Fill the community bookshelf

Gathering books for children: UK organization hopes to recruit to continue successful seasons

The five members of UK's Community Bookshelf raised more than 500 books for charity over the weekend.

"We received more than we thought we would, the ones that won't immediately be used will be used for different organizations," said Allison Cardin, a chemistry senior and member of the Community Bookshelf.

On Friday, members of the orga-

nization handed out flyers in local neighborhoods, asking citizens to donate used children's books. Then, on Sunday, members went back and collected the books.

The books will go to the Lexington Family Care Center and the YWCA Spouse Abuse Center.

"We want to do more of these book drives next semester. We've done some in the past and they've always been successful," Cardin said.

The purpose of the relatively new organization is to promote literacy for children.

"It feels really good to be doing this for the children. We want kids to learn, that's our goal," said Kristina Talbert, a Russian and biotechnology senior.

During last semester's drive, 250 books were raised when UK's faculty was asked to donate.

"We learned that the books we donated went for a library in the YWCA Spouse Abuse Center. The ones that were left over, the children took home," said Kasey Beckles, a Spanish and economics senior and president of Community Bookshelf.

"We want the children to be able to read these with their families."

"Children books were our focus, but we got a bunch of adults book as

well," she said.

But, without the help of volunteers, the organization may be in jeopardy.

There are only five members of UK's Community Bookshelf, and most will be graduating this year.

"We do a lot for Lexington and the UK community. We're looking for people who know the value of literacy, especially in children," Beckles said.

Cardin said the success of the program in future years would depend on dedicated volunteers.

"We're always looking for more people to participate," she said. "We want people to continue with it for years to come."

Beyond the one-or-two-strap debate

The days of the traditional two-strap backpack are long gone for many UK students. This semester, UK students tote their books around in an array of styles.

"I like the size. I can get a lot of books in it. It has lots of compartments and storage space," Edwards said.

Edwards said another reason UK students find camping backpacks appealing is because these packs distribute the weight better across your back.

Many female students revert to large Vera Bradley bags for a softer look.

"They are quilted totes with organizer pockets on the inside," said a representative from For Friends in Lexington. "A lot of young ladies use them as bookbags."

These cloth bags come in many patterns and appeal to college students because they are washable and wear well, the representative said.

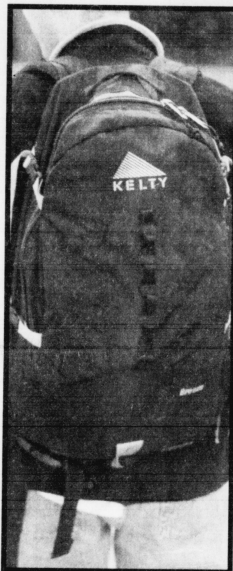
All of these new styles are quite a stretch from what students used to carry.

"Nobody had attaché cases and nobody carried bookbags," said Phil Berger, retired professor at the Martin School.

Despite the many trends sweeping the campus, some students said they prefer their traditional backpacks.

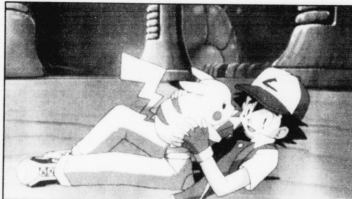
"They hold up," said Kristy Conard, an accounting senior. "I've had mine since high school and I carry a lot of heavy books."

Kids' trends catching on

All across UK's campus, students are hearing a lot about a madness consuming young people today, something called Pokémon, without even knowing what it is all about.

"I don't know exactly what it is, but I see it advertised on television a lot, maybe too much," said freshman Italian major Pierre Fleutoit.

The background story to Pokémon, as told in the comics and the animated series on TV, is that Ash, a young boy, finds Pikachu, the yellow Pokémon most people connect with the Pokémon image. They and other Pokémon engage in various adventures.

The goal of the trading card and video games based on the story is to acquire and train as many Pokémon as possible. There are over 150 different types of Pokémon, according to Nintendo's official web site.

The major difference between the Pokémon card game and other card games is that in Pokémon, players can stack their own decks, picking the best cards in order to achieve victory.

While some critics argue that Pokémon encourages violence (training Pokémon includes training them how to fight each other), all Pokémon games issued by Nintendo have earned an "E" rating (suitable for persons age six or older) by the independent Entertainment Software Rating Board.

Despite the "E" rating, many are worried about the effect Pokémon has on the young. National media reports indicate that Pokémon has raised concerns among the parents of the children to whom it has been introduced, along with people who work with these children, such as teachers and psychologists.

These individuals feel the kids are spending too much time and money on Pokémon and not enough on schoolwork, physical exercise and recreation, and family life.

However, some UK students feel that all the uproar is over nothing, and will soon die down.

"It's just another fad!" said theater sophomore Michael Morris. "Before this it was Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, et cetera... like all fads it will stay around until somebody comes up with something else to distract the kids with."

Campus Mourns Bonfire Victims

AUSTIN, Texas — The usual pre-Thanksgiving frenzy of school spirit and football mania that sweeps the University of Texas was put aside yesterday as the mourning continued for the 12 people killed in the bonfire collapse at archival Texas A&M. Across Texas, thousands of mourners crowded into one church after another, many wearing the maroon-and-white colors of the Aggies, to bid farewell to five of those who died. At UT, a candlelight vigil tonight was to take the place of the annual "hex rally," when Longhorns traditionally put a curse on the Aggies' football team before the annual day-after-Thanksgiving game.

Clinton Praises Bulgaria's Progress

SOFIA, Bulgaria — President Clinton promised tens of thousands of cheering Bulgarians yesterday that "you too shall overcome" in the struggle for democracy and prosperity. Clinton, the first American president to visit this one-time Soviet bloc state, received a hero's welcome. The president offered encouraging words for Bulgaria's campaign for NATO membership, which promises Western security protection against any threat from Moscow.

Congo Won't OK Mandela As Mediator

KIGALI, Rwanda — The tortuous peace process in Congo hit another snag when Congolese President Laurent Kabila's representatives refused to endorse Nelson Mandela as the mediator in the country's peace process, rebels said yesterday. Three rebel groups, which fought a yearlong rebellion before signing a peace agreement in August, agreed over the weekend to ask the former South African president to mediate a national dialogue that is supposed to bring a democratic government to Africa's third-largest nation.

Buchanan Eyes Iran, Iraq Dialogue

WASHINGTON — Reform Party presidential contender Pat Buchanan declared yesterday that the longstanding U.S. policy of "dual containment" of Iraq and Iran is unsustainable and he suggested opening a dialogue with the Gulf nations. Delivering a foreign policy speech, Buchanan asked: "If we can engage China and North Vietnam and even North Korea, why can we not at least talk to Iran and Iraq?" The third-party candidate also countered claims by his rivals that he is an isolationist.



Gore Questions Bradley's Commitment

BURLINGTON, Iowa — Vice President Al Gore, focusing squarely on his party's political base, told Democratic activists yesterday that "my passions" are rooted in the party's core themes. During a presidential campaign swing in Iowa, Gore questioned his party rival's commitment, urging "those who care about Democratic values" to look closely at proposals offered by former Sen. Bill Bradley on issues ranging from schools to health care. "I feel passionately about these issues," said Gore. From abortion rights to more money for schools to popular health programs, Gore left few traditional Democratic issues untouched.

ON HIS OWN: Former 'Seinfeld' sidekick Jason Alexander could be back in a primetime series by early 2001, thanks to a wide-ranging pact the actor signed with 20th Century Fox Television. The exclusive, two-year deal makes Alexander, 40, master of his domain, giving him ample creative control over the particulars of his return to television.

Pakistan's Sharif Claims Innocence

KARACHI, Pakistan — Former Premier Nawaz Sharif spoke out publicly yesterday for the first time since the army swept him from power last month, insisting he is innocent of treason and railing against the military leadership that is putting him on trial. Sharif, making his second appearance before a special anti-terrorism court, was also allowed to meet with his wife and family, whom he had not seen since his ouster Oct. 12 by soldiers loyal to army chief Gen. Pervez Musharraf.

Repetitive Motion Rules Announced

WASHINGTON — The 27 million Americans who labor on assembly lines, at computer work stations or in jobs involving heavy lifting could benefit from a government proposal aimed at lessening repetitive-motion injuries, supporters say. Business threatened to fight the rules in court. Businesses face an estimated \$4.2 billion in annual costs to fix job sites and pay workers recovering from injuries under the initiative announced today by the Labor Department's Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Stocks End Mixed; Dow Up 85.63

NEW YORK — Wall Street turned in a mixed performance yesterday with a handful of large, well-known issues advancing, but most other stocks declining as investors took profits following last week's rally. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 85.63 at 11,089.52. But decliners outnumbered advancers on the NYSE 2,131-933. The Nasdaq composite reached its 14th record high close in the past 17 sessions, rising 23.28 to 3,392.53.

Hanging with the big people: UK advertising students taste the profession

An attempt to gain a competitive edge sent a group of UK students interested in advertising to New York City for the 43rd Annual Advertising Career Conference held Nov. 11-14. Rick Roth, an integrated strategic communications instructor, said the conference was designed to help students gain a better understanding of what companies will be looking for once they've graduated.

"Students were given the opportunity to learn about different jobs and how to get them at the highest level," Roth said. The group visited two advertising agencies, Mad Dog & Englishman and Batten, Barton, Durstine and Osborn (known in the business as BBDO) to experience a day in a typical ad agency.

Mad Dog & Englishman is a smaller agency, with a laid back atmosphere. In connection with their name, they actually have dogs walking around the office.

While one group was enjoying the antics at Mad Dog & Englishman, the other was learning about the daily routine in a larger agency, BBDO. The students were treated to speakers from different departments within the agency, to whom they asked various questions.

"It was refreshing to get an inside look at what a creative department is all about," Ushma Patel, an ISC senior, said. "Talking with the people in the agency helped me get an understanding for what I'll be doing in the future."

Michelle Nierman, an integrated strategic communications senior, particularly enjoyed her experience at BBDO.

"BBDO was kind of amazing, they did two of my favorite commercials, the Visa Platinum and the M&M's," Nierman said.

After the agency tours, the group had the opportunity to mingle and speak with representatives from different agencies in New York City at the Fashion Institute of Technology, a great networking opportunity for the students with both potential employers and other advertising students from across the nation.

"Unfortunately, a few of the students felt a bit cheated. 'It wasn't what we expected, there was bad representation from the agencies,' Patel said. "The ratio of professionals to students was extremely uneven."

Despite the bad representation of the agencies at the Fashion Institute of Technology, the earlier tours had their desired effect. Dennis Altman, an ISC instructor, said they were one of the more important parts of the trip.

"It's a much more immediate experience than you can get from any textbook or even a lecture," Altman said.

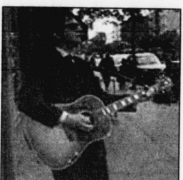
You should already know if you want to buy this album.

New horseman movie not exactly Disney

Burton's new flick has him doing what he does best — making bleak, disturbing movies

Tim Burton's *Sleepy Hollow* is a smart, devilishly clever film veiled in a glorious celebration of deprecation.

Part suspense and part surreal illusion, the film moves like a dream through episodes of horror, fantasy, romance and beauty. Burton's *Sleepy Hollow* is a dour place, at once the artifice and reality of a filmmaker who shuns the visual constraints of daily life.

The film is based on, but in no way bound to, Washington Irving's timeless classic, *The Legend of Sleepy Hollow*.

The latest incarnation of the Headless Horseman legend takes place at the tail end of the 19th century. Ichabod Crane, a righteous constable from New York City, believes that the legal system must be brought up to date with improved methods of investigation and justice.

Upset by the constant interruptions from this child of reason, a New York judge banishes him upstate to investigate a series of murders in which the victim's were all found decapitated.

Burton teams once again

with Johnny Depp, star of Burton's *Edward Scissorhands* and *Ed Wood*. Depp's ability to disappear into characters is mesmerizing.

Crane's journey north shines light on Burton's most ostensible talents — art direction, set design and cinematography. The landscape is bleak and resonates with an idle sense of death.

In this macabre world Crane meets the locals, each one a harbinger of the horseman's evil: Baltus Van Tassel (Michael Gambon) and his mysterious daughter Katrina (Christina Ricci) and her stepmother Lady Van Tassel (Meranda Richardson).

The horseman's identity is perhaps one of the more enjoyable surprises in the film. Although the film has a lot of gore, it is somehow made innocent by Burton's style — more cinematic than shocking, more necessity than enjoyment.

The film's ending might seem trite, but it works well with Burton's spin on Irving's characters. The story isn't filmic, but the true meat of the film is the visuals, which, thanks to Burton, are rich, dynamic and full of emotion.

Original idea: Inner city kids try to defy stereotypes and come out on top

Grammy winner Kenneth "Babyface" Edmonds and wife Tracey have collaborated for a third time to produce the film *Light It Up*. Sadly, this movie pales in comparison to their award-winning drama *Soul Food* (1997).

Set in a stereotypical inner-city high school in Queens, R&B singer Usher Raymond stars as Lester, who takes over the school in a desperate measure to keep friend Ziggy (Robert Ri'chard) from being sent home.

The series of events begins when the window in Mr. Knowles' (Judd Nelson) classroom breaks for the umpteenth time. Since it was too cold to hold class there and the rest of the rooms were already occupied, Knowles tells Principal Armstrong (Glynn Turman) of the predicament.

Armstrong, stressed out himself, tells the teacher to take the class anywhere — which is exactly what Knowles does. When the principal finds out Knowles took the students to a nearby restaurant to conduct class, he suspends Knowles. The students start a walkout to save their favorite teacher, and Armstrong starts throwing out suspensions left and right.

One of the students slapped with disciplinary action is Ziggy. Armstrong tells the

school's security guard, Dante Jackson (Forest Whitaker) to remove Ziggy from the building. The two struggle and the officer's gun accidentally goes off, shooting Jackson. Lester panics, grabs the gun and orders everyone out of the building, taking only the wounded officer as a hostage.

In the madness, a haphazard group of six students remain behind and barricade themselves in the school's library.

The movie attempts to show that inner-city students care about themselves, each other and education. However, the movie is so weighed down by introducing too many issues at once — teen pregnancy, physically-abusive parents, the present generation's lack of focus and police brutality. The social-issue overload detracts from the characters' development, leaving the audience empty.

The lack of character development and lapses in the storyline in turn detract from the actors' performances, despite a talented cast (with the exception of Usher, who really needs to stick to singing).

An optimistic ending ultimately leaves the audience with a warm, fuzzy feeling. Still the feeling isn't enough — save your \$6.50 and rent the movie when it comes out on video.

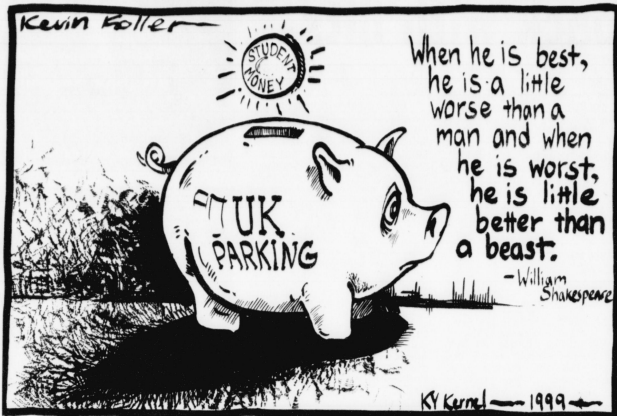

Keep 'em learning

Suspending students hurts the students and society in general

On September 17, seven Decatur, Ill., high school students were involved in a fight in the bleachers at a football game. Because of the school system's zero-tolerance policy against violence, these students were disciplined with two-year expulsions.

After the involvement of civil rights activist Jesse Jackson, Illinois Governor George Ryan and the pressure of national attention, the school board voted to shorten the expulsions to one year and allow the students attend alternative education programs. However, Jackson wants the students returned quicker than that.

State school Superintendent Glenn "Max" McGee has proposed creating a special panel to review the students' conduct and grades in January and those who are doing well might then be allowed back in the classroom.

What will the students do between now and then? What do any students so when they are expelled from school? When you start thinking what underage kids could do all day when their parents and guardians are at work, the possibilities of what they could get into get scary very quickly.

Truly, should expulsion be a disciplinary option? The answer is no.

In an age where we, as a nation, are trying to deter America's youth from crime, drugs and other deviant behavior, giving them the option of doing nothing all day is not acceptable. We run commercials trying to convince students to stay in school; we complain that the students in other countries are smarter than students in ours. In light of this, why are we allowing even one child to sit on the sidelines?

Now of course disruptive students should not be allowed to stay in an environment that prevents other students from learning. Whether it be weekend school, summer school, or other alternative educational programs coupled with counseling, we can no longer afford to leave anymore of our country's children home - free to do as they choose. Theatre right to show Disco Dolls

Urban County Council member Scott Crosbie has put forward a set of arguments as to why the X-rated movie *Disco Dolls in Hot Skin* should not have been shown at the Kentucky Theater and why such films should be banned from the Kentucky in the future. A careful look at his arguments will show that they don't stand up well under close examination.

Crosbie deplored *Disco Dolls* as a trashy, smutty film. He also objected to the advertising strategy used by the theater to maximize the turnout of UK students.

In assessing these points, I have the advantage of being among the few Lexingtonians over age 30 or so who actually saw *Disco Dolls* during its brief run at the Kentucky, where it played to overwhelmingly college-age crowds.

I found it to be a crude, unappealing film, disgusting in places, but also quite funny sometimes and not very erotic despite lots of nudity and graphic sex. The audience seemed to enjoy it.

I believe most Lexingtonians, had they been present, would have been repelled by *Disco Dolls* and not happy to see it playing before such large crowds of young people. So ring up some major points for Crosbie's position, right?

Well, maybe not. Seen from another angle, this situation looks quite different. These young people were of age, after all, old enough to vote and serve in the military. A single movie experience isn't likely to warp their moral values.

Moreover, since most of them were about the same age as the movie itself, they were "experiencing history" by watching this campy, X-rated, 3-D film from the 1970s on a big screen.

They were viewing a celluloid museum piece from a bygone era in which they were not yet born or are too young to remember much about. Thus, the Kentucky's showing of *Disco Dolls* can be regarded as, among other things, a form of

history lesson, with a certain inherent value as such.

Crosbie argues that X-rated movies should be banned from the Kentucky because it's not appropriate, he says, for them to be shown at a city facility "owned by the taxpayers."

Is there reason to believe "the taxpayers" are that bothered by the infrequent showing of an X-rated movie at the Kentucky? In any case, local taxpayers are not a monolith.

In their ranks are many who sharply disagree with Crosbie. There are also many who simply recognize that the Kentucky "ain't broke" and thus it wouldn't be a smart move to try to "fix" it.

Probably the most serious problem with Crosbie's position is that it rests on unsound premises or assumptions about the social and cultural reality of Fayette County.

Crosbie has said he believes "our government has the public responsibility to champion community values that mirror the collective views of all Fayette County citizens." What is troubling about this statement is that it implies a degree of unanimity or homogeneity that does not exist locally.

Lexington is a diverse city and becoming more so all the time. Crosbie's idea that we have "collective" community values that government should bring to bear on the showing of a movie like *Disco Dolls* is dangerous.

In the wrong hands, such thinking can easily lead to abuses of governmental power.

In fact, this has just been demonstrated by County Attorney Margaret Kannensohn, who overstepped reasonable bounds by bringing obscenity charges against Kentucky Theater manager Fred Mills.

83 - Cheddi Acham



Position: Tight End Hometown: London, Ontario

One of UK's most experienced special teams players, Acham arrived in Lexington from Lincoln Memorial University as a sophomore, but played only junior varsity ball.

Acham did make one catch, against Louisville in 1998, but drew the praise of Coach Hal Mumme for his character.

"Take a guy like Cheddi Acham who plays just special teams," Mumme said. "Look at his grades and what he does off the court. He epitomizes them all (seniors)."

95 - Gordon Crowe



Position: Defensive tackle Hometown: Lancaster, Ky.

Crowe has been one of the stalwarts on UK's defensive line in the last four years, never finishing with less than 12 tackles in a season. His biggest season came in 1997, where Crowe finished with 17 tackles and six tackles for losses.

For his career, Crowe started 15 games, most at defensive end. He tallied 60 tackles, eight for losses and three sacks and recovered four fumbles. After a slow start to 1999, Crowe came back to sure-up UK's defensive front.

97 - George Massey



Position: Defensive Tackle Hometown: Lynch, Ky.

Talk about another player who suffered through ups and downs while at UK, Massey burst onto the scene in 1996 by making 38 tackles and notching a sack during his freshman campaign. But that number dropped to just three tackles in 1997.

Massey became UK's leader on the defensive front this season, notching a career-high 50 tackles this season, including nine versus Tennessee. For his career, Massey finished with 113 tackles, 10 for losses, six sacks and three fumbles recovered.

35 - A.J. Simon



Position: Fullback Hometown: Newport, Ky.

The former walk-on was one of UK's most underrated players during his stay in the Commonwealth. A jack-of-all-trades, Simon has carried, caught and passed the football. Doing mostly dirty work as a blocker creating holes for Derek Homer and Anthony White, Simon gained fame for his fake punt calls.

A heady player, Simon also was named an All-Southeastern Conference Academic Honor Roll member in 1998. For his career, Simon completed two passes and rushed six times for 31 yards.

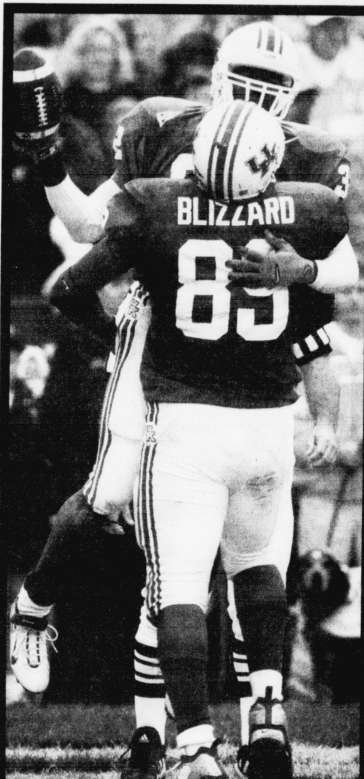
14 - Andy Smith



Position: Punter Hometown: Franklin, Ky.

A transfer from Western Kentucky University, Smith bided his time behind Jimmy Carter before taking over the punting duties this season. Smith joked that he hoped he "never played" because that meant UK wasn't scoring.

Once Smith did get in the game, he was spectacular, averaging over 42 yards per kick, placing him among the nation's elite this season. Smith's booming kicks also allowed UK to virtually abandon its directional kicking approach and just let him air it out.

While the Cats may earn a bowl bid, it was the seniors' last game at Commonwealth. They were honored before the game with framed jerseys and the playing of "My Old Kentucky Home."

52 - Anwar Stewart



Position: Defensive End Hometown: Panama City, Fla.

Stewart will always be remembered as the player who returned a blocked field goal for a touchdown to tie the game in UK's historic victory over Alabama in 1997. But like several other seniors, Stewart survived through a difficult four years that saw him lose a year of eligibility for poor academics.

Stewart returned though to become one of UK's leaders this season. For his career, Stewart made 64 tackles, including two for losses and seven sacks.

44 - Lee Wesley



Position: Fullback / Linebacker Hometown: Campbellton, Fla.

Another player who went through a position change before his senior season, Wesley was impressive as both a linebacker and fullback while at UK. Wesley made over 100 tackles in his career, including 88 as a sophomore in 1997.

But depth at the linebacker position prompted Wesley's move to the backfield this season, where he made just one reception but earned praise for his blocking. Wesley started 15 games during his career.

37 - Jimmy Haley



Position: Tight End / Defensive Tackle Hometown: Lowell, Mass.

As far as personal football changes go, none of the seniors went through as much during their time at UK as Haley. It all started when Bill Curry blew Haley's redshirt year by starting him in the 1996 finale against Tennessee. Haley switched to tight end as a sophomore, where he caught 37 passes for 313 yards.

His senior campaign brought more change as he moved over to defensive tackle to help the Cats' depth.

17 - Jeff Snedegar



Position: Linebacker Hometown: Salesville, Ohio

A fan favorite, Snedegar was one of the Cats' emotional leaders and its most hard-nosed player in a long time. Snedegar will long be remembered for his reckless abandon on the field.

Fighting shoulder problems for nearly his entire career, Snedegar still just narrowly missed joining UK's 300-tackle club when he finished with 286 in his career. Snedegar led UK in tackles this season with 84 and tallied 25 tackles for loss, 11 sacks and intercepted four passes during his career.

85 - James Whalen, Jr.



Position: Tight End Hometown: Portland, Ore.

From walk-on to record-holder, no player has improved as much as Whalen during their stay at UK. Catching just 30 passes before this season, Whalen set a NCAA record for most catches by a tight end in a single season and school record with 90 this season. He also grabbed 10 touchdowns, including four versus Georgia.

Whalen's career started as a walk-on with a video tape before earning a scholarship. Whalen's biggest knock is that his mom, who made the videotape, may be more famous than he is.

32 - Anthony White



Position: Halfback Hometown: Twinsburg Heights, Ohio

The most overlooked player on UK's roster in recent years, White became just the third player in NCAA history to gain 1,500 yards rushing and receiving during his career.

White will finish his career all over the UK record book, including seventh in career rushing yardage (1,750) and second in career receptions (195). White's love-affair with the fans showed when a student jumped from the stands after Saturday's game and thanked him for coming to UK.
