I was very much pleased with my news. If you have got the the things Stephen can bring them down particularly bellies shoes as he is in grain distress for them. The little shirts will be ready for you. I regret that you had not brought some of your work to me as I could have had it done. Sister left this morning Papa is or was quite unwell last night - Willie has been sick for several days - yours affectionately -
