



JULIAN M. CARROLL
Governor of Kentucky



Julian Morton Carroll became Kentucky's 58th governor on Dec. 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll was elected to a full four-year term as governor in November 1975 and was inaugurated in December of that year. Born in McCracken County in 1931, Carroll attended Paducah Junior Collegafter graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956.

Before becoming governor, Carroll, served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives, the last four as Speaker of the House. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-67 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod. The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

# JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

#### DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall

The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

#### Athletics Department

#### CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

#### FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative Assistant to footpall coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.



#### SUSAN FEMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics



SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1, 1978, with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

#### LARRY IVY Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the appointment three years ago of LARRY IVY as Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and develops and initiates policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

#### **Coaching Staff**

#### JOE B. HALL Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his eighth season as coach of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which he took a team depleted through graduations and molding them into a contender for the SEC title and receiving an invitation to enter the National Invitation Tournament. The team finished with 19 wins and 12 losses.

Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 154 wins and 54 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 230-110. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his sixth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base, in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where

# SEC Teams Appear Strong, Balanced

The Southeastern Conference in recent years has become more evenly balanced in regards to the relative strengths of the member basketball teams. In a poll of sports media representatives attending the annual pre-season meeting at SEC headquarters in Birmingham last month, Louisiana State was the choice for most likely to succeed.

However, the coaches attending the conference were in agreement that there would be a number of SEC schools that would be highly competitive and would be capable of spoiling the Tigers' hopes

for a crown.

The Bengals received 40 first place votes to tally 624 points as the league favorite. Close behind was Kentucky with 23 first place votes and 608 points. The Wildcats were followed by Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia, Auburn, Mississippi State, Vanderbilt, Mississippi, and Florida.

ida.

"Pre-season polls are a popularity contest," Kentucky coach Joe B. Hall commented recently. "We were ranked No. 2 in the nation at the same time we were ranked No. 2 in the conference. No one knows how players are going to respond during the race and the only way to determine who is strong is to play the games.

"We had a good recruiting year but our team has a lot of young players that need to gain experience. Georgia also had a good recruiting year that will help them and Alabama will be strong again. There will be a lot of people competitive this year. Auburn and Tennessee are also capable of being among the better teams in the SEC. It will be a fun year," said the Wildcats' coach.

Looking at the teams in alphabetical order, the conference shapes up as fol-

lows:

ALABAMA—C. M. Newton has established the Crimson Tide basketball program as one of the winningest in the nation, having won 20 or more games in six of the past seven seasons.

Despite having lost the "SEC Player of the Year", Reggie King, the Tide will again be strong after a third place finish last year.

Senior guards Robert Scott, 6-1, and

Joe Hancock, 6-5, are back to run the Tide attack. Scott set a school record of 191 assists last season and averaged 20 points per game in the SEC and NIT tournaments.

Inside, the Tide has 6-6 Eddie Phillips, returning after averaging 14.5 ppg and 7.4 rebounds and shooting 60.2 from the floor. Ken Johnson, a two-year starter, who averaged 10.7 ppg last year, is also returning. Phillip Lockett, a 6-9 center, will move in as a starter in the place of the graduated Reggie King.

AUBURN—The War Eagles are optimistic about their 1979 season with four starters returning and coach Sonny Smith's first group of recruits in camp. Auburn finished ninth in the SEC, 5-13, but reached the 1979 semifinals of the SEC tourney.

Smith played a lot of young players last year and hence lost only three seniors to graduation and they averaged less than five total minutes of playing time

per game.


The nucleus of the team will be 1979 starters Bubba Price, a 6-3 senior guard, Rich Valavicius, a 6-5 forward, huge Bobby Cattage, a 6-9, 250 pound junior center, and Earl Banks, a 6-7 junior forward. At point guard, Eric Stringer and Lewis Card alternated last year and should be improved with a year's experience.

FLORIDA—John Lotz has eight experienced lettermen back from last year's squad. The Gators finished 8-19 last season but six of those losses were by a combined total of seven points.

The front line is anchored by two year starter Reggie Hannah, a 6-8 forward/center, who led the Gators in rebounding the past two seasons. Maurice McDaniel, a 6-8 sophomore, 10.7 ppg in 1978-'79, and 6-9 Bob Van Noy, inactive last year, round out the front line.

In the backcourt are a pair of longshot artists, 6-2 junior Mark Giombetti and 6-3 junior Jimmy Cotton.

GEORGIA—After breaking even last season at 14-14, Bulldog coach Hugh Durham hopes to move Georgia into the SEC's upper-division this year. Georgia finished seventh in the SEC in 1979 on a

7-11 record, but in the SEC tourney, stunned third-place Mississippi State, 75-72 before losing to Auburn, 95-91 in four overtimes.

#### LSU, Kentucky are seen as strongest of strong.

Durham must replace the graduated Walter Daniels at the guard spot after he finished as Georgia's all-time career scoring leader with 1,659 points. Returning are starters 6-10 center Lavon Mercer, 6-1 guard Jimmy Daughtry and 6-3 sophomore forward Eric Marbury.

Lack of depth has plagued Georgia in the past, but a recruiting year that included two of the most sought after prep players in the nation last year—Dominique Wilkins and Terry Fair—plus Derrick Floyd, a 6-4 guard, has added three that have the ability to play as freshmen.

KENTUCKY will be using a busy early season schedule to mold a team constructed of five of the nation's top recruits with a nucleus of veterans that includes seniors Kyle Macy, LaVon Williams and Jay Shidler. Providing additional experience will be standouts Dwight Anderson, Fred Cowan and Chuck Verderber.

Coach Joe B. Hall feels good about the coming year. He points out the abundance of great athletes on the squad and that gives him an edge called versatility. With the returning players and the incoming talent, it should make for an exciting year in the Bluegrass.

LOUISIANA STATE welcomes back three starters and 11 lettermen from last year's team that won the SEC Championship with a 14-4 record.

DeWayne Scales, Ethan Martin and Greg Cook are the returning starters. The 6-9 Scales won All-SEC honors as a junior at his forward position. Greg Cook will move to center with All-SEC forward in 1978 Durand Macklin returning after an early injury in 1979.

The Bengals are loaded with talent and depth, a combination that has earned them national attention from pre-season polls

MISSISSIPPI will be led by 6-7 John Stroud, a scoring machine who averaged 26.3 ppg last season and was a concensus All-SEC player. Bob Weltlich played a lot of freshmen in 1979 and will have four starters back plus a lot of experience on the bench. Elston Turner, 6-5, will play forward opposite Stroud while one guard will be Sean Tuohy, 6-1, and the center will be 6-8 Tim Thomas. Chris

MISSISSIPPI STATE, which finished at 19-9 and a third place SEC tie with Bama and Vandy, is likely to be strong again this year.


How far the 1980 Bulldogs get depends on how the returning scoring punch of 6-10 Ricky Brown and 6-1 Greg Grim intertwines with transfer Kent Looney and freshman Kalpatrick Wells. The latter will be replacing the SEC's top rebounder Wiley Peck, who graduated.

TENNESSEE returns four starters from last year's SEC Tournament champs (21-12) including forward Reggie Johnson, guards Bert Bertelkamp and Gary Carter and center Howard Wood.

The Vols finished second in the SEC regular season race with a 12-6 record. The majority of the 1979 top subs are back and the season looks bright for Don DeVoe in his second year as head coach.

VANDERBILT will be hoping that Richard Schmidt, a transplanted Kentuckian who coached at Ballard High School in Louisville and accumulated a remarkable lifetime record of 318-36—an 89.8 winning percentage, will continue the Commodores' 1979 success of 18-9.

Schmidt likes to run a motion offense and fast break whenever possible. He is a believer in pressure defense too. He will be relying on silky smooth Charles Davis, a 6-6 All-America candidate, to lead his high geared game plans.

### BAYLOR UNIVERSITY WACO, TEXAS

#### JIM HALLER Head Coach

It is no coincidence that the rise of Baylor's basketball fortunes and the arrival of Jim Haller started at about the same time.

Baylor had four straight losing seasons before the personable Haller took over the coaching reins toward the end of the 1977 season. He promptly guided the unlikely Bears to a Southwest Conference Post-Season Tournament appearance. The next season, his first full season as the Bruin head man, saw the Baylor squad post a winning record of 14-13. That was the first time Baylor basketball had been on the positive side since 1973.

Presiding over the largest Baptist university in the world is only one of the many activities 64-year-old Abner V. McCall involves himself in nowadays. One of Baylor's most faithful sports fans, Dr. McCall also finds time to sit on the Texas Adult Probation Commission and Judicial Council, act as chairman of the Board of Directors of two scientific institutions and teach a men's Bible Study class at the First Baptist Church of Waco.


In 1946 he returned to a full professorship and later became dean of the Baylor Law School. A tenure as Associated Justice of the Texas Supreme Court followed before McCall moved to executive vice president and then, in 1961 president of Baylor.



Haller, the youngest coach in the league, continued the upward spiral with a convincing 16-12 record and fourth place Southwest Conference finish last year.



"Of course we are happy that our program is moving along positively but we are far from satisfied," explains the 34-year-old Haller.





# Special Collection Opens UK Museum

In November, the University of Kentucky opened its new art museum with a special collection titled "Beginnings: A University Art Museum Collects."

The museum is now open daily, except Mondays, from Noon to 5 p.m. Admission is free.

The museum is located in the west wing of UK's new Center for the Arts, located on the corner of Rose and Euclid on the former site of McLean football stadium, "old Stoll Field."

UK President Otis Singletary said, "Universities throughout the country have long recognized the need for the study of the visual arts as a means of preserving and transmitting cultural values to society as a whole. The opening of the University Art Museum provides a means of fulfilling that purpose."


The opening exhibition includes many recent acquisitions to UK's permanent collection that have not been on display as well as the more familiar works in the UK collection.

In addition, some 30 works representing a wide spectrum of cultures and styles have been loaned to the University by New York galleries for the opening.

"These loaned works, selected for their

exceptional quality and their relationship to existing collections, provide opportunities to consider future growth of our collection,' said Prescilla Colt, UK museum director.

In particular, the opening exhibition will highlight UK's collection of 15th through the 19th century American and European paintings, sculpture and decorative arts, and its initial acquisitions in the areas of African, Northwest Coast, Oriental and Pre-Columbian art.

The exhibition also will include an important group of American paintings from the 1960s which form the core of the Robert B. Mayer Memorial Loan Collection.

UK's significant print collection also is shown with a special presentation of graphic works from the 1930s.

An illustrated exhibition catalogue will be available for purchase.

Bruce Weber, the museum's first

curator, said that the museum plans several exhibitions for the next two years including "Kentucky Artists: 1980," "Contemporary Paintings from the Robert B. Mayer Memorial Loan Collection," and "The Intimate View: Small Paintings from the 19th Century."

Other future showings will include highlighting Kentucky historical art and the work of Joel T. Hart, the 19th century Kentucky sculptor.

Two photographic shows planned this season are "The American Farm," organized by the California Historical Society, and "I Shall Save One Land Unvisited: 11 Southern Photographers," organized by the Virginia Polytechnic Institute and the State University in Blacksburg, Va.

The only such facility within a 75-mile radius of Lexington, the UK Art Museum occupies a two-story wing of the Center, and has 20,000 square feet of exhibition, storage and office space.

Areas are provided for the display of works from the museum's permanent collection and for the installation of special exhibitions.

"The museum serves as a new educational arm of the University," Ms. Colt said. "It provides a focal point and mixing place for the large and diverse group of persons in the community who are drawn to the arts."

In 1975 there were 917 objects in the museum's collection. Presently it numbers over 1,400. The strongest area is 20th century art with a growing nucleus of 19th century American and European paintings.

Since Ms. Colt's arrival as director inthe fall of 1975, the collection has expanded to include works of Oriental, Pre-Columbian, Northwest Coast and African arts.

The museum's inaugural exhibition closes Dec. 16. For further information, telephone (606) 258-5716.




# Sports Information



## **Arena Information**

#### FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

#### CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

#### LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

#### NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

#### GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

#### LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all foods and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

#### **PUBLIC ADDRESS**

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.

#### SIGNS


Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.


