





# Q. You worked with former President Bill Clinton for a long time and now you're solidly behind Presi-dent Bush. Why the change?

A. I would have supported Kerry if it were not for 9-11.

I think that Clinton was a very good domestic policy president.

Remember that Clinton cut the welfare rolls in half, while reducing child poverty by a third, which is an extraordinary achievement.

And he eliminated the budget deficits, reduced the crime rate by 60 percent, made the United States unbelievably competitive in international economics.

lievably competitive in international economics.

So when Clinton left office, I was very high on him. I thought he'd done a wonderful job and I was very proud of the role I had been able to play.

But on 9-11, that was the worst day of his presidency — even though it was eight months after he left office — that was the day that you looked back and you could see all the things that should have happened but didn't happen.

I had been a very long-term hawk in the war on terror. But I don't think any of us could possibly imagine the extent to which we were vulnerable, as a result of some of (Clinton's) failings.

# O pou now have different positions on other issues besides the terror threat?

A. No, no. I'm pro-choice, I'm in favor of gay marriage. I would never vote for Bush if it weren't for 9-11. I voted for Gore (in 2000).

I'm no conservative. I'm still very much in syne with the Clinton policies. It just is the war on terror.

As I believe that 9-11 created a community of experience with (your) generation that is now being reflected in their high voter turnout.

That presages a level of public involvement—the level of intensity of citizenship, and a level of political power that I think will be very, very important in your generation.

Winston Churchill once said that if you're not a liberal when you're 20, you have no heart, and when you're not conservative when you're 40, you have no brain.

And hat he meant by that is that when you are very idealisted of you have no train.

And hat he meant by that is that when you is a very idealistic liberal view. If we want to eliminate poverty, give the poor more money.

If we want peace stop making if the proper was the property of the property in the poor more money.

to eliminate poverty, give the poor more money. If we want peace, stop making weapons and going to war.

For example, in the 1980's, I was vigorously pro-peace. I was a strong advocate of the nuclear freeze, strongly opposed to armaments — hated Reagan and the arms race.

And I thought that the way to achieve peace with the Soviet Union and avoid world war was through disarmament.

Well, I was totally dead wrong, because it turned out that the more you disarmed, the less you imposed an economic burden on the Soviet Union, and the longer you've permitted it to perpetuate itself.

bankrupt the Soviet Union in the process — and it also achieved freedom

bankrupt the Soviet Union in the process — and it also achieved freedom for 600 million people.

Another great example is when I was in my 20s and 30s, I thought it was very necessary to have a big increase in welfare benefits for the poor.

Then when I got to be in my 40s and I worked on getting Clinton to sign the welfare reform bill, I realized that it was necessary to make people work, that they were not going to go from dependence to work unless you gave them a good hard push.

That's what the welfare reform bill did. And it cut the welfare rolls in half, which is fine, but it also cut child people with the commonsty, because it made people work. The commonsty because it made people agave them any strained forced them into jobs — and they took to it like a duck to water.

And I think that al-Qaeda may with its silence, be laying low at the mo-ment, so that they can hopefully en-courage people to get rid of Bush, and not figure that terrorism is a big deal.

# What advice would you give to students who are interested in punditry and campaigning – who want to live off of TV appearances, books, columns, pushing their opinions?

A. To be a pundit, you sort of have to make your mark in some other field. You could become a journalist, but that's sort of almost the opposite of a pundit, because a pundit is based on opinion — a journalist is based on reporting facts. whereas if you armed, and you challenge the Soviets to an arms race, you exposed the economic difficulties optof their system, and you hasten their collapse.
