State hesitates in donation

Renovations for Rupp Arena and the Civic Center could slow because of difficulties in receiving funding from the state, Lexington Mayor Pam Miller said yesterday. Miller said the state might be requested because of the uncertainty surrounding the UK basketball team's future at Rupp Arena. The state, she said, is "going to want to see some letter of intent," Miller said.

said. "We've made it clear to them that we'd like the university to make a long-term commitment (to playing in Rupp)," she said. C.M. Newton, athletic director at

UK, said he doesn't see UK's involvement with Rupp Arena affecting plans for the renovation.

"I can't imagine that," Newton said. "Either they are going to get their \$30 million for the convention center or not."

Newton said the athletic department supports the renovations and will continue to play at Rupp until further decisions have been made.

"We are very supportive of what they are trying to do and we are very support of their plans to renovate Rupp, but it is just too early to make any definite commitments," Newton said. said. Newton said Mayor Miller plans to ask the state for \$30 million and that this money would be used entirely for renovations to the Civic Center.

"The mayor wants \$45 million for the project, \$30 million for the convention center and \$15 million for the Rupp renovation," Newton said.

Newton said that once the department determines the renovations \$15 million will buy, they will negotiate another lease.

"Once that is determined then we will go from there and see what kind of renovations you can get for \$15 million." Newton said.

Newton said UK has a lease for five more years with Rupp Arena and that the university would honor that.

"Depending on what happens with the renovation of Rupp," Newton said, "we will see about extending it (the lease)."

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico — More than 100 people, including 22 Americans, are believed to have been killed by a Mexican drug cartel and buried on two ranches near this border city, Mexican authorities said yesterday, U.S. and Mexican agents resumed a search yesterday for bodies. There has been no indication any of the bodies had been exhumed and officials were uncertain exactly how many bodies they expect to find. At Mexico's request, the FBI sent agents and forensic experts to help recover and identify the remains, believed to be of both U.S. and Mexican citizens, the Mexican attorney general's office said in a statement. For years, Ciudad Juarez has been headquarters for the Juarez cartel.

Computer tracks guns used in crimes

WASHINGTON — A nationwide computer system that aims to trace guns used in crimes gives law enforcement officials a new weapon in the war against crime. The system, called Online Lead, is administered by the Treasury Department's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and has been operating on a limited trial basis since February. The system is in use at all 331 ATF field offices. Although police and other local law enforcement officials can't tap directly into the system on their own, they can access the system through ATF.

Clinton: no 2nd thoughts on Panama

WASHINGTON — President Clinton said yesterday the United States has no second thoughts about relinquishing control of the Pomma Canal and is confident Panama's government will do a good job of operating the waterway. The 1978 Panama Canal treaties requires the United States to surrender control of the canal and to remove all U.S. troops by Dec. 31, 1999. Clinton won't attend the handover ceremony in mid-December. He said the United States would be represented in Panama by former President Carter, whose administration negotiated the treaties.

Ramsevs sue Star over accusation

ATLANTA — The parents of JonBenet Ramsey filed suit yesterday against the supermarket tabloid The Star after the newspaper published a story saying the Ramseys' son was a prime suspect in JonBenet's murder. The Star later retracted the stories. The suit, seeking §25 million in actual and punitive damages, said the stories published May 25 and June 1, were false and defamatory, and subjected 12-year-old Burke Ramsey to "public hattred, contempt and ridicule." The 6-year-old JonBenet was found beaten and strangled Dec. 26, 1996, in the basement of her parents' home in Boulder, Colo.




Tasteless toys



Shooting victim back at Heath H.S.

PADUCAH, Ky. — Missy Jenkins did something Monday doctors told her two years ago that she most likely never would do.

Jenkins, one of five students wounded in the Dec. 1, 1997. Heath High School shootings, shed her wheelchair and walked into school to resume her senior year. Aided by a walker and special leg braces, Jenkins said she is determined to someday walk without aid.


Three students were killed when Michael Carneal opened fire on a prayer group meeting in the school's lobby. Jenkins was the most seriously injured but months of intense rehabilitation in Los Angeles have given her new hope.

"Before this, I thought nothing could ever happen to me or one of my family members. But it can happen, I known." Jenkins said. "I want to be that person I was before the shooting, when I could walk, not the person in the wheel-chair.
