

Frankfort March April 13th 1834

Dear Sir,

I had the pleasure to receive your letter a few days past, & ill health is my apology for not having answered it immediately -

I have always concurred in the policy of a convention of our friends, as a means of animating & quickening our party - And if I had not been so much absent from home & engaged, we would, in imitation of the example of your county men, have held a meeting here in the last month to vote in your recommendation of a convention - Since the receipt of your letter, I have conversed with others on the subject of yet calling a meeting in our county & we have determined to hold it on our next county court day, which is tomorrow week, if it be thought advisable by you & our Lexington friends to persist in the measure - Mr. Chas. S. Morehead will be in Lexington in the mean, & will consult, & bring us your views on the subject - The only thing to be feared, is that at this season of the year, & under all circumstances we might not succeed in assembling such a convention, as by its numbers & general representation of the counties, would be calculated
