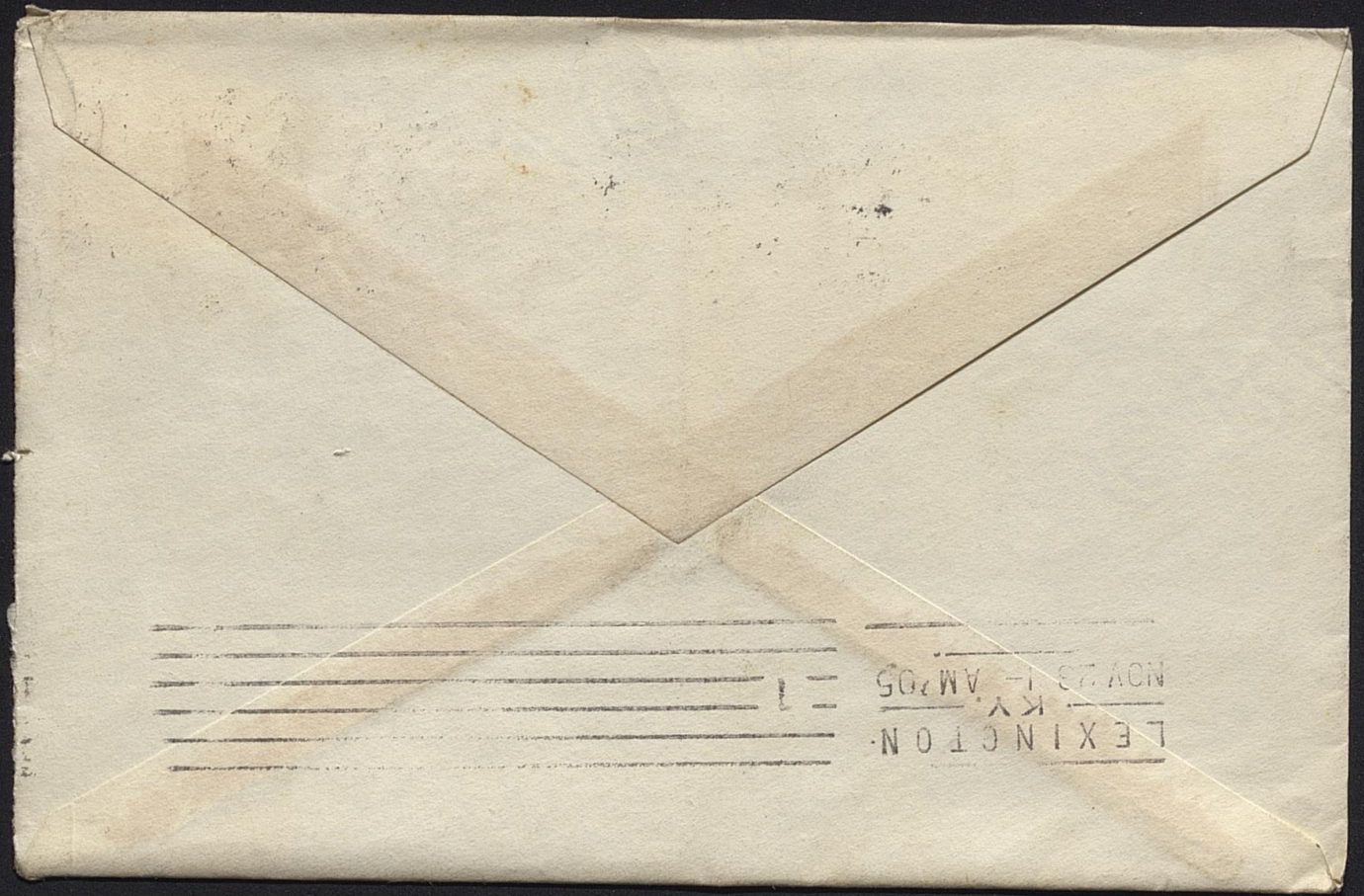

Dear Cousin Mary,

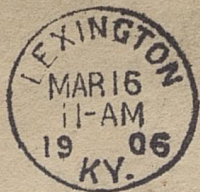
I have, indeed, never known her to be so deeply gratified by anything, not even by the surprisingly demonstrative cordiality of her own people of which she had just been the subject, — as by the welcome you gave her; and she seems peculiarly anxious to give proof of her sense of your kindness, — influenced, I suspect, by an impression of thirteen years' standing, that her welcomes among my people were likely to be wanting in radical cordiality.

I have been quite sick since the change in the weather — the prolonged revolt of my system against the fearful heat seemed to "strike in" when the external stress was removed — and I am still scarcely capable of expressing myself — a more critical undertaking, at the moment, than that of reporting my wife —; but I think you saw and understood, despite the incipience of my sickness while we were with you, my sincerely grateful recognition of your liking for my wife and the pleasant evidences of it.

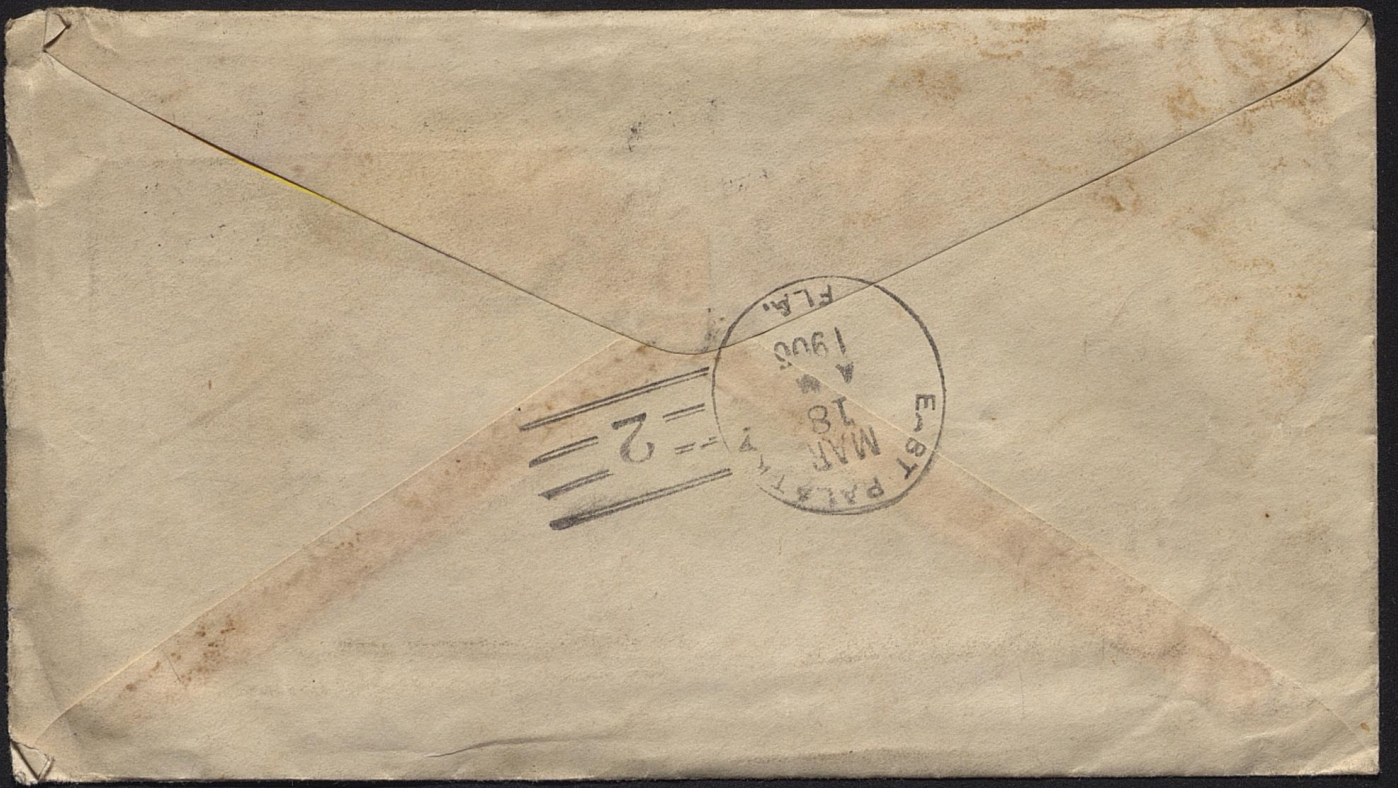
