
Beirut paper prints terrorists' claims

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — William Buckley, a political officer at the U.S. Embassy kidnapped 18 months ago, has been killed, the newspaper An-Nahar reported today.

He is one of six Americans that the underground terrorist group, Is-lamic Jihad, claimed to be holding hostage. The terrorists have de-manded that 17 of their comrades convicted and imprisoned in Kuwait for bombings be released in ex-change for the Americans.





Atlantis shuttle launched on maiden trip

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Atlantis joined America's space shuttle fleet yesterday with a dazzling liftoff on a mission of mystery, carrying five astronauts and a pair of military satellites built to withstand nuclear radiation.

Except for the launch, which could be seen from much of central Florida, the flight had as much secrecy as the

Air Force could muster.

"The space shuttle is in orbit," was Mission Control's terse announcement 45 minutes after liftoff. "All systems on board the orbiter Atlantis are good. The mission is pro-

ceeding as planned."

The Air Force said in advance there would be only two public reports about Atlantis unless problems develop.

Pentagon tested lasers, Weinberger says

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger disclosed today the Pentagon conducted two successful "Star Wars" laser tests last month, including one that focused a laser beam on a fast, high-flying rocket.

Weinberger, in the course of offering a rousing defense of President Reagan's Star Wars initiative, made the disclosures during a speech in Philadelphia.

The Pentagon later released a brief statement elaborating on his remarks. It said one of the tests cited by the secretary marked the "first time a laser beam, adjusted for atmospheric distortion, has been propagated from the ground to space."
