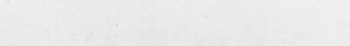

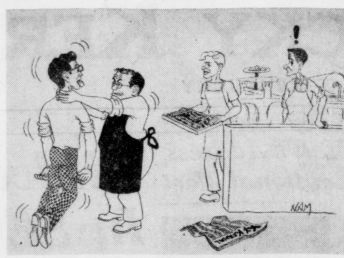

## Hardened Arteries

Circulation of the Kernel is a difficult and complex operation. It is not always completely effective but is the best we can do under the circumstances. Mr. Bowers (see letters column) deserves some explanation, as do others.

Cooperstown, through no fault of ours, is not served by the University staff, but by regular city mail carriers. As a result, bundles of Kernels are distributed there every Friday, in the four laundries which have been disbursed as regularly as possible among the units.

As the writer stated, students are "assessed" for Kernel subscriptions when they pay registration fee. Total cost is 36 cents a semester, or a little more than two cents per copy.

At that rate, door-to-door delivery is obviously impossible. If they were mailed to Cooperstown, the cost would necessarily rise to at least \$1 per semester—the regular mail edition cost to alumni. In addition, students in Cooperstown would not receive their copies until Monday following publication because of the Lexington mailing schedule.

Bundles of the paper are sent to the larger dorms and barracks. Sororities and fraternities can obtain enough copies for their memberships by informing the Kernel circulation department and designating one or more postoffice boxes—whatever number required. The requested number of Kernels will be placed there each Friday morning.

As in the past, all students signing for postoffice boxes receive individual issues.

Any time the above sources fail, reporting the failure to the postoffice workers or the Kernel circulation manager should prevent its happening again.

## A Lesson In Journalism

It is an old, old story, but we are in receipt of a letter this week complaining of the advertising space consumed in the Kernel. The letter is by one A. Yan Key and may be read in the regular Letters To The Editor column on this page.

We cannot say anything in response to this student's statements that has not been said many times over in the last year, but we wish to take this space to refute some of the statements made by this obviously misinformed person. Anyone who will take the time to compare the advertising space of the Kernel with that of other newspapers in the country, dailies or weeklies, will find that our advertising-news proportion is comparable to these publications. Kernel advertising has at times been as low as 40 percent of the total space and has never in the last year been higher than 60 percent. This is in accordance with postal regulations on the amount of advertising space to be allotted.

It is very difficult to explain many of the journalistic principles involved in the proportioning of advertising and news, but it may suffice to say that despite all the halos flung at old-time journalism, the press in this country plays a dual role as a profession and a business. We, too, must eat and eke out a living on the bare soil of society. Advertising is the press' business and the news is its public service.

We on the Kernel work long hours in an effort to give the students a "school paper worthy of the name" and it is a rare occasion when an important news story is left out for any reason. It is our features and humor columns, the desert of your journalistic meal, that are first to go into the can when space is tight. This is true also of last week's Kernel. No important news was left out and, as a matter of fact, the size of the paper was increased for the sole purpose of including more news. Neither printers nor staff is completely at fault.

Through the years the Kernel has proven to be a good advertising medium and local businessmen have, as they should, taken advantage of it. It is against our policy to discourage such advertising, largely because the paper, if it ever becomes a semi-weekly, will need all the support it can get.

True, the journalism building is to be paid for in part by Kernel profits. But very little of this revenue will be derived from the paper itself. Most of it will come from the University-owned and operated Kernel printing plant which has resulted from the re-investment of small profits from the paper over a long period of time, and from University grants.

Enough has already been said, we believe, on the subject of a semi-weekly Kernel. The students have been promised such a publication as soon as it is mechanically and physically possible. It is no overnight operation to convert a plant over to such an operation. We can offer no concrete promises on the subject but we feel assured that a semi-weekly Kernel is definitely a thing of the near future. We can only wait and hope. But we also feel assured that there will be no "ad book". Advertisements and news

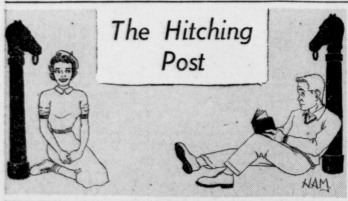

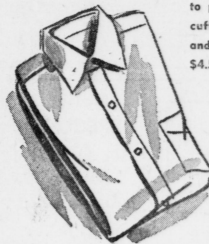

In their last three outings, the Cats have won in easy fashion over the Xavier frosh, Jeffersonville American Legion, and Cumberland.

Xavier, who gave the yearlings of Coach Harry Lancaster quite a tussle at Cincinnati, succumbed to a blistering attack, 62-40. The Musketeers were never a threat, and Kentucky poured in points almost as will as they hit 44 percent of their shots.

Jeffersonville, who came here with a record of 24-3, was the victim of the highest score run up by the frosh all year. The final tally was 107-51. The Kittens racked up 44 field goals in 100 tries, which represents an all time high for shots attempted by any Kentucky team in one game.

### 'Best Freshman Club Ever,' Says Coach Harry Lancaster

"The best freshman basketball club we've ever had."

Those eight words were the appraisal by Coach Harry Lancaster of this year's Blue and White yearling squad which has just finished one of the most successful seasons ever enjoyed by a freshman quintet at Kentucky.

In 16 games, they amassed 1289 points or 79.3 points per game while holding their opponents to 47.5 points per till.

The 1289 points were collected on 498 field goals in 1388 attempts, and 373 free throws in 427 tries. Their field goal percentage was 31.3 and their average on charity tosses 62.9.

This year's group of Kittens had stand-out performers in every department.

Hagan Leads Scorers

In scoring, they were led by two great prospects, Cliff Hagan and Frank Ramsey. Both these boys possessed a wide variety of shots and can hit with deadly accuracy.

Hagan was not far behind, having rung the bell 159 times in 274 assaults on the corbs for 43 percent and 264 points.

Hagan had a 22.3 per game average for 12 contests, while Ramsey contributed an average of 16.5 points in 16 tilts.

Dick Pikrone was the No. 3 scorer with 75 points and a shooting average of 32 percent in 16 games.

As for rebounding, 6' 5" Lou Tsioropollos took a back seat to no one when it came to snatching the ball off the boards, to combine with Hagan and Ramsey in this department.

to give Kentucky control of the leather for most of the games. The Kittens fired goalward 1396 times this season while their opponents were allowed only 1044 tries. This means they usually got about 22 more shots per game than the opposition, and this was due in no small way to lanky Lou.

On defense, the two shining lights were Dick Pikrone and Lindie Castle, a pair of fast guards. Pikrone consistently did a good job of dogging the other team's hottest scorer, while Castle is a ball-hawking specialist that set up the Cat's fast break offense.

Price Had \$3 Average

The other members of the team—Dwight Price, Ches Riddle, Bob Fry, Bill Balthol and Joe Waggoner—all performed capably when called

on. Price had an 8.3 point average for 16 games, while Riddle had a 3-point average for the same number of tilts. The other three boys saw little service, but tossed in 4 points between them in the few minutes they played.

Coach Lancaster said that the best game the Kittens played this year was at Owensboro when they slaughtered the Vanderbilt freshmen, 96-52.

This was not the game in which they hit their highest number of shots, their highest point total, nor their best shooting percentage, but they worked better as a team than on any other occasion.

# DisKintucky Sports Review

The final three varsity basketball games played in the 26-year-old Alumni Gym were certainly ones to be remembered. First there was the Georgia Tech tussle when Bill Spivey broke the Conference scoring record by hitting 49 points. Who will forget how "Griss" scored that last goal with just seconds left in the game?

Then five nights later, the determined Xavier Musketeers surprised everyone, including themselves probably, as they battled the Cats right down to the wire, losing only by a 58-53 score.

The last one was the most dramatic held in Alumni Gym in years. The 2800 students jammed in there will replay this game many times in years to come—how Vandy hit 47 percent of their shots in the first half and led 41-29 at intermission. . . how UK came back like champions to tie it up 52-52 with nine minutes to go. . . how the two seniors, Jim Line and Dale Barnstable, making their final home appearance, played brilliant games, scoring 25 of the Cats' 41 points in the final 20 minutes of play. . . how the Big Blue hit 48 percent of their goal attempts in the second half to save the 84-game winning streak on their home court. . . and how Line and Barney were carried off the floor after the fray by their teammates. Yeah, it was quite a finish. Let's hope that the new Coliseum is as good to the Wildcats cagers as Alumni Gym has been in the past.

The present basketball season has been very successful for UK. Coach Rupp's varsity enters the SEC tournament with a 22-4 record, while the freshmen cagers of Coach Harry Lancaster won 15 games by their only one. These marks combined give the Kentucky basketballers a total record of 37 victories against only five losses.

Congratulations to the coaches and the players. We doubt if there is another college in the country that has an average like that for their varsity and freshmen teams. During the past two seasons now, the UK Killians have won a total of 30 games against one lone setback, which was later avenged.

While watching Xavier extend the Cats here last week, we recalled that the last three teams to beat Kentucky here in Lexington were all from Ohio. The last loss was, of course, to Ohio State, 45-40, seven years ago (Jan. 2, 1943).

Before that, Xavier beat UK here, 40-44, midway in the 1940-41 season. And the third last defeat suffered in our home last week was at the hands of Cincinnati, 29-30, in the second game of the 1929-30 campaign.
