable Feast Award of Admiration 1999.

Although he has never competed in any drag pageants he does however admit to his stiletto days...... "As for female illusion, I have never competed in this art form but I have indeed been in face and walked in pumps as my retired alter-ego Angel, of Angel & The Heavenly Rays (most folks won't remember those days I'm sure). The Heavenly Rays consisted of some enormous drag talent some of whom are still performing regularly today...Rayna Starr, Devina Latrell and LaToya Ba-Call. We delivered some fabulous shows, if I must say so myself (smile)."

When asked what the biggest misconception about him was he replied, "Funny, you should ask that. I was recently at a party where I became reacquainted with someone from the community. Someone I've seen around for years but who always seemed a bit stand-offish. Anyway, this individual overheard me joking and laughing with some of the other guests (folks we both knew better than each other), but this encounter prompted him to tell me that for years he thought I was stuck up and somewhat unapproachable, which I thought was bizarre because I like to think of myself as a down to earth type of individual, open, and most certainly approachable (LOL)."

"Anyway, I said to him, (with a smile)... 'Really, are you kidding? Well, I know a lot of people, maybe you should have asked somebody.' We all laughed and although I haven't seen him around lately, I believe I made a new friend that night so hugz Charles. Ummm, so yeah, the biggest misconception about me, of late, is that I'm stuck-up and/or unapproachable. That's not me."

I asked Bill to finish the following statement: The world would be a better place if... and he replied,

"The world would be a better place if we had more evolution and less revolutions. It never ceases to amaze, confuse, and frustrate the hell out of me that there are otherwise seemingly intelligent folks in this world who still can't grasp the reality of one's sexual orientation not being a choice and therefore cannot conceivably wrong! Or the fact that bigotry, racism, discrimination, intolerance and the hatred built on these types of negativity still thrive so richly in our town and, indeed, in the world! We need more M.E.N. Mind Evolution Now! With open hearts and open minds this world of ours would be just fine.

I then asked, How do you strive to make the world a better place?

"I strive to make the world a better place by showing up for work everyday, being a community activist, talking to people about the issues confronting the GLBT community and the world today, being respectful of others, and by always trying to navigate my life toward love and understanding and not hatred and conflict; because when my time here is done and folks remember me, I want them to be able to say "He was my friend, and He was a good man."

Bill, thank you for this interview. Lexington is blessed to have you in our corner and so devoted to the betterment of our cause. I am truly inspired by you.

Acceptable Violence Lexington Fairness

As a child, it was important that you understood these two realities: 1) kids can be cruel and 2) the playground is host to some of life's harshest lessons. However, it seems that throughout the generations, kids have gone from cruel yet puckish to vicious without boundaries. The childhood recess ritual has transformed into almost 24/7 harassment.

Bullying is a topic that has gotten a lot of attention lately with some state legislatures passing—or considering—laws regarding school bullying as well as cyberbullying. However, bullying has recently grabbed national headlines for more macabre reasons – the deaths of Jaheem Herrera (11 year-old from GA), Carl Walker-Hoover (11 year-old from MA) and Maria Herrera (12 year-old from NY).

Each child endured incessant taunting and teasing, even after parents alerted the schools numerous times of the situations. And each child chose to end his or her own life. What drives a sixth grader to think, "I could live to see old age, but life will never get better so puberty will have to do"? They should be thinking about riding bikes, caffeine, sugar, and the next cool shows on Nickelodeon and Disney.

These kids weren't alone in their suffering. Bullying is considered the most common form of violence. According to the National Association of each Psychologists, School 160,000 students skip school for fear of being bullied. In 2005, the U.S. Department of Justice reported that 77 percent of students are bullied or physiverbally emotionally, Specifically speaking to cally. LGBTQ youth, 33 percent of men and

34 percent of women experience some kind of violence at home AND school. They're also four times more likely to attempt suicide than heterosexual students.

The abuse that happens in schools leaves emotional and, at times, physical, scars. Psychologists believe victims of traumatic bullying cases can exhibit signs of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, which may appear later in life. PostSecret, the website where people can anonymously bear their souls, recently displayed a card that reads "The girl who bullied me throughout elementary school has cancer. I'm not sure if I should pray for her or thank God for punishing her."

Clearly, many adults carry memories from their younger days of someone considered bigger, stronger, cooler or more popular picking on them for being too feminine or masculine, too fat or thin, too short or tall, too smart or dumb. How about you? Do you still

carry a grudge?

With the understanding that bullying greatly affects many within the LGBTQ community, Lexington Fairness has partnered with the Family Counseling Service to develop PROJECT SPEAK OUT. We are collecting anonymous stories from local middle and high schools and from college students about their experiences with bullying in the school systems.

Some of these accounts will be used to create a reader's theater-style performance piece to be presented to students, parents, educators, administrators, and the greater Central Kentucky community. The goal is to create an emotionally poignant performance that demonstrates the seriousness of school bullying. With permission, all of the original stories will be posted online.

And as an acknowledgement of the lingering effects bullying can have, Lexington Fairness will host a "Speak Out Booth" during this year's Pride Festival. People of all ages will have the opportunity to share their experiences either on camera or by voice recorder to be used as part of PRO-JECT SPEAK OUT and could be posted on our website— again, with your permission. If you are not sure you want your story to be represented, come talk to us anyway. You may find that telling someone is empowering and healing.

Society has always chalked up kids teasing one another as just kids being kids. It was a way to make you tougher, stronger, wiser. Nowadays at work, we take light jabs at coworkers as a way to relieve the stress. Kids, likewise, need a release. But bullying has become more that just playful joking. It has become a form of acceptable violence. As a human race, we must establish boundaries and draw a line in the sandbox, so to speak. Go to www.lexfair.org to learn more about the project.
