OPENING IN  
SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

All library staff are invited to the opening of a photograph exhibit and program that documents life in two eastern Kentucky coal company towns on Sunday, January 24, at 2:00 in the Peal Gallery, King Library North.

Selected photographs from the "Harlan County Coal Camps, Lynch and Benham, Kentucky: Cultural Transition from Rural to Urban Communities, 1912-1948" will open in the Department of Special Collections with a special video presentation and discussion led by Ann Shertz, Executive Assistant of the Harlan County Coal Camps Project.

The large collection of over 4,000 photographs is housed at Southeast Community College, and additional photographs from the collection will be on display at the Appalachian Center and the Northside Branch of the Lexington Public Library.

The collection will be on display at all three sites through February 28.

OPERATION READ AT UK

Through the Human Resource Development department of the Lexington Campus, the University provides tutoring the

employees who need basic skills and literacy training. Called "Operation Read at UK", the program matches low-level and nonreaders with faculty, staff, and students who wish to serve as volunteer reading tutors.

The volunteer tutors must receive 15 hours of training before beginning work with their assigned student employee.

Although there are presently no further on-campus training sessions scheduled (sessions were held January 5, 6, and 7), it is sometimes possible to work out other training for potential volunteers.

ENGLISH LIBRARIES AND  
LIBRARIANSHIP: TOURS AND  
SEMINARS

The University of Oklahoma and the Bodleian Library at Oxford University will be again co-sponsoring a two-week series of tours and seminars at Oxford University May 22 - June 4, 1988.

Participants will examine such concerns as the ever increasing role of libraries in

public service efforts, the place of libraries as a resource for economic potential, and the central foundation of libraries as a component of social life and cultural enrichment.

The fee, which includes all field trips and tuition, is \$750. Travel arrangements must be made separately.

Three hours graduate credit is available for the seminar through the University of Oklahoma.
