ers or professors who daily record in some little book the mark of A. B. C. D. E. Can this five-point system of grading be considered reliable on the part of the instructor? Do we as students tend to work for desired high marks, rather than study on our own initiative? The system of two marks, "Pass" and "Fail," I has been introduced recently into several collegiate institutions. Outstanding example of the success of this plan has been the University of Chicago, where President Robert Hutchins said that such a method has a two-fold purpose: (1) to adapt the educational process to the student, (2) An attempt to alter student psychology. At Chicago the responsibility for an education rests with the students.

At the University of Arkansas, J. R. Gerberich conducted an investigation among a randomicked group of junior and senior students to determine their attitude toward examination and marking practices. Three hundred questionnaires were sent out. The survey resulted in the discovery that over half of the students preferred the two-mark system.

If the elimination of the five-point grading plan has proved favorable at other colleges and universities, should it not be feasible to experiment with the idea on this campus? Or shall all students continue to compete for the same honor, regardless of general or specific abilities and interests?—L. L. J.
