

## Crash panel finds FAA, ValuJet at fault

Crash panel finds FAA, ValuJet at fault

MIAMI — The federal hearings on the ValuJet crash brought out some disturbing news
When you travel on an airliner, there are likely to
be things in the cargo hold that can kill you if
they catch fire or explode.

And in a rare attack upon the Federal Aviation
Administration, the agency that is supposed to
make sure that flying is safe, members of the
panel investigating the Vallet crash made it clear
the FAA didn't fulfill its mission.

The hearings by the National Transportation
Safety Board revealed that, before the deadly
crash in the Everglades, federal authorities gave a
low priority to the search for dangerous cargo
such as chemicals and even ammunation.

Testimony and documents revealed that 60
percent of the hazardous materials shipped on airplanes in the United States goes aboard passenger
airliners rather than cargo planes, and that the
FAA ignored warnings from its own hazardous
materials, or hazmat, inspectors.

"Lumping together cargo, hazmat — anything
that goes into the belly of a plane — we're just
waiting for an accident to happen," a division
manager said in a 1992 internal FAA repor,

Lexington, on the other hand, is the smallest, but also demands a higher price than medium-size markets such as Louisville.

Overall, Louisville stacked up best for several destinations ranging from Atlanta (\$68 round-trip for Christmas) to Phoenix, AZ (\$244 for Christmas). Clincinnati prices differed greatly from Atlanta (\$261) to Phoenix (\$279).

There is still some time before Christmas to book a fairly reasonable flight. But, as ariline representatives say, it is best to plan ahead. Airline rates change daily because of deregulation of the industry.

Representatives of Delta and USAir said their fares may change three to four times a day, based on

ticket availability and competitors fares. As the holidays near, those changes are likely to be more dras-tic and expensive, representatives said.

So when the man who hasn't
appeared in a bad film to date,
writes, directs and stars in a film,
there is definite cause for excitement among his distinct followers.
His film Trees Lounge, a dreary
comedy loosely based on his life,
offers a wonderful slice-of-life
piece that's sure to please his most
dedicated fans.

Trees Lounge tells the story of
Tommy Basilio (Buscemi), a 31year-old bartely living in a miserable suburban Long Island town.

Kids. Longtime friend and collaborator Mark Boone Junior, whose
face is probably unfamiliar to
most, gives one of the best performances as another drunk, Trees
Lounge resident. Samuel L. Jackson makes a mid-film camea
appearance, providing for one of
the funnier scenes of the movie.

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

At the time, the United States Dr. Lester Grinspoon of the Harmacopoeia recommended cannabis as a treatment for more than 100 different conditions. arijuana is one of the safest therapeutically active substances known to man, says, not marijuana law reform activists, but the Drug Enforcement Agency's own chief administrative law judge.

In 1988, Judge Francis Young ruled that marijuana should be provided that marijuana should be provided that marijuana should be removed from its current classification, which defines cannabis as nextremely dangerous substance with no known medical uses.

The federal government ignored the ruling, maintaining that marijuana has no accepted medical value. Likewise, the American Public Health Association has concluded that greater harm is caused by the legal consequences of marijuana's prohibition than any possible risks of its medical uses. Many others — from the American Bar Association, even Mothers Against Misuse and Abuse — join in their reasonable request that marijuana be made legally available as a therapeutic agent to those in medical

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

"We were all from segregated high schools. All but one of us were from either Douglas or Dunbar in Lexington, except for one, he was from Nicholasville. We were all just teen-agers, 15- to 18-years old, starting college ... it was an exciting time."

Wilkinson was the valedictorian of Lexington's Paul Laurence Dunbar High School and a member of the National Honor Society before enrolling at UK.

of the few women professors at the university. Wilkinson said she was a motivator and role model for women students.

"She is both my friend and mentor," Wilkinson said.

Wilkinson received her bachelor's degree in social work with a minor in English from UK in 1938 — making her the first black student to receive a bachelor's degree from UK.

group that is following the strict liquid diet plan.

"The whole time they're on the diet they're learning the skills they're gonna need to keep the weight off," Lynne Cassidy, program coordinator.

The people who teach these hour and a half classes work with the participants all week, giving them advice and encouragement to stay on their diet and keep up the physical activity.
"That makes a really big difference, when you have somebody working with you during the week," Cassidy said.
Unlike many diet programs, HMR participants call their instructor during the week to update them on how they are doing.
Their consultants are particularly interested in how their physical activity is going, which is a key part of the program.
