Notes From Gen. Clay.

C. M. Clay's first wife, Mary Jane Warfield Clay, born and now living in Lexington, Ky., was divorced in Lexington court, in a suit brought by him, in which he was complainant and she defendant. She resisted the divorce, but the court decreed that Clay was entitled to a divorce, *a vinculo*, and that he had a right to marry again, but Mrs. Clay was refused a divorce *a vinculo*, and allowed only a divorce *a thoro et mensa*, (from bed and board), and was not allowed to marry again during his life.
