

My Dear Son

Ashland 17<sup>th</sup> Oct 1845.

I returned yesterday from Frankfort and to day transacted your business in the Banks. The N. Bank had discounted your note for \$2100. The payment of the discount upon that was \$43:40. and upon the old note \$1000. I took up your note at the B. B. for \$600 and enclose it cancelled.

The N-Bank discounted your note on Miss<sup>n</sup> P. J. H. for \$1500, taking off the int. and one per cent besides, amounting to \$51. and leaving the net proceeds of the bill \$1449. The one per cent would not have been deducted, if the bill had been payable before the first of March next.

The bill discounted was that enclosed in your letter of the 11<sup>th</sup> inst. The one, which you had omitted to sign and which I returned for your signature, I have not since received; but I think I understand from James that, in my absence at Frankfort, he had received it.

The result of what I did is that I paid for you
