

UK Hall of Fame

Twenty-one college or university presidents, 11 generals or admirals and 10 governors or senators are distinguished alumni of the University of Kentucky.

Kentucky alumni who have been governors or senators include Governor Edward Breathitt, Governor and Senator Albert B. Chandler, Senator and Senator Earle C. Clements, Governor and Senator Bert T. Combs, Governor Keen Johnson, Governor and Senator A. O. Stanley (deceased), all of Kentucky; Senator John E. Miller of Arkansas, and Governor and Senator James Scroggins (deceased) of Nevada.

Winners of awards of national and international reputation include Don Whitehead, Thomas Hunt Morgan (deceased), winner of the Nobel Prize in medicine, and twice winner of the Pulitzer Prize, when the people of Kentucky decided to establish the University of Kentucky under a cooperative plan authorized by the legislature. In 1878, when the school was started as part of Kentucky.

Brief History

A state institution of higher learning, the Agricultural and Mechanical College was separated from Kentucky University and re-established on land given by Lexington and Fayette County. To provide a separate campus for the new institution, the city of Lexington had donated its 50-acre fairground and park which, during the Civil War, had been utilized as a bivouac area for Union troops. Lexington and Fayette County contributed \$60,000 for the construction of buildings, and President James K. Patterson, whose service to the institution began in 1869, used his personal savings to supplement the building fund. Thirty years later the legislature changed the name of the institution to State University, Lexington, Kentucky, and gave it additional financial support. In 1916 the name was changed to the University of Kentucky. The University of Kentucky has had only six presidents. Their periods of service have been as follows:

Libraries

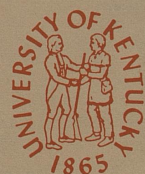

Research

The University of Kentucky Research Foundation was awarded over six million dollars during the first six months of 1966.

Research at UK has been largely physical science oriented. But emphasis now is also on education, the humanities and social sciences.

UKRF administers funds for 763 different research and special projects distributed among 78 departments and divisions.

Projects run the gamut from an appropriation to assist a local school board in program development to an annual award of almost \$1,500,000 in the tobacco and health research program, which already involves 31 UK faculty researchers from eight departments.
