As a consequence, it is directly up to students to exercise logical and unprejudiced judgment in their selections. The fight to directly voice opinions can only be won by exercising prompt and unbiased judgment in these selections.

these selections. It is further gratifying to record that in a consultation with members of the Alumni Association Executive Board, The Kernel was assured that the association will take similar steps toward direct selection of alumni representatives.

The Kernel wishes it to be understood that their fight has been not against the Athletic Council, but rather for true opinions of students Council, out rather for true opinions of students and alumni through more direct representation. Both students and alumni are now in a position to assume responsibility of expressing these opinions. It is hoped that they will act accordingly. Whoever President McVey selects as student

Whoever President McVey selects as student members of the Council, must remember that they are speaking for the entire student body. They must cast their votes as they believe the students want them cast. They must not be swayed by any outside influence, and generally, they must remain loyal to the student body.

The controlling vote in the Athletic Council is, and should be, dominated by the more mature faculty members. But they, together with undergraduate members, must remember that they function in the interests of the Athletic Association, which is composed of every student o the University. Their primary duty is to the students, regardless of commercial advantages, and *The Kernel* trusts that their decisions will not be influenced by off-campus interests.

Independents are planning a good will policy for next year's social calendar.

Understanding that consider the constant of t

Independents are planning a good will policy for next year's social calendar.
Understanding that considerable animosity exists between the Independents and fraternity men over the bid situation, the non-Greeks wish to propose a plan by which they will sponsor a formal function next year, invite all the fraternities, and thus relax the tension encountered by Independents when they apply for fraternity dance bids.

The plan revolves around the idea of collecting two dollars from each Independent who wishes to attend fraternity swings during the year. Upon payment of this "initiation fee" the Independent will receive a card which entitles him to admission at every fraternity dance. The two dollar fees will be centered in a treasury, which should, if the plan works, amount to some four or five hundred dollars. With this money the Independents will give a dance in the Alumni gymnasium and have as their guests every fraternity on the campus.

Naturally, the fullillment of this innovation depends solely upon the Greeks' approval. It is

something which needs the endorsement of ev-ery lodge, otherwise the strain will still pull be-tween the Hellenics and the Independents. The Kernel suggests that this bone be gnawed upon at the first Inter-fraternity council meet-


