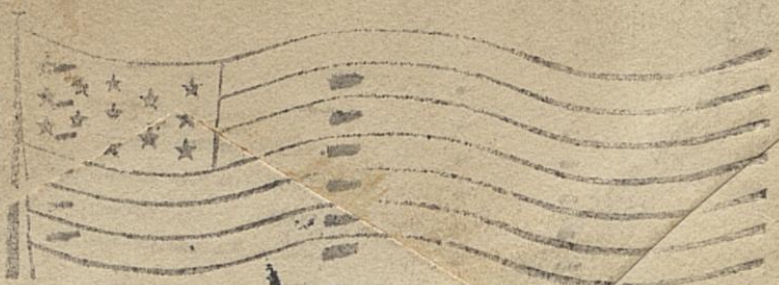

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## VERY ILL WITH TYPHOID.

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RAY McNAIR, SON OF H. C. McNAIR, IS HARDLY EXPECTED TO SURVIVE SERIOUS DISEASE.

Ray McNair, second son of Henry C. McNair, Laurel avenue, is critically ill with typhoid fever at his home, and small hope is held out by his physicians that he will recover.

Young McNair has been a student of great promise at the state university, and one of the most popular members of the younger set of boys and girls in St. Paul. His severe illness, coming almost immediately after the death of his mother, is a double affliction for the family.



## RIVER—TWO HORSES ARE DROWNED.

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A teamster's whip yesterday afternoon made possible the rescue of Robert McKeen, 32 years old, when two horses he drove into the river near the bridge at Twentieth avenue N were caught in the current and drowned in the stream. McKeen retained his hold on the reins when the horses were being drawn into the eddys, and when his cries were heard by pedestrians in the vicinity, the man was gradually being drawn into the stream. Rescuers seized the end of a whip which he held toward them, and succeeded in dragging him to shore. The horses were drowned.

McKeen told the police he was driving his horses home from work. When the river was reached, McKeen said he wanted to cool the horses off and let them drink. He drove them into the water and the next moment they were seized by the current. The team was valued by the owner, Martin Boheunstingle, a lumberman at 327 Thirteenth avenue S, at more than \$600.

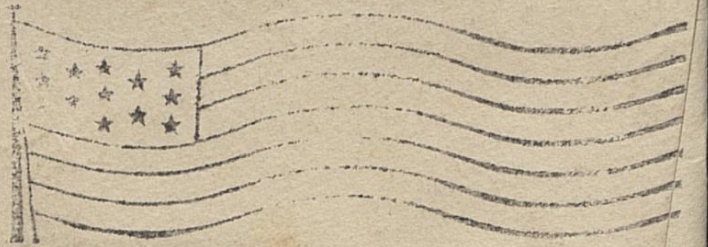
