autobiographical interpretation of this weird and diabolical composition was the dramatic high point of the evening. She left her audience gasping with amazement and a little frightened.

"Mon coeur s'ouvre a ta voix" the famous aria from Saint-Saens' opera "Samson et Dalila," furnished the best musical moments of the concert. Miss Meisle sang its haunting strains with feeling, injecting into its poignant quality a force of expression all her own.

One of the most difficult of operatic arias, the most extreme tone came into her grasp. Only the slightest lack of perfection in tone could be discerned on top notes, which, however, were not in the customary contralto range.

Scarcely second in excellence was Tschakowsky's immortal "None But The Lonely Heart." It was the contrast between types such as in this plaintive melody and the "White Song," which kept Miss Meisle's program so interesting.

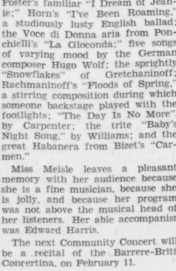
