according to your suggestion to Dr Blanton calling a meeting of the Com. to meet today.

It was not said of the McHenry ch. that "they had
been helped till they were helpless" but of another ch.
I am glad the McHenry people have done so well.

Mr. Blair of Nashville wrote me as Chairman ma-
king an application from the Session of the 1st ch. N.
for us to allow you & H. to go & labor in their Mission field.
He also enclosed your letter expressing a desire to go.

I laid these before the Committee, and it was ordered
by the Com. that you hold your next meeting at
Central City or Sturgis as you judge best. The
Committee also agreed that if you & Hopper ^{today} desired
to do so - the Com. consent to release you both, from
your engagement to the Synod, for a length of time

^{so that you can / with vigor} there, & then resume labor for the Synod at such
place as may be designated by the Synods Com-
^{Please write me at once whether you will avail yourself of this opportunity}
In your letter to Dr Blanton you write that Bro. Hopper
stated to you that in going to Tilly you "were violating
an understanding with our Northern brethren, who were
to occupy the Knottville Branch & we the Cent' Southern."
Neither I or any other member of the sub-ex Com. whom
I have asked have any knowledge of any such
agreement or understanding, ^{or} of our Synod giving
any body authority to make such an agreement.
We certainly would never have any part in the violation
of any covenant, agreement, or understanding, that
was of any justly binding authority. We have em-
ployed an Evangelist to labor in Laurel & Bell counties;
which we certainly would not have done if we knew of
such understanding. If you know of such understanding
I would be glad to hear the particulars - I will write
Bro. Hopper & ask him to let me know his authority for
such a statement. I will write him also an answer
to his letter - There are other matters of importance
but as I am pressed for time - having to go to ~~the~~ Kentucky



Yours of Nov 12th enclosing check for \$10. contributed by McKinney church to Synod's Ev. Fund was rec'd last evening on my return from B. Green. I hoped possibly to meet you at B.G. Saturday. Hope you reached Scottsville yesterday, and that you will work most earnestly especially in personal conversation & prayer to lead those interested into our church. From what was manifest while Rev. Mr. Stagg was at S. there is now an opportunity to greatly strengthen that church & I hope it will do a great deal more toward self support.

I send you a copy of the minutes of Synod. You see our Ev. Fund is in debt and Synod directs (our Evang & workers when holding a meeting) to work "to secure from Churches receiving aid from the Committee an increase in the salaries of the pastors or supplies of those churches, and a full contribution to the Evangelistic fund." Hope you can secure the \$15 appor. to Scottsville. The Com. reappointed you at same salary & on same terms as last year, that is \$1080 for salary and expenses, you to pay over to the Com. whatever you may receive from the Churches or individuals where you labor. I asked you for a statement of what you received during the last year but it has not yet come to hand. As soon as it does I am prepared to pay balance due you. Yours of yesterday recd. My recollection is distinct that my conversation with Mr Waller was in exact accord with the letter I wrote him when he was engaged, that we would pay him \$25 per month. He said he could stay out of school till he completed the four months.

I do not understand how he could state, that "he would not have taken the work had he not understood that he might earn one hundred dollars before school began".

He was not engaged for mere sunday work, but to labor every day - visiting, teaching the Gospel from house to house, holding prayer meetings during the week, as well as sunday work -

We paid him as much as we did Logan Irvine who had spent 1 year in Theological seminary after graduating at C. Univ. If we pay the debt I have incurred borrowing so much to pay salaries to Oct 1st the Com. will do all it can reasonably be expected to do, without paying what has not been earned - Excuse haste & plain talking - Yours fraternally

To the Churches
Dear Brethren

The Executive Committee of Evangelistic Labor of the Synod of Ky. have obeyed the directions of Synod and endeavored (in connection with the Presbyterian Committees) to secure the ministrations of the Gospel for all our feeble churches, and to carry it into the regions beyond.

God has prospered the work so that many of the feeble churches have been strengthened, churches have been organized in four counties heretofore without a Pres. Church, and valuable mission work has been done in 5 other unoccupied counties, which will we hope in the near future enable us to organize churches in them.

Forty eight (48) laborers have been in the employ of the Synod. To provide for their support, the Synod directed the Com. to apportion \$10,000. among all the churches, & to notify each church of the amount the Com. judged its fair share of that sum. There is still unpaid about \$3500. of the amounts apportioned to the churches.

If every church will pay its share ^{by Oct 1} the sum thus paid, with the 50 per cent promised by the Liberal brethren who have already given so much to this great work, will enable the Com. to pay all dues & so close the year without debt. If the Chs. do not pay before Synod, they lose the advantage of the 50 per cent, & the debt will have to be paid in full, for the Synod that is the Churches directed its agent - the Com. - to employ these ministers & the Chs are bound to pay the salaries fairly earned. Every dollar sent before Oct 1. will pay \$1.50 of these dues. If not paid before Synod they will have to be paid afterwards dollar for dollar.

To the extent to which this may be the case, the work will be crippled. This would be a great disaster, involving not only cessation of our aggressive work, but also the loss of much that has been gained. The only way to avert this terrible disaster is for each church to act at once, and before Synod meets raise and forward to the Treasurer (Rev E. W. Bedinger Anchorage Ky) its apportioned share of the amount needed. On behalf of the Committee







Please urge upon your office bearers and people not to be satisfied, till the full amount apportioned has been forwarded to the Treasurer. I am confident you and nearly all our people realize the importance to Christ's Cause, as represented by our church, of our helping to keep alive & build up our feeble churches, and also to plant and care for new ones in our destitute places - I fear some do not realize the great need that every church meet its apportionment at this time.

All the Presbyteries resolved to call on their churches to pay an apportionment to free Synod's work from debt. Many of the churches which had paid their apportionment in full, while others had not, feel that it is a hardship to have to make up for others failure to contribute their fair share. Through love of Christ - his Church and of souls that are perishing, they are meeting the apportionment of their Presbytery. If this effort fails & a debt remains, because others again fail to respond, it will cause great disappointment, and may seriously injure the work.

All ought to make earnest self-denying efforts to enable Synod to meet its obligations. Please let me know at an early date what your church will do. Yours Faithfully
