I hear that the price is now 44^{1/2}
per cwt in your city. are Sales made
at that rate on time or for Cash?
I have some friends here who wish to know
particularly therefore I shall be tened it as
a favor to have your views!

There is evidently I think a tendency now
to speculate in Bt rope from last yrs from his
views. If firms Sales have been made there
at 12^{1/2} Cash on speculation & I presume
will rather go up. I had three calls
yesterday from persons wishing to buy,
in fact a partner and first rate
house at N. O. about paper ~~Scars~~ ^{Scars} Park
etc. Lee without any other name,
offered me 12 + 4^{1/2} per cwt for 5000
1000 per Bagging & 1000 coils good
rope. what I have on hand however
is limited by the owner. & I sold last
month to a house Lee all I had which

was not limited. So that my stock is small at present. I have had some letters from some of the large planters of the South on the subject & I perceive they are anxious to buy at present low rates. Heard by the way that you intended going again somewhat into the manufacture of these articles. & I shall annex you a statement handed me within a few days, of the quantity which will very probably be made this year. It was made out I believe by Mr. Thorley & it may prove interesting to you; in case you do go into the manufacture of these articles I shall be much pleased to make some sales for you. As there is a small balance due you from W H Pope &c I will pay it at once in London. If this mode should suit you; my mode of doing business is to sell for Cash & charge only 2 1/2% Comms. of the manufacture with one to sell on time, & am willing to trust to my judgment. I tell to none but those whom I believe are undoubtedly
 mostly planters whom I know, or towns beyond all suspicion. The paper I send over it charged 2 1/2%; & I wish any communication so as to be a ~~so~~ of

~~from~~ guarantee to them. I have sold a good deal there for, & all have paid. Sold also a considerable quantity for Cash.

I have made a right smart number of customers among the planters. Of their skills I prefer: Please give me your views in relation to the Hemp as soon as you can also what you think will be the date of its reaching you! & greatly oblige my dear Sir

My dear Sir,

We arrived here yesterday all well & my present purpose is to leave tomorrow for home on the Steam Liner & of course will not go by St. Louis as at one time contemplated.

Yesterday I looked into the different Commission houses here having bagging & rope for sale & find it offering prices, usually at 12½ to 13½ cent for the former & 5 to 6 cent for the latter at 4 months. I was in at W. Pope's & looked at your article, the bagging I was much pleased with, the rope as I remonstrated to you I think a size too small, at least I would prefer it a size larger, tho' it may prove on trial to do better than I now think. As you remarked to me in Lexington that you were disposed to take the Louisville prices for your article to be delivered at our landings on the river. I have concluded to make you a proposition for myself & two of my neighbours, which if you think favourably of you will please advise me & forward the article as soon as practicable viz - 13½ cent for the bagging and 6 cent for the rope, pay able four months, we should be pleased to have forty or sixty days longer & would be willing to allow the interest for that time. I assure you the offer made above are the outside asking prices for such an article as yours, at present & the market rather a-

Tendrancy down, as think, Mr. Pope, I do not however make the remark with a view to hold out any inducement to you to make the sale, as you are informed of the state of the market & as able to judge of the matter as myself or any other person. I was offered yesterday a lot of 100 coils Rope at 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents 4 months, which I was pleased with & a choice lot at 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ bagging C 127 $\frac{1}{2}$ intended added the the latter article I must in candour say was not equal to yours yet it weighed over 172 $\frac{1}{4}$ to the yard — Should you think proper to accept of my proportion you will please order the shipment of the article as per Memorandum annexed —

If you know of any friend or acquaintance that you could have confidence in & would like to leave the commission under your superintendence would be pleased that you would get him to look out & purchase such a lot for me —

Dear Sir

Since my return to this place I have made inquiries in regard to the price of Bagging & Hops; - the present feeling in the market &c. - I have to inform you that nearly all the stock in the city is either held firmly at 15^d. (say fifteen cents) each or not off' still: - But few sales have as yet been made as high as 15^d. - I hear of a sale yesterday of 220 pounds at 14¹/₂^d: - This price, 14¹/₂^d will buy a good many pounds pressing upon the market, - altho' there is in truth not much more to be had now below 15^d.

McCoy of Mobile & some other buyers here, took not nearly all the choice Bagging & Hops off' at 14¹/₂^d: - 8^d C 1¹/₂^d for Hops. - Last Friday & Saturday: - If I was call'd upon to say what the Louisville market price for Bag. & Hops was since Monday last - I would say 14¹/₂^d C 15^d: - The latter for the best brands in Large lots. Roppe 6^d C 7^d: - The L.M.C. & the other factory would ship before taking less than the highest figure, say 15^d & 7^d: -

The last acc't from N.O. quote Bogg. at 16 $\frac{1}{2}$. -
some steel sales at 17 $\frac{1}{2}$: - The opinion
here is that the stuff will certainly advance,
and I believe myself that the article is
good for 18 or 20 $\frac{1}{2}$ in New-Orleans before
next spring: - I believe this, altho' I
would altho' like to give 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ for Bogg. -
with the view of holding it for 20 $\frac{1}{2}$.
There is not enough margin though for a speculation
beside, the Manufacture of your section
~~was~~ (so my curiosities,) may yet defeat their
own interest, and allow the price to remain
as it is at present; - by shipping too much
to New-Orleans, in the next 30 days: -

The stock in New-Orleans altho' not heavy
yet seems ample to meet the present de-
mand: - and It may be that the advanced
price, if it does take place, will not come
til next spring: - Still as I said before
there is ~~any~~ probability that Boggings will
get up to 20 $\frac{1}{2}$ in New-Orleans before
next Ap'l -

Dear Sir

I was offered
the other day by Mr. Joshua Nixon of In-
diana \$320. on two dollars an acre for
your tract of land, upon which is the
blue grape grove. He proposes to pay \$200.
in hand, and the remainder in twelve
months. As this is far better than any offer
I have made for you, or any offer I
have had, I told told him that I had no
doubt but that you would be willing to
sell at that price. I consider this much
the least valuable of any of your land
it is about four miles from any timber or
neighborhood. The Grove itself is small
not sufficient to make a keep up even
a very small farm. The land however is
