Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, October 15, 1985.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 1 p.m. (Eastern Daylight Time) on Tuesday, October 15, 1985 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the Lexington Campus.

A. Meeting Opened and Roll Called

Mr. Robert T. McCowan, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 1 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Mr. William R. Black.

The following members of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. Robert T. McCowan (Chairman), Mr. William R. Black, Mr. Albert G. Clay, and Mr. George W. Griffin Jr. (ex officio Secretary). Mr. Tracy Farmer and Mr. T. A. Lassetter were absent from the meeting. Members of the Board of Trustees attending the meeting included Mr. John S. Cain, Professor Timothy A. Cantrell, Mr. Henry E. Hershey, Professor James D. Kemp, and Professor Constance P. Wilson. The University administration was represented by President Otis A. Singletary; Mr. James O. King, Vice President for Administration; Chancellors Peter P. Bosomworth, Art Gallaher, and Charles T. Wethington; Dr. Raymond R. Hornback, Vice President for University Relations; Mr. Edward A. Carter, Associate Vice President for Planning and Budget; Mr. John C. Darsie, General Counsel; Mr. Henry Clay Owen, Controller and Treasurer; and Dr. Paul G. Sears, Special Assistant for Academic Affairs.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. The Secretary reported a quorum present, and the Chairman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 1:03 p.m.

B. Minutes Approved

On motion made by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Clay and passed, the Minutes of the September 17, 1985 meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky were approved as written.

C. President's Report to the Trustees (PR 1)

President Singletary reviewed briefly some of the items in PR 1, calling particular attention to the following:

- Books published by the University Press of Kentucky, a number of which have gained favorable notice internationally.
- (2) Four alumni who were presented U.K. National Alumni Association Distinguished Service Awards at the annual reunion banquet: Morris Beebe, Kay King Evans, Robert Spragens, and Ron Forrester.

- (3) The 1935 National Restaurant Association/American Vocational Association's Award of Excellence in Foodservice Education which was presented to the Jefferson Community College.
- (4) The dedication on September 30 of the Media Center-Learning Laboratory at Elizabethtown Community College.
- (5) The Armand Hammer Daumier Collection at the Art Museum which will be exhibited through December 8.
- (6) The New Journal of Mineral Law and Policy published by the Mineral Law Center of the College of Law.
- (7) The national award received by the University Extension administrators for its "Downtown at Noon" program, which offers credit and non-credit courses at facilities furnished free by downtown businessmen.
- (8) The launching of a fund drive by the College of Business and Economics to establish scholarships for upper level undergraduate and graduate business students, a fund to be named in honor of Dr. Cecil C. Carpenter who was dean of the college (then called the College of Commerce) from 1948-64.
- (9) The establishment of an Alzheimer's Disease Research Center in the Sanders-Brown Research Center, funded by a National Institute on Aging \$1.2 million five-year grant.
- (10) An award of \$1,475,521 to support a Clinical Research Center given to the College of Medicine by the National Institutes of Health, Division of Research Resources. The three-year award will fund multi-disciplinary research on innovative treatments in patients with recognized diseases.
- D. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

With President Singletary so recommending, on motion made by Mr. Clay, seconded by Mr. Black and passed, the routine personnel actions in PR 2 were approved. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

E. Supplemental Recommendations of the President (PR 3A)

There were no supplemental recommendations.

F. Proposed Amendments to the Governing Regulations (PR 3B)

Mr. Black moved that the proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations be received for preliminary consideration and be included on the agenda at the next regular meeting of the Board. The motion, seconded by Mr. Clay, carried without dissent. (See PR 3B at the end of the Minutes.

G. Name Change of Educational Unit (PR 5A)

President Singletary recommended that the name of the Department of Slavic and Oriental Languages and Literatures be changed to the Department of Russian and Eastern Studies. He pointed out that the proposed name change originated in the College of Arts and Sciences and is associated with the merger of the Russian and the Russian Area Studies majors into a single major. The motion, which was made by Mr. Clay and seconded by Mr. Black, was voted on and carried. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Naming of University Departmental Library (PR 6A)

President Singletary indicated his pleasure in recommending that the Department of Ophthalmology Library be named the WILLIAM N. OFFUTT LIBRARY in honor of Dr. William Nelson Offutt, a prominent surgeon and specialist, and Dr. William Nelson Offutt III, an ophthalmologist. On motion made by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Clay and unanimously carried, it was so ordered. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Agreement Between University of Kentucky and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation (PR 6B)

Chancellor Bosomworth explained that since no bid had been received by June 24, 1985, the document presented to and approved by the Board at that meeting was devoid any dollar amount for the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation portion of the cost of the excess umbrella insurance policy. He added that a bid has now been received, and accepted, and is reflected in the proposed agreement. With President Singletary so recommending, on motion made by Mr. Clay, seconded by Mr. Black and unanimously carried, the proposed agreement between the University of Kentucky and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation was approved. (See PR 6B at the end of the Minutes.)

J. November Meeting Cancelled

With the concurrence of the Chairman, President Singletary announced that the November 12, 1985 meeting of the Executive Committee would be cancelled.

K. Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)

Mr. Clay, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Committee had met on the morning of October 15 and reviewed the six items to be presented for action, the first of which was the Interim Financial Report for the two months ended August 31, 1985. He then moved acceptance of the report. His motion was seconded by Mr. Black and passed without dissent. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Acceptance of the Financial Statements of the University of Kentucky and Affiliated Corporations and Other Related Organizations for the Year Ended June 30, 1985 (FCR 2)

 $\,$ Mr. Clay, acting on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, moved:

that the Board of Trustees accept the audited consolidated financial statements and related reports of the University of Kentucky and the affiliated corporations for the year ended June 30, 1985, including the Management Letter and a Report on Compliance with House Bill 622 submitted by Coopers & Lybrand, Certified Public Accountants;

that the Board of Trustees accept the audited financial statements of the University of Kentucky including separate financial statements for the Housing and Dining System and the Tobacco and Health Research Institute for the year ended June 30, 1985;

that the Board of Trustees accept the audited financial statements of the affiliated corporations and other related organizations of the University of Kentucky including The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, University of Kentucky Research Foundation, University of Kentucky Athletic Association, University of Kentucky Business Partnership Foundation, Inc., University of Kentucky Mining Engineering Foundation, Inc., University of Kentucky Equine Research Foundation, Inc., University of Kentucky Humanities Foundation, Health Care Collection Service Inc., University of Kentucky Alumni Association, and University of Kentucky Hospital Auxiliary for the year ended June 30, 1985.

Mr. Clay's motion was seconded by Mr. Black and carried without dissent. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE SUCCESSFUL BID FOR THE PURCHASE OF \$16,100,000 OF UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES I (FCR 3)

Thereupon, a motion was made by Mr. Clay and seconded by Mr. Black that the following titled Resolution, which was read in summary form to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, be passed and adopted:

RESOLUTION RELATING TO THE \$16,100,000 UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY CONSOLIDATED EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS. SERIES I

(The full resolution being attached to these minutes as $\mathsf{Exhibit}\ \mathsf{l.}$)

Thereupon, the Chairman declared that the motion had carried and that the Resolution had been passed and adopted and directed that the same be recorded in the Minutes of the Executive Committee of the Board. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Report on Leases (FCR 4)

Mr. Clay reminded the Trustees of Board action on December 13, 1983 authorizing the President to enter into leases and easements not exceeding \$20,000 in value. He then moved acceptance of the report on leases as listed in FCR 4. Mr. Black seconded Mr. Clay's motion, and it was so ordered. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

O. Delegation Authorizing the President to Enter into Leases and Easements not Exceeding \$30,000 in Value (FCR 5)

Acting on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, Mr. Clay moved that the President or his designated representative be authorized to enter into leases and easements not exceeding \$30,000 in value. He explained that the dollar value increase is being recommended in order to accommodate most of the leases and easements that affect real property transactions. Mr. Clay's motion was seconded by Mr. Black and passed without dissent. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Registration of University Logos (FCR 6)

With the concurrence of the Finance Committee, Mr. Clay moved that the Athletics Director, University of Kentucky Athletics Association, be authorized and directed to select appropriate service marks, trademarks, designs and logos of the University of Kentucky Wildcat and to apply for trademark and/or copyright registration in the name of the University of Kentucky as presented in FCR 6. He added that the University currently has only common law protection of its logos and that registration will enhance that protection and, at the same time, will generate income. Mr. Clay's motion was seconded by Mr. Black and passed without dissent. (See FCR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at $1:17\ p.m.$

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the following amendments to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky (December 1984) be received at this time for preliminary consideration and, at the next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, be included on the agenda for action.

(Note: Proposed additions are underlined; proposed deletions are bracketed.)

Amendment #1 -- Change Part X.C.2 to read:

X.C.2. Vacation Leave

All full-time faculty members on a ten-month, eleven-month, or twelve-month assignment basis shall be entitled to [one month] working days of vacation leave with pay [during an] per assignment With prior administrative approval, faculty members may take vacation leave at appropriate times during the period in which they are eligible to take such leave; however, each member of the teaching faculty shall be in actual attendance at least until after Commencement and until all reports have been made, and at least three days prior to the first day of registration for the fall semester, unless for special reasons leave is approved. Vacation leave normally cannot be accumulated from one assignment period to another, except [to the extent] that a faculty member on a twelve-month assignment basis may[, with advance approval of the dean or director of the college,] take vacation leave either during the assignment period in which the vacation leave is earned or [within the first two months thereafter] during the subsequent assignment period. Under unusual circumstances, provided it is in the best interest of the University and has advance approval by the appropriate chancellor, a faculty member on a ten-month or an eleven-month assignment basis also may take unused vacation leave during the assignment period following that in which the vacation leave was earned. [All members of the teaching faculty shall be in actual attendance at least until after Commencement and until all reports have been made, and at least three days prior to the first day of registration for the fall semester unless for special reasons special leave is approved.] Pay for unused vacation leave shall be limited to a maximum of 22 days at the end of employment. [Full-time faculty members employed on an academic year basis shall be on assignment from August 16 through May 15 and are expected to be normally available for participation in appropriate academic activities during this period. To insure opportunities for vacations, faculty members employed on this basis shall be limited to a maximum of two and one-half months of employment in activities funded by the University or its affiliated corporations during the summer period (May 16 through August 15).]

Background for Amendment #1: University of Kentucky policy governing faculty use of vacation leave has been much more restrictive than such policies at most other comparable institutions. The proposed changes in the first paragraph of Part X.C.2 primarily affect faculty on a twelve-month assignment basis and are designed to help eliminate operational problems during summer periods for certain University units, especially the University Hospital. Some of the other changes are intended to provide greater consistency in terminology between the University's Governing Regulations and Administrative Regulations. The deletion of the last sentence in the second paragraph of Part X.C.2 will make it possible for some faculty on regular nine-month assignment basis to be employed for three full months during the period of May 16 through August 15, provided appropriate funding is available from sources such as contracts or grants. This change, which has been recommended by the deans of several colleges, the Vice Chancellor for Research and the Dean of the Graduate School, and the Chancellor for the Lexington Campus, should provide greater incentive for faculty on regular nine-month assignment to obtain contracts and grants which include full funding of faculty positions throughout the period of May 16 through August 15. The remainder (first sentence) of the second paragraph also is deleted since it does not logically fit under the topic of vacation leave.

Amendment #2 -- Change Part VII.A.1, first paragraph, to read:

The basic organization of the educational units of the University System shall be departments, schools, [institutes, and] colleges, graduate centers, and multidisciplinary research centers and institutes.

Amendment #3 -- Change Part VII.A.1, sixth paragraph, to read:

[An] A multidisciplinary research center or institute is an educational unit established for the administration of [interdisciplinary] multidisciplinary programs which are primarily research in nature. [The term "center" may, in some cases, be used as a synonym for research institute.] Such an educational unit is administratively responsible to the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School unless the administrative responsibility specifically has been delegated otherwise. The chief administrative officer of [an] a multidisciplinary research center or institute is a director.

Amendment #4 -- Change Part VII.A.6, second paragraph, to read:

The departmental faculty has jurisdiction over matters concerning its internal educational policies, insofar as these do not conflict with those of other departments or with the rules of the University Senate or the faculties of the school or college of which the department is a part. It should hold regularly scheduled meetings and is authorized, with the approval of the dean of the college and the appropriate chancellor, to establish rules for procedure and a committee structure to deal with matters over which it has jurisdiction, copies being filed with the secretary (secretaries) of the school and/or college of which the department is a member. It has primary responsibility for the development of policies on such matters as academic requirements, courses of study, class schedules, graduate and research programs, and service functions. Jointly with the department chairman, it should establish: (1) procedures to be used within the department in making recommendations on the appointment of new members of the department, promotions, reappointments, terminal reappointments, decisions not to reappoint, post-retirement appointments, and the granting of tenure; and (2) the procedures to be used within the department in the faculty performance evaluations and in the preparation of budget requests. The procedures in (1) and (2), except those for the preparation of budget requests, shall include consultation with directors of multidisciplinary research centers and institutes for those faculty who are or will be associated with such centers or institutes.

<u>Amendment #5</u> -- Change Part VII.A.7, to read:

Staffs of [Interdisciplinary] <u>Multidisciplinary</u> Research <u>Centers and</u> Institutes (University System)

The staff of [an interdisciplinary] a multidisciplinary research center or institute shall consist of: (1) a director who also shall be a faculty member of a department, school, or college; (2) [regular] faculty members on a joint appointment basis; (3) faculty members on a faculty associate basis (each such faculty associate appointed, on recommendations of both the director of the center or institute and the appropriate educational unit administrator, by the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School or other administrator who has administrative responsibility for the center or institute); and [2] (4) non-faculty employees appointed for the duration of a specific project [(3) a director who shall also be a member of an academic department].

Academic rank shall not be conferred by an [interdisciplinary] multidisciplinary research center or institute nor tenure acquired solely through service in such a unit.

[An interdisciplinary] A multidisciplinary research center or institute shall be administratively responsible to the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School unless specifically designated otherwise. A faculty advisory committee shall be appointed for each research center or institute by the officer to whom the unit is administratively responsible.

Amendment #6 -- Change Part VII.B.5, second paragraph, to read:

The department chairman is responsible for recommendations on the appointment of new members of the department, promotions, reappointments, terminal appointments, decisions not to reappoint, post-retirement appointments, and the granting of tenure. Procedures and criteria used in preparing recommendations shall be those established by the University, the college, and the department faculty. As a minimum, the procedures must include consultation with all tenured members of the department, with the directors of any multidisciplinary research centers or institutes with which the affected individuals are or will be associated, and with all full-time non-tenured faculty members (except those appointed in the research title or visiting series) with the actual or equivalent rank of assistant professor or higher who have been members of the department for two years, except as noted below. All recommendations on matters listed above, excluding reappointments and post-retirement appointments, shall include the written judgment of each consulted member of the department and of each director of pertinent multidisciplinary research centers and institutes, along with the recommendation of the chairman. The following exceptions may be made: (1)

Amendment #7 -- Add as new Part VII.B.6, renumbering present Parts VII.B.6-VII.B.8 as Parts VII.B.7-VII.B.9, respectively:

<u>Directors of Multidisciplinary Research Centers and Institutes</u>
(University System)

The administrative officer of a multidisciplinary research center or institute is a director, who also shall be a faculty member in a department, school, or college.

The director of a multidisciplinary research center or institute is charged with the planning, implementation, coordination, and efficient management of the program and activities of the center or institute. The director shall have the same responsibilities as those of a department chairman relative to faculty with joint appointments and non-faculty personnel in the center or institute. The director shall provide recommendations and advice to appropriate educational unit administrators concerning space, financial, and other resources, as well as the identification and appointment of faculty associates in the center or institute. The director shall submit the core budget request for the center or institute and administer this budget after its approval. In addition, the director may have other responsibilities delegated by the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School or other specific administrator to whom the center or institute is administratively responsible.

In connection with the above major administrative functions, the director shall seek the advice of the staff of the center or institute,

individually or as a group, or of advisory committees that may be appointed by the director of the center or institute or by the administrator to whom the center or institute is administratively responsible. The director shall speak for the center or institute and be an ex officio member of all of its committees.

Amendment #8 -- Add as Part VIII.A.4.d:

Terms of Chairman and Directors

<u>d.</u> <u>Directors of Multidisciplinary Research Centers and Institutes</u> (University System)

The director of a multidisciplinary research center or institute shall be appointed for a term of six years. A director may be reappointed, however, when an ad hoc committee appointed to review and evaluate the center or institute (AR II-1.0-6) finds that the particular circumstances and needs of the center or institute make such a reappointment desirable.

Amendment #9 -- Change Part IX, footnote, to read:

* Includes departments, schools, graduate centers, [institutes, interdisciplinary units,] colleges, [and] individual community colleges, interdisciplinary instructional programs, and multidisciplinary research centers and institutes.

Background for Amendments #2 through #9: The University's planning for the future in the Medical Center and Lexington Campus sectors places major emphasis on the creation of several multidisciplinary research centers and institutes, as illustrated by those proposed in the University of Kentucky Five Year Plan 1985-1990. Amendments #2 through #9 are designed to provide modified and new sections in the Governing Regulations which will establish needed policy and procedures relative to multidisciplinary research centers and institutes. The proposed amendments have been reviewed and approved by the Vice Chancellor for Research and Dean of the Graduate School, the Chancellor for the Medical Center, the Chancellor for the Lexington Campus, and the University Senate Council.

NAMING OF UNIVERSITY DEPARTMENTAL LIBRARY

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees approve the name WILLIAM N. OFFUTT LIBRARY for the Department of Ophthalmology Library.

Background: Dr. William Nelson Offutt, prominent surgeon and specialist, practiced in Lexington for many years. He was a graduate of the University of Louisville medical school and spent a year in England doing post-graduate work. Dr. Offutt was an avid sportsman and was active in the work of his church and the community, particularly with the Boy Scouts of America. As a member of the Rotary Club, he was instrumental in the purchase of the camp on the Kentucky river for boy scouts. He died on April 3, 1935.

Dr. William Nelson Offutt III was an ophthalmologist in Lexington. He was a member of the Fayette County Medical Society for 40 years. He was highly respected by his peers. Two sons are graduates of the University of Kentucky College of Medicine and practice ophthalmology in Central Kentucky. He received his premedical degree at Washington and Lee University and his M.D. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1933. He did his post graduate training at Tulane University. He died on July 8, 1976.

One of his sons has established an endowment fund in support of the Department of Ophthalmology Library. The interest income from the endowed fund will be used to purchase books for the library.

In accordance with University policy on naming buildings, the Committee for Naming University Buildings has made its recommendation to the Chancellor of the Medical Center who recommends to the President and Board of Trustees that this Library be named the WILLIAM N. OFFUTT LIBRARY in honor of Dr. William Nelson Offutt and Dr. William Nelson Offutt, III.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AND KENTUCKY MEDICAL SERVICES FOUNDATION

Recommendation: That the Board approve the attached agreement between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and Kentucky Medical Services Foundation, Inc. which was negotiated pursuant to the "Board of Trustees Resolution Regarding Medical Practice Plan" adopted on June 20, 1978.

Background: The Board action on June 20, 1978 provided that:

"The President is authorized to negotiate and execute a contract subject to approval of the Board of Trustees, with an appropriately qualified organizational entity for carrying out necessary functions and assuming the responsibilities involved in the administration of income for professional services under the plan."

Kentucky Medical Services Foundation, Inc. meets the "criteria" specified under Section III-A for the appropriately qualified organization. The attached agreement conforms to the provisions of the June 20 Board resolution and specifically satisfied the "conditions" set forth in Section III-B.

The document presented to and approved by the Board of Trustees on June 24, 1985 was void any dollar amount for the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation portion of the cost of the excess umbrella insurance policy. We had not received a bid at the time the Board met on June 24, 1985. A bid has been received and accepted. On page 20, Section 18-A the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation portion is listed at \$212,211.

Section 18-C has been added to indicate that the Kentucky Medical Services Foundation has agreed to and has deposited the sum of \$675,000 with an additional sum of \$221,305 to be deposited in twelve equal installments during the 1985-86 fiscal year to meet the reserve requirements recommended by the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 24th day of June, 1985 by and between the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY, a statutory body corporate existing pursuant to Section 164.100 et seq of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (hereinafter referred to as the University) and KENTUCKY MEDICAL SERVICES FOUNDATION, INC., a non-stock, non-profit corporation formed pursuant to Chapter 273 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (hereinafter referred to as the Foundation).

WITNESSETH:

Section 1. RECITALS

- A. Foundation is organized for the purposes stated in its Articles of Incorporation as a non-stock, non-profit corporation and will use and apply the whole or any part of its income and principal exclusively for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes at or for the benefit of, the University of Kentucky Medical Center.
- B. A substantial number of University's faculty in its College of Medicine have heretofore executed agreements with Foundation, known as "Practice Agreements and Assignments" whereby said faculty have assigned to Foundation their professionally generated clinical income.
- C. The recruitment and retention of the members of the medical faculty of the University will be improved by permitting the said members to supplement, by income from the practice of medicine, the salaries provided by the University.

- D. The University recognizes that the medical practice activities of its faculty members can be conducted in a more efficient and economical manner if those faculty members who produce income are permitted, through the medium of the Foundation, to exercise a larger voice in the expenditure of the funds so produced.
- E. The University has heretofore established, in addition to its previously adopted Physicians Service Plan, a "geographic full-time medical service plan", the said geographic full-time plan having been adopted on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984; said action is hereby incorporated by reference as is set out in full herein.
- F. The aforementioned action of University's Board of Trustees authorized the University's President to negotiate and execute a contract, subject to the approval of said Board, with an appropriately qualified entity for carrying out necessary functions and assuming the responsibilities involved in the administration of income for professional services under the plan.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 2. DEFINITIONS

A. "The Plan" means the geographic full—time medical service plan for the University of Kentucky College of Medicine established by action of the Board of Trustees of said University dated June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984.

- B. "Clinical Income" means (1) all payments for professional services rendered to or with respect to patients whether denominated as diagnosis, treatment, evaluation, or consultation and whether said payments be characterized as fees, retainers, or otherwise, and (2) all payments whether direct or in kind, (excluding actual travel costs) for oversight or administration of, or consultation with, facilities, programs, or other operations providing care, services or evaluation relating to patients, and (3) witness fees or other payments relating to depositions or other evaluations in the capacity of an expert witness. Provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be deemed to include in the term "clinical income" any item excluded therefrom by paragraph II, B of the plan.
- C. "Practice Agreements" means those documents, denominated Practice Agreements and Assignments heretofore executed by certain members of University's faculty, the University, The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center and the Foundation.

Section 3. NATURE OF THE AGREEMENT

Pursuant to Paragraph III, A. of the aforementioned action of University's Board of Trustees dated June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, University hereby recognizes Foundation as an "appropriately qualified organizational entity"

as described therein for carrying out necessary functions and assuming the responsibilities involved in the administration of income for professional services under University's "geographic full-time medical services plan".

Section 4. BILLING AND COLLECTION

Foundation agrees that it will accept, pursuant to practice agreements, the assignment of all clinical income by participants in the plan and, in accordance with such assignment, agrees to bill the amount of duly established charges for professional services to parties determined to be responsible for payment of such charges.

Section 5. REIMBURSEMENT OF UNIVERSITY

- A. In accord with paragraph II, D. 2 of the plan, the parties recognize that Foundation must reimburse University for actual expenses incurred by it which are attendant to the production of clinical income.
- B. To provide for said reimbursement, Foundation agrees that it will, on or before the first working day of each month in which reimbursable expenses are due as provided hereinafter, deposit the funds necessary to make such payments in a separate account maintained by it and that funds held in the said account will be invested only in accord with the provisions of Section 17 hereof.
- C. Foundation agrees to pay to University, from said account, as reimbursement for the remainder of the expenses attendant to the production of clinical income, University's actual annual costs, as determined by joint evaluation of Foundation and University, the sum of Two Million Two Hundred Four Thousand Two Hundred Forty—One (\$2,204,241.00) Dollars, composed of \$2,204,241 as reimbursement of personnel expenses and other current expenses, in direct support of the operation of the AMS Clinic.

Payments hereunder shall be in the following manner:

- 1. Twelve (12) monthly installments of One Hundred Eighty-Three
 Thousand Six Hundred Eighty-Six and 75 Cents (\$183,686.75) each on the last
 calendar day of each month beginning July 31, 1985.
- 2. Any increase in direct costs of personnel and current expenses will be additive to the \$2,204,241.00 annual amount and will be borne by the Foundation. Likewise, direct cost savings in personnel and current expenses experienced through mutual management efforts of University and Foundation, will be deducted from the \$2,204,241.00 yearly reimbursement as adjusted and the monthly payments to University will be adjusted accordingly. Within 30 days of the end of each quarter, University and Foundation officials will reconcile the direct cost expenditures for clinic operations to determine if direct cost expenditures exceed the \$2,204,241.00 yearly amount or if direct cost savings have been experienced. If it is determined that direct cost savings will be experienced during the last quarter of the 1985—86 fiscal year, Foundation will hold an estimated amount in escrow from the last monthly (June 1986) payment until the final quarter reconciliation is made.
- D. In addition to the above, Foundation agrees that it will reimburse University for all "plan income", as that term is defined in paragraph II, C., 2 of the plan, paid to faculty by University.

Section 6. REIMBURSEMENT OF FOUNDATION

A. The parties recognized that University receives certain services from Foundation, for which it is due reimbursement as specified hereinbelow.

- B. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Diagnostic Radiology for the provision of x-ray interpretation services to the University Student Health Service during the period July 1, 1985 June 30, 1986 a sum not to exceed Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars.
- C. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Surgery, for the harvesting of transplantable kidneys from appropriate cadavers, for University Hospital, the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred (\$1,200.00) dollars for each kidney harvest. In addition the University also agrees to pay for appropriate professional fees as defined by Medicare, Part A reimbursement regulations for live donor kidney acquisitions and cadaver kidney acquisitions.

In the event Medicare reduces Hospital reimbursement for professional fees paid as outlined above, the Foundation agrees to refund said amounts.

- D. In consideration of the furnishing of a computer prepared listing of Outpatient Diagnosis by Foundation to the Department of Patient Accounts of University Hospital on a monthly basis, University agrees to pay Foundation its actual cost.
- E. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Neurology, for provision of EEG interpretation services to the University Student Health Service, a fee of Forty-Five (\$45.00) dollars for each such service rendered.
- F. University agrees to pay to Foundation on behalf of members of the Department of Medicine, for provision of executive physical examinations to certain University employees identified by the University President, a fee for each examination.

G. University will make payment to Foundation monthly, on the last calendar day of each month beginning July 31, 1985, for services as described in paragraphs 8, C, D, E, and F hereinabove.

Section 7. ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT FUND

A. Consonant with Section II, D. 3 of the plan adopted by
University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984,
Foundation agrees that it will pay to The Fund for Advancement of Education
and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center (hereinafter Fund),
an amount equal to three (3%) percent of the actual clinical income collected
by said Foundation. The Fund will deposit said payments in an account
maintained for the purpose of providing an academic enrichment fund to be used
by the Dean of the College of Medicine in support of the programs of said
College and for related purposes. Amounts due hereunder will be computed by
Foundation on a monthly basis as income is received and remitted to the Fund
within twenty-five (25) days after the close of each monthly accounting period.

B. Foundation further agrees that it will deposit, in an account maintained by Foundation, on the same basis as provided in subsection A. hereinabove, an additional amount equal to six (6%) percent of the actual clinical income collected by said Foundation, said funds to be used by the Dean of the College of Medicine for the enrichment of the programs of the College and for related purposes in his sole discretion.

Section 8. PARTICULAR COVENANTS OF THE FOUNDATION

- A. Foundation's Articles of Incorporation, as filed with the Secretary of State of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on June 19, 1978, have been inspected by the University as a condition precedent to University's entry into this agreement. Foundation covenants that it will not, absent the written agreement of the University, amend or otherwise alter said Articles or adopt any by-law or other operating practice which would effectively alter the character of said Foundation.
- B. Foundation covenants that it will not engage in the practice of medicine, nor will it solicit, administer, receive, perform or accept any gift, grant, devise, bequest, contract or other arrangement with or from any governmental unit, entity, or subdivision or any person, corporation, partnership, association or other entity whatsoever except as specifically permitted herein. Provided, however, that nothing contained herein shall be construed to prohibit the Foundation (subject to the approval of the Dean of the College of Medicine) from negotiating and executing contracts providing exclusively for professional services by faculty who have executed practice agreements.

C. Foundation covenants that it will not merge with any other corporation or convey any substantial portion of its assets to any other corporation, partnership, or other entity except as specifically provided herein and that, in the event of its dissolution its Board of Directors shall cause its assets to be applied and distributed as follows: (a) all liabilities and obligations of the corporation shall be paid, satisfied and discharged, or adequate provisions shall be made therefore; (b) assets held by the corporation upon a condition which occurs by reason of the dissolution, shall be returned, transferred or conveyed in accordance with such requirements; and (c) all of the remaining assets of the corporation shall be transferred or conveyed to the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, or its successor, to be used for medical education and research, if said University or its successor, shall qualify as a public corporation and an instrumentality of the State of Kentucky or as an exempt organization under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended; and if said University or its successor shall not so qualify, then to some other organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, or scientific purposes in the field of medicine as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended.

Section 9. MEMBERSHIP AND BENEFITS

A. University agrees that it will assist the Foundation to enforce the terms of the practice agreements entered into by members of University's clinical departments of its College of Medicine by requiring adherence to said agreements as a condition of continued employment as a member of University's faculty.

- B. University agrees that it will require, as a condition of employment as a member of University's faculty in a clinical department in which a majority of the faculty members have executed practice agreements, that new members of its faculty execute said practice agreement in form identical to said agreements heretofore executed or as the form of same may be modified by mutual agreement of the parties hereto from time to time.
- C. Foundation agrees that it will not, absent the written consent of University, bill for, collect or administer any item of income for any person or entity not holding membership in the plan, nor will it permit persons not members to serve on its Board of Directors, nor will it provide any benefit or other thing of value to any person or entity not a member of the plan except for (1) termination benefits to former members as provided by action of Foundation's Board of Directors, (2) incidental benefits indirectly accruing to employees of the Medical Center by virtue of Foundation's activities, (3) students and House Staff of University, (4) payment to nurses incident to their recruitment to the University Medical Center, (5) education and technical training costs of persons involved in patient care activities or (6) education and technical training costs of persons indirectly involved in patient care activities if approved on a case by case basis by the Dean of the College of Medicine or the Chancellor for the Medical Center.
- D. In order to provide University of Kentucky Health Plan patients with a unified bill, Foundation is authorized to bill and collect the following items: clinic Pharmacy changes, patient deductible and non-covered items, and oral Surgery fees. The collection and billing shall be in accord with that certain contract entered into between the University and the Foundation.

- E. Foundation shall on or before November 1, 1985, assume responsibility for the costs of drugs and supplies to be used in the patient care programs in the clinics and is hereby authorized to bill, collect, and deposit in foundation accounts revenue from these non ancillary items.
- F. Foundation agrees that it will strictly enforce the terms of its practice agreements, report promptly to University in the event any individual fails or refuses to abide thereby and join with University in any appropriate action, in law or equity, necessary to secure compliance therewith.

Section 10. PERSONNEL

The parties recognize that the Foundation must employ various individuals to carry out its functions hereunder; however, the parties also recognize, and hereby declare their intention to adhere to, those provisions of the plan adopted by University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, particularly those portions which provide that University must retain

responsibility and authority for the appointment of faculty and house staff, the determination of institutional staffing patterns and the maintenance of balance among programs and their component activities.

Accordingly, with respect to employment of personnel by Foundation, the parties agree as follows:

A. Foundation staff

The Foundation may employ an executive director and such assistants, including secretarial and clerical personnel as may be determined by its Board of Directors to be necessary to permit said Foundation to bill and collect

professional fee income and to administer its funds in accord with the terms of the geographic full-time plan.

The Foundation is authorized to house computer equipment as may be required to communicate with its central computer and house two FTE employees in the University Medical Plaza building for the purpose of providing billing and financial information to patients of University physicians who are members of KMSF.

B. Other personnel

During the term of this contract Foundation agrees that it will not employ persons other than the two FTE Employee authorized in Section 10.A. to perform services in University's patient care or college programs. Provided, however, that this provision shall not be construed to prohibit specific agreements between the parties whereby University will employ personnel for such service and/or research duties with reimbursement of salary, fringe benefits and other direct costs by Foundation. Where such personnel are employed for service in a specific department or unit, employment will not occur unless (1) the department or unit where service is to be performed has consented in writing to said appointment, (2) the Dean of the College of Medicine has approved the employment and the job description related thereto and (3) funds for the salary, fringe benefits, and other costs related to said employee are either on hand or reasonably anticipated in the departmental or unit budget.

C. Equal opportunity-affirmative action

Foundation agrees that it will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. The Foundation agrees that it will take affirmative

action to ensure that applicants are employed and employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other compensation; and selection for training. The Foundation agrees that it will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age or handicap. The Foundation agrees that it will indemnify and save harmless the University, the Board of Trustees of the University including the individual members thereof, officers, agents and employees of the University by reason of any action at law or equity or by reason of any administrative proceeding initiated by any person arising out of any such employment action or practice of Foundation, including the payment of attorney fees and other costs of such action or proceeding.

Section 11. USE OF UNIVERSITY FACILITIES

The parties recognize that paragraphs III, B. 4, b, d, g and i of the "geographic full-time plan" adopted by University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, require that institutional control be maintained with respect to direction and supervision of institutional activities and programs, assignment and use of space in institutional facilities, determination of goals, objectives and priorities and the maintenance of balance among programs and their component activities.

Accordingly, Foundation and University agree that University will provide space for the Ophthalmology Clinic, the Chambers Building, appropriate assigned space in the University Medical Plaza and the Emergency Room (exclusive of faculty offices and classroom space contained therein) and other space officially designated for the conduct of the patient care operation.

With respect to any other facilities which University may from time to time provide to Foundation, Foundation shall be deemed a licensee without any property right whatsoever in said premises or facilities and shall, upon demand of University, vacate same.

Section 12. MEDICAL RECORDS

The parties agree that all medical records relating to the care of patients in University facilities or as a part of University programs, are and shall remain the property of University and that Foundation has no right or property interest therein. Provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed to limit access to said records by members of University's faculty, staff, and students pursuant to existing University procedures. Provided, further, that University agrees to provide or make available to Foundation such information and data from patient records and program data maintained by University as may be necessary for Foundation to perform its billing and collection functions herein provided, including such information and data as may be necessary to meet the requirements of third-party or other payors as the basis for payment for services.

Section 13. INSPECTION AND AUDIT

- A. Foundation agrees that, in accord with paragraph II, B. 1, of the action of University's Board of Trustees dated June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, its books, records and accounts are open at all reasonable times to inspection and audit by appropriately designated University representatives.
- B. The parties agree that the University's Internal Auditors will conduct an audit of Foundation's operations and accounts for the period ending June 30, 1985 and such other audits, including audits to determine compliance with this agreement, the terms of the action of University's Board of Trustees on June 20, 1978, as amended on June 19, 1984, and the terms of the departmental agreements referred to in Section 19 hereof, as may be specified by the University of Kentucky Controller and Treasurer, and that Foundation's agents and employees will cooperate to the fullest extent possible with University's auditors designated to conduct same. Further, the parties agree that a firm of Certified Public Accountants, mutually agreeable to the parties, will be employed by the Foundation to perform an independent audit of the Foundation's books, records and accounts for the year ended June 30, 1986.
- C. The Parties agree that Foundation will be furnished information by University sufficient for Foundation to verify the nature and detail of expenditure of funds paid to University under the provisions of Section 5.c.2. hereinabove.

Foundation agrees that it will furnish to University the following reports.

Annually

Audited Financial Statements to include:

Section 14. DEFAULT

- A. In the event of any failure of Foundation to pay any sum due to University hereunder within thirty (30) days after written notice of such default shall have been mailed to Foundation, or any failure to perform any other of the terms, conditions or covenants of this agreement to be observed or performed by Foundation for more than thirty (30) days after written notice of such default shall have been mailed to Foundation, or if Foundation shall become bankrupt or insolvent, or file any debtor proceedings, or take or have taken against Foundation in any court pursuant to any statute either of the United States or of any State a petition in bankruptcy or insolvency or for reorganization or for the appointment of a receiver or trustee of all or a portion of Foundation's property, or if Foundation makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or petitions for or enters into an arrangement therewith, then University may terminate this agreement. Provided however, that should any default occur which cannot reasonably be corrected within such thirty (30) day period then Foundation shall have such additional time to correct said default as may be reasonably necessary if Foundation promptly initiates, and expeditiously carries out, appropriate action to correct such default.
- B. University may at its election terminate this agreement with respect to any department without termination of the entire agreement for the same reasons and in the same manner as provided hereinabove.

Section 15. PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY

Nothing contained herein shall be construed to provide that any member of University's clinical faculty, house staff or student is acting as an agent of Foundation when providing care to patients in University facilities or as a part of an approved University program. University agrees that, when so acting, said faculty, house staff and students shall be considered agents of said University and that payment of claims or judgments may be made on their behalf from the fund provided pursuant to KRS 164.941 or other University funds or funds provided through any policy or policies of insurance maintained for said purpose.

Section 16. APPLICATION OF INCOME

University agrees that it will not, during the operation of this contract, cause charges for services rendered after July 1, 1978 by members of the faculty who have executed Practice Agreements and Assignments to be deposited in the accounts of the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky pursuant to the provisions of University of Kentucky Administrative Regulation AR II—4.0—1; deposits of such charges attributable to faculty who have not executed said Practice Agreements and Assignments shall continue pursuant to said regulation.

Section 17. MANAGEMENT AND INVESTMENT POLICIES

A. The parties recognize and agree that the reimbursement of University costs incurred attendant to the production of professional income

and the provision of a sum equal to nine (9%) percent of Foundation's gross income for the purpose of providing an academic enrichment fund for University's College of Medicine constitute the second and third charges, respectively, upon Foundation's gross income, the first charge being Foundation's ordinary and necessary expenses incurred in billing and collecting said income and providing for the central administration of Foundation. The mutual goal will be to raise the College of Medicine Academic Enrichment Fund tax to ten (10%) percent, but this is dependent upon the outcome of the bids we are seeking for umbrella medical malpractice insurance.

B. Accordingly, Foundation agrees that it will deposit the funds necessary to meet its obligations for reimbursement of the University and the provision of the aforementioned academic enrichment fund in a separate account as received and that the funds in said account shall be invested only in the following: (1) direct obligations of the United States Treasury; (2) other appropriate securities issued by federal agencies (including the Federal National Mortgage Association, the Export Import Bank, Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, Federal Home Loan Banks, Federal Land Banks); and (3) certificates of deposit collateralized by direct obligations of the federal government, federal agency obligations which qualify for direct investment under this recommendation, general obligations of the Commonwealth of Kentucky or obligations of the University of Kentucky.

Foundation shall be entitled to the investment income derived from said account, provided however investment income derived from balances attributed to the academic enrichment fund identified in subparagraph A. and Section 7, paragraph B. hereinabove shall be credited to said account.

Section 18. PROVISION OF PROFESSIONAL LIABILITY INSURANCE

- A. Foundation agrees that it will pay to University, as reimbursement to University for its portion of costs attendant to (i) payments required pursuant to KRS 164.941, a sum certain of One Hundred Thirty-Nine Thousand Thirty-Seven (\$139,037) Dollars, (ii) costs of claims administration, the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty (\$38,760) Dollars in Twelve (12) equal installments, the first said installment being due and payable on July 31, 1985 and monthly thereafter until June 30, 1986 and (iii) premiums to be paid for excess aggregate professional liability insurance, the sum of Two Hundred Twelve Thousand Two Hundred Eleven (212,211) Dollars payable when premium(s) is(are) due from the University of Kentucky.
- B. In addition, Foundation has agreed that between July 1, 1985 and June 30, 1986, it will cause to be deposited in a separate account the sum of One Hundred Forty-Five Thousand Three Hundred Fifty (\$145,350) Dollars, said account together with interest accruing thereto to be held solely for the purpose of payment of claims or judgments arising for liabilities defined in KRS 164.941 (3). No monies in said account shall be expended for any other purpose than as provided in this Section without the written agreement of University, nor shall such monies be encumbered, pledged or otherwise hypothecated. The monies in said account shall be invested only as provided in Section 17 hereof. Payment to the separate account may be in equal installments, provided that the full \$145,350.00 is deposited by June 30, 1986.
- C. In addition, Foundation has agreed to and has deposited the sum of Six Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand (\$675,000) Dollars to the separate account to fulfill its obligation to establish reserves at the level recommended by the University of Kentucky Medical Center. Also, Foundation has agreed to

deposit Two Hundred Twenty—One Thousand Three Hundred Five (\$221,305) Dollars to this separate account in twelve equal installments during fiscal year 1985—86, the first and second installments being due and payable on or before August 31, 1985 and monthly thereafter until June 30, 1986.

Section 19. ADMINISTRATION OF DEPARTMENTAL FUNDS

A. Foundation agrees that it will, after making provision for: (1) the costs of its administration and costs relating to billing and collection, (2) reimbursement of University expenses pursuant to Section 5 hereof and (3) the College of Medicine Academic Enrichment Fund pursuant to Section 7 hereof, maintain its accounts in such a manner that income attributable to the professional clinical activities of each of the following departments or divisions shall be shown separately on books maintained by the Foundation from any other fund or funds held by said Foundation:

B. Thereafter, Foundation agrees that it will expend the funds maintained by it in the aforementioned accounts only in accord with the departmental or divisional agreement relating to each department or division. Said departmental agreements are recognized as a material portion of this agreement. Therefore the parties agree that University shall retain custody of all funds accruing to the account of departments for which an approved departmental agreement has not been executed. Said departmental or divisional agreements may be amended from time to time, as provided in said agreements, with the approval of the Dean of the College of Medicine.

Section 20. NOTICES

All notices, demands and requests hereunder shall be in writing and shall be given by United States Registered or Certified Mail or by messenger delivery, in the case of University to:

Each party may from time to time change its address for purposes of notice by giving to the other party notice of such change of address. Any notice, demand or request given by United States Registered or Certified Mail, as provided herein, shall be deemed served on the date it is deposited in the United States mails properly addressed and with postage fully prepaid.

Section 21. RECORDS ACCESS

Pursuant to Public Law 96-499, Section 952, the Foundation agrees to make available upon written request from the Secretary of Health and Human Resources, the Comptroller General, or the Department of Human Services of the State of Kentucky or any of their duly authorized representatives, access to this contract and all other service agreements written or oral entered into or renewed since December 5, 1980, and access to books, documents, and records necessary to verify costs of services provided by such arrangements exceeding \$10,000 in a 12-month period. Access will be permitted until four years have expired after completion of services furnished, and in accordance with the applicable federal regulations.

If the Foundation carries out any of the duties under this contract through a sub-contract with a related organization, with a value or cost of \$10,000 or more over a 12-month period, such sub-contract shall contain a clause to the effect that until the expiration of four years after the furnishing of such services pursuant to the sub-contract, the related organization shall make available, upon written request from the Secretary or Comptroller General, or any of their duly authorized representatives, the sub-contract, books, documents and records of such organization that are necessary to verify the nature and extent of such costs.

Section 22. TERM

The term of this agreement shall begin on July 1, 1985 and end on June 30, 1986.

DELEGATION AUTHORIZING THE PRESIDENT TO ENTER INTO LEASES AND EASEMENTS NOT EXCEEDING \$30,000 IN VALUE

Recommendation: that the President or his designated representative be authorized and directed to negotiate and finalize, on behalf of the University of Kentucky any and all leases and easements affecting real property owned by or for the benefit of the University of Kentucky; further, that the President or his designated representative be authorized and directed to negotiate and finalize such leases and easements upon such terms and conditions as the President or his designated representative deems to be in the best interests of the University of Kentucky; provided, however, this authorization shall not include any transactions involving leases and easements the value of which exceeds \$30,000; and that all leases and easements covered by this Resolution shall be reported to the Board of Trustees.

Background: On December 13, 1983, the Board of Trustees authorized the President or his designated representative to enter into leases and easements not exceeding \$20,000 in value.

The \$20,000 limit is being raised to \$30,000 to accommodate most of the leases and easements that affect real property transactions.

Registration of University Logos

Recommendation: that the Athletics Director, University of Kentucky Athletics Association, be and is hereby authorized and directed to select appropriate service marks, trademarks, designs and logos of the University of Kentucky Wildcat, and other marks, designs and logos of the University of Kentucky, and apply for trademark and/or copyright registration of same in the name of the University of Kentucky.

Background: Currently, the University of Kentucky has only common law protection of its marks, designs and logos. Registration will enhance that protection and, at the same time, allow enhancement of the athletic programs of the University of Kentucky by generating income from the sale of rights to the use of these marks, designs, and logos. As with many major universities, the sale of these rights is expected to provide an additional source of income not heretofore utilized to any significant degree. All net revenues are to be divided equally between the University and the Athletics Association. The current trend of the courts based on a number of recent decisions is to recognize the rights of universities in this regard. Many universities have moved in the last two years to register their logos, marks, etc.
