

Oak Forest 25th Nov: 1860

My dear allay

Allow me to congratulate you
On the entrance of yourself & the best into your own
home. I trust it may prove a happiness and always
a happy one you mean to tell the old said "live in a
Cottage". It is a true one as I can attest from past
experience - There is really no place like home and when
in a few years you have emerged from the Cabin to
the Castle you will feel less the better by the contrast
& the improvements that you will make.

We have been much retarded in
our sugar operations but I made out to get off
a barrel of sugar for you & Sarah & Eliza a
few days ago - the two first destined to N.Y. - as
yet the quality is not as good as could be wished.
The next I hope will be better - this will do to begin

on. We have had two severe frosts which
have stopped the growth of the cane effectively &
say you an advantage - we start with more
force tonight & better preparation for work and
hope to go along pretty rapidly.

I was gratified to hear of the ^{22d} letter from so soon Mr. Duncan and regret
that we can not be present to participate in the
festival - but I can at least tender my felicitations
and my best wishes that a union & happiness

My a lasting blessing to all - Miss Lelly is a general
favorite and with none more than with the
poor brother I have always appreciated for his very
high & rare qualities - I trust the families are
all satisfied which adds much to the happiness
of the poor, I should think -

I wish you could meet with the tea
family we are here - Kendall has become a very busy
and important man he has often occupied a hearty wish
that I might come here to take watch at night so
that he could have something of the Sugar of sugar
making! There is nothing like experience to gain knowl-
edge unpleasing as it sometimes is -

The old doctor is still slopping
around - steadily is doing a little at the cane fields
just to give a little exercise - I hope the winter will
bring him out or he has no desire, has a good
appetite and takes his medicine - Kendall has
planned from time at all stages and has put up
seed for a crop of 400 bushels next season - intending
to shake it up at Greenwood so as not to be obliged
to build a sugar house the first season

The excitement in consequence of
Lincoln's election is on the increase - I suppose there
is to be a public meeting at Hominy - Kendall
will go up & make a unanimous resolution for disunion
& a Southern Confederacy - I am out and out for
a separate & independent government of people

I loath the very idea of a further connection with
Northern fanatics with their vile abominations of any sort
the least of which is their Slavery of the South which
we could well dispense - The Governor has called the
legislature together in extra session on the 15th Inst March
when I hope a convention will be called to act definite-
ly on the question of disunion - The consequence
of all those agitating matters sugar & tobacco at
present have no market but money must come to
St. Louis soon as the people must have our products -
The "Vicksburg" first came out we have had trouble
with a new engine - always something -

We count on having some company
this winter Mr. Higgins possibly and probably soon
from Memphis - Did I write you that Miss
Mary Easter was married to Dr. Bush of Hominy
is the favored man - Kendall & I were at the wedding
the "Select few"

I am afraid our things now stand my
trip to Europe will have an indefinite postponement
important matters are before us and gravely to trans-
act enough to keep all Southerners at home for some
time ~~up to come~~ -

I will write next to Hart when time
I hope you & the both will have time to tell what
you are doing - a kiss to Duncan and
