

UNIVERSITY EMERGENCY CLOSING PROCEDURE: PLAN B

When the University announces that it is operating on Plan B and classes are not in session (for example, in between semesters), the Library will not be open. If the

University operates on Plan B when classes would otherwise be in session, the Library will normally continue its regular schedule with staff coverage as is maintained in public service units on nights and weekends. Department heads with public service units should have plans in place for Plan B coverage. Staff members are referred to UK Staff Personnel Policy and Procedure No. 71.0 for time reporting policies.

This policy does not apply to Medical Center Library personnel.

The University of Kentucky Women Writers Conference will celebrate its tenth anniversary April 6-9, 1988, with four days of readings, lectures, panel discussions, workshops and special events.

Visiting writers invited for the conference include Camille Bacon-Smith, Andrea Dworkin, Denise Giardina, Sandra Gilbert, Susan Gubar, Rosa Guy, Marilyn Hacker, Sharon Olds, Sherley Anne Williams and

Billie Jean Young.

The celebration will begin with a reception and preview offering short round-robin readings by guest writers on Wednesday evening. Panel discussions and lectures will address directions in women's literature, writing erotica, women as writers, choosing poetry as a form of expression, writing fiction based on history, fanzines, using ideology in fiction, women and language, and writing poetry.

SCIEONLINE SCIENTIFIC LITERATURE WORKSHOPS

The next two workshops for online searching on Dialog will be held January 25-26 from 1:00-2:00 p.m. and on February 22-23 from 10:00-11:00 a.m. in the conference room of the Geological Sciences Library.

The workshops are designed to give the most basic training on dialog. They cover all the commands a librarian or enduser will need to conduct searches that will satisfy about 95% of their searching needs. The workshops are "watered-down" equivalents of a Dialog system seminar.

The workshops can benefit librarians who are experienced with or have never used Dialog.

Each participant will have approximately 40 minutes of guides online time to practice searching techniques in a wide

variety of databases available on Dialog. Although the emphasis will be on gathering scientific literature, anyone can sign up for the workshop and search topics of their own interest.
