

Please let me hear at once



I would prefer a more compact field one of less traveling, but if you think this is the best you can do for me if all things can be arranged satisfactorily I am willing to undertake the work. This seems to be a rather difficult field from which to get large results, & I am inclined to think that nothing short of hard, persevering patient effort will accomplish anything - a reason for the postscript perhaps.



not likely to be done


I am willing to do the best I can
