According to the American College Health Association's brochare "Stress in College," without some stress, people wouldn't get a lot done. Stress triggers the release of adrenaline in the body.

When people become more stressed, more adrenaline is released. Negative stress occurs when a person does not deal with stress. When stress becomes a problem for a student, he or she needs to

"Common-sense things" such as adequate rest, managing time, a healthy diet and por plop down on the couch and watch a little Star Trek," said Todd Hash, a journalism senior. The University Counseling and Testing Center, located in Frazee Hall, offers free counseling services to students who attend at least six hours at UK, the Medical Center or at Lesington Community College, and are not in a master's course. There are 50-minute individual and group counseling sessions once a week, I 5 sessions per academic year, and all records are kept confidential.

"The counseling center is a place where people can come to vent their feelings in a safe, confidential environment," said Nikki Fulks, director of the counseling center.

Four percent salary hike part of biennial request

A 4 percent salary increase over a two-year period and a 3 percent increase for University operating expenses are just we highest of a recently approved UK biennial request. The University's Board of Trustees endorsed the document, which will be given to the state, who ultimately decides how many of the actual requests will be granted.

mately decides how many of the actual requests will be granted.

"This biennial request is based only on money from the state," UK President Charles Wethington told the trustees yesterday. "The amounts are the totals it would take to give a 4 percent (salary) increase to those paid with state money."

The request is first submitted to the Council on Higher Education. After the council acts on it, it is given to the governor for his recommendations and on to the legislature for final action in the 1996 General Assembly.

on to the legislature for final action in the 1996 General Assembly.

The total state funding requested for the Community College System in 1996-97 is \$40.3 million and \$10.6 million for the following two years. For the University System, the 1996-97 request totals \$78 million and \$24.2 million in the next two years.

Wethington asked the trustees to pay close attention to the parts of the request dealing with the Community College System.

If funded, the system would receive more than \$20 million in program improvements. Specifically, the request deals with community college salaries.

"We're trying to bring the community college faculty salaries half way between the average public school salary and the average University salary," Wethington said. "In some instances, public school teachers in the state are making significantly more (money) than community college salaries."

Popcorn icon Orville Redenbacher dies



UK makes it difficult to SLIP off campus

Questions, questions, questions Students seem to be having both complex and basic problems with many of the computer systems on campus. I received many questions, which I hope I have answered to the satisfaction of those whom have asked.

However, I received many questions I feel are worthy of discussion in this article. The question I have been asked the most up to this point is how a student can get around the firewall set up on the SLIP lines for students.

The answer is there is no way for the average student to get around the firewall. Unfortunately for people at home, you must use an on-line service such as UK Online to get full access off-campus. Basically from home, all you may do is view homepages at UK, and use your local accounts.

Students who SLIP accounts obtain them usually do not realize that, with the student SLIP lines, it is not possible to access computer services off campus.



This is because of the firewall on the server. For all of you who are not following what a SLIP connection is, it is a way for students, at home, to remotely (over the modem) connect their home system to UK.

This connection allows the students (from home) to use NetScape, the files, and telhet to their accounts on campus. Also, students can use Eudora from their home PC.

A firewall does not allow information to come to you from outside of UK. If a student tries to access a homepage off campus, they will access it, but no information from that site will be displayed on their screen. This is also the wall. Jazz living legend Wynton Marsalis will be bringing big band jazz back to Lexington tonight, conducting the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra through some of the best of classic jazz songs.

The Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra will be performing this evening at the Otis A. Singletary Center at 8. Tickets run \$12 for students, \$17.50 for faculty and staff and \$22.50 for the general public.

Tickets are still available for tonight's show, but on a very limited basis. Sponsors, the Student Activities Board, are expecting the show to sell out.

The Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra started out as a summer concert series in 1987, with the notion of educating and informing the American public about jazz, a zurely American form of music.

Marsalis' association with the Lincoln Center started with this

serious about studying trumpet at the age of 12, playing in marching bands, funk bands and classical youth orchestras.

Out of high school, Marsalis entered the Juilliard School in New York City at the age of 18 and quickly became the famous performance school's top trumpet student.

pertormance school's top trumpet student.

Then just as quickly as Marsalis' successes came at Juilliard, the same year he stepped out into the spotlight of modern jazz, landing a role with Art Blakely and the Jazz Messengers and began his recording career in 1982, at the tender age of 21.

It has been all uphill since then for Marsalis, who has surpassed all other modern jazz musicians in popularity and awards. He has produced a catalogue of albums and won eight Grammy Awards.

series and he has since moved up to the title of Artistic Director of the Center.

Marsalis was born in New Orleans, where he started to be serious about studying trumpet at the agre of 12 selvation.

to jazz. He has also influenced the modern jazz scene by causing a resurgence of older jazz, like be-bop and big band sounds. Even though Marsalis over-shadows the rest of the members of the Orchestra, all the players are big time and big names. Names like Wess Anderson on sax, Cyrus Chesnut on piano and Ryan Kisor on trumpet stand out as some of the best of modern jazz musicians.

Anderson achieved much acclaim after the release of his first album last year, Warmdaddy in the Garden of Swing, and has toured with Marsalis and his band and then with the Wynton Marsalis Septet.

Septet.
Randall Haywood, trumpet, met Marsalis at age 13 when Wynton invited him to play on a PBS series called, "Marsalis on Music." Since then, Haywood has

made it to the ripe age of 16 and plays with the Lincoln Center Jazz. Orchestra when not in high school in Jacksonville, Fla. Under the direction of Marsalis, the Lincoln Center Jazz. Orchestra has not only become a source of influence and has achieved critical praise, but popular success as well.

The group has played every-where from Japan to the Mon-terey Jazz Festival and regularly plays towns and cities all over the United States.

United States.

The group's popularity may stem from its songbook, which includes works of some of the most well-known jazz musicians, like Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Thelonius Monk and Jelly Roll Morton.

The Lincoln Center hopes that its jazz program, along with the Orchestra, will help establish jazz as a fine art and specify a jazz canon, or a group of songs that stand out as exemplary iazz.



UK rifle team set to take aim at its competition

Competing at the college level in rifle is not as easy as taking aim at the target and pulling the trig-

at the target and pulming use tag-ger.

The UK squad practices five or six days a week at the Buell Armory, which is also the location of the team's home matches.

In addition, UK head coach Harry Mullins said most Wildcat shooters have been competing in shooting events from an early age.

"Many people hear about the rifle team for the first time and think, 'Hey, I can shoot. I could be on the team.' But it is really more complicated than that," Mullins

complicated than that, Munins said.

The UK coach compared shooting during competition to sinking clutch free throws in a basetball game.

"It is easy to perform when nobody is watching or when you're not under pressure," Mullins said. "What we do is at least 90 percent mental."

During matches, contestants shoot 40 shots with a .22-caliber rifle from standing, kneeling, and prone (dying) positions. In addition to the .22-caliber shots, 40 standing shots are fired with an air rifle.

Cowboys facing lawsuit

NEW YORK — Jerry Jones
says the Dallas Cowboys will prevail. The NFL's other 29 owners
say they will see him in court.

The league went to court Monday, filing a \$100 million suit
against the Cowboys over Jones'
agreements with Nike and Pepsi,
which the NFL called "ambush

marketing deals" that violate the NFL's revenue-sharing policies.

It's the latest chapter in a feud that heated up during the first week of the season, when Jones struck an agreement with Nike, which was unable to obtain an NFL marketing license. Jones announced that deal with a press release headlined "Cowboys" Owner Takes On NFL Again."

This time, the NFL is taking on Jones in preparation for today's meeting in Atlanta, where the owners were to be briefed on the suit against the Cowboys.

The suit was filed in federal court in New York following a unanimous vote of the five club executives who make up the executives who make up the executive committee of NFL Properties, the league's marketing arm.

The NFL wants the court to order Jones and the Cowboys to stop violating their agreements with NFL. Properties regarding club markings and logos, and prevent them from signing additional deals that undermine existing NFL sponsorship or licensing contracts.

Jones, expected to soon announce another independent deal with Americane Express, said he was not surprised by the NFL suit, which he called a "dumb" move by a league prone to litigation.

The Cowboys have clashed with the league by selling Pepsi rather than the league syanctioned Coca-Cola at Texas Stadium. And by signing with Nike they ignored

Players Inc., the licensing arm of the NFL Players Association. Estimates have put the value of each deal around \$2.5 million a year, Pepsi for 10 years and Nike for seven.

Both contracts are aimed at the league's revenue sharing policy in which money from television, properties and even gate receipts are shared. NFL executives have long contended they avoided the troubles besetting other sports by equalizing revenues of teams from small and large markets.

The Cowboys' agreement with Nike may have helped Jones sign Deion Sanders, a major client of the sports manufacturer. The Cowboys and 49ers vied for Sanders, the baseball player-cornerback who helped San Francisco win the Super Bowl last season.

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska coach Tom Osborne will consider

allowing star tailback Lawrence Phillips to return to the No. 2 Cornhuskers if he can learn to control his anger.

The return of the suspended Phillips also depends on the outcome of an NCAA investigation, his standing with team rules and the outcome of the legal case against him, Osborne said Monday.

Phillips could be reinstated within a month if those steps are taken, Osborne said. He said doctors would have to confirm that Phillips has made progress in controlling his temper.

Phillips, a junior who rushed for 359 yards and seven touchdowns in the Huskers' first two games, was suspended Sept. 10 after being charged with hitting his ex-girlfirend. Phillips pleaded and the progression of property.




