

Desperately seeking scholarships

Students search for dollars to ease financial burdens

After the recent tuition increase imposed by the UK Board of Trustees, students are scrambling in search of ways to ease their financial burdens.

Out-of-state students must now come up with an additional \$420 dollars per semester, a final tuition bill of \$4188 each semester, to attend UK.

These figures do not include the costs of housing or books.

Fortunately for both in and out-of-state students, the University has many generous scholarship programs that reward UK students on the basis of grade point average, extracurricular activities and other criteria, said Sandy Copher of the Merit Scholarship Office.

"We received 480 applications last year and were able to award 480 scholarships." Copher said.

"The Merit Office hopes to have the scholarship application available on the University's Web Page, making it much easier for students to apply. While awarden out, applications for the Fall of 1969 will be available the first week of January and must be returned by April 20.

Report: 28 children killed by falling TVs between '90 and '97

CHICAGO — Falling Y sets killed at least 28 children from 1990 to 1997, researchers report. The average age of the victims was 2 1/2. Sets placed on TV stands or dressers were the most dangerous, causing 38 percent of the deaths, according to the study published in the September issue of the journal Pediatrics. The study was based on data collected from the Consumer Product Safety Commission and the Children's Hospital of Alabama.

Of 73 cases of fallen TV sets reported to the safety commission during that period, 28 resulted in death. Head injuries were most common.

The ages of the children hurt or killed ranged from newborn to 11 years.

Court upholds McVeigh verdict

DENVER — The emotional testimony from relatives of those who died in the bombing of the Oklahoma City federal building was correctly acluded at tria, a federal appeals court said in upholding Timothy McVeigh's conviction and sen-

tence.

McVeigh had appealed on grounds that the testimony produced a verdict and sentence based on emotion rather than reason, but the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Tuesday rejected his accurated to the control of the court of the

Circuit Court of Appeals on Tuesday rejected his arguments.

"The devastating effects that the deaths of the victims had on their families and loved ones is certainly part and parcel of the circumstances of the crime properly presented," the curt said.

The three-judge panel also rejected eight other avenues of appeal, including pretrial publicity, juror misconduct and barred testimony alleging that others may have carried out the worst-ever bombing on American soil.

McVeigh was convicted of murder and conspiracy in the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alried P. Murrah Federal Building and sentenced to death. The blast killed 168 people and injured hundreds more.

Grimes has been suspended pending a hearing Monday before the Ballard County Board of
Education.

"Those are one of the biggest deterrents there are," said Bandy, who recommends attaching the lock to both the front wheel and bike frame for maximum security.

per of degrees has increased 1.4 "The increase achieved in 1998 brings the University close to that 5-year goal and it indicates that UK is making rapid progress in enhancing its graduate education achieve-ments," Nietzel said.

Nietzel said UK wants to increase the number of graduates to provide intellectual leadership in the state and nation.

One way to measure the intelligence of a nation is to show the level of training in graduate study at the doctorate and masters levels, he said.

ate and masters levels, ne said. He Graduate School hand-ed out 1,366 degrees last school year, 1,333 masters degrees and 233 doctoral degrees. That number of masters degrees includes professional degrees such as law degrees. The number of masters degrees dropped from 1,614 in 1996 to 1594 in 1997. Diana Lopez, director of graduate admissions and records at UT-Knoxville, attributes that Uhiversity's drop to the economy and lack of funding.

"I wouldn't do that show." Povich told The Philadelphia Inquirer. "I can't handle fighting." The newspaper said Povich aspears with no suit jacket, a loose tie and rolled up sleeves.

TV series leads to lawsuit

HOLLYWOOD — A former star of the UPN series "Malcolm & Eddie" has filed a \$\frac{8}{5}\ \text{ million}\ suit against the show's producers for firing him. Jamie Cardriche says he had a six-year contract but was fired after three seasons, allegedly for complaining about the work environment. The lawsuit states that the producers also hired A.J. Johnson to work on the series, despite allegedly knowing that he had been fired from another UPN. The suit says Johnson allegedly hit Cardriche in the head with a chair, pointed a gun at him and threatened to kill him.

But don't despair. NWO fans. I'm sure




