SG backs special dorm for basketball players

The Wildcats have had an erratic season so far — on and off the court—but UK's Student government demonstrated last night that the team's fans are still loyal, voting to support the athletic staff in its efforts "to provide the best possible facilities." Although the National Collegiate Athletic Association has not approved official guidelines for athletic facilities, there is a question of "what's legal and what's to be done" about the dorn. Senator Bobby Dee Gunnells said "We need to support them (the athletic staff, and they need the support right now."

The resolution said the team is "a special group of athletes deserving special treatment," and the basketball program is a special part of this University.

program is a special part of this University.

Another program receiving additional support is SG's reincarnation of the student buying power card. Another 2,500 cards will be printed in addition to the 5,000 already available.

The reaction to the cards has been stronger because of the more popular stores participating, especially the new MacDonald's on Limestone. Alysia Wheeler, sendors-at-large, said some students liked the offer of a free item cach month so much they have tried to get more than their share (one per student) just for that bargain.

"That's the weak spot of the card."

said David Fields, the coordinator of the program. "I didn't think of the devious minds of the students." Some of the merchants already had discounts available to students with IDs, with or without the buying power cards, Fields said.

Students should contact merchants about special limitations or call SG about problems they encounter when

about problems they encounter when using the cards.
Fields said the cards are "probably the most tangible project Student Government has had all year," adding that it was more productive than discussing the Iranian issue in terms of benefits to the UK student population. Another productive effort is a new television show that Brad Sturgeon, building relations committee chairman, is engineering with WLEX-TV. It will be broadcast for the first time preceeding the SEC Game of the Week on Feb. 10.

At the next SG meeting. Feb. 5. members will vote whether to endorse the proposed expansion of the Student Center.

YWCA refuge for battered women to open in spring

battered women in Lexington have been raised so quickly that the Young Women's Christian Association now hopes to have the refuge open by

"We've had a lot of good luck with us," said Susan Warren, acting director of the shelter. All the money isn't in, though. The YWCA is waiting on federal funds for

The idea for a shelter originated two years ago when the YWCA began looking into the needs of area women. Many social service agencies expressed the need for it and the WCCA responded by forming a committee to study its feasibility. Once it was decided to start one, the problem of finding a large enough facility in good shape arose.

The search began last June and ended in October when a suitable dwelling was found. Some money has been obtained from urban county government for furnishings and the house is being checked to see if any security systems will be needed.

The location of the house will be kept confidential and women applying to enter will be screened so that no one will use the house for problems other than abuse.

The YWCA has also begun to

advertise for and interview people to work at the house. This staff will include a full-time director, a case aide, and two full-time evening supervisors. Meanwhile, the YWCA provides voluntage supervisors to showed women

Meanwhile, the YWCA provides volunteer services to abused women—and the need is apparent. For instance, between Sept. I and Dec. 13 last year the organization received 39 calls concerning shelter, 46 on counseling and 50 for information on advising, social services, etc.

A support group was also provided for counseling abused women during

that period and was attended by 39 people. Warren said the totals decline around holidays because the women make an attempt to keep the family

make an attempt to keep the raining together.

The calls came from as far away as Massachusetts and Florida as well as all over Kentucky, Warren said als of calls are from friends and relatives of a battered victim who are trying to find information and services available.

Once the house is set up, services will include advising and counseling, both in groups and individually. The women entering the house may bring

their children. Housework and meals will be the responsibility of the women staying in the house and all will be expected to participate. Activities will be provided for the children. The YWCA's 24-hour hotline will

The YWCA's 24-hour hotline will be maintained at the house. A two-week limit will be imposed on the entrants to the house so that a permanent change in lifestlyes won't occur. Warren says the YWCA can't let the women stay there too long because the shelter house will serve only as a form of "temporary crisis intervention."

California students can now examine those who examine them. A landmark "Truth-in-Testing" bill was signed into law last Spetember by Gov. Jerry Brown. The law allows students for the first time to look into

students for the first time to look into the workings of organizations like the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J., and the American College Testing Program of lowa City, lowa, that develop and administer standardized college admissions tests.

The bill was a reaction to the California Board of Regents' decision that year placing more importance on a respective properties of the California diadratized tests as a basis for Packer, legislative director of the U.S. admission, says Felice Smith, codification of the University of California Student Lobby, sponsor of the bill.

The bill requires ETS and all other testing corporations to:

— disclose copies of old tests equivalent in content to those currently in use;

— disclose data bearing on the quality

and the validity of the tests and on ho well they actually predict success in

and what money received by the tester is used for;
— disclose information on the purpose and subject matter of each test, and how each test is scored.

Administrators are putting more weight on test scores than grade point averages for admissions, says Joel Packer, legislative director of the U.S.

Students Association, the national lobby group for student governments. Packer said this is mostly because the

number of applicants has been greatly outnumbering the openings at many schools.

Controlling 80 percent of the testing market is ETS, says the California Student Lobby. According to ETS, over 1.75 million students last year took its tests, including the Scholastic Aptitude Test, the Law School Admissions Test, the Graduate Management Admissions Test.

The nonprofit group also says it took in last year \$70 million from its operations, a million dollars of which was "in excess of expenditures."

"Legislation is very crucial because ETS is a very secretive corporation," said Alan Nairn, a Columbia University graduate student working with Ralph Nader's Center for the Continued on page 5

LEGISLATION TO GIVE VOTERS more direct control over how much local governments spend was praised yesterday, by taxpayers and critisized by some local officials.

"We want relief from taxation," said J.L. Johnson, president of the Taxpayers Action Group, one of several persons testifying at a hearing before the House Appropriations Committee on House Bill 44.

The bill would limit annual property tax increases by four percent unless voters agreed to a higher rate. State and local governments would be required to reduce tax rates to offset the effect of increased property assessments.

FILM PRODUCER CARLO PONTI was found guilty esterday by a Rome court of illegal transfer of money

abroad. He was sentenced to four years in prison and given a fine of \$24 million.

The judges dropped two of the four years of Ponti's sentence under a pardon prevision.

At the same time, the court acquitted Ponti's wife, actress Sopia Loren, and her private secretary, Ines Bruscia, who were charged as accomplices and with attempting to smuggle works of art abroad.

Neither Ponti nor Miss Loren attemded the trial. They are French citizens and live in Paris, having given up their Italian citizenship because of legal problems surrounding their divorces and marriage. France does not extradite its citizens for prosecution in other countries.

Cooperation between cops, students needed to prevent future attacks

Right now, caution should be the watchword for female campus residents and women who live in the UK vicinity.

Three attacks on women, including one rape have been reported in the last few weeks, ranging from the Complex to Hilltop Avenue to Rose Lane. The assailant is still at large, as no suspects have been arrested in connection with the assaults.

Asked to comment on the situation, a UK official said that many students no longer use good judgment in traveling around campus. Attacks can come at unexpected times and places, he said.

There's a good deal of truth to that. Cold weather is no safeguard against rape — indeed, because there are fewer bystanders outside to act as witnesses, the chance of assault could even be greater.

Meanwhile, live as safely as possible: travel in pairs, restrict movement after dark, avoid pairs, restrict movement after dark, avoid vulnerable situations and use other safeguards such

Campus and city police should make the recent Campus and city police should make the recent incidents a top priority for investigation. Patrols on campus and in nearby neighborhoods should be increased, and serious consideration should be given to establishing some sort of escort service for students and faculty who find it necessary to travel after dark.

Most importantly, communication between police officials and the University community needs to remain as clear as possible. The chances of panic can be reduced if students are kept informed with descriptions of the assailants and advice on how a woman can resist such an attack.

UK students, faculty and staff can cooperate by reporting suspicious persons matching the description (about 5-foot-10, short brown hair). Also, have patience if you are asked to identify yourself or if the police want to search your home. Remember your constitutional rights, but comply as much as possible. The danger of one attack is worth taking a lot of precautions and cooperation.

Carter's federal budget means loss of benefits for students

President Carter's new budget would give many college students the chance, whether they want it o not, to become a front line fighter in the front lines in the war against inflation.

The biggest economic blow to students would be the proposed phasing out over four years of Social Security benefits for college students between the ages of 18 to 21.

Because of astronomical increases projected in Social Security payments, that program has become one of the most popular targets for cutbacks. Needy students, say Carter and others, should be able to get money from the Basic Grant program.

Hypothetically, they're right. But practically,

many students who depend on Social Security payments to stay in school will be unable to obtain Basic Grants, for various reasons, and will have to leave school because of that.

Politically, it's another case of the people with the least influence getting the short end of the stick.

least influence getting the short end of the stick. Nationally, college students have no organization or cohesive voice, and rarely can respond effectively to issues that are important to them. But there is a good chance Congress will rearrange the President's budget. Lexington's freshman Congressman Larry Hopkins received a good deal of his support from students in the November election and this issue would be a good time for him to repay the debt.


