Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, May 3, 1983.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 3 p.m. (Central Daylight Time) on Tuesday, May 3, 1983 in the Commons, Student Center/Fine Arts Building on the campus of the Paducah Community College, Paducah, Kentucky.

A. Meeting Opened and Roll Called

Mr. William B. Sturgill, Chairman, called the meeting to order at $3:12\ p.m.$ and pronounced the invocation.

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. William B. Sturgill (Chairman), Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mr. William R. Black, Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Professor Opal Skaggs Conley, Mr. James W. Dinkle, Mr. Tracy Farmer, Mr. Ronald G. Geary, Mrs. Edythe Jones Hayes, Mr. Brereton C. Jones, Mr. R. Larry Jones, Mr. T. A. Lassetter, Mr. W. Terry McBrayer, Mr. Robert T. McCowan, Frank Ramsey, Professor William F. Wagner, and Professor Constance P. Wilson. Absent from the meeting were Governor Albert Benjamin Chandler (Honorary Trustee), Mr. George W. Griffin, and Mr. A. Stevens Miles. The University administration was represented by President Otis A. Singletary; Dr. Donald B. Clapp, Vice President for Administration; Chancellors Peter P. Bosomworth and Charles T. Wethington; Dr. Raymond R. Hornback, Vice President for University Relations; Mr. David I. Carter, Special Assistant for Business and Financial Affairs; Mr. John C. Darsie, General Counsel; Mr. Henry Clay Owen, Controller and Treasurer; Dr. Paul G. Sears, Special Assistant for Academic Affairs; and Dr. Jack C. Blanton, Vice Chancellor for Administration representing Chancellor Art Gallaher. Members of the various news media were also in attendance. A quorum being present, the Chairman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 3:15 p.m.

B. Meeting Dates Established

Mr. Sturgill called attention to the schedule of meetings of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee as established for fiscal year 1983-84 (see copy at the end of the Minutes) and requested the members to mark their calendars accordingly. He reminded the Trustees that the June 21, 1983 meeting of the Executive Committee has been changed to a full Board meeting.

C. Dr. Donald Clemens Recognized

Mr. Sturgill recognized Dr. Donald Clemens, Director of the Paducah Community College, and thanked him and his staff for their hospitality in hosting the meeting. The Chairman indicated his pleasure in having the Board meeting in Paducah, and Dr. Clemens was given a round of applause.

President Singletary thanked the members of the Board for their attendance and noted that one meeting each year would be held off campus. He praised Paducah as a "good University town" and expressed his appreciation for the support of the local press. He indicated there would be a tour following the meeting for those interested in seeing the campus.

D. Minutes Approved

The Minutes of the April 5, 1983 meeting of the Board of Trustees were approved as written.

E. President's Report to the Trustees

President Singletary reviewed briefly some of the items in his monthly report to the Trustees, calling particular attention to (1) the commencement ceremonies at 4 p.m. on Sunday, May 8, (2) the award recently received by the Kentuckian for being one of the top five collegiate yearbooks in the country, (3) the Niles Folklore Collection given to the University, and (4) the naming of Thomas A. Chapman as the College of Arts and Sciences Distinguished Professor for 1983-84.

President Singletary recommended that the report be received and filed. Without objection, it was so ordered.

F. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

After noting that the personnel actions in PR 2 were routine in nature, President Singletary recommended its approval. On motion by Mr. Brereton Jones and second by Mr. Farmer, the appointments and staff changes recommended in PR 2 were approved. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Supplemental Recommendation of the President (PR 3A)

President Singletary indicated his pleasure in recommending the appointment of Professor Edmund Lambeth as Director of the School of Journalism, effective July 1, 1983. Dr. Lambeth is currently professor and Coordinator of Science Journalism at the Indiana University School of Journalism. Vice Chancellor Blanton in the absence of Chancellor Gallaher reviewed Professor Lambeth's experience and credentials. He noted his extensive experience in news coverage and added that the recommendation follows an extensive search.

On motion made by Professor Wilson, seconded by Professor Conley and unanimously carried, Edmund Lambeth was appointed professor, School of Journalism, and Director of the School of Journalism, effective July 1, 1983. (See PR 3A at the end of the Minutes.)

H. 1982-83 Budget Revisions (PR 3B)

Mr. Larry Jones moved that the 1982-83 budget revisions recommended in PR 3B be authorized and approved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Geary and passed without dissent. (See PR 3B at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Report on Gifts and/or Grants (PR 3C)

With President Singletary so recommending, the report on gifts and/or grants covering the period from January 1, 1983 through March 31, 1983 was accepted and ordered made a matter of record. (See PR 3C at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Delegation of Authority for Making Decision on Residency Status (PR $\overline{3D}$)

President Singletary recommended that the Board delegate to the Chancellor for an academic sector of the University the authority to make final institutional decisions regarding the residency status of students enrolled in that sector, provided the students' cases have been reviewed and recommended on by the Committee on Residency Review of the Council on Higher Education. Mr. Black so moved. His motion was seconded by Governor Breathitt and passed without dissent. (See PR 3D at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Approval of Degree Candidates -- Lexington Campus and Medical Center (PR 3E)

Without discussion, Professor Wagner moved that the President be authorized to confer upon each individual whose name was listed in PR 3E the correct degree to which he or she is entitled. His motion was seconded by Professor Wilson and passed unanimously. (See PR 3E at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Candidates for Degrees -- Community College System (PR

Professor Conley moved that the degrees and certificates specified in PR 4A be awarded to the persons named, upon certification that the requirements for those degrees or certificates have been satisfactorily completed. Her motion was seconded by Mr. Ramsey and passed without dissent. (See PR 4A at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Naming of University Building (PR 4B)

President Singletary recommended that the Board approve the name of CHRISMAN HALL for the new Learning Resources/Technical Classroom Building at Southeast Community College in Cumberland, Kentucky.

Chancellor Wethington pointed out that Mr. Clayton Ruben Chrisman was a member of the first Advisory Board of the Southeast Community College and a longtime friend and supporter of the University and the College. He indicated his pleasure in supporting President Singletary's recommendation which he noted also has the support of the current members of the Advisory Board and the approval of the Committee for Naming University Buildings.

On motion made by Mrs. Hayes, seconded by Professor Conley, and passed unanimously, approval was given to name the new building at Southeast Community College CHRISMAN HALL. (See PR 4B at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Change in Division Structure (PR 4C)

On motion by Mr. Black, second by Mr. McBrayer and carried, approval was given to create a fourth academic division, the Humanities and Related Technologies Division, at the Lexington Technical Institute. (See PR 4C at the end of the Minutes.)

O. Modifications in Policy Statement on Community College System Previously Approved by the Board (PR 4D)

With President Singletary so recommending, Professor Conley moved approval of the modifications in policy statement on the Community College System as presented in PR 4D. Her motion was seconded by Mr. Larry Jones and passed without dissent. (See PR 4D at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Modifications in four Medical Center Policy Documents Previously Approved by the Board (PR 6A)

On motion made by Mr. McBrayer, seconded by Mr. Farmer and unanimously carried, approval was given to the four Medical Center policy documents as recommended in PR 6A. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. University of Kentucky Selective Admissions Policy (PR 5A)

President Singletary called attention to the two-page summary of the Selective Admissions Policy approved by the University Senate on March 21, 1983. He then recommended that the Board approve the policy for implementation in Fall 1984. In the absence of Chancellor Gallaher, he called on Vice President Clapp to review the Selective Admissions Policy. Dr. Clapp summarized the policy and pointed out that its basic objective is to bring into the institution students who will achieve a 2.0 grade point average at the end of their freshman year and beyond.

Mr. Brereton Jones expressed support of the policy and declared it a step in the direction the University should move while expressing a reservation about the classification of athletes in a separate category. He requested that the Board be given a report on the workings of the policy at the end of a twenty-four month period. President Singletary indicated his intent to request such a report and said that it would be shared with members of the Board.

Governor Breathitt commended the faculty for "treating athletes" and the admissions policy "on top of the table."

Professor Wilson indicated that the faculty is not defending the athlete but rather is defending the diversity of the pool.

Mr. Geary raised two questions concerning interpretation of the policy, the first being whether the section on geographical distribution includes extra weight for non-residents of Kentucky. His second question concerned the provision for suspension of the policy in case of an emergency, and he asked whether that provision reduces the role of the Board of Trustees. It was explained that the pool arrangement, including the provision applicable to geographical distribution, applies to Kentucky residents only, and that the provision for suspension of the policy in the case of an emergency does not in any way diminish the authority of the Board to change the policy.

With President Singletary so recommending, on motion made by Professor Wilson, seconded by Governor Breathitt, and unanimously carried, the Selective Admission Policy, effective Fall 1984, was approved. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)

Mr. Clay, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Committee had met on the morning of May 3 and considered six items to be presented for action, the first of which was the financial report for the nine months ending March 31, 1983. He then moved acceptance of the report. His motion, seconded by Mr. Ramsey, carried and the financial report was accepted. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

S. External Auditor for Fiscal Year 1982-83 (FCR 2)

The Finance Committee so recommending, Mr. Clay moved that the firm of Arthur Andersen and Company, Certified Public Accountants, be engaged to perform an examination of the various accounts of the University of Kentucky and its affiliated corporations in accordance with the recommendation in FCR 2. Mr. Clay's motion was seconded by Mrs. Hayes and passed without dissent. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

T. Authorization for Incineration of Paid Bonds and Coupons

With the concurrence of the Finance Committee, Mr. Clay recommended and so moved the incineration of paid bonds and coupons as presented in FCR 3. His motion was seconded by Mr. Farmer and carried unanimously. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

U. Capital Construction Report (FCR 4)

Mr. Clay moved that the capital construction report for the nine months ending March 31,1983 be accepted. His motion was seconded by Mr. Larry Jones and passed without dissent. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

V. Room and Board Rates 1983-84 School Year (FCR 5)

Mr. Clay called on Vice Chancellor Blanton who explained through a series of charts the current and proposed room and board rates and the amount of increase for each plan. For the benefit of the newly appointed Trustees, Vice Chancellor Blanton explained that the Housing and Dining System at the University receives no state funds and is entirely self-supporting. He told the Trustees that the average 5 percent increase in room and board rates is necessary in order to meet the higher operating costs and financial demands of the Housing and Dining System. The proposed adjustments result primarily from increased labor, food, and utility costs. In closing, Vice Chancellor Blanton reported that increases in the University's cost of operating the Housing and Dining System over a five-year period were maintained at slightly less than increases in the Consumer Price Index. He reminded the Trustees that the proposed increase has been shared with student groups and published in the Kernel.

Mr. Clay said the Finance Committee, along with the Board of Trustees, wished to compliment Vice Chancellor Blanton and his staff for the excellent manner in which the Housing and Dining System is handled. He then moved that the adjusted room and board rates recommended in FCR 5 be approved. Mr. Clay's motion was seconded by Mr. McCowan. It carried with one dissenting vote by Mr. Dinkle. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

President Singletary stated that the University has the highest dormitory occupancy rate of any institution in the state, and said he was pleased that Mr. Clay had commended Business Affairs for its very good operation.

W. Voluntary Contributions to Fidelity Group of Funds, Twentieth Century Investors, and Value Line Securities, Inc. Pension Funds by University Employees (FCR 6)

The Finance Committee so recommending, Mr. Clay moved that the Board authorize voluntary contributions to Fidelity Group of Funds, Twentieth Century Investors, and Value Line Securities, Inc. pension funds by University employees as recommended in FCR 6. His motion was seconded by Mr. Black and passed without dissent. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

X. Meeting Adjourned

Mr. Sturgill again indicated his pleasure in holding the board meeting on the campus of the Paducah Community College, and said he would hope that one meeting each year could be held off campus.

Mr. McBrayer suggested that the next time a meeting is held on one of the Community College campuses a report be given on that particular college.

Mr. Black expressed appreciation on behalf of the people of Paducah to President Singletary and members of the Board for making the decision to meet in Paducah. He added that this is something the people of Paducah have wanted for a long time and that they appreciate the attendance of the Board members.

Governor Breathitt and Mr. Ramsey also expressed their appreciation that the Board of Trustees held its meeting in their part of the state.

Mr. Clay asked the Finance Committee to remain for a short information session following the meeting.

President Singletary remarked that the clear sentiment expressed concerning the location of the Board meeting underscores that UK is the state university, and he proposes to hold one meeting each year away from the Lexington Campus.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:08~p.m.

DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY FOR MAKING DECISIONS ON RESIDENCY STATUS

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees delegate to the Chancellor for an academic sector of the University of Kentucky the authority to make final institutional decisions regarding the residency status of students enrolled in that sector, provided the students' cases have been reviewed and recommended on by the Committee on Residency Review of the Council on Higher Education.

Background: Prior to 1972, pursuant to regulations issued by the Council on Higher Education, a Non-Resident Fee Committee was established at each state-supported institution for the purpose of considering appeals of students who contended that they had been incorrectly classified as non-resident students. Subsequently, by action adopted April 9, 1972, the Council made provisions for such students to further appeal their cases to a State Board of Review. The State Board of Review recommended final actions in such cases to the Board of Trustees or Regents of the respective institutions. To preclude the necessity for its consideration of individual cases after action by the State Board of Review, the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees acted on March 7, 1974, to delegate to the President of the University the authority to make final decisions regarding the residency status of University of Kentucky students whose cases had been reviewed and recommended on by the State Board of Review.

On April 9, 1975, the Council on Higher Education adopted its current policy on residency status and established a Committee on Residency Review composed of deans of admissions at the state-supported institutions of higher education as a state board of review for interpretative recommendations to the respective institutions on problems relating to non-residency (out-of-state) classification of students at the institutions, with the understanding that institutional representatives would not vote in the review of cases or problems referred to the Committee from their respective institutions.

In the event that a ruling by an institutional Non-Resident Fee Committee is unsatisfactory to a student, that student may request that a copy of his or her file be submitted by the Dean of Admissions, or other person designated by the student's institution, to the Executive Director of the Council on Higher Education for referral to the Council's Committee on Residency Review for its recommendation to the institution.

In view of reorganization of the University of Kentucky which was approved by the Board of Trustees and has been in effect since July 1, 1982, it is both desirable and appropriate that authority to make final institutional decisions regarding residency status of students enrolled in an academic sector of the University of Kentucky be delegated beyond the President to the Chancellor for the academic sector.

Background: Beginning with the summer session in 1983 the Lexington Technical Institute will be offering the general education courses that are required in each of the college's Associate in Applied Science Degree programs. The addition of these courses makes it advisable to alter the existing Division structure. The presently recommended modifications, which are principally editorial in nature, incorporate approved University organizational changes and provide needed or desirable refinements related to current applicability of the policy document.

Recommended additions and deletions are underlined and bracketed, respectively, within the paragraphs of the Policy Statement of the Community College System.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

POLICY STATEMENT ON THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

(Approved by the Board of Trustees: 1/17/64; Amended by the Board of Trustees: 11/19/71)

Kentucky's public higher education administered by the University of Kentucky will consist of two /parts/ systems under a President and a Board of Trustees--(1) the University System and (2) the Community College System. The Community College System shall be headed by a /Vice President/ Chancellor for the Community College System who shall be directly responsible to the President and shall serve as the chief executive officer concerned primarily with the operation and programs of the Community College System.

The separateness of these two <code>/parts/ systems</code> is distinguished by their respective roles. The inter-relatedness is distinguished by the shared top administrative authority which coordinates available resources for optimum use without duplication. Each system shall bear primary responsibility and accountability for its administration, policy, personnel, programs, and finances to the President and the Board of Trustees and not to subordinate administrative units of the other, unless specifically directed by the President.

The paternal role of the University of Kentucky in the development of the Community College System has been vital and effective in the genesis of a new educational concept in Kentucky. The present policy is a reflection of the philosophy that the Community College System is, in development, function, and enrollment, a valid component and not an addendum of the University's total effort to serve the higher educational needs of the citizens of Kentucky.

Cooperation rather than authority is deemed necessary to provide the flexibility and responsiveness essential for a viable and evolving comprehensive Community College System under the University umbrella. The relationships between the two parts systems shall be that of mutual liaison and interchange with common supportive services available to both. The community colleges, as they strive to fulfill their statutory functions, are to be administratively free to meet changing challenges with an internally determined and responsive flexibility.

I. Role of the Community College System

The community colleges have roles aligned both with the task of higher education in the Commonwealth and with the educational and cultural

contributions to be made to the citizens of the communities in which they are located. Following are the tasks of the community colleges:

- A. To provide two years of lower division programs applicable to a baccalaureate degree. These programs are designed to enable the student to transfer to four-year institutions in the /State/ Commonwealth and elsewhere for upper division work.
- B. To provide two-year non-baccalaureate programs leading to the granting of associate degrees or appropriate certificates in occupational areas.
- C. To provide programs of adult education and service oriented to community interests, both occupational and cultural.

II. Administrative Structure of the University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky consists of two systems under a President and Board of Trustees. The first of these, the University System, is composed of the University of Kentucky at Lexington and its state-wide research and service elements. The administrative structure in this system is not changed by the organization of the Community College System.

The Community College System consists of the twelve community colleges now in operation, the Lexington Technical Institute, and all other community colleges that may be added to the system in the future. A /Vice President/ Chancellor for the Community College System heads the Community College System reporting to the President of the University and the Board of Trustees. Each of the community colleges is headed by a chief administrative officer, reporting to the /Vice President/ Chancellor for the Community College System. Each of the community colleges (excluding the Lexington Technical Institute) has a nine-member local Advisory Board which provides advice to the chief administrative officer of the community college, the /Vice President/ Chancellor for the Community College System, the President / Of the University of Kentucky, and the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. The counsel of the local Advisory Boards is sought primarily on matters of the two-year occupational programs and local community educational needs. The faculty of each community college is administratively responsible to the chief administrative officer of the respective community college. Community college faculty maintain informal academic liaison with faculty in the parallel subject matter areas at the University of Kentucky at Lexington / Campus/.

III. Faculty of the Community College System

The responsibilities of the faculty in the Community College System differ somewhat from those in the University System. Teaching and community service functions are paramount in the community colleges. Standards of competence and performance for the functions to be performed are equally as high in the <code>/community colleges/// Community College</code> System as <code>/on the Lexington campus// in the University System. Faculty at the community colleges are expected to remain up-dated professionally for their teaching and service tasks.</code>

IV. Admission Requirements of the Community College System

Admission to the community colleges and to the University of Kentucky at Lexington is and should be separate. The Community College System has the responsibility to set up and administer its own admission requirements, subject to the approval of the President Zof the University of Kentucky and the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. Its admission requirements must be such as to allow the Kentucky. flexibility needed to serve the wide range of students in transfer, occupational, and continuing education programs. Courses offered both in the University System and in the Community College System shall carry the same identification and description. Credit hours and grades transfer to the University System from the community colleges in these courses. Courses offered in the Community College System which are not offered on the Lexington campus are evaluated for transfer credit on the same basis used to evaluate courses from any other institution.7 Grades, credits, quality points, and academic status from courses taken in the Community College System shall be transferred when the community college student enrolls in the University System. The applicability of any courses offered in the Community College System which are not offered in the University System towards satisfying the requirements for a University degree shall be determined by the dean of the college in which the student enrolls, which is the same basis used to determine the applicability of courses from any other institution. Steps are taken to assure that students enrolling in lower division degree work at the community colleges with declared plans for later transfer to curricula at the University will receive the benefit of information from the University in those areas in planning their lower division work at the community colleges. The community colleges also will see that those students who intend to transfer to another college or university receive the benefit of counsel in planning their lower division work at the community colleges.

V. Facilities at the Community Colleges

The facilities needed for the community colleges are in substantial contrast to those needed by the University at Lexington. Students

commute, thus eliminating the need for dormitory facilities. Technical facilities and equipment should be provided at the community colleges commensurate with the requirements for the programs offered in occupational areas, such as nursing or engineering technology. Laboratory facilities at the community colleges are limited to those laboratories necessary for undergraduate teaching. Library facilities also are designed to support the lower division teaching effort.

VI. Students in the Community College System

The community colleges attract students with a wide range of background and abilities. The markedly lower cost to the student and _his_ the student's family makes it possible for many more of the Commonwealth's citizens to participate in higher education.

Many students coming to the community colleges have not identified their educational and career goals. Others have financial, academic, and personal problems that need to be resolved. The community colleges are attempting to meet the needs of this heterogenous student body by giving particular attention to guidance and counseling programs.

Some students enrolling in the community colleges need additional assistance in the basic skills required to be successful in either baccalaureate or occupational programs. The community colleges are unique in higher education in their acceptance of this role in providing developmental work for those students who need it.

Many high school graduates in the state have needs for education oriented to the development of technical abilities usable in the communities from which they come in which they live. The expectation is that these needs can be partially met by enrollment in the occupational, collegiate-based curricula of the community colleges.

A significant portion of the enrollment in the community colleges comes from both part-time and full-time students drawn from the adult population of the communities, satisfying needs and interests in cultural improvement as well as the development of technical capabilities.

The enrollment of substantial numbers of students in the community colleges for lower division programs in baccalaureate degree work is a promising development. Common lower division requirements, offered both in the University System and in the Community College System for a large number of University degree programs, make a broader range of upper division programs of the University of Kentucky open to transfers from lower division programs in the community colleges without

loss of credit or time in meeting requirements for a baccalaureate degree.

The students served by the community colleges have wide-ranging needs. These colleges are developing transfer, occupational, and community service programs that are making it possible for their students to meet those needs.

VII. A Policy for Expansion

Frequently the question of adding new locations to the present system of community colleges arises. Future expansion of the present Community College System must be well planned, orderly, and deliberate if the Community College System is to obtain its maximum effectiveness. No expansion should be attempted until provision is made to adequately support existing community colleges and to provide the necessary budgetary support to begin an institution. Any such decision should be rendered only after the Community College System studies the situation in question and has \(\int \), together with the University Planning Office. Trecommended this action. It is now obvious that the improved, and improving, highways make it possible for students to commute greater distances and thus a more systematic plan for expansion will better employ \(\int \) our tax dollars \(\text{Trecommonwealth's financial resources} \) and better serve prospective students.

The _first ful_17 development of a master plan for future growth, including detailed criteria, should occur prior to the establishment of any additional community colleges.

Additional community colleges should be established only when:

A. A thorough feasibility study has been made of the community's higher educational needs and the existing capacity it has to meet those needs. A minimum student enrollment of 350 at the opening of the college and a potential of 500 by the end of a five-year period is a desirable standard. The secondary schools in the area to be served by the proposed institution should have at least 1,000 students graduating annually. The immediate surrounding community must be large enough to provide a strong nucleus of the total enrollment, support for scholarships, and employment for graduates, particularly in the two-year occupational programs.

- B. Adequate financial support has been assured. A study of the feasibility of establishing a community college should include an evaluation of the prospects of the basic economy of the area and its future development. Even though the location of a community college may enhance the economic growth of an area, it is necessary that the potential for growth and development must be present. It should be noted, however, that community college education may be most urgently needed in communities that have a declining economy, and this opportunity should not be denied to those who need it most.
- C. The community itself demonstrates a desire for the rather unique functions and programs of a comprehensive community college. Contributions and commitments (such as providing land, faculty housing, etc.) that demonstrate support for the college should be considered. The degree of support already provided for other educational and cultural institutions provides significant evidence in this regard since it is an indication of the continuing local interest that is an essential factor in the long-range development and operation of a community college.
- D. There is a demonstrated need for higher education. Careful consideration must be given to educational opportunities available at other higher educational institutions (both two-year and four-year) in the area. Relationships with other institutions of higher education represent an important matter for policy consideration.
- E. The college is in easy commuting distance for those whom it is intended to serve. Experience indicates that about 25 to 30 miles represents a realistic limit of the primary commuting area for a college. However with the improved highway system, this limit may be increased. The boundaries of a commuting area are usually defined in terms of a maximum one-way travel time of forty-five minutes.
- F. Adequate building(s), parking, and ultimate growth space has been provided. The minimum size for a non-metropolitan site should be usable acreage of not less than 100 to insure adequate potential for growth and ready, \(\sum_{\text{and}} \) safe accessibility to site from existing highways.

Prior to opening a new community college to student enrollment, the "key" staff members (\(\sum_{\text{administrative}} \) administrators and faculty) should be employed with an adequate period of time to study the educational needs of the people of the area in order to plan an educational program to meet these needs. The chief administrative officer should be on the scene at least a year prior to initial student enrollment.

VIII. Community College Rationale

The University of Kentucky/'s system of community colleges/ Community College System represents a strong effort to meet public higher educational needs in the Commonwealth. The basic philosophical assumptions upon which such a system rests are:

- A. The community college is unsurpassed in effectiveness and economy as a means of extending educational opportunity beyond high school.
- B. Perhaps the most sacred tenet of American educational philosophy is that each individual should be provided with the opportunity for an education to the limit of This the individual's capacity. The community college is a valuable instrument by which this end can be realized. Many students academically able and anxious to graduate from college cannot afford four years of living away from home while attending college.
- C. The community college must be comprehensive in nature--designed for a variety of functions. This includes far more than the freshman-sophomore transfer programs.
- D. The community college, in the true sense of the term, must be responsive to the local needs and special conditions.
- E. The community college is a functioning part of a coordinated state plan or pattern for higher education.
- F. A local Advisory Board for each community college helps reflect the area's needs and opinions.

Large numbers of publicly supported community colleges have been established in the past few years. Kentucky's /developmental/ pattern of development of community colleges has been somewhat unique. In most other states, the community colleges have not been so closely tied to a state university. The /transformation/ development of the University of Kentucky's /branches from university centers to/ community colleges has been a slow but rewarding process.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY SELECTIVE ADMISSIONS POLICY

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees approve the attached Selective Admissions Policy for the University of Kentucky, effective Fall 1984.

<u>Background</u>: The selective admissions policy approved by the University Senate on March 21, 1983 defines the following applicant categories for admission of first-time freshmen:

1. Automatic Acceptance

For each applicant, a predicted UK first-year grade point average is calculated using the student's ACT composite score and high school grade point average in a formula based upon the performances of previous UK freshmen. Students for whom the predicted grade point average is at least 2.0 are accepted automatically for admission to the freshman class.

2. Rank-Order Pool

- a. Applicants who are not automatically accepted will be rank-ordered by means of a formula that considers:
 - Diversity factors, including ethnic background, geographical distribution, and student age;
 - (2) Personal achievements in nine out-of-class categories;
 - (3) Predicted UK first-year grade point average.
- b. Applicants in the rank-order pool with superior personal achievement that cannot be measured on the objective scales used in the automatic acceptance or rank-ordering categories may be admitted on an individual basis by a committee appointed by the Chancellor of the Lexington Campus.
- c. Applicants will not be rank-ordered if they do not have either an ACT composite score of at least 11 or a high school grade point average of at least 2.0.

3. Student-Athletes

Student-athletes will be required to meet the academic requirements of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Southeastern Conference. Because of these externally imposed requirements, problems of timing associated with admission decisions, and because our prior experience with student-athletes predicts a first-year achievement level very similar to the overall freshman class, this category is not subsumed in the above.

In addition to approving the above standards for admission of new freshmen, the University Senate made the following recommendations pertaining to admission of students:

1. Transfer Students

Students at Community Colleges or at other colleges or universities may transfer to the University of Kentucky if they meet one of the following criteria:

- a. The student is in good academic standing and would have been accepted automatically at UK at the time of entrance to the other college.
- b. The student would not have qualified for automatic admission to the University of Kentucky but has completed at least 24 semester hours with a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.0.

2. Foreign Students

Undergraduate students with a score of at least 525 on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) may be admitted. Applicants with TOEFL scores below 525 may be admitted by the admissions committee appointed by the Chancellor of the Lexington Campus if other factors indicate that the student will be academically successful.

3. Pre-College Curriculum

Applicants admitted automatically to the University of Kentucky in the fall of 1987 should be required to have completed at least twenty units of high school work, including the following specific courses:

- a. Two of the following: Biology I, Chemistry I, Physics I;
- b. English I, II, III, IV;
- c. Algebra I, Geometry I, and Algebra II;
- d. U. S. History and World Civilization.

In addition to these pre-college requirements, applicants for admission are urged to have completed at least two years of a foreign language, one additional year of mathematics beyond Algebra II, and one year of fine arts.

Introduction

Presented here are specific criteria that the Committee on Admissions and Academic Standards proposes to be used to judge the suitability of first-time freshmen for admission to the University of Kentucky. These criteria were developed in response to the policy statement on selective admissions that was adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University [1]. That policy recognized that because of the University's mission in Kentucky's public higher education system the University must, on the undergraduate level, attach special importance to its upper division programs. As a result, the University should admit those students whose academic credentials indicate that they have the ability to participate effectively in upper division programs and not admit those who would not be well served by such programs. With this in mind, specific criteria were developed for categorizing applicants as ones who should be automatically accepted or automatically rejected.

In addition to accounting in the admission process for the academic qualifications of applicants, the University is obligated to recognize personal accomplishments that cannot be measured against academic standards alone and to maintain a diverse student body in order to provide to all students a meaningful life experience. Diversity can be achieved by admitting applicants who are members of groups whose representation at the University has in the past been far below their representation in society. It is unreasonable, though, to believe that maintenance of the desired diversity will result from requiring all to be admitted to meet particular, academic criteria. Consequently, the University must admit as students those from a pool of applicants who would not be automatically accepted or rejected but would bring to the University characteristics that the University desires a portion of its students to possess.

The proposed admission scheme is a refinement and extension of one that we reported earlier [2]. Supporting data and documentation that accompanied the earlier version, which will not be reproduced here, provide background for the current proposal. Although before we only considered procedures by which first-time freshmen would be admitted to the University, the current proposal addresses other categories of applicants insofar as students admitted from these applicant categories impact the University's ability to carry out its mission.

The policy as it is proposed here should be seen as a beginning point from which refinements will be made as a result of continuing review in the future.

Applicant Categories for First-time Freshmen

Auto accept/auto reject

Performance in high school, as judged by the overall high school grade point average (HSGPA), and on the American College Test (ACT composite score)

would be used to accept or reject applicants automatically. First-year freshmen grade point averages (EGPA) of previous UK freshman students would be fit in a least-square-error sense to a function of ACT and HSGPA, e.g., EGPA = C_1 + C_2 ACT + C_3 HSGPA where C_1 , C_2 and C_3 are constants determined from the fit of the previous year(s). The EGPA equation would then be applied to applicants, using the ACT score and HSGPA available on the ACT report form, to yield a predicted GPA (PGPA) for each applicant. Those who predict a PGPA \geq 2.0 would be automatically accepted.

A first-year EGPA \geq 2.0 is an important step for all students toward remaining at the University a long enough period of time to participate in upper division programs [3], and it is these students on which the University must concentrate its efforts. For example, if the incoming freshman class of 1977 were considered to consist of 100 students, 66 achieved a 2.0 or greater EGPA the first year while 34 did not. Of the 66 with EGPA \geq 2.0, 46 enrolled in the fall of 1980, while only 10 of the 34 with EGPA < 2.0 enrolled that same fall.

The above procedure for automatically accepting applicants does not use absolute cutoffs on either ACT or HSGPA but reflects the contention that ACT and HSGPA used in concert are good predictors of first-year EGPA [4]. This approach is, in part, a departure from our earlier proposal [2], but would seem to be rational and defensible. For example, applying American College Testing Program prediction equations based on ACT score and HSGPA to the 1981 fall freshman class, 75% of those who had a PGPA \geq 2.0 had an EGPA \geq 2.0 after the first year while only 35% with a PGPA < 2.0 had an EGPA \geq 2.0.

Proposed criteria for determining which applicants are to be rejected automatically remain the same as in the previous proposal, i.e., those who do not have a HSGPA \geq 2.0 or an ACT \geq 11. Students who enrolled in fall 1981 who fit into this category had an average first-year EGPA of 1.02 with only 22% having an EGPA \geq 2.0.

Rank-order pool

Applicants who would be neither automatically accepted nor automatically rejected would be rank-ordered initially using the PGPA equation. This rank-ordering process is carried out to obtain a value for A for use in the following equation:

$$R = 0.5 D + 0.2 P + 0.3 A$$

where the value of R would be used to rank again those in the rank-order pool. In the formula for R, A is a measure of the quality of an applicant's academic credentials and is determined as follows:

Rank in top 1/4 of pool using PGPA, A = 100Rank in next 1/4 of pool using PGPA, A = 50Rank in bottom 1/2 of pool using PGPA, A = 0

The variables D and P are diversity and personal achievement factors, respectively. Their values are to be determined from the ACT assessment report (see sample appended to this report) as follows:

Admission to the University from the rank-order pool would be limited to those applicants ranking at the top of the R scale with the total number admitted from the rank-order pool and by exception as explained below not to exceed 20% of the incoming freshman class.

Admission by Exception

Age < 25

The above scheme is an attempt to allow applicants to be admitted in as orderly a manner as possible. Some exceptions will have to be made, for example, for truly superior personal achievement that cannot be measured on any objective scale. These exceptions should be dealt with on an individual basis by the committee that is to be appointed by the Chancellor of the Lexington Campus [1] and whose responsibility it is to decide on admissions by exception. Any applicant not meeting the automatic acceptance criteria or not accepted as a result of the rank-ordering process may be considered for admission by exception.

Policy Impact on 1981 and 1982 Freshman Classes

First-year EGPA's for the 1981 freshman class were fit as a linear function of ACT and HSGPA to obtain the relation*

^{*} In the equation for 1981 EGPA, the HSGPA scale is from 1 to 7 where the relation to the usual 4.0 scale is:

EGPA = -0.443 + 0.0534 ACT + 0.286 HSGPA

The square of the correlation coefficient for the above is 0.325. In the proposed admission scheme, such an equation could have been used to calculate PGPA for the 1982 class to determine the applicants who would have been automatically accepted in fall 1982. Here we will apply it to the 1981 class as though it were a prediction equation even though it reflects their actual performance.

Using the above equation then as a PGPA relation, the two tables below show the categories into which the 1981 and 1982 applicants and students would have fit. Scores are those who took the ACT exam in the fall or spring prior to the fall of the indicated year and listed on the ACT form that they were interested in attending UK. Apply are those who indicated that UK was the university that they preferred to attend, and Enrolled are the ones who actually chose to attend UK.

The figures in the above three tables will not match those presented in our earlier version. Since the first version was written, data have been updated as new information became available. In addition, only those applicants and students for whom ACT's and HSGPA's could be assigned are included in the count. As a result, the totals and actual class sizes listed are too small; in fall 1981, 3268 freshman students enrolled while in fall 1982, 3066 enrolled.

It is obvious that any admissions policy aimed at improving the academic qualifications of the incoming freshmen applied to past classes will indicate a reduction in class size. But it should also be obvious that there are a substantial number of well-qualified applicants who indicate a preference for attending UK who do not enroll. Recruitment of these students rather than admission of academically unqualified students should be the goal of the University as it attempts to stabilize enrollment following institution of a selective admissions policy.

Student-Athletes

With regard to these students, we wish to state the educational principle that a liberal and professional education is the essential reason for every student's being at the University, and that entrance requirements should not be affected by an individual's choice to participate in intercollegiate athletics or any other extra-curricular activity. We disapprove of the type of emphasis that has been placed on intercollegiate athletics at major colleges and universities, and we feel that no institution of higher learning is well served by these developments. Ideally, entrance requirements for students should not be affected by their participation in intercollegiate athletics, but we realize that an immediate and unilateral application of this educational principle at the University of Kentucky would seriously alter the University's ability to meet existing commitments in intercollegiate athletics and may even impair the University's ability to achieve its academic goals and carry out its ultimate educational mission. Therefore we recommend that the University

- 1. Acknowledge the educational principle stated above.
- 2. Require student-athletes who do not meet standards for automatic acceptance, for the next two years, to meet only Southeastern Conference (SEC) and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) academic requirements.* Student-athletes who are to be admitted according to these standards should be identified by the Athletic Director to the University Administration as being vital to the University's intercollegiate athletic program.
- Request that the Administration work for the next two years with other SEC institutions to upgrade the academic standards that studentathletes are required to meet and report to the University Senate the results of the effort.

^{*}There are indications, based on the fact that the NCAA recently voted to require scholarship athletes in fall 1986 to achieve a ${\tt HSGPA} \geq 2.0$ and an ${\tt ACT} \geq 15$, that the disparity that now exists between the academic standards that student-athletes are required to meet and the academic standards that we are recommending applicants meet for admission to UK may, in the future disappear.

- 4. Maintain records on the number and performance of those studentathletes admitted to the University who do not meet the standards for automatic acceptance.
- 5. Review, at the end of a two-year period, the admissions policy in place at the time in light of the information obtained from recommendations 2, 3 and 4 with an eye toward implementing the educational principle ennunciated above.

Pre-College Curriculum

Total Units

The Council on Public Higher Education has established minimum high school course requirements for unconditional admission to public institutions of higher education in Kentucky. Those requirements, which would go into effect in fall 1987, are

We recommend that for an applicant to be admitted automatically to the University of Kentucky in fall of 1987 under the admission policy outlined above he be required to have had the following high school courses as a minimum:

We believe that this course sequence will bring to the University students that are better prepared academically than the sequence adopted by the Council. Although the above course sequence proposal for UK is one that we advocate be instituted for fall 1987, we recommend that in addition, high school students complete at least two years of a foreign language, one additional year of mathematics beyond Algebra II, and one year of fine arts.

It is recognized that at an early date, the University Senate will need to articulate some policy for dealing with applicants who do not meet the pre-college curriculum requirements.

Transfer Students

Community College students would be permitted to transfer to the University of Kentucky if they met one of the following criteria:

- If the student would have been accepted automatically at UK at the time he entered a Community College, he would be allowed to transfer at any time to UK provided that he is in good standing at a Community College.
- 2. Students who would not have been automatically accepted but have completed 24 semester hours and achieved a cumulative GPA \geq 2.0 at a Community College would be allowed to transfer to UK.

Students at colleges and universities other than the Community Colleges would be required to meet the same transfer criteria as Community College transfers.

Foreign Students

We recommend that undergraduate foreign student applicants with a TOEFL score of 525 or above may be admitted. An applicant with a TOEFL score below 525 may be admitted if other factors such as previous academic record, interviews and other English tests indicate that the applicant will be academically successful. Decisions concerning admission of applicants with scores below 525 shall be made by the admissions committee appointed by the Chancellor for the Lexington Campus. Foreign students who are not admissible to the University due to their level of competency in English may apply to the University Center for English as a Second Language for instruction before applying to the University itself. Admission to the programs administered by this center does not guarantee future admission to the University.

Summary and Calendar

In an effort to summarize the main framework of the proposed admission policy and to indicate how it would be applied, the policy is outlined below in a "calendar of events" form. The calendar is written so that the fall semester for which the applicant is applying is 1984, the first time we anticipate that UK would institute selective admissions. The timetable employed follows the recommended policy of the Board of Trustees [1].

1 May 1984	Notify those applicants rejected as a result of the rank-ordering process.
1 June 1984	All accepted applicants must submit a confirmation fee. After this date only applicants meeting the automatic acceptance criteria or applicants accepted by the Admissions Committee to be appointed by the Chancellor would be accepted.

Throughout the above process, HSGPA will be checked by the registrar to ensure that the HSGPA's self-reported on the ACT form are correct.

The selective admissions policy proposed here was constructed under the assumption that the economic and political climate that now exists in Kentucky will persist. When, in the course of implementing this or any selective admissions policy, it is found that the above assumption is invalid and to implement the policy would place the University in a state of emergency with respect to funding, we recommend that, with agreement of the full University Senate and the Chancellor for the Lexington Campus, the policy may be altered.

Acknowledgements

In the course of developing the selective admissions policy outlined here, the committee received helpful input and support from many on the

faculty and in the administration. And we can feel good about that because it shows that the University is concerned about the quality of the institution.

The presently recommended modifications, which are principally editorial in nature, incorporate approved University organizational changes, provide needed or desired refinements related to current applicability of the policy documents, and eliminate the use of masculine pronouns.

Recommended additions and deletions are underlined and bracketed, respectively, within the paragraphs of each of the policy documents.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY MEDICAL CENTER

PHYSICIANS' SERVICES PLAN

(Approved by the Board of Trustees: 9/20/60)

ARTICLE I. NAME OF THE PLAN

The Plan shall be known as the PHYSICIANS' SERVICES PLAN of the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

ARTICLE II. SCOPE OF THE PLAN

The Plan establishes policies and general procedures relating to compensation for services rendered by [all] participating physicians, regardless of speciality, with full-time faculty appointments in the College of Medicine. This Plan is applicable to compensation derived from salary and from the Medical Services Account, both of which are established by the University Board of Trustees. The Plan is applicable to all services of such faculty members incident to the care of patients and to all other activities which are a part of the Medical Center program. Income from publications and honoraria for lectures or other activities which are not a part of the Medical Center program are excluded from the Plan, but remain subject to policies and regulations of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE III. PURPOSE OF THE PLAN

The purpose of the Plan is to facilitate proper functioning of the teaching, research, and service programs of the Medical Center, consistent with the integrity and responsibilities of the University. With this purpose paramount in consideration, the operation of the Plan will be evaluated periodically with the underlying principles hereinafter set forth as guides.

ARTICLE IV. DEFINITIONS

A. The "FUND" as used herein means The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, a non-profit corporation organized in 1959 under the laws of Kentucky to promote, advance, and support the educational, research, and other purposes of the University of Kentucky Medical Center. The "BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FUND" means the Board of Directors of The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, which Board consists of five members, including the President of the University of Kentucky the Vice-President?

Chancellor for the Medical Center /of the University, the Vice Chancellor for Clinical Professional Services who is also the Dean of the College of Medicine, the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University, and two members appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

- B. The "FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE FUND" as herein used means that Committee of The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center appointed by the Board of Directors of The Fund pursuant to Article X of this Plan.
- C. The "FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE" as herein used means that Committee of the College of Medicine appointed by the Dean of the College of Medicine as provided in Article IX of this Plan.
- D. The "CLINICAL DEPARTMENTS" as herein used means the following departments of the College of Medicine: Anesthesiology, Community Medicine, Diagnostic Radiology, Emergency Medicine, Family Practice, Medicine, Neurology, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Opthamology, Pathology, Pediatrics, Preventive Medicine and Environmental Health, Psychiatry, Radiation Medicine, Rehabilitation Medicine, and Surgery, and any other departments that in the future may be established and designated as clinical by the Board of Trustees of the University. "BASIC SCIENCE DEPARTMENTS" as herein used means any of the other academic departments of the College of Medicine not specifically included in this definition of clinical departments.
- E. The "MEDICAL SERVICES ACCOUNT" as herein used means that separate depository account to be established as provided in Article VII of this Plan.
- F. The "BOARD OF TRUSTEES" as herein used means the Board of Trustees of the University which by law is the governing board of the institution.

ARTICLE V. UNDERLYING PRINCIPLES

- A. Medical care will be provided in the Medical Center because it is essential to the teaching and research programs and to the proper use of the facilities and skills in the Center to reinforce health care resources in local communities throughout the Commonwealth.
- B. The kinds and volume of medical care provided by the Medical Center will be determined by the needs of the teaching, research, and service programs of the Center.

- C. Medical Center patient care facilities will be used exclusively for activities which are part of the Center's teaching, research, and service programs and separated areas will not be provided for private clinics or pavilions. All patients admitted to the Medical Center will receive care on an equal basis as part of the teaching and research programs, irrespective of ability to pay or source of payment.
- An optimal teaching environment will imbue students with understanding, sympathy, and respect for the patient as a person and will cultivate attitudes which are consistent with the highest ideals of the medical profession. To develop in students the ability to relate to patients differing widely in personality and environmental factors requires that teaching patients not be drawn from a single segment of society but rather that they represent a cross-section of the population. Moreover, optimal use of the Center's facilities in serving the needs of research activities requires absence of arbitrary restriction by social classification of patients. Such restrictions also would impair the value and usefulness to the people and physicians of the Commonwealth of the medical care resources available in the Center to reinforce resources available in local communities. In drawing teaching patients from all segments of the population, it will be the intent of the Medical Center to follow to the fullest extent possible the principle of strengthening the relationships between patients and their physicians by accepting patients upon referral of, and returning patients with appropriate reports to, physicians having responsibility for ongoing care, not precluding appropriate acceptance of patients requiring emergency care or upon referral of health and welfare agencies or the University Health Service.
- E. For a significant proportion of the patients admitted under policies in existence, it should be possible to obtain, either from the patient or some third-party agency on behalf of the patient, payment of all or part of the cost of hospital services. Where payment for such services is obtainable, the Medical Center and the faculty members participating in this Plan will make appropriate charges to cover the cost of providing these services.
- F. Where payment is obtainable for hospital services, frequently payment will be obtainable for medical services rendered by physicians who are full-time members of the College of Medicine faculty and, with few exceptions, payment by or on behalf of patients for the medical services they receive is deemed proper and appropriate. Income derived from such services is incidental to the purposes for which patients are admitted to the Medical Center and in this sense is properly considered a "by-product" from the operation of the programs for which the Center exists.

- G. The professional interests of full-time members of the clinical faculty of the College of Medicine should be concentrated in academic medicine. Arrangements creating financial incentives for full-time faculty members which would tend inappropriately to divert or dilute their concentration on teaching, research, and program responsibilities are not consistent with the mission of the Medical Center. Moreover, arrangements providing incentives for full-time members of the clinical faculty to compete with practicing physicians for private patients would place the Medical Center in a competitive rather than a supportive role.
- H. Each full-time member of the clinical faculty can rightfully expect:
- l. The facilities, material, and support needed for $\sqrt[n]{his}$ teaching and research;
- 2. Ample opportunity to maintain and develop ∠his7 clinical skills; and
- 3. Compensation for /his/ work on a basis which recognizes /his/ the faculty member's responsibilities, competence, and productive effort and which is reasonably in line with compensation which /he/ the faculty member could obtain elsewhere in academic medicine.

Success in attracting and holding an outstanding clinical faculty will depend on meeting these expectations.

- I. Assurance that the level of compensation for full-time members of the clinical faculty is competitive with other good medical teaching centers and adequate to attract and maintain a strong, competent faculty is basically the responsibility of the University. Responsibility should rest with the University not only for ensuring that initial and subsequent levels of remuneration are adequate, but also for ensuring that such levels are not excessive. Through budgetary and related actions, the University should, to the extent possible and permissible, assure the faculty member that his the faculty member's total remuneration from all sources will be in accord with a predetermined level which is fixed consistent with adequacy and which is periodically reviewed.
- J. Payments received for physicians' services rendered by members of the full-time faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan should be used only for remuneration of such faculty, in such manner and in such amounts as determined by the Board of Trustees, and for such other purposes in the Medical Center as may be recommended by representatives of the full-time faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan.

K. With respect to each member of the full-time clinical faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan, the amount of total compensation will be established by the Board of Trustees in the operating budgets of the Medical Center. The manner and extent to which compensation from the Medical Services Account is combined with other compensation will be reviewed and approved annually by the Chancellor for the Medical Center with periodic reporting to the Board of Trustees with the objective of providing stability of total compensation without impinging on the freedom of faculty members to apportion their time and efforts among teaching, research, and patient care activities as determined by their interests and program responsibilities.

ARTICLE VI. SETTING OF CHARGES FOR PHYSICIANS' SERVICES

Standard schedules of charges for physicians' services, as developed from time to time by the various clinical departments of the College of Medicine, subject to review by the Faculty Advisory Committee and approval by the Dean of the College of Medicine, will be the general basis for assessing such charges to patients. However, the amount of charges to any individual patient may be adjusted as determined by the physician rendering the services, if variation from standard charges is deemed by /him/ the physician to be warranted by the circumstances.

ARTICLE VII. BILLING AND COLLECTION OF CHARGES FOR PHYSICIANS' SERVICES

Charges for services rendered by the full-time members of the faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan will be billed by the Medical Center in a manner naming the physician rendering the service. Billing of charges from the Medical Center for physicians' services will be coordinated with billing for hospital services. Collection of all amounts so billed will be handled by the Medical Center, with undesignated receipts from or on behalf of individual patients being applied on a prorated basis to payment of hospital charges and to payment of charges for physicians' services. Major problems relating to collection from patients of charges for physicians' services will be handled in a manner that is subject to the concurrence of the physicians rendering the services to the patients. Any payments, other than compensation as established by the Board of Trustees, which are received by full-time faculty members for professional services within the scope of the Plan shall be transmitted on a current basis to the Medical Center for inclusion with other funds collected for physicians' services.

All funds collected or received by the Medical Center for services rendered by full-time members of the faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan shall be so collected and received by the Medical

Center as Trustee for The Fund for the Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center. Such funds shall be segregated upon receipt and shall be paid over by the Medical Center to the Fund by depositing the same in a separate account of the Fund in such depository as may be designated. Such separate account shall be designated and known as the Medical Services Account of the Fund.

ARTICLE VIII. USE OF FUNDS DEPOSITED IN THE MEDICAL SERVICES ACCOUNT

As a standing policy, The Fund for the Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center will use and expend all monies and funds deposited in the Medical Services Account to the extent available for the following purposes:

- A. Compensation to members of the full-time clinical faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan in such amounts as may be necessary to provide the difference between other University compensation and the total compensation as established by the Board of Trustees in the operating budget of the Medical Center. The operating budget will show the amounts to be paid from the Medical Services Account, which amounts are dependent upon the availability of funds.
- B. Such other purposes in the Medical Center as from time to time may be recommended to the Board of Directors of the Fund by the Faculty Advisory Committee of the Fund provided, however, that such funds may not at any time be used for payment to members of the full-time faculty of the College of Medicine in this Plan of income in excess of the total compensation established for the Individual members thereof by the Board of Trustees in the operating budget of the Medical Center.

ARTICLE IX. THE FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

The Dean of the College of Medicine shall appoint a Faculty Advisory Committee of the College of Medicine, which Committee shall consist of the chairmen of /all/ the clinical departments /of the College/ as defined in Article IV herein, the chairman of one of the basic science departments of the College, and such other faculty members as the Dean deems desirable. The Dean shall serve ex officio as Chairman of the Committee. The Committee shall meet at least quarterly and shall review the operation of this Plan, including matters relating to the applicability of the Plan to sources of income, standard schedules of charges for physicians' services as developed by the clinical departments, and any other aspects of the operation of the Plan. This Committee shall make such recommendations as it may deem appropriate to the Dean of the College of Medicine with respect to the modificaton

of the policies and procedures provided by this Plan or utilized in its operation.

ARTICLE X. THE FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE FUND

The Board of Directors of the Fund will establish within the organizational structure of the Fund a Faculty Advisory Committee, which shall consist of all the members of the Faculty Advisory Committee of the College of Medicine. The Chairmen of the clinical departments and the chairman of the basic science department shall be the only voting members of this Committee of the Fund except that the Dean of the College of Medicine shall vote upon motions on which the other voting members the Committee are equally divided. It shall be the duty of the Advisory Committee of the Fund to make recommendations from Faculty time to time to the Board of Directors of the Fund on the use of monies in the Medical Services Account of the Fund, specifically with respect to use of such monies pursuant to subparagraph B of Article VIII of this Plan and within the purposes authorized by the Articles of Incorporation of the Fund. In the performance of its duty the Committee shall review the status of the Medical Services Account, for which reviews the Fund shall provide summary statements of deposits, expenditures, and commitments by major categories.

ARTICLE XI. LIMITATIONS ON MEDICAL PRACTICE BY FACULTY MEMBERS

As a condition of employment, physicians who are full-time faculty members in the College of Medicine in this plan shall not maintain offices or engage in the practice of medicine outside of the approved programs of the Medical Center except in infrequent and special circumstances as in emergencies and in other situations where provision of service is required by professional ethics.

ARTICLE XII. EFFECTIVE DATE

Upon approval by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, the Physicians' Services Plan will be effective as of September 20, 1960. Subsequent modifications or amendments of the Plan will be effective upon approval of the Board of Trustees or as of such date as may be specified by the Board of Trustees.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY MEDICAL CENTER

PROVISIONS FOR SUPPLEMENTAL COMPENSATION UNDER THE PHYSICIANS' SERVICE PLAN

(Approved by the Board of Trustees: 8/4/70; Amended by the Board of Trustees: 12/10/74)

I. UNDERLYING CONSIDERATIONS:

The factors and considerations which underlie the provisions herein include the following:

- A. The problem of \underline{a} deteriorating competitive position in retaining and attracting faculty in clinical fields is acute and pressures are expected to become more intense in years the immediately ahead.
- B. Budgetary restrictions upon the University and the prospects for the foreseeable future make it essential that income from professional fees and other sources be increased to provide support for faculty compensation necessary for the maintenance and development of participating clinical departments and faculty to meet the growing program requirements they face.
- C. Third-party payment programs, the principal source of payment for professional fees, are increasingly requiring not only direct involvement in the care of patients on the part of faculty, but full documentation of this as a condition for payment of professional fees for services of faculty physicians. These requirements are often difficult to fulfill in a teaching setting; in the absence of special effort there will be loss of potential income of significant amounts.
- D. A major and essential requirement for achieving increased financial support from the source of professional fees is a high level of interest and effort toward this objective on the part of full-time faculty members who provide the services and meet the requirements that make professional fee income realizable. Such interest and effort are important factors in attracting an increasing proportion of paying patients, which is essential for the support of the University Hospital as well as for improvement in professional fee income.
- E. A method is needed for giving more specific recognition of and incentive for performance in the clinical departments which produces increased income from professional activities.

F. Provision for such recognition and incentive can be accomplished by modifications within the existing Physicians' Services Plan, and it is the consensus that such modification should allocate funds for supplemental compensation among participating clinical departments for the purpose of recognizing faculty performance.

II. APPLICABLE PROVISIONS:

Pursuant to the above considerations, the following provisions are adopted:

- A. Supplemental compensation will be determined on a semi-annual basis and established by approval action of the Board of Trustees upon supplementary operating budgets of the College of Medicine covering six month periods. The appropriation of funds for expenditures projected in such a budget will be equal in amount to additional income to the University provided by a grant from income derived from professional fees of participating physicians by the Board of Directors of THE FUND to the University specifically for the purpose of financing the supplementary operating budget. Such a grant will be in addition to that made by THE FUND in support of clinical salaries provided in the basic operating budget of the College of Medicine.
- B. FUND grants for the purpose of supplemental compensation will consitutute non-recurring funds, and approval of the supplementary operating budget based thereon will not constitute an increase in the budget base of the College of Medicine. Supplemental compensation payable to participating individuals in accordance with approved supplementary operating budgets will be distributed in the months of March and September of each year, based on equity determinations on January 1 and July 1 of each year, provided, however, that such individuals must continue in the employment of the University through the first day of March and September respectively to be eligible to receive the supplemental compensation payable at such times and no rights to receive such supplemental compensation shall vest in individuals prior to such dates.
- C. THE FUND budget will be projected each year recognizing as income such factors as the collection experience with participating physicians bills, anticipated patient day equivalents of service, and schedule of charges. The amount of the grant to the University by THE FUND for the purpose of supplemental compensation will be determined as of January 1 and June 30 by the Board of Directors, and will be the amount by which payments received in the Medical Services Account since the prior semi-annual date are in excess of the sum of (1) pro rata requirements for coverage of THE FUND grant in support of salaries provided in the basic operating budget, Zand7 (2) requirements

for coverage of other expenditures which have been budgeted or are reserved in the Medical Services Account pursuant to recommendations by the Physicians' Services Plan Faculty Advisory Committee, and (3) requirements for maintenance of a reserve against monthly fluctuations in payments to the account; provided, however, that the total amount of such grant for purposes of supplemental compensation by THE FUND shall not exceed 25 percent of the aggregate amount of the clinical faculty salary payments made since the prior semi-annual date to participating individuals in clinical faculty positions, whose duties include provision of professional services to patients, in clinical departments of the College of Medicine. This percentage limitation is subject to adjustment in future years by revisions of the Plan as may be found necessary to maintain competitive levels of total compensation for faculty positions in participating clinical departments as determined by periodic comparisons with prevailing levels of total compensation for comparable faculty positions in institutions selected for benchmark purposes utilizing a similar practice plan when such information is available.

- D. The supplementary operating budget for the College of Medicine will be prepared and submitted, in accordance with University budgetary procedures, immediately following the determinaton of the amount of THE FUND grant to the University for supplemental compensation. The amount of supplemental compensation for a participating department chairman will be determined by the dean.
- E. The amount of supplemental compensation provided for any individual faculty member in the supplementary budget for a semi-annual period, when annualized, shall not exceed 50 percent of the regular salary of the individual. Because supplemental compensation is not considered as a part of basic salary, no deductions will be made for TIAA or CREF and there will be no University contributions to TIAA or CREF for the supplemental compensation.
- F. In the preparation of the supplementary operating budget, the Dean of the College of Medicine will allocate 70 percent of the total amount of THE FUND grant generated by participating faculty for supplemental compensation among the clinical departments or faculty on the basis of available data to measure the performance of the respective departments or faculty in producing income including, but not limited to, professional fee income. Such allocations will be the basis for departmental budget submittals in which the distribution of supplemental compensation among participating faculty members of the respective departments is to be made by the department chairman, based on Inist the chairman's determination and judgment of relative performance and contributions to the program of the department. If the amount of allocation to a department is in excess of the amount which can be or is used by the department for salary supplementation, up to

- 50 percent of the amount of such excess, subject to the approval of the Dean, may be added to the current balance outstanding in the incidental account for the department, to be available for expenditure in accordance with policies and procedures applicable to such accounts. The residual 50 percent or more of such excess shall be added to amount available for budgeting by the Dean of the College of Medicine under the provisions of Paragraph II.G, herein.
- The budget for the remaining 30 percent of the amount of the grant will be prepared by the Dean of the College of Medicine with the funds available being devoted, in accordance with This the Dean's discretion, to (1) providing supplemental compensaton for participating faculty members in clinical departments where appropriate recognition of performance and contribution to the patient care program is not possible within formula allocations to departments, and (2) supplementing the position pool for additions to faculty in clinical departments with funds to be used only after other funds available for the position pool have been fully committed. Commitments made for additional faculty in clinical departments based upon allocatons for this purpose by the Dean, in accordance with the foregoing provisions, shall be included in the basic operation budget of the College of Medicine and financed by the basic grant of THE FUND to the University for the fiscal year following such allocation. In recognition of this commitment, the Dean may authorize chairmen of participating clinical departments to recruit for filling duly-approved faculty positions based upon /his/ the Dean's use of funds allocated to supplement the position pool, provided, however, that the effective date of any full-time faculty appointment shall not be prior to July 1 of the fiscal year following such allocation. Since such positions will not require funding until the following year, funds in the current year earmarked for the position may be spent, in the Dean's discretion, for nonrecurring items which do not increase the budget base.
- H. The allocations among participating departments of the amount representing 70 percent of THE FUND grant for supplemental compensation will be determined as follows:
- 1. The amount of payments to the Medical Services Account received, in the six-month period upon which THE FUND grant for supplemental compensation is based, from the combined sources of the Physicians Accounts Office or its equivalent and the University Hospital, plus the amount of income for professional services of faculty members accruing to the institution in the six-month period from other sources, including grants and contracts, will be determined in aggregate for all clinical departments of the College of Medicine and separately for each such department.

- 2. The amount determined for each participating department, expressed as a percentage of the amount determined for all departments in aggregate, will be the basis for dividing among departments the funds available for distribution, and the amount to be allocated to the respective departments will be calculated accordingly.
- I. Data on the factors to be utilized in determining departmental allocations will be submitted by the Dean of the College of Medicine for review by the Physicians' Services Plan Faculty Advisory Committee prior to preparation of the supplementary operating budget. Upon recommendation of the Committee, adjustments in the factors used may be made by the Dean if deemed necessary to avoid inequities due to limitatons of available data. Computations of the amount of allocations for individual participating departments will be provided to the chairmen of the departments, respectively.
- J. Following adoption of the provisions herein, recommendations may be made by the Faculty Advisory Committee from time to time for modifications deemed to be appropriate and desirable, with the understanding that at the end of the first year the entire plan for supplemental compensations will be critically reviewed and appropriate changes made.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY MEDICAL CENTER

DENTISTS' SERVICES PLAN

(Approved by the Board of Trustees: 9/15/64)

ARTICLE I. NAME OF THE PLAN

The Plan shall be known as the DENTISTS' SERVICES PLAN of the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

ARTICLE II. SCOPE OF THE PLAN

The Plan establishes policies and general procedures relating to compensation for services rendered by all dentists, regardless of specialty, with full-time faculty appointments in the College of Dentistry. This Plan is applicable to compensation derived from salary and from the Dental Services Account both of which are established by the University Board of Trustees. The Plan is applicable to all services of such faculty members incident to the care of patients and to all other activities which are a part of the Medical Center program. Income from publications and honoraria for lectures or other activities which are not a part of the Medical Center program are excluded from the Plan, but \(\subseteq \text{would} \sqrt{} \) remain subject to policies and regulations of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE III. PURPOSE OF THE PLAN

The purpose of the Plan is to facilitate proper functioning of the teaching, research, and service programs of the Medical Center, consistent with the integrity and responsibilities of the University. With this purpose paramount in consideration, the operation of the Plan will be evaluated periodically with the underlying principles hereinafter set forth as quides.

ARTICLE IV. DEFINITIONS

A. The "FUND" as used herein means the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, a non-profit corporation organized in 1959 under the laws of Kentucky to promote, advance, and support the educational, research, and other purposes of the University of Kentucky Medical Center. The "BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FUND" means the Board of Directors of the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, which Board consists of five members, including /the President of the University of Kentucky the /vice-president/

Chancellor for the Medical Center Zof the University, the Vice Chancellor for Clinical Professional Services who is also the Dean of the College of Medicine, the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University, and two members appointed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

- B. The "DENTAL FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE FUND" as herein used means that Committee of the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center appointed by the Board of Directors of the The Fund pursuant to Article X of this Plan.
- C. The "FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY" as herein used means that Committee of the College of Dentistry appointed by the Dean of the College of Dentistry as provided in Article IX of this Plan.
- D. The "CLINICAL DEPARTMENTS" as herein used mean the following departments of the College of Dentistry: <code>/Operative Dentistry</code>, <code>Fixed Prosthodontics</code>, <code>Prosthodontics</code>, <code>Periodontics</code> and <code>Endodontics</code>, <code>Pedodontics</code>, <code>Orthodontics</code>, <code>Oral Surgery</code>, <code>Oral Pathology</code>, <code>Oral Diagnosis-Oral Medicine</code>, <code>Oral Biology</code>, <code>Oral Diagnosis</code> and <code>Oral Medicine</code>, <code>Oral Pathology</code>, <code>Orthodontics</code>, <code>Pediatric Dentistry</code>, <code>Periodontics</code>, <code>Prosthodontics</code>, <code>Restorative Dentistry</code>, and any other departments that in the future may be established and designated as clinical by the Board of Trustees of the <code>University</code>. "BASIC SCIENCE <code>DEPARTMENTS</code>" as herein used mean any of the other academic departments of the <code>College</code> of <code>Dentistry</code> not specifically included in this definition of <code>Clinical Departments</code>.
- E. The "DENTAL SERVICES ACCOUNT" as herein used means that separate depository account to be established as provided in Article VII of this Plan.
- F. The "BOARD OF TRUSTEES" as herein used means the Board of Trustees of the University which by law is the governing board of the institution.

ARTICLE V. UNDERLYING PRINCIPLES

- A. Dental care will be provided in the Medical Center because it is essential to the teaching and research programs and to the proper use of the facilities and skills in the Center to reinforce health care resources in local communities throughout the Commonwealth.
- B. The kinds and volume of dental care provided by the Medical Center will be determined by the needs of the teaching, research, and service programs of the Center. Income derived from the provision of

such care is incidental to the purposes of these programs and in this sense is properly considered a "by-product" of their operation.

- C. Medical Center patient care facilities will be used exclusively for activities which are part of the Center's teaching, research, and service programs and separated areas will not be provided for private clinics or pavilions. All patients admitted to the Medical Center will receive care as part of the teaching and research program.
- An optimal teaching environment will imbue students with understanding, sympathy, and respect for the patient as a person and will cultivate attitudes which are consistent with the highest ideals of the dental profession. To develop in students the ability to relate to patients differing widely in personality and environmental factors requires that teaching patients not be drawn from a single segment of society but rather that they represent a cross-section of the population. Moreover, optimal use of the Center's facilities in serving the needs of research activities requires absence of arbitrary restriction by social classification of patients. Such restrictions also would impair the value and usefulness to the people and dentists of the Commonwealth of the dental care resources available in the Center to reinforce resources available in local communities. In drawing teaching patients from all segments of the population, it will be the intent of the Medical Center to follow to the fullest extent possible the principle of strengthening the relationships between patients and their dentists.
- E. The professional interests of full-time members of the clinical faculty of the College of Dentistry should be concentrated in academic dentistry. Arrangements creating financial incentives for full-time faculty members which would tend inappropriately to divert or dilute their concentration on teaching, research, and program responsibilities are not consistent with the mission of the Medical Center. Moreover, arrangements providing incentives for full-time members of the clinical faculty to compete with practicing dentists for private patients would place the Medical Center in a competitive rather than a supportive role.
- F. Each full-time member of the clinical faculty can rightfully expect:
- 1. The facilities, material, and support needed for _his7 teaching and research;
- 2. Opportunity to maintain and develop $\sqrt[n]{his}$ clinical skills; and

3. Compensation for /his/ work on a basis which recognizes /his/ the faculty member's responsibilities, competence, and productive effort and which is reasonably in line with compensation which /he/ the faculty member could obtain elsewhere in academic dentistry.

Success in attracting and holding an outstanding clinical faculty will depend on meeting these expectations.

- G. Assurance that the level of compensation for full-time members of the clinical faculty is competitive with other good teaching centers and adequate to attract and maintain a strong, competent faculty is basically the responsibility of the University. Responsibility should rest with the University not only for ensuring that initial and subsequent levels of remuneration are adequate, but also for ensuring that such levels are not excessive. Through budgetary and related actions, the University should, to the extent possible and permissible, assure the faculty member that his the faculty member's total remuneration from all sources will be in accord with a predetermined level which is fixed consistent with adequacy and which is periodically reviewed.
- H. Payments received for dentists' services rendered by members of the full-time faculty of the College of Dentistry should be used only for remuneration of such faculty, in such manner and in such amounts as determined by the Board of Trustees, and for such other purposes in the Medical Center as may be recommended by representives of the full-time faculty of the College of Dentistry.
- I. With respect to each member of the full-time clinical faculty of the College of Dentistry, the amount of total compensation will be established by the Board of Trustees in the operating budgets of the Medical Center. The manner and extent to which compensation from the Dental Services Account is combined with other compensation will be reviewed and approved annually by the Chancellor for the Medical Center with periodic reporting to the Board of Trustees with the objective of providing stability of total compensation without impinging on the freedom of faculty members to apportion their time and efforts among teaching, research, and patient care activities as determined by their interests and program responsibilities.

ARTICLE VI. SETTING OF CHARGES FOR DENTISTS' SERVICES

Standard schedules of charges for dentists' services, as developed from time to time by the various clinical departments of the College of Dentistry, subject to review by the Faculty Advisory Committee of the College of Dentistry and approval by the Dean of the College of Dentistry, will be the general basis for assessing such

charges to patients. However, the amount of charges to any individual patient may be adjusted as determined by the dentist rendering the services, if variation from standard charges is deemed by \hbar the dentist to be warranted by the circumstances.

ARTICLE VII. BILLING AND COLLECTION OF CHARGES FOR DENTISTS' SERVICES

Charges for dental services rendered by the full-time members of the faculty of the College of Dentistry will be billed by the Medical Center for payment at the time services are provided or subsequently, with such charges and billings being appropriately coordinated with charges and billings for other services to patients. Collection of all amounts so billed will be handled by the Medical Center. Amounts collected for combined charges for dental services and undesignated receipts from or on behalf of individual patients who receive dental services will be applied on appropriate bases of proration to payment for dentists' services and to payment for other services. Major problems relating to collection from patients of charges for dentists' services will be handled in a manner that is subject to the concurrence of the dentists rendering the services to the patients. Any payments, other than compensation as established by the Board of Trustees, which are received by full-time faculty members for professional services within the scope of the Plan shall be transmitted on a current basis to the Medical Center for inclusion with other funds collected for dentists' services.

All funds collected or received by the Medical Center for dentists' services rendered by members of the faculty of the College of Dentistry shall be so collected and received by the Medical Center as Trustee for the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center. Such funds shall be segregated upon receipt and shall be paid over by the Medical Center to the Fund by depositing the same in a separate account of the Fund in such depository as may be designated. Such separate account shall be designated and known as the Dental Services Account of the Fund.

ARTICLE VIII. USE OF FUNDS DEPOSITED IN THE DENTAL SERVICES ACCOUNT

As a standing policy, The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center will use and expend all monies and funds deposited in the Dental Services Account to the extent available for the following purposes:

A. Compensation to members of the clinical faculty of the College of Dentistry in such amounts as may be necessary to provide the difference between other University compensation and the total compensation as established by the Board of Trustees in the operating budget

of the Medical Center. The operating budget will show the amounts to be paid from the Dental Services Account, which amounts are dependent upon the availablility of funds.

B. Such other purposes in the Medical Center as from time to time may be recommended to the Board of Directors of the Fund by the Dental Faculty Advisory Committee of the Fund provided, however, that such funds may not at any time be used for payment to members of the faculty of the College of Dentistry of income in excess of the total compensation established for the individual members thereof by the Board of Trustees in the operating budget of the Medical Center.

THE FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY

The Dean of the College of Dentistry shall appoint a Faculty Advisory Committee of the College of Dentistry, which Committee shall consist of the chairmen of all clinical departments of the College, a member of one of the basic science departments of the College, and such other faculty members as the Dean deems desirable. The Dean shall serve ex officio as Chairman of the Committee. The Committee shall meet periodically and shall review the operation of this Plan, including matters relating to the applicability of the Plan to sources of income, standard schedules of charges for dentists' services as developed by the clinical departments, and any other aspects of the operation of the Plan. This Committee shall make such recommendations as it may deem appropriate to the Dean of the College of Dentistry with respect to the modification of the policies and procedures provided by this Plan or utilized in its operation.

ARTICLE X. THE FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE OF THE FUND

The Board of Directors of the Fund will establish within the organizational structure of the Fund a Dental Faculty Advisory Committee, which shall consist of all the members of the Faculty Advisory Committee of the College of Dentistry. It shall be the duty of the Dental Faculty Advisory Committee of the Fund to make recommendations from time to time to the Board of Directors of the Fund on the use of monties in the Dental Services Account of the Fund, specifically with respect to use of such monies pursuant to subparagraph B of Article VIII of this Plan and within the purposes authorized by the Articles of Incorporation of the Fund. In the performance of its duty the Committee shall review the status of the Dental Services Account, for which reviews the Fund shall provide summary statements of deposits, expenditures, and commitments by major categories.

ARTICLE XI. LIMITATIONS ON DENTAL PRACTICE BY FACULTY MEMBERS

As a condition of employment, dentists who are full-time faculty members in the College of Dentistry will not maintain offices or engage in the practice of dentistry outside of the approved programs of the Medical Center except in infrequent and special circumstances as in emergencies and in other situations where provision of service is required by professional ethics.

ARTICLE XII. EFFECTIVE DATE

Upon approval by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, the Dentists' Services Plan will be effective as of September 15, 1964. Subsequent modifications or amendments of the Plan will be effective upon approval of the Board of Trustees or as of such date as may be specified by the Board of Trustees.

UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY MEDICAL CENTER

PROVISIONS FOR FACULTY SALARY SUPPLEMENTAL COMPENSATION UNDER THE DENTISTS' SERVICES PLAN

(Approved by the Board of Trustees: 9/21/71)

I. Objectives

The specific objectives of the proposed salary supplementation plan include the following:

- A. To increase faculty income over and beyond that available through State support to the College of Dentistry in an effort to remain competitive with other institutions;
- B. To increase faculty incentive to participate in income-producing activities which will be beneficial to the College of Dentistry, the University of Kentucky, and the State; and
- C. To maintain primary emphasis on the teaching and research programs of the College of Dentistry.

II. Basis

The proposal is based on a system allowing the Dean and department chairmen to reward faculty members for unusual productivity and effort. The rewards will be derived from income generated by faculty activity but will not necessarily be directly related to the fiscal productivity of each individual. The system should allow maintenance of departmental balance without overcompensation for one segment of activity to the exclusion of other equally important commitments.

III. Applicable Provisions

A. Supplemental compensation will be determined on a semi-annual basis and established by approval of the Board of Trustees upon supplementary operating budgets of the College of Dentistry, covering six-month periods. The appropriation of funds for expenditures projected in such a budget will be equal in amount to additional income to the University provided by a grant by the Board of Directors of THE FUND to the University specifically for the purpose of financing the supplementary operating budget. Such a grant will be in addition to that made by THE FUND in support of clinical salaries provided in the basic operating budget of the College of Dentistry.

- B. FUND grants for the purpose of supplemental compensation will constitute non-recurring funds, and approval of the supplementary operating budget based thereon will not constitute an increase in the budget base of the College of Dentistry. Payments to individuals in accordance with an approved supplementary operating budget will be made by the University for the semi-annual period covered by such a budget and will be paid in a separate check from regular salary payments. Withholding taxes on the amount of supplemental compensation paid to individuals may, however, be taken into account and deducted from basic salary checks.7
- C. The amount of the grant to the University by THE FUND for the purpose of supplemental compensation will be determined as of January 1 and June 30 by the Board of Directors and will be the amount by which payments received in the Dental Services Account since the prior semi-annual date are in excess of the sum of (1) pro rata requirements for coverage of THE FUND grant in support of salaries provided in the basic operating budget; and (2) requirements for coverage of other expenditures which have been budgeted or are reserved in the Dental Services Account pursuant to recommendations by the Faculty Advisory Committee of the Dentists' Services Plan [7], and (3) requirements for maintenance of a reserve against monthly fluctuations in payments to the account[7].
- D. The supplementary operating budget for the College of Dentistry will be prepared and submitted, in accordance with University budgetary procedures, immediately following the determination of the amount of THE FUND grant to the University for supplemental compensation.
- E. In preparation of the supplementary operating budget, the Dean of the College of Dentistry will allocate 70 percent of the total amount of THE FUND grant for supplemental compensation among the clinical departments on the basis of available data to measure the performance of the respective departments in producing income including, but not limited to, professonal fee income. Such allocations will be the basis for departmental budget submittals in which the distribution of supplemental compensation among faculty members in each of the respective departments is to be made by the department chairman, based on Inist the department chairman's determination and judgment of relative performance and contributions to the program of the department. The amount of supplemental compensation for department chairmen will be determined by the Dean.
- F. The budget for the remaining 30 percent of the amount of the grant shall be prepared by the Dean of the College of Dentistry with the funds available being devoted, in accordance with $\sqrt{\text{his}}$ the Dean's discretion, to (1) providing supplemental compensation for faculty

members in clinical departments where appropriate recognition of performance and contribution to the patient care program is not possible within formula allocatons to departments, and (2) supplementing the position pool for additions to faculty, staff, and operating expenses in clinical departments.

- G. The allocations among departments of the amount representing 70 percent of THE FUND grant for supplemental compensation will be determined as follows:
- 1. The amount of payments to the Dental Services Account, received in the six-month period upon which THE FUND grant for supplemental compensation is based, sources, /including/ which include grants and contracts, will be determined in aggregate for all clinical departments of the College of Dentistry and separately for each such department.
- 2. The amount determined for each department, expressed as a percentage of the amount determined for all departments in aggregate, will be the basis for dividing among departments the funds available for distribution, and the amount to be allocated to the respective departments will be calculated accordingly.
- H. Data on the factors to be utilized in determining departmental allocations will be submitted by the Dean of the College of Dentistry for review by the Faculty Advisory Committee of the Dentists' Services Plan prior to preparation of the supplementary operating budget. Upon recommendation of the Committee, adjustments in the factors used may be made by the Dean if deemed necessary to avoid inequities due to limitations of available data. Computations of the amount of allocations for individual departments will be provided to the chairmen of the departments, respectively.
- I. Compensation initially budgeted as supplemental and on a non-recurring basis may be converted to a recurring or guaranteed basis, with TIAA-CREF contributions attaching thereto, in the basic operating budget by inclusion of provision for such purpose in the basic FUND grant to the University for support of salaries in the basic operating budget of the College of Dentistry. Salaries for positions filled and financed from the position pool will receive first priority for conversion and inclusion in the basic operating budget in the use of any increase provided in the basic FUND grant to the University for the fiscal year following establishment of such position. In recognition of this commitment with respect to the position pool, the Dean of the College of Dentistry may authorize chairmen of clinical departments to recruit and enter into agreements for filling duly-approved positions on a continuing basis where initial

financing is from funds provided to the Dean for supplementing the position pool under an approved supplementary operating budget.

J. Following adoption of the provisions herein, recommendations may be made by the Faculty Advisory Committee from time to time for modifications deemed to be appropriate and desirable.

This ability is especially valuable to administrative officers responsible for the conduct of financial administration.

A new section of KRS Chapter 164A, enacted under House Bill 622, requires an external audit for the purposes of rendering an independent opinion of the financial statements, preparing a report of findings and recommendations concerning internal accounting controls and procedures, and compliance with provisions of House Bill 622.

Voluntary Contributions to Fidelity Group of Funds, Twentieth Century Investors, and Value Line Securities, Inc. Pension Funds by University Employees

Recommendation: that the Board authorize the University to make available to employees on a voluntary basis the following 403(b) investment vehicles: Fidelity Group of Funds; Twentieth Century Investors; and Value Line Securities, Inc. These investment alternatives will be offered in addition to the voluntary plans currently offered in Teachers Insurance Annuity Association and College Retirement Equity Fund Plans. University administration will establish operating procedures for withholdings similar to those utilized for the TIAA/CREF voluntary plans, and will implement the new alternatives as soon as such procedures are developed.

Background: The University by virtue of being classified as a 501.C.3 organization under federal revenue regulations may offer its employees the opportunity to voluntarily tax shelter salary funds under the provisions of codes 403(b) and 415. Since the early 1960's the University has limited these voluntary investments to a single company, Teachers Insurance Annuity Association and College Retirement Equity Fund. The majority of institutions throughout the country now permit their employees alternatives for their voluntary investments. This does not impact the University's retirement plan being confined solely to TIAA/CREF. Between 650 and 700 employees voluntarily tax shelter funds under the provisions of 403(b) and 415. There is considerable employee interest in this matter.

A special committee, chaired by Dr. Dean White, was appointed to investigate and recommend on the question of alternatives. Dr. White's committee invited proposals from all eligible companies. Out of the 18 proposals that were received, three are recommended for approval. The three recommended offer the variable type of investment vehicle and thus are comparable to CREF. No institution funds are involved. The plans would be administered

by the Employee Benefits Office in the same manner as the voluntary TIAA/CREF investments. University administration reserves the right to review the performance of these voluntary vehicles periodically to insure it is in the employees' best interest that they continue to be offered. University administration will be vested with the authority to establish reasonable operating rules, such as prescribing minimum levels of employee participation. The development of procedures and systems to permit implementation will require some time, and the new alternatives cannot be implemented until such procedures and systems are developed.
