

## Student dies after being hit by semi

An incoming UK student died early Tuesday morning after being hit by a tractor-trailer on New Circle Road.

Brian Anthony Muth, 19, of Louisville, who would have begun his first semester at UK today, was arrested and charged with alcohol intoxication on Gibson Avenue just after 1 a.m. Tuesday, said Lexington Police Lt. Mario Russo. Russo said Muth was released into the custody of a friend.

Russo then responded to a call just after 2 a.m. that a pedestrian had been hit by a semi on the outer loop of New Circle Road near the on-map of Old Frankfort Pike, he said.

Today marks a crucial time in the development of this institution. Looking at those statistics, one can determine that UK's admissions standards are lower than its benchmark institutions. And the result is poorer retention and graduation rates. An adherence to higher standards would bring about higher success rates and success that the caliber of UK's incoming freshmen meets that of its benchmark institutions.

But admissions standards are only the belinning. The "America's 25 Hottest Schools" list by the Neussueek-Kaplan College Guide contains five of UK's benchmark universities.

UK has a very lofty goal to meet. It is important that university officials clearly articulate the plan to get UK to top.20 status, provide an honest self-examination of its pros and cons, and allow students, faculty and staff to weigh in.

- \* The UK Board of Trustees passed a \$1.48 billion budget for the 2004-05 fiscal year in June. Despite a decrease in total state appropriations, total expenditures are up approximately \$74 million. Faculty and staff received a 1 percent pay raise and UK will cover increases in their health insurance. Students also received a raise over the summer in the form of a 14 percent utilion hike.

   In June, governance of Lexington Community College was transferred from UK to the Kentucky Community and Technical College System. Although this paper endorsed the UK Board of Trustees' decision to end a 39-year partnership with LCC, we wish the best to all of the faculty staff and students at LCC and hope its relations with UK continue to be cordial for the sake of students at both institutions.

- In June, UK distributed Wethington • In June, UK distributed Wethington Awards to nearly 200 faculty mem-bers. The awards, which would not ex-ceed \$25,000 each, are supplemental income designed to retain research-oriented faculty. In late July, it was reported that UK researchers brought in a record \$258.3 million in grants for the 2004 fiscal year. We havent seen anything in the headlines about facul-yerselving supplemental income for outstanding instruction.
- UK Police cruisers and motorcycles received awards in July's Cruiser Classic in Cynthiana. UK Police Information Officer Travis Manley created the current designs used on the vehicles, which were implemented in 2002. The designs won first, second and third place awards in the college/university police cruiser division and first and second place awards in the overall motorcycle division.
- In July, UK Police reported a decrease in campus crime of approximately 7 percent in 2003. Violent crimes, property crimes and drug-related citations and arrests all saw a decrease in 2005 compared to statistics from 2002. There were no indictions as to whether the decrease in crime correlated with pretty police cruisers.
