Miss Lucy Abrams is visiting her sister, Mrs. Dewey Smith, and Mr. Smith, at their home on Boone street.

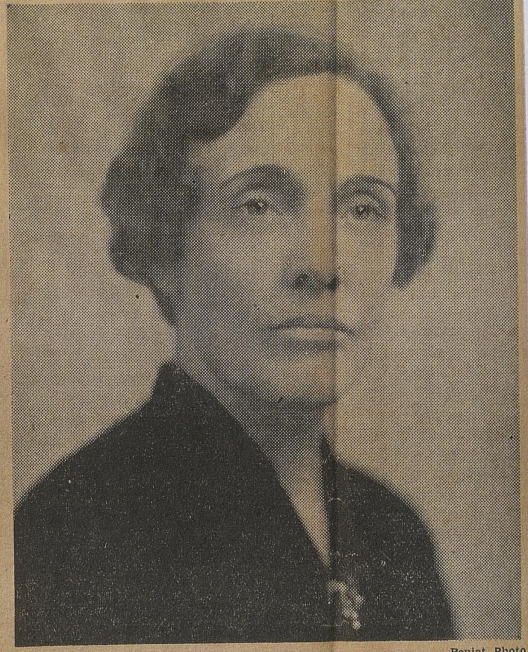
Miss Mattie Sizemore has returned to Berea after spending a few days with her parents at Big Creek.
