REVIEW OF THE MARKET.

MARKETS.—The river has fallen some since our last, and is now quite low. Boats of small size continue to ply below the Falls with good freights at high prices. Yesterday we had a fine rain which was very much needed.

BAZONS.—About the rates of last week are current. Sky for hams from wagons, 9 cts. Sides, 7 @ 7 1/2. Hams in stores, 10 cts. Sides, 6 @ 6 1/2. **BAZONS AND BAZ.**—There have been sales to a limited extent of 50 and 100. Arrived this week of bagging, 1,000 pieces shipped, 2,000 pieces stock unshipped, 4,600. Arrived this week of rope, 1,488 coils shipped, 2,135 coils stock, 3,312. The steambot Wm. Potts took a few days ago, on her way to New Orleans, loaded with bagging and rope, which was saved in a damaged state.

necessary now to name yours of the 13th
inst accompanying the Beautiful Flag
presented by the "Banker Hill" Fillmore
& Donelson Club of Charlestowne Mass
to the Whigs National Americans of the

a day or two since and as President of
the F. Fillmore & Donelson Club of this
City composed of Conservative men
of all parties, I embrace the earliest
opportunity of returning my most heart-
felt and sincere thanks for this token
of Friendship & Fraternal Sympathy on
the part of our "Banker Hill" Brethren
and you will please inform them
that prizing as we very highly do the
Flag coming from the source it does
the hand of Daniel Webster the able
expounder of the Constitution and
co-laborer of our distinguished and
lamented Clay in preserving the int-
egrity of our glorious Union, it will
be the means at this crisis in the pol-
itical affairs of our Country of stimu-

approaching canvass to do all in our

power to elevate to the chief Magistracy
of this great confederacy the man
