DEAR SIR, — The Rooms of the HASTY PUDDING CLUB being entirely inadequate for the accommodation of the Society, owing to the increased size of the classes, the immediate members have petitioned the Corporation for the entry and two rooms adjoining.

This petition has been granted; and it is necessary to raise funds at once, to make the required alterations in the rooms.

The plan is, to make of the four rooms and entry one large room, which shall comprise the stage and auditorium; the latter to serve also as library.

In order to obtain sufficient ventilation, it will be necessary also to increase the height of the rooms, by removing the ceiling and changing the position of some of the rafters.

This is thought to be the most economical method of obtaining the necessary accommodations for the audiences, and a thorough ventilation for the rooms.

It is estimated that four thousand dollars (\$4,000) will be needed to make the necessary changes. This sum must be raised by contribution among the past and present members of the Pudding.

The Committee would therefore respectfully solicit your subscription.
