When making a choice of a volunteer to recognize, two names were mentioned repeatedly. The two people just happened to be

married to one another, Rose Rita and Jerry Wurmser. While they work together on some projects, they also have many individual interests.

Their friends describe them as the hardest working people they have ever come across with a deep commitment to family and a strong compassion for their fellow human beings. Together this dynamic couple have put in uncounted hours setting up and decorating the apartments provided for our new American families and assisting in many other ways.

Rabbi Adland said of his congregants,"They are two of the nicest, most giving, most open people, I have ever known."

Rose Rita and Jerry moved to Lexington 34 years ago from Louisville. For 25 years they had a wholesale sundries business in which they worked hard together with their family.


