DEAR BROTHER—

I HAVE RECEIVED YOUR LETTER  
INFORMING THE CHURCHES OF MY FIELD OF  
THEIR ASSESSMENT BY THE COMM., & I SHALL DISTRIB-  
UTE THE CIRCULARS, & INFORM THE CHURCHES OF THE  
AMOUNTS THAT ARE DUE.

I PUT THIS MATTER BEFORE MY CHURCHES SOM-  
TIME BEFORE THE SYNOD MET, & THE RESPONSE WAS NOT  
ACENT. I MAY BE NO MORE SUCCESSFUL THIS YEAR, BUT  
I WILL MAKE AN EFFORT.

SALEM CHURCH HAS PAID ME ONLY \$19 OUT OF \$50  
PROMISED. ELKTON & RUSSELLVILLE HAVE PAID UP  
ALL THAT THEY HAVE PROMISED TO THIS TIME, BUT  
R. WILL NOT BE ABLE TO DO AS MUCH AS SHE HAS  
DONE, FOR THE COMING YEAR, ON ACCOUNT OF THE RE-  
MOVAL OF TWO OF HER MAIN STAYS.

I AM SORRY TO MAKE SUCH A DISCOURAGING REPORT  
AS THIS IS TO ME,

WHEN PRESBYTERY MET HERE OUR ORGANIZATION WAS  
REVISED, & THREE MEMBERS WERE ADDED ON CERTIFI-  
CATE, & A RULING ELDER WAS ELECTED, ORDAINED, & IN-  
STALLED, WHICH MAKES ABOUT 8 MEMBERS ON THE ROLL.

SOME OF THESE HAVE MOVED ELSE WHERE, & ABOUT THREE  
OF THE REMAINING ARE SUPERANUATED SO THEY ARE NO  
HELP TO US.

I ENDEAVORED TO START A S. S. BUT FOR WANT OF  
MATERIAL FAILED. I HAVE ALSO TRIED TO INSTITUTE  
A BIBLE CLASS OR A PRAYER MEETING, BUT HAVE NOT  
SUCCEEDED IN GETTING THE MEMBERS TO TAKE HOLD  
OF THAT. I WANTED TO HAVE IT ONE NIGHT IN EACH  
WEEK, BUT AM DOUBTFUL ABOUT SUCCEEDING.

AT ELKTON THERE SEEMSTO BE A LITTLE MORE  
HOPE. LAST MONTH WE RECEIVED TWO BY LETTER,  
THEY HAVE BEEN PAYING THE PROMISED SALARY PROMPT  
LY, ALTHOUGH IT HAS BEEN A LITTLE HARD FOR THEM  
TO RAISE IT. WE HAVE MADE SOME PROGRESS THERE  
TOWARDS BUILDING A CHURCH. THE FARM THAT WAS  
DONATED FOR THAT PURPOSE HAS BEEN SOLD, & THE  
MEANS ARE IN SUCH A SHAPE THAT THEY ARE NOW AVAL  
ABLE, & IN THE SPRING THE BUILDING WILL BE PUT  
UP, PROVIDENCE PERMITTING.

AT OLD SALEMWE HAVE NOT RECEIVED ANY  
YET BUT I AM EXPECTING TO RECEIVE ONE FROM THE  
BAPTIST CHURCH BY LETTER, & IF SHE DOES COME SHE  
WILL ASK TO BE BAPTISED BY SPRINKLING, SHE IS  
THE WIFE OF ONE OF OUR DEACONS ELECT.

I THINK IF THE EVANGELISTS COULD ONLY COME AND  
HOLD A MEETING THERE WE MIGHT HAVE A NUMBER  
ADDED.

ARE  
THERE ABOUT 22 MEMBERS AT OLD S. & ABOUT 13  
AT ELKTON.

AFTER HAVING BEEN IN THE FIELD SINCE LAST FEB., THIS IS ALL THAT I HAVE TO REPORT. AND AFTER REFLECTING ON THE MATTER FOR SOME TIME, I HAVE COME TO THE CONCLUSION THAT I HAD BETTER TRY ANOTHER FIELD WHERE I MAY BE ABLE TO ACCOMPLISH MORE. I HAVE TALKED TO DR. WITHERSPOON ON THE SUBJECT BEFORE THE SYNOD MET & HE AGREED WITH ME. HE SAID, THEN, IF MR. M. LEFT THE PORTLAND CHURCH HE WOULD PUT MY NAME BEFORE IT, BUT I HAVE NOT HEARD ANY THING FROM HIM SINCE, IF THAT WAS NOT AVAILABLE HE WOULD PUT MY NAME BEFORE SOME OTHER CHURCH. I DO NOT KNOW WHAT HE HAS DONE. I SUPPOSE HE HAS BEEN VERY BUSY WITH HIS LORGE WORK.

IT IS MY DESIRE & MY WIFES DESIRE ALSO THAT WE REMAIN IN KY. & I AM SOME WHAT OF A STRANGER IN THIS STATE, SO WE WOULD BE VERY GREATFUL <sup>IF</sup> YOU WOULD ASSIST US IN FINDING ANOTHER PLACE OF LABOR WHERE WE MAY BE MORE USEFUL, & WHERE OUR SALARY WILL BE A LITTLE BETTER. UP TO THIS TIME I HAVE BEEN SUPPORTING MYSELF & WIFE ON A SALARY OF ABOUT \$700 PER YEAR.

A SINGLE MAN CAN GET ALONG IN THIS FIELD ON

A SALARYD OF \$650 VERY COMFORTABLY & SAVE A LITTLE IF HE IS ECONOMICAL, & I THINK WOULD BE BETTER SUITED FOR THE PLACE AS HE COULD TRAVEL AROUND OVER THE FIELD MORE.

I HAVE THOUGHT THAT THE COMM, MAY BE DISAPPOINTED IN ME & THIS FIELD, I WOULD NOT BLAME THEM IF THEY WERE, FOR I AM DISAPPOINTED MYSELF, BUT I HOPE YOU WILL BE SO KIND AS TO HELP ME SECURE ANOTHER PLACE, WHERE I MAY BE ABLE TO ACCOMPLISH MORE FOR THE MASTER.

WE ARE THOROUGHLY CANVINCED THAT IT IS TIME FOR US TO MAKE A CHANGE, & ANY ASSISTANCE RENDERED WILL BE LONG REMEMBERED WITH THANKFUL HEARTS.

CAN YOU INFORM US WHEN THE NEXT PAYMENT WILL BE MADE?



DEAR BROTHER—

YOUR EXCEEDINGLY KIND

LETTER CAME DULY TO HAND & ITS  
CONTENTS WERE CAREFULLY NOTED, & WILL SAY IN  
REPLY, THAT WE APPRECIATE YOUR DESIRE TO KEEP  
THIS FIELD SUPPLIED AT PRESENT, & WE THANK YOU  
MOST SINCERELY FOR YOUR KIND WORDS OF ENCOURAGE-  
MENT, & WE WISH THAT WE COULD SEE THINGS AS YOU  
DESIRE US TO, BUT IT IS OUR CONVICTION THAT WE  
OUGHT TO MAKE A CHANGE, & THAT AS SOON AS POSSI-  
BLE, THIS IS A FIELD SUITED TO A SINGLE MAN  
BETTER THAN A MARRIED MAN IN MY JUDGMENT, & I  
HAVE BEEN IN FIELDS SOMEWHAT SIMILAR BEFORE.

IF WE MAKE THE CHANGE SOON THEN THERE MAY  
BE SOME CHANCE OF SUPPLYING THE FIELD FROM THE  
SEMINARY. WE RECEIVED THREE MEMBERS ON PRO-  
FESSION OF THEIR FAITH LAST SUNDAY AT OLD SALEM  
BUT THE OUT LOOK IS NOT SUFFICIENT TO JUSTIFY  
US IN EXPECTING THIS FIELD TO BECOME SELF SUS-  
TAINTING IN FIFTEEN YEARS. IF THERE WERE 500  
MEMBERS AT OLD SALEM THEY WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO  
PAY A MINISTER HALF OF HIS SALARY, IF THEY WERE  
IN SUCH CIRCUMSTANCES AS MOST OF THEM ARE NOW IN.  
I THINK THAT IF THE EVANGELISTS COULD COME THERE

THEY MIGHT TAKE IN A NUMBER.

I HOPE THEY MAY COME, & IF I AM AWAY THE NEED OF THEIR COMING WILL BE THAT MUCH THE MORE.

I THINK THAT MR EVANS MIGHT DO A GOOD WORK THERE, NOW PRIVATELY BETWEEN YOU & MYSELF, I HAVE MY DOUBTS ABOUT MR EVANS BEING ABLE TO ACCOMPLISH MUCH AT ELKTON. HE WAS AT THIS PLACE SOME TIME IN THE PAST, & EACH ONE TO WHOM I HAVE SAID ANY THING CONCERNING HIM HAVE EXPRESSED THEMSELVES UNFAVORABLY TOWARDS HIS COMING AGAIN.

I AM VERY SORRY THAT THIS IS THE CASE, BUT I THOUGHT THAT I OUGHT TO INFORM YOU ON THIS MATTER. WERE HE TO COME AGAIN HE MIGHT OVERCOME THOSE FEELINGS & DO A GOOD WORK. I THINK IT MIGHT BE BEST TO WAIT FOR A MEETING THERE UNTIL THE CHURCH IS BUILT & THEN START OFF WITH A MEETING. WE ARE SORRY TO HAVE TO ASK FOR A CHANGE, BUT <sup>YOU</sup> WOULD OBLIGE US VERY MUCH TO ASSIST IN FINDING ANOTHER FIELD. WE WOULD NOT OBJECT SERIOUSLY TO A GROUP OF TWO OR EVEN THREE CHURCHES IF THEY WERE NOT TOO FAR A PART. IN THIS WE TRUST THAT WE ARE NOT ACTING AGAINST THE LORD'S WILL.

The dear Brother -

Yours of Aug. 10. to hand, and I am sorry to hear the unfavorable report about the Evang. Fund.

Not receiving monthly remittance will put us to some inconvenience, as people expect to receive their board money at the end of each month, and do not like to wait on boarders to pay up, and you know of all people in the world, if a minister falls in debt, or is slow about paying board bills, it is thought to be a terrible thing. As you know, I have a wife to support, as well as myself, and up to this time we have just about made "both ends meet," and I have no other resources for a support than the salary I get for preaching, and further, my three churches here, are so weak, and poor, that they cannot pay over \$200. per year.

We can manage to get in money matter until the time you mentioned, if the full salary is then remitted.

We are pleased with the people and place

and so far as we can judge they seem to like us, but I don't think a large church can ever be built up here at Russellville, for the Baptists and Methodists both have large churches here, and each of them have a college here, and there are four other denominations who have churches at this place.

Possibly, in the course of time, a small church might be gathered here. The town is not building up. Our other churches have but little better prospect, but I think if the funds would only hold out, something more than they now are could be made of them.

Can you give me any assurance of the funds holding out after Oct? If not, will you be so kind as to assist me in finding another field that is self supporting, just as soon as possible, for, as you see from above, a little more than five-seventh of my living comes from the Evang. Fund and if that fails and I remain here you can very readily see the predicament I will be in.

And again I am a stranger to the churches of this state.

Your assistance in this matter, I shall take as a great kindness.

I fear very much that I shall not be able to attend <sup>Symod</sup> ~~spoke~~ the reason intimated above.

Dear Brother.

I am sorry to have to do so,  
but my financial circum-  
stances make it necessary.

I have rec'd. no money from  
the Com. for May, June & July,  
and I am in debt for ~~part of~~  
my board for part of that time  
and am in debt for a dr.  
bill, as my wife has been  
sick most of the time since  
last Feb. The dr. here charge  
ministers, which is a good  
indication of the character of  
most of the people here.

My dear Sirs  
I am sorry to say that we  
may pass the winter from  
May 1st till Sept 1st  
in your part of America so  
as to have no prospect of  
paying you for your services  
by your wages - pay us now  
and we will make up the  
difference in value of our  
services & expenses & you may  
pay us back at any time  
you please - we are poor  
now & expect no help - pay  
us what you can & we will  
not be sorry to accept it  
My dear wife & I are  
expecting you soon

I have just returned from  
Louisville with my wife  
whom I took there for medical  
treatment for her eyes, and  
otherwise. This I felt com-  
pelled to do, for the sake of  
her health, and she is now  
improving very encouragingly.

Now as to the collection  
for the Evangelistic work.  
It makes me sad to  
think about it. I have not  
been able to make a collection.  
The people are complaining of  
hard times in money matter  
in this part of the country, &  
the consequence is Old Salem,  
while we have had additions,  
and increase in congregation  
until the house did not hold  
all at my last appointment,  
there seems to be no money ac-

wishes in yr y miss you  
I am very sorry for your  
loss you do very well I am  
very sorry we have had  
many difficulties now in our  
work & I am very sorry for  
you & your wife in  
your time in my way  
to happiness as often as  
you do so much of work  
you may do for me  
as you are now  
your wife has  
been in the collection  
of benevolent men  
now in yr place of work  
for you & for the  
loss of my wife  
you will see my  
opinion of your wife & myself  
you know your opinions  
well you will see

I have only rec'd from them \$30.  
since I have been here

At Elkhorn our house of wor-  
ship is nearing completion  
but they are falling a little  
behind with me, and have  
been able to raise no collec-  
tion for any thing else.

As to Russellville the church  
here is about broken up by  
removals, and I see no hope  
for its salvation. You can  
now understand why I am  
so anxious to find another  
field.

Hoping that I have  
made plain my condition,

Report of W. O. Stephen,  
Evangelist of Sagan & Todd Co.  
to the Evan. Com.

I have been preaching regularly  
at three different points.

According to the direction of  
the Com. and presbytery, I  
have been giving half of my  
time to Russellville, but it  
seems that the providence of  
God has not been favorable  
to me in our church work at  
this point. I am sorry to report  
that I have found it neces-  
sary to quit preaching at Rus-  
sellville, for the reason that  
all but four or five presby-  
terians have moved away, and  
three of those four are so infirm

that they never are able to attend church. The ground is so occupied that my congregation does not amount to more than half a dozen & some times less. As I have been here over a year I see no use in wasting time in this part of the field.

I have been endeavoring to find in those two vacant Sundays at any place I can,

The field is so taken up by other denomination that some Sundays I am compelled to be idle. I have visited Auburn and Adairville but there is no encouragement at either of these places.

I am happy to say that I have something better to

say about Elkhorn & Old Salem. I do not feel that my work at these places has been entirely in vain, but it is far from what I would like to report.

At Elkhorn I have been preaching once in each month. The congregation have been tolerably good, but somewhat fluctuating. Four members have been received there, three by letter, and one<sup>on</sup> profession of his faith in <sup>the</sup> old man, 85 years of age, now. One of our members died, and one was dismissed. Our church has felt so weak that it has not contributed to any of

the parson of the church.  
The salary that they promised  
has been pretty well  
kept up, but they have fallen  
a little behind in that.

Taking the church as a whole  
I think it is in a better  
condition now than it was  
some time back, spiritually.

The Methodist have been  
very kind in giving us the  
use of their church for our ser-  
vices. A very beautiful,  
brick, building, with seat-  
ing capacity for 200, is now  
complete. It is to be dedicated  
on the 5th Sunday of Sept.  
We are now, as you see, about  
to move into a new home of  
our own.

## Old Salem.

I have been giving one Sunday in each month to this country church. The congregation has increased in number until some time the house is too small. We have elected & installed two deacons, the first the church has ever had in its history of at least 75 years. We now have a Sunday School there and services once per month between the preaching appointments, conducted by the members. The S.S. has about 30 scholars.

Not being able to secure the aid of the Synodical evangelist, we undertook a

meeting, and looked up for  
Divine help, and it came.  
The meeting lasted 8 days  
including two Sundays &  
preached 16 sermons, and the  
church seemed to be thoroughly  
revived, a greater number than  
usual taking part in public  
prayer. Four have been added  
on profession of their faith  
in Christ during, and since,  
the meeting, which makes  
nine who have been received  
since the last meeting of  
Synods, all on profession  
except one. The erection of a  
new building is now being  
agitated strongly among the  
members.
