Fraternities may ban LCC pledges

After winning the regional American Advertising Federation Competition the 19-\

The UK fraternity system is considering banning Lexington Community College men from pledging UK fraternities in or-der to raise grade-point aver-

ages.
This week, Interfraternity
Council President Josh Knipp
and the 18 fraternity presidents
will discuss three options:
Not allowing LCC students

Not allowing students to join until after the first semester, without a stipulation on their GPA.

GPA.

"I'm trying to make sure the all-fraternity average is above and always stays above the allmen's average," Knipp said. The all-men's average is the all-male GPA on campus.

Tony Blanton, adviser of fra-ternities, researched LCC GPAs within the Greek system. The 99

LCC fraternity men, out of about 1,100 overall members, had a GPA of 2.23 at the end of the

GPA of 2.23 at the end of the spring 1998 semester.

The Lexington campus student fraternity men had a GPA of 2.82, which is the all-men's average. When combined, the cumulative all-fraternity average was 2.78, Blanton said.

"I'm not saying everyone at LCC is a bad student, but we need to take a look at some criteria, which we will use to affiliate them to our organization," Blanton said. "I think anything we can do to pledge people who are good students is helpful to the system."

System."

One reason such a strong emphasis is being placed on

raising the all-men's average is because IFC scholarships are based on it, Blanton said.

Another incentive is having unlimited social events throughout the semester. Last year a scholarship bill passed that placed social restrictions on fraternities that did not meet the all-men's average, Knipp said. A fraternity that failed to meet the average is limited to four social events during the following semester.

With fewer than 10 percent of the fraternity men coming from LCC, basing the discussion solely on LCC students is unfair, LCC Sen. Brian Biermann said.

"I think it's silly on behalf of

it's discrimination."

LCC students are allowed to participate in all events on the UK campus, with the exception of NCAA sports.

The results from the discussion will be formed into a bill and voted on during the Oct. 26 IFC meeting. The bill will need a two-thirds majority vote to pass.

Knipp emphasized that the three options are open to change.

Graduate **GPA** needs raised

Undergrads will need 2.75 GPA to qualify for graduate school

If graduate school is in your future, a
2.5 undergraduate grade-point average will
no longer be sufficient.

This decision was made by the University Senate Monday in the William T.
Young Library.

The minimum GPA requirement for admission was raised from 2.5 to 2.75.
Also, the Graduate Record Examination test analytical section will now be considered in selecting graduate students. Before, only the verbal and quantitative sections were used.

"This will raise the expectation of the image of UK, said Mike Nietzel, dean of the Graduate School.

Nietzel said it does not seem unreasonable to require a minimum grade-point average of 2.75. That is below the graduate grade-point average of 3.0 that mandates academic probation.

A discussion was made to raise the undergraduate grade-point average requirement for graduate school applicants even higher, to 3.0.

"There has been a lot of concern about balancing the access among students and having a standard as high as 3.0," Nietzel said. "But I think a 2.75 is reasonable ... it balances the access and shows high standards."

The Senate also approved a proposal to require undergraduate students to declare a major within their first 60 credit hours. The proposal was developed by the Undergraduate Council to help students make decisions about their career and major within a reasonable amount of time

It will not affect current students, but will apply to undergraduates entering the University in the fall of 1999.

The proposal was not designed to discourage experimentation by students nor prevent them from attempting more than one career path, according to a report to the Senate from the Undergraduate Coun-

cil.

As of now, 500 juniors or seniors at UK have not declared a major and are not expected to graduate in the near future, the report said.

When students have earned 45 hours and haven't chosen a major, they will be required to meet with an adviser regularly until a major has been decided.

Students who fail to declare a major after earning 60 hours will have a registration stop placed on their record until they choose a major.

K.I.T.E. aids minority students

UK is one of several partners in a new program designed to help minority high schools students prepare for college and successful careers. The program — Kids, Ideas and Talents in Education, Inc. — was started by Donald Cordray, editor and publisher of the Community Voice. Cordray will serve as the director of the K.I.T.E. Communication Academy. "I came up with the idea

the director of the K.I.T.E.
Communication Academy.

"I came up with the idea to train students to be writers and reporters for the Community Voice," Cordray said.
Cordray added that after doing more research into the subject, he decided the program should be focused on all aspects of communication.

"Our challenge is to show these students where they can go with communication," Cordray said. "First and foremost, every student, whether involved in this program or any other must realize, "Nothing, can happen without some form of communication."

Students in the program include 19 sophomores, and Juniors and seniors from several high schools in Lexington. These students spend up to 20 hours a month in learning sessions outside of their regular class work.

The program is free, and

class work.

The program is free, and students are compensated for their time with a \$5-per-hour stipend.

The stipend is deposited directly into the students' bank accounts. Students may remove up to half of the money in one year.



German House will be demolished by UK, forcing students to find new place to live

Students living at the German House almost found themselves exiled to Never-neverland. The City of Lexington requested that UK renovate or demolish the house because it was too run-down. UK concluded that renovating the house was not cost-effective and planned demolition for the end of the field of the compart of Procurement and Construction Ken Clevidence said, leaving some students without a home.

After many heated complaints from the faculty in the German department and the students themselves. UK received permission from the Lexington code enforcement office to delay the demolition until June 1999.

said he had been angry because the University originally told the students they would have to be out by the end of the semes-ter.

Much of the response UK received from the faculty and students was because of the short notice given to the residents of the house. Clevidence said UK was sticking by its contract and its budget.



Linebacker and captain Jeff Snedegar, who is returning this week after reaggravating an old shoulder injury two weeks ago, said stopping the run would be top priority.

"We're gonna be more focused on the run," he said. "But (LSU quarterback Herb) Tyler's like a third running back back there, so that makes it even harder to do."

The Wildcats' seven-game winning streak ended Sunday with a 4-0 loss to the Akron Zips.

"They came to play," assistant coach Tim Bennett said.

The Cats held the Zips to a 0-0 score through the first thaif, but Christer Larsen of the Zips smashed two goals past UK goalie Brian O'Leary early in the second half. The third and fourth goals came in the 71st and 75th minutes of the game.

"We showed up in the first half," Bennett said, "but winning on the road against Buffalo is a great victory. We were satisfied with that."

The Wildcats faced and beat the Buffalo Bulls in Buffalo, N.Y. on Friday. The game was significant for the team, because it reinforced the idea that they can win on the road and

Pi opens with its lead char er Maximillian Cohen nar

Asia economic crisis demands a response

Asia has been the world's economic miracle for the last 15 years. Many experts predicted that Asia would overtake the United States and Europe as the world's economic power.

Why are these economic tigers now facing collapsing currencies and plunging stock markets' Thailand, Indonesia and South Korea, the world's 11th largest economy, had to obtain outside economic help. Even the world's second-largest economy, Japan, looks vulnerable. One key reason for collapsing Asian economies is that they chose to borrow and expand beyond their capabilities.

Now facing a global financial crisis, the United States can choose to express its world leadership by restoring economic stability to Asia and Russia. Or we can choose to keep our hands off, thinking that it is just another restricted regional crisis. Alan Greenspan, Federal Reserve Board chairman, in his recent testimony to a Senate committee, said, "It is just not credible that the United States, or for that matter, Europe, can remain an oasis of prosperity unaffected by a world that is experiencing same by increased distress."

College students not immune to pressures

Academic pressures, relationship problems and adjusting to a new environment are just some of the causes for stress and anxiety, which can lead to depression among college students.

Janet Jones, a staff psychiatrist at the UK Mental Health Clinic, says depression is the primary reason students come to the Student Health Services.

Depression is a treatable illness that can affect men and women of all ages, races and economic levels. Some symptoms of depression include feelings of hopelessness, pessimism, guilt, loss of interest or pleasure in ordinary activities, sleep disturbances, eating disturbances (either an increase or decrease in appetite), decreased energy or fatigue and thoughts of death or suicide. For some students, depression interferes with their academic performance.

Students should seek help if symptoms of depression persist for several weeks, become more severe or lead to destructive thoughts and behavior.

"Many students who come to the University Health Service thinking they have a physical problem often are suffering from mental illnesses such as depression." Jones said.

Headaches, digestive disorders and chronic pain that doesn't respond to medication can be signs of depression.

The most common cause of depression is the loss of personal worth and self-

esteem often brought on by external factors, such as the break up of a friendship or romance, a divorce or separation of parents or the death of a loved one. Internal factors, such as unrealistic standards and assumptions, lack of effective coping skills and feelings of lack of support also are common precipitants of depression for college students.

Last year, the UK Mental Health Clinic recorded more than 3,000 visits by students, Jones said. Some were receiving care for the first time, while others were continuing treatment they had begun at home. The clinic works closely with the UK Counseling and Testing Center and refers students with more "situational" problems to group and individual counseling sessions.

Jones said a combination of psychotherapy and medication is the treatment generally used for students with more severe problems. Today's medications are much better than those used in the past and have fewer side effects. Although a stigma still exists, education and awareness regarding mental illness, has led to an increase in the number of people seeking treatment.




