Irregularities

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, December 13, 1949.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:10 a.m., Tuesday, December 13, 1949. The following members were present: Guy A. Huguelet, Vice Chairman; Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, T. H. Cutler, Dr. W. M. Coffee, George H. Cheek, J. Woodford Howard, Harper Gatton, H. D. Palmore, R. P. Hobson, John C. Everett, and Judge Harry F. Walters. Absent were: Governor Earle C. Clements, Boswell B. Hodgkin, Carl Dempewolfe, and Judge E. C. O'Rear. During the meeting, a telegram was received from Judge O'Rear, expressing his regret that he was unable to be present. President Donovan and Secretary Peterson met with the Board.

A. Minutes Approved.

The minutes of the Board of Trustees of September 20, 1949, were approved as published; the minutes of the Executive Committee of October 15, 1949, were approved as published; and the minutes of the Executive Committee of November 19, 1949, were approved with the following correction:

"Delete Item R, concerning transfer of State Law Library papers, and substitute the following:

"President Donovan stated that he had been informed that the Court of Appeals had agreed to the State Law Library transferring bound Kentucky newspapers to the University of Kentucky Library. He stated that he desired to recommend that the volumes be accepted and that, in accepting, these promises be made; '....that the editions be cleaned and stored in a place suited to the preservation of newspapers. I should like, also, to recommend to the University Board that it agree to the supplying of duplicate micro-films of the editions when and if such are made."

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in.

B. Report of the Comptroller.

The Comptroller submitted the financial report for the period July 1 to November 30, 1949, inclusive, and read the following analysis of the report:

The report was examined in some detail, questions of members of the Board were answered, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report of the Comptroller was ordered received and made a part of the minutes.

C. Report of the President.

President Donovan read the following statement to the Board:

"Building for Department of Journalism

"This is a success story which is of particular interest to Kentuckians because the entire personnel and the locale involved are centered on the campus of the University. It is a story very likely without parallel on any campus in this country—or elsewhere.

"The story is that of the building of the printing facilities of the University during the last twenty-five years under the direction of the Department of Journalism. On June 30, 1949, the report of the Comptroller revealed that the assets of this project had reached \$145,786.38—and every dollar of this sum had been earned to that date without the investment of a penny of the University's funds.

"But beyond the citing of total assets there are other phases of the story which should be pointed out.

"In the building of these printing facilities, now known as The Kentucky Kernel Press, there have been created laboratories for the teaching of journalism without which the Department of Journalism would find it difficult to maintain its place among the 38 accredited schools of journalism in the United States. Such accreditation, however, has been held for the last 18 years.

"Hundreds of young men and young women have learned the basic principles of successful publishing here and have gone on to responsible positions in Kentucky and elsewhere throughout the nation.

"Student publication activities, built around the printing facilities, serve as models for others both in Kentucky and outside the Commonwealth. It is not just by chance that the Kentucky high school and the intercollegiate press organizations, as well as the Kentucky Press Association, maintain their headquarters at the University of Kentucky.

"In the printing plant scores of young men and young women have found employment by which they have earned all or part of their expenses, enabling them to continue their studies at the University.

"Here, too, has been kept alive the journalistic tradition of printing a student newspaper which is now past its fifty-fifth year on the campus.

mentum to undertake the fast and economical production of all the printing services required by the University. From this expanded activity is expected to come the funds necessary to underwrite the bonds for the erection of a new building to house the plant, student publications, and the Department of Journalism. Further, the printing facilities and the personnel are now ready to aid the University substantially in its effort to move forward in the publication of scholarly books.

"The building of a printing plant for the University was first envisioned just 25 years ago by the late Enoch Grehan, head of the Department of Journalism from 1914 until his death in 1937. In the years prior to 1924, Professor Grehan and his students struggled to publish the student newspaper, The Kernel, through the services of commercial printers. High costs actually threatened the continued publication of the newspaper. So it was that Professor Grehan proposed that the student newspaper purchase a type-setting machine on a deferred payment plan, letting earnings of the newspaper pay off the debt.

"It is not surprising that there was considerable doubt on the campus concerning the practicality of the proposal since the debt was to be \$2,000, and campus experience with student publications in the past gave little cause for optimism. As a matter of fact, minutes of the faculty dating from the days of President Patterson indicate financial troubles with student publications and notations are to be found requiring that a student editor post bonds to cover all possible losses to subscribers and printers.

"But Professor Grehan believed in his proposal and he offered to guarantee the payment of the cost of the typesetting machine. He placed his signature on a note for the \$2,000 debt. This was the beginning of the project which had assets of more than \$145,000 at the beginning of the present fiscal year. In 1925 a small two-page press was purchased, further increasing the indebtedness, but augmenting the earning power of the newspaper. Then, slowly, piece by piece, year by year, the plant was expanded. After a while the plant was able to handle small printing orders for students. This work added to the income derived from the sales of advertising. Fersonnel, too, was slowly recruited.

"During one period of the growth of the printing plant Mr. James Shropshire, a graduate of the University, served as Director of Student Publications and was of great help to Professor Grehan and to the present head of the Department of Journalism.

"Mr. W. D. Grote, manager of the printing plant for the last 10 years, is another of the University's graduates who has given effectively to building the plant, especially during the difficult war years.

"Not until the Board of Trustees created the Department of Business Management and Control under Mr. Frank D. Peterson did the finances of the printing plant and of student publications become a direct responsibility of the University. The transition was made easily. The operations moved into a new era of service and of profit.

"In 1946 the Legislature enacted a statute under which the University might use the printing facilities on the campus for servicing materials which hitherto had been required by law to be processed by the State Frinter. It soon became evident that printing services could be obtained on the campus much faster than at Frankfort, and that by a modest expansion of plant and personnel practically the entire printing needs of the University could be met without delay.

"Accordingly, last spring the President asked Mr. Peterson and others associated in the printing activities to plan to meet all printing needs of the University. They recommended the expansion of the printing plant over the area in McVey Hall then used for journalism instruction, the purchase of approximately \$60,000 of new equipment, the transferring of the Department of Journalism to quarters elsewhere on the campus until such time as printing and journalism could be reassembled in one building, and the recruiting of new personnel to man the enlarged plant.

"These recommendations have now been carried out. The new machinery, which was installed in mid-September, has increased the assets of the printing facilities to more than \$200,000, and the new personnel requirements were met by mid-October. All University printing is now being sent to the campus plant.

"Since the Book Store was leased to Mr. James E. Morris 19 years ago, the income to the University from this agency has been carefully and scrupulously saved and kept segregated from other funds for the purpose of taking over the Book Store any time the present arrangement might prove unsatisfactory. However, this arrangement with Mr. Morris has been eminently satisfactory and there appears to be no reason why all of this money should be held in escrow any longer.

"It is my recommendation that we take the funds earned by the Kentucky Kernel Press, less the necessary operating reserve, and such part of the Book Store fund as may be needed, to meet one-half of the cost of the Journalism Building, and that we use this money to pay half the cost of erecting a building that will house the Department of Journalism and the Kentucky Kernel Press properly. The other half of the cost of the building would be paid for out of bonds which would be retired over a period of twenty years.

"This arrangement will result in our erecting another building on the campus of the University without a dollar's expense to the taxpayers of Kentucky.

ment since its establishment. It has not had a permanent home at any time, often located in basements of buildings, and now scattered over the campus in two or more buildings. This arrangement is highly unsatisfactory. A new building will enable this department to serve the students interested in Journalism much more effectively than heretofore and it will give us the kind of a printing plant that is essential to our printing needs.

"Proposed Budget for the Next Biennium

"Trustees of universities and colleges have always regarded it one of their chief functions to help secure the budgets of their institutions. This is true both in privately and in publicly supported colleges and universities. The laws of the State of Kentucky place upon the Board of Trustees of fifteen members responsibility for the University and for its proper development. The members of the Board are persons of distinction and of great influence, representing every part of Kentucky. If they believe in the University's proposed budget request to the Governor and to the General Assembly, they can do much toward interpreting this budget and the needs of the University to the officers of the state.

"Late last summer, at the request of the Department of Finance, we presented our budget to that department. Much work went into the preparation of this document by the various administrative officers, and by the deans and heads of the departments of the University. We presented a realistic budget that was nowhere padded. We did not request a larger sum than we felt was necessary, with the idea that it would be cut down to the size required to take care of the various departments and colleges of the University. We outlined the minimum requirements.

"The largest addition was requested in the division of colleges. Here we asked for an increase of \$550,000 for 1950-51 and \$750,000 for 1951-52. These increases were not requested with a view of expanding the work of the University, except in three or four minor respects. The request was

necessary for another reason. At the present time we have 2,850 veteran students, for each of whom we are collecting from the Federal Government tuition amounting to \$210 more than the fee paid by a non-veteran. This amounts to an appropriation of \$598,500 per year to the University from the Federal Government. We are confident that between 1500 and 1800 veterans will be graduated this year or leave the University for other reasons. This will mean a loss of approximately \$378,000 from Federal funds for the first year of the biennium and by the end of the second year almost a complete loss of the current income from the Veterans Administration. Already we have about 1800 veterans fewer than we had at the peak load in the school year 1947-48.


"If our enrollment were reduced in the same proportion as we are losing the veteran, the problem would not be so But while we anticipate a slight loss in enrollserious. ment. the number of freshman students will in a large measure offset the veteran loss. Instead of veterans we shall have civilian students who pay the incidental fee only, and the result will be a loss in University income of \$210 per stu-In other words, over the period in which the veteran student has predominated, the state has been saving a large sum of money as a result of the federal subsidy. In fall of 1948 we had an enrollment of 7,929 students. In the fall our enrollment was 7,687. It is obvious from these figures that the enrollment of the University is going to remain high when the veterans have all dropped out of the institution. As a matter of fact, the enrollment would not have come down at all, but instead would have increased, if we had had adequate residence halls.

"If the state does not make up at least a large part of the loss in federal tuition, some drastic measures will be necessary. The only thing that the University could do to balance its budget would be first to eliminate all expenditures for instructional materials, for most of the books for the library, and for scientific equipment. If this did not suffice, and it would not, the next step would necessarily be that of dropping a number of the staff and faculty, thereby increasing teaching loads and class size. This would in turn certainly get us into trouble with the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and jeopardize our accredited status. Finally, it might be necessary to cut the salaries of teachers, research specialists, and other staff members. If this came to pass there would be an exodus from the campus of the very people we must keep if we are to build a greater university.

"I am not 'viewing this situation with alarm' merely to get somebody excited. I am simply stating the facts that the trustees and the public are entitled to have. I would be derelict in my duty, should I see disaster in the making for the University, and fail to give proper warning."

A REALISTIC BUDGET

That our proposed budget is a realistic one, we need only to point out what the Governors and Legislatures of the bordering states have appropriated this past year for their universities.

Study the above map and see if you do not agree that Kentucky should receive the appropriation it is requesting. If the General Assembly approves our request, Kentucky will still be receiving less money than any of her neighbors. Complete figures could not be verified for the appropriation made to the University of Virginia.

From Mr. J. J. Walker, Treasurer of the University of Tennessee, we received a letter in which he says: "The last Legislature appropriated for operating expenses the sum of \$4,375,000.00 (for 1949-50) for capital outlay, \$2,500,000.00." Certainly Kentucky should support its university as generously as the State of Tennessee supports its university.

A general discussion concerning construction of the Kentucky Kernel-Journalism Building and the budget for the next biennium followed. Much interest in the next budget, on the part of the members of the Board, was expressed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the President's report was received and ordered made a part of the minutes.

D. Bids for Construction of the Kentucky Kernel-Journalism Building Considered.

President Donovan stated that, pursuant to direction of the Board of Trustees, the Comptroller secured bids for construction of the Kentucky Kernel-Journalism building. He distributed a tabulation of the bids, which tabulation was examined by each member of the Board.

The base bids submitted were as follows:

Hargett Construction Company, Lexington\$422,165.00 Grayson Jones Construction Company, Lexington 447,325.00 George H. Rommel Construction Company, Louisville 448,000.00 Wehr Construction Company, Louisville 477,000.00 J. Henry Hall, Louisville 590,270.00.

The President reported that the bids had been checked by the architects and officials of the University, and it was their recommendation that Alternate #1 (substitute common bond brickwork for Flemish bond brickwork) be rejected, that Alternate #2 (to do all interior painting) be accepted, that the Board approve awarding the contract to Hargett Construction Company, in the gross amount of \$424,112.00 (including Alternate #2), and recommend acceptance by the State Property and Building Commission.

Members of the Board being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President, the architects and officials of the University was concurred in, and the bid of Hargett Construction Company authorized accepted.

E. <u>University of Kentucky Journalism Building Revenue Bonds Authorization and Notice of Sale.</u>

President Donovan, having reported to the Board on the desirability of constructing a Journalism building, recommended that a part of the cost of construction be raised through the issuance of revenue bonds under Section 162.340 Kentucky Revised Statutes, and produced a resolution calling for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds. He read the following opinion from the Attorney General:

Dear Frank:

Re: University of Kentucky Journalism Building Revenue Bonds

I have examined a copy of the prepared resolution to be adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, providing for the issuance, sell, and delivery of the Journalism Building Revenue Bonds of the University of Kentucky, to provide for the construction of a building for this purpose upon the campus of the University of Kentucky.

This resolution appears to me to be in proper legal form and when adopted by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, it is my opinion, it will meet all legal requirements, and will properly authorize the University of Kentucky to sell the Revenue Bonds, mentioned in said resolution.

The funds from the sale of these bonds are to be used for the construction of the Journalism Building on the campus of the University of Kentucky.

Whereupon Member Harper Gatton introduced and caused to be read the following proposed resolution entitled "A Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky providing for the issuance, sale and delivery of Journalism Building Revenue Bonds of the University of Kentucky, to provide funds (to the extent not otherwise provided) for the construction of a Journalism Building upon the campus of the University of Kentucky", which Resolution and Notice of Sale of Bonds are as follows:

WHEREAS, the University of Kentucky and its students are not now being provided with adequate buildings for educational purposes and in order to provide the same, the Board of Trustees of the University has heretofore directed that plans and specifications for a Journalism Building be prepared to house the School of Journalism and the Kentucky Kernel printing establishment which is used in training journalism students, and such plans and specifications have now been completed and submitted and approved; and

WHEREAS, the State Property and Buildings Commission has also approved said plans and specifications, as well as the issuance of the bonds authorized hereby; and

WHEREAS, bids for the construction of said building according to the approved plans and specifications have been received and it has been made to appear, to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees, that said building may be completed at a cost of not to exceed Four Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$475,000.00); and the University now has on hand, in available funds, the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) which has been appropriated to apply against such construction costs, leaving a balance in the sum of approximately Two Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000) presently to be raised; and

WHEREAS, under the provisions of Section 162.340 and succeeding sections of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky as the governing body of said state educational institution, is authorized to issue bonds as hereinafter provided for the purpose of financing the cost of said new building to the extent not otherwise provided (said Journalism Building together with appurtenances being hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Project"):

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. In order to provide for the payment of the costs of the Project not otherwise provided, there shall be and there are hereby ordered to be issued by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, in its corporate capacity and by and through its corporate name, and as a state educational institution and agency, Journalism Building Revenue Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of Two Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000.00), dated January 1, 1950, consisting of Two Hundred Twenty-Five (225) bonds of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each, which shall be numbered consecutively from One (1) to Two Hundred Twenty-Five (225), inclusive, and which shall bear interest to be evidenced by coupons attached to each bond payable semi-annually on each July 1 and January 1 to the respective maturity dates of

principal, such interest to be at one or more interest rates (not to exceed Three and One-Half per cent (3½%) per annum) to be established by competitive bidding when the bonds are offered for public sale as hereinafter provided. Said bonds shall mature serially and in numerical order as follows:

provided, however, that any of said bonds shall be redeemable prior to stated maturities, as a whole, or from time to time in part, in the inverse order of their numbering on any interest payment date, providing a notice specifying the bonds to be redeemed shall have been on file at the place of payment of principal and interest at least Thirty (30) days prior to the specified redemption date and provided also that such notice shall have been published at least once not less than Thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date in a newspaper having general circulation throughout Kentucky. In the event any of the bonds shall be called for redemption in the manner above set forth, the University of Kentucky shall pay to the owner and holder of each such bond the face amount thereof together with interest to the redemption date at the applicable coupon rate and together with additional interest which shall be in the sum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per bond if the redemption date is prior to January 1, 1955; Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) per bond if the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1955 but prior to January 1, 1958; Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per bond if the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1958 but prior to January 1, 1960; Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per bond if the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1960 but prior to January 1, 1963; and Five Dollars (\$5.00) per bond if the redemption date is prior to January 1, 1965. If the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1965,

no premium shall be due or payable. If, on or prior to the specified redemption date, the University of Kentucky shall deposit at the place of payment of said bonds the amounts then due to the bondholders as herein provided, the bonds called for redemption shall cease to bear interest as of the redemption date.

Section 2. Said bonds shall be signed for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky by the Chairman of said Board of Trustees, attested by its Secretary, and sealed with its corporate seal, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed with the facsimile signatures of said Chairman and Secretary, and said bonds, together with the interest thereon, shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of the Security Trust Company in the City of Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky, but only out of the "Journalism Building Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund," hereinafter created, and shall be a valid claim of the holders thereof only against said fund and against the gross income and revenues of the Project pledged to such fund.

Section 3. The aforesaid bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following form, to-wit:

The University of Kentucky, by its Board of Trustees and as a state educational institution and agency, for value received, hereby promises to pay to the bearer, or if this bond be registered, to the registered holder hereof, as hereinafter provided, the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) on the first day of January, 19____, with interest thereon from the date hereof until paid, at the rate of per cent (______%) per annum, payable semi-annually on each July 1 and January 1, except as the provisions hereinafter set forth with respect to prior redemption may be and become applicable hereto, such interest as may accrue on and prior to the maturity date of this bond to be paid only upon presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as they severally mature, both principal and interest being payable in lawful money of the United States of America, at the office of the Security Trust Company in the City of Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky.

The right is hereby reserved to call and redeem all bonds of the series of which this bond is a part, as may from time to time be outstanding, prior to their respective stated maturities, as a whole, or from time to time in part, in the inverse order of their numbering, on any interest payment date, providing a notice specifying the bonds to be redeemed shall have been on file at the place of payment of principal hereof and interest hereon at least Thirty (30) days prior thereto, and provided such notice shall have been published at least once not less than Thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date in a newspaper having general circulation throughout Kentucky. In the event any of said bonds shall be called for redemption prior to their stated maturities, as herein provided, the University of Kentucky will pay to the owners and holders the face amount thereof, together with interest to the specified redemption date at the coupon rate, and together with additional interest which shall be in the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per bond if the redemption date is prior to January 1, 1955; Twenty Dollars (\$20,00) per bond if the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1955 but prior to January 1, 1958; Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) per bond if the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1958, but prior to January 1, 1960; Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per bond if the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1960 but prior to January 1, 1963; and Five Dollars (\$5.00) per bond if the redemption date is prior to January 1, 1965. If the redemption date is on or after January 1, 1965, no additional interest shall be due or payable. If, on or prior to such redemption date, the University of Kentucky shall have deposited at the place of payment of principal and interest the sum to which the holders of said redeemed bonds will be entitled, as herein provided, then said bonds shall cease to bear interest as of the redemption date.

This bond is issued for the purpose of financing the cost, not otherwise provided, of a Journalism Building and appurtenances for educational purposes in connection with the University of Kentucky under and in full compliance with the Constitution and Statutes of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, including, among others, Sections 162.340 to 162.380, inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

This bond is payable only from a fixed amount of the gross income and revenues to be derived from the operation of said Journalism Building and appurtenances (including the Kentucky Kernel and other printing facilities which will be housed in said building), which will be set aside as a special fund and pledged for that purpose and identified as the "Journalism Building Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund," and this bond does not constitute an indebtedness of the University of Kentucky or its Board of Trustees or of the Commonwealth of Kentucky within the meaning of any constitutional provisions or limitations.

A statutory mortgage lien, which is hereby recognized as valid and binding on said Journalism Building and appurtenances

is created and granted to and in favor of the holder or holders of this bond and the series of which it is a part and in favor of the holder or holders of the coupons attached thereto, and said Journalism Building and appurtenances (including said Kentucky Kernel and other printing facilities housed therein) shall remain subject to such statutory mortgage lien until the payment in full of the principal of and interest on this bond and the series of which it is a part.

This bond is fully negotiable but may be registered as to principal only on the books of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, such registration to be evidenced by notation thereof on the reverse hereof by said Secretary, after which no transfer of this bond shall be valid unless made on said books at the written request of the registered owner or his authorized representative and similarly noted on the reverse hereof. But this bond may be discharged from registry by being registered to bearer, and thereafter transferability by delivery shall be restored. Registration of this bond as aforesaid shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons appurtenant hereto, which shall continue to be transferable by delivery merely and shall remain payable to bearer.

IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED, RECITED AND DECLARED, That all acts, conditions and things required to exist, happen and be performed precedent to and in the issuance of this bond do exist, have happened and have been performed in due time, form and manner as required by law, and the amount of this bond, together with all other obligations of said University of Kentucky and its Board of Trustees, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or Statutes of Kentucky; that said Journalism Building and appurtenances (and Kentucky Kernel and other printing facilities housed therein) will be continuously operated by said University of Kentucky, and that a sufficient portion of the gross income and revenues therefrom has been pledged to and will be set aside into a special account for the payment of the principal of and interest on this bond and the series of which it is a part, as the same will respectively become due.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky has caused this bond to be signed by its Chairman, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, attested by the Secretary, and the coupons hereto attached to be executed with the facsimile signatures of said Chairman and said Secretary, who, by the signing of this bond, do adopt said facsimile signatures, and each of them, to be their respective authorized and official signatures; all as of the First day of January, 1950.

Section 4. The Project shall be completed as expeditiously as may be (the estimated completion date being May 31, 1950), and continuously thereafter it shall be operated as a revenue-producing undertaking on a fiscal year basis ending on December 31 of each year, and on that basis the gross income and revenues of said Project shall be sufficient so as to set aside the required amounts (hereinafter specified) into a separate and special fund designated the "Journal Building Revenue Fund" (hereinafter called the "Revenue Fund").

It is hereby represented and declared that in addition to other charges fixed and imposed for attendance at the University, the Board of Trustees of said University has heretofore and so long as any of the bonds herein authorized are outstanding, will continue to fix, impose, charge and collect an "Incidental Registration Fee", which all students have been and will continue to be required to pay and a portion of which has been and will continue to be allocated annually for subscriptions to the Kentucky Kernel, a newspaper published by the School of Journalism of

said University for the purpose of training journalism students. Inasmuch as a substantial portion of the Journalism Building has been designed to accommodate a portion of the necessary printing facilities of the Kentucky Kernel and other printing facilities of the School of Journalism, it is covenanted and agreed on behalf of said Board of Trustees that said portion of said building will continuously be set aside and used for that purpose and that a substantial portion of the fees allocated to student subscriptions for said Kentucky Kernel from said "Incidental Registration Fee" will constitute income and revenues of the Journalism Building.

It is further represented and declared that a substantial portion of said Journalism Building has been designed to accommodate and will be continuously used for the purpose of accommodating printing facilities of said School of Journalism for the purpose of instructing students in printing, said facilities being used, and hereafter to be used, to serve the printing needs of the various schools and branches of the University, as authorized by KRS 57.045; that the University has in the past, does now, and so long as any of the bonds hereby authorized remain outstanding, will continue to charge to itself and to all of its independent departments, agencies and schools (including the Kentucky Agricultural Experimental Station maintained at the University), sums representing a fair and reasonable charge for the value of services so rendered; that such charges have been and will continue to be fixed in such amounts as to defray all expenses in connection with the rendering of said services and in addition thereto, yield a profit; and that such profit will constitute and represent income and revenues of the said Journalism Building.

It is, therefore, hereby covenanted and agreed on behalf of said Board of Trustees that annually when fixing the amount of such "Incidental Registration Fee" and from time to time when fixing the amounts of charges for printing services rendered by said Kentucky Kernel and other printing facilities housed in said Journalism Building, due account will be taken of the services and facilities provided in that connection by said Journalism Building; that the portion of the "Incidental Registration Fee" allocated annually to student subscriptions to said Kentucky Kernel, and the charges from time to time fixed for said printing services rendered in and by said building will continue to take into account the services and facilities of said Journalism Building; that the aggregate of all amounts thus allocated and charged will be sufficient each year to discharge all expenditures properly chargeable to said printing activities operated therein and in addition an amount which will be sufficient at all times to make the required payments into the "Journalism Building Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund" and pay costs of operation and maintenance (including insurance) of said Journalism Building.

There shall be and there is hereby created a fund to be known as the "Journalism Building Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund" (hereinafter called the "Bond Fund") into which there shall be set aside from the moneys held in the Revenue Fund such amounts as will be sufficient to pay the interest on and principal of the bonds hereby authorized, as may be outstanding from time to time. It is hereby agreed that during the fiscal year ending December 31, 1950, the amount to be set aside into said fund shall be \$18,875.00, the same to include all sums received as accrued interest in the issuance of said bonds and also a sufficient portion of the proceeds of said bonds equal to the interest to accrue thereon during the construction period of the Project. The amount to be set aside into said fund each fiscal year thereafter so long as any of said bonds remain outstanding shall be not less than as set forth in the following schedule:

The amounts set forth above for the respective fiscal years have been computed upon the assumption that after proposals for the sale and purchase of said bonds have been received, the interest rate with respect to said bonds will be fixed by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees at Three and One-Half per cent (3½%) per annum, the amount set forth for each fiscal year being a sum sufficient to pay interest (at that assumed rate) maturing on July 1 of such fiscal year and upon January 1 of the ensuing fiscal year, together with principal maturing on January 1 of such succeeding fiscal year. In the event that the interest rate or rates established by resolution of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees at the time of sale shall differ from said assumed rate of 3½% per annum, the minimum annual amounts to be set aside into the Bond Fund shall be higher or lower in order to accomplish the same results.

All funds received as accrued interest at the time of the issuance of said bonds, together with a sufficient amount of the proceeds of said bonds equal to the interest to accrue thereon during the construction period of the Project, shall be paid into said Bond Fund at the time of the issuance and delivery of the bonds hereby authorized, and shall be used for the payment of the interest on said bonds next thereafter becoming due.

The amount by which the payments in any fiscal year exceed the aggregate amount of interest on and principal of said bonds then currently becoming due shall be held in said Bond Fund as a reserve for contingencies and used solely as herein provided; provided, however, that no further payments need be made into said Bond Fund whenever and so long as such amount of the bonds shall have been retired that the amount then held in the Bond Fund, including the reserve for contingencies, is equal to the entire amount of the principal and interest that is to be paid on all of such bonds then remaining outstanding.

If, for any reason, there be a failure to make any payments into such Bond Fund as aforesaid during any fiscal year, any sums then held as a reserve for contingencies shall be used for the payment of any portion of the interest or principal on which bonds there would otherwise be default, but such reserve shall be reimbursed therefor from the first available payments made into the Bond Fund in the following year or years in excess of the required payment for the then current fiscal year; provided, however, that such reserve may be applied to the redemption of bonds prior to maturities.

All moneys held in the Bond Fund or as a reserve for contingencies shall be deposited in a bank which is a member of the Federal Reserve System and of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation; the moneys held as a reserve for contingencies may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America; provided, however, that sale of a sufficient amount of such obligations shall be made in the event that it shall prove necessary to draw upon said reserve.

The payments hereinabove provided into said Bond Fund from the Revenue Fund shall be made in equal monthly installments on the first day of each month, except when the first day of any such month shall be on a Sunday or a legal holiday, in which event such payment shall be made on the next succeeding secular day. The balance then and from time to time remaining in the Journalism Building Revenue Fund may be set aside for the necessary expenses of operation and maintenance, as hereinafter more fully provided. In the event that the moneys held in the Revenue Fund in any month shall be insufficient to make the aforesaid payments in full, any such deficiency shall be added to the amounts required to be paid into such Bond Fund in the following month.

said printing facilities, is granted and created by Sections 162.350 and 162.200 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, which said statutory mortgage lien is hereby recognized and declared to be valid and binding upon all the property constituting the Project, as provided by law, and shall take effect immediately upon the delivery of any bonds authorized to be issued under the provisions of this Resolution. Any holder of said bonds, or of any of the coupons may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus, or other proceedings, enforce and compel performance of all duties required by law, including the charge, collection and accounting for sufficient rents, student fees and charges, and the segregation and application of the income and revenues as provided by this Resolution.

If there be any default in the payment of the principal of or interest on any of said bonds, then, upon the filing of suit by any holder of said bonds, or any of the coupons, any court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer said Project, with power to charge and collect a sum sufficient to provide for the payment of any bonds or obligations outstanding against said Project and for the payment of the operating expenses, and to apply the income and revenues in conformity with this Resolution and the provisions of said laws of Kentucky aforesaid.

Section 8. The bonds authorized to be issued here-under and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the revenues of said Project, or with respect to the statutory mortgage lien securing their payment, regardless of the time or times of their issuance, it being the intention that there shall be no priority among the bonds authorized to be issued under the provisions of this Resolution, regardless of the fact that they may be actually issued and delivered at different times.

Section 9. While any of the bonds herein authorized are outstanding, no additional bonds payable from the revenues of the said Project shall be authorized or issued unless the lien and security for payment of such additional bonds are made junior and subordinate in all respects to the lien and security of the bonds herein authorized.

Section 10. So long as any of said bonds are outstanding, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky shall:

(a) Maintain insurance on the Project against loss or damage by fire, lightning and windstorm in an amount equal to the full insurable value, and pay the cost of such insurance from the Operation and Maintenance Fund hereinbefore described:

- (b) Keep proper books of record and accounts (separate from all other records and accounts) in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to said Project, and furnish the original purchaser of said bonds and any subsequent holder of any of said bonds, at the written request of such holder, complete operating and income statements of the said Project in reasonable detail covering each six months period, and same shall be available not later than thirty (30) days after the close of each six months period; and
- (c) Grant to the holder of any of said bonds the right at all reasonable times to inspect the said Project and all records, accounts and data relating thereto.

Section 11. Upon the adoption of this Resolution, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice to be published in THE BOND BUYER, a Financial Newspaper printed and published in the City of New York, New York, reciting in such notice that a Resolution providing for the issuance of the bonds as herein authorized has been adopted and that at a time and place stated therein, which shall be the time and place of a scheduled meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, the matter of issuing the bonds authorized by this Resolution will be further considered and also that at said meeting anyone interested may present sealed written proposals for the purchase of the bonds as herein authorized. Each such proposal should specify the interest rate or rates for the bonds, each such rate to be a multiple of $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% and not to exceed three and one-half per cent (31%) per annum, and the bid price must be 101% of par plus accrued interest or better. Said Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky is hereby authorized and directed to consider all proposals made pursuant to such published notice, and to award the bonds in the manner and for the purposes as herein provided.

Such sale shall be held at such time and place and upon such conditions as may be ordered by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky or by the Executive Committee of said Board.

Section 12. All sums received as accrued interest when the bonds are delivered and paid for shall be deposited in the Bond Fund. From said proceeds from the sale of said bonds, there shall next be paid all expenses incident to the authorization, issuance and sale of the bonds herein described. Thereafter, as authorized by KRS 162.350 and 162.200, there shall be set aside from said proceeds and deposited in the Bond Fund a sum equal to interest during the construction period, such sum to be credited by the amount of accrued interest received when the bonds are delivered and paid for as above set forth. All sums then remaining shall be transmitted to the State Treasury

of the Commonwealth of Kentucky to be held and used, together with other available funds, for the completion of the Project.

Section 13. That the provisions of this Resolution shall constitute a contract between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky and the holder or holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued and after the issuance of any of said bonds, no change or alteration of any kind in the provisions of this Resolution may be made until all of the bonds have been paid in full as to both principal and interest or funds sufficient therefor shall have been duly provided and deposited for that exclusive purpose at the place of payment thereof.

Section 14. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or ineffective for any reason, the remainder thereof shall remain in full force and effect, it being expressly hereby found and declared that the remainder of this Resolution would have been adopted despite the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision.

Section 15. That all resolutions and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed, and that this Resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

G. Budget Increases.

President Donovan stated that he recommended budget adjustment in estimated income by increasing the receipts for the construction of the Stadium in the amount of \$23,950, same representing proceeds from sale of bonds; estimated income from Stores Overhead Account, \$17,500, same representing collection from the operation of the University Stores, for the purpose of amortizing bonded indebtedness of the Service Building; and increase from student fees at the Northern Kentucky Extension Center in the amount of \$606.00, same representing fees collected from students taking an added course in Education.

President Donovan also recommended an increase in appropriation for the operation of the Northern Kentucky Extension Center and employment of an instructor to teach the added course, in the amount of \$1,250.00.

The members being duly advised, upon motion made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in.

H. Increase in Per Diem Allowance of Agricultural Extension Workers.

President Donovan read a letter from Dean Cooper.

November 30, 1949

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

The Board of Trustees, at its meeting December 10, 1946, authorized travel expenses, other than transportation, on funds of Federal origin incurred by the Agricultural Extension staff, to be paid on the basis of \$6.00 per diem. This basis of payment was made to meet the very great increase in travel costs and also to reduce the tremendous amount of detail auditing required for itemized subsistence expense accounts. With the continued advance in cost for lodging and subsistence, our staff has found it impossible to cover the expenses for travel required of them. Therefore I wish to recommend that effective December 1, 1949, the per diem for travel within the state be at the rate of \$6.50; that the allowance for out-of-state travel in the larger cities be at the rate of \$7.50 per day.

The per diem of \$6.50 and \$7.50 will be in lieu of all charges for meals, lodging, personal use of room during daytime; all fees and tips to waiters, porters, baggagemen or redcaps, bell boys, hotel maids; telegrams and telephone calls reserving accommodations; fans or fires in rooms; transportation between places of lodging or where meals are taken and places of duty.

The details for submitting these expenses on a per diem basis will be in accordance with the standardized government travel regulations for Federal funds, as amended January 31, 1942 and approved by the President of the United States. These regulations are now in effect in the Washington office.

It was stated that the expenses of these employees were paid from Federal grants and audited by Federal auditors, and that this recommendation was in line with Government regulations concerning travel by employees reimbursed from Federal funds.

After some discussion, the motion was made, seconded and carried that, effective December 1, 1949, the per diem for travel within the State be fixed at the rate of \$6.50, and the allowance for out-of-state travel in the larger cities be at the rate of \$7.50 per day, a day being interpreted as consisting of 24 hours.

I. Reorganization of Aeronautical Research Laboratory and Appropriation.

President Donovan made a statement concerning the operation of the Aeronautical Research Laboratory during the war years and its current financial status. He read a letter from Dean Terrell requesting that the Laboratory be reorganized and that appropriation be made so as to integrate the work of the Laboratory into the College of Engineering.

My dear Doctor Donovan:

As you know the Aeronautical Research Laboratory has in the past been able to perform enough contractual research to

pay all the expenses of operation. It now appears that this laboratory can no longer continue on the original plan and it is proposed to bring it into the College of Engineering on the same basis as other departments in the College.

The laboratory will continue to be used for both instruction and research. To this end authority is requested for the purpose of reorganizing this laboratory as of January 1, 1950. At present the personnel consists of the following:

1 - Director

1 - Engineering Superintendent

8 - Mechanics 1 - Stockman

1 - Stenographer-accountant

1 - Janitor 3 - Part-time

Total \$48,000.00

The proposed reorganization is to consist of the following in permanent full-time positions:

1 - Director

1 - Assistant

2 - Machinists

1 - Mechanic

1 - Graduate Assistant

1 - Stenographer Total \$24,000.00

The following appropriation is requested for the period of January 1, 1950 to July 1, 1950:

In addition to this the budget of maintenance and operation should be increased by \$3,000.00 to take care of the normal maintenance and operation of the building.

The Directors salary has been set at \$7,000.00 a year with a provision that it will be supplemented if and when the laboratory earns sufficient funds from contractual research.

It is expected that the laboratory will return to the University during the period January 1, 1950 to July 1, 1950, not less than \$8,000.00. This will reduce the cost to the University \$8,250.00. It is requested that the Board of Trustees approve this plan in principal and leave the details to be worked out at a later date.

It is desirable that we put the program into effect on January 1, 1950 and that we give those employees not to be retained at least two weeks notice.

President Donovan recommended that the reorganization be approved and that the sum of \$13,250 be appropriated from the unappropriated surplus of the general University budget for the operation of the Aeronautical Research Laboratory from January 1 to June 30, 1950, and that the budget of the Division of Maintenance and Operations be increased by the sum of \$3,000 to take care of normal maintenance and operation of the building for this period.

Members of the Board being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in and the appropriations authorized.

J. Animal Husbandry Fees Rescinded.

President Donovan stated that Dean Cooper reported that, at a meeting of the faculty of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, approval was given to withdraw fees for Animal Husbandry courses as follows:

A. I. 102 - \$35.00 A. I. 122 - 35.00 A. I. 145 - 20.00.

He stated that, since the Board of Trustees authorized all fees, it was necessary for them to act upon withdrawal of fees thus recommended. President Donovan recommended that the fees be withdrawn.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in.

K. Retaining Wall North of Memorial Coliseum Authorized.

The Comptroller presented plans and specifications for retaining wall, drains and chain link fence, to be installed on the north side of the Memorial Coliseum. It was stated that it would be necessary to backfill on the north side of the building, in order to complete contracts already made and to protect the abutting property owners north of the University property line. The plans were examined and explained in some detail. It was estimated that the work would cost approximately \$17,000.00.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was directed to cause bids to be received to do the work in accordance with plans and specifications submitted, and the necessary funds were ordered appropriated from the unappropriated surplus of the University budget, to take care of the cost of construction based upon competitive bids.

L. Awards Won at International Livestock Exposition Noted.

President Donovan read a letter from Dean Cooper reporting on awards won by the University for Southdown and Hampshire sheep at the International Livestock Exposition.

I know you will be interested in learning that the University scored the greatest sweep of the wether show at the International Livestock Exposition this week. Our exhibit consisted of six Southdown sheep and six Hampshire for which awards were made as follows:

The 4-H Judging Team from Henderson County was awarded second place in the judging contest and our college team ranked seventh in cattle judging.

Mr. Harold J. Barber, as in years past, fitted the sheep for exhibition. I am informed that this is the greatest number of prizes ever awarded to a single exhibitor and, of course, we are gratified with the excellent showing which has been made.

M. Gifts.

From Mrs. William S. Taylor and her daughter, Mrs. Robert Hayes, check for \$5,000.00.

President Donovan read the following letter to the Board of Trustees:

December 13, 1949

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky Lexington, Kentucky

Dear Dr. Donovan:

It is with a feeling of genuine appreciation for the ideals and aspirations of Mr. Taylor that Nancy and I send you this check for \$5,000, payable to the Kentucky Research Foundation for the William S. Taylor Memorial Fund. It is our hope that the interest from this fund will be used by young men and young women in continuing their education.

The Board commented at some length on the generosity of Mrs. Taylor and her daughter and on the work of the late Dean Taylor, which these funds will help to carry forward. They agreed with the President's recommendation that the gift be accepted, and on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check for \$5,000 to the Kentucky Research Foundation for the William S. Taylor Memorial Fund was ordered accepted, and the President was asked to express to Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Hayes the very real appreciation of the Board of Trustees and the University.

From Ashland Oil & Refining Company, Ashland, Ky., -- \$1,235.46, for Ashland Oil & Refining Company Scholarship Fund.

President Donovan reported receipt of check for \$1,235.46, from Ashland Oil & Refining Company, Ashland, Ky., to be placed to the credit of the Ashland Oil & Refining Company Scholarship Fund. He recommended that it be accepted, and on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check for \$1,235.46 was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to thank the donors for this grant.

From Dixie Stock Farms, Lancaster, Ky., an Aberdeen-Angus steer calf.

President Donovan reported to the Board that the Dixie Stock Farms, Lancaster, Ky., had presented to the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station an Aberdeen-Angus steer calf. He stated that Dean Cooper considered this calf a valuable addition to the beef cattle herd of the Experiment Station, and would be of particular aid in presenting to students an outstanding representative of the breed. He recommended that the gift be accepted.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of an Aberdeen-Angus steer calf by the Dixie Stock Farms was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to thank the donors for their generosity.

From Mr. Winston Coleman, Lexington, Ky.,—
115 volumes.

President Donovan read the following letter from the Director of Libraries at the University:

Dr. H. L. Donovan President University of Kentucky

My dear Dr. Doncvan:

Winston Coleman has just presented the Library 115 volumes of miscellaneous historical content. Many titles are rare and difficult to get today, and the collection is quite valuable on the whole.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of 115 volumes from Mr. Winston Coleman was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to write a letter of appreciation to Mr. Coleman.

N. All-Weather Road to Bingham Camp.

President Donovan reported that, in January, 1947, the Executive Committee accepted an anonymous gift for the construction of an all-weather road to Bingham Camp in Washington County. He stated that he was advised by the Comptroller that the road had been completed and will permit traffic to the camp at any time of the year, regardless of the weather or water level. He stated further that the road was built by the Highway Department at a cost of \$1,695.69, which was \$49.31 less than the anonymous gift, and the balance has been returned to the source from which it came.

O. Change-of-Occupation for Professor E. J. Kinney.

President Donovan stated that Professor E. J. Kinney, head of the Department of Agronomy, will reach the age of 70 on December 26, 1949, and that he concurred in the recommendation of Dean Cooper that Professor Kinney be given a change of work. He read the following letter:

December 7, 1949

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

Mr. Edmund J. Kinney, Professor of Farm Crops and Head of the Department of Agronomy, will attain the age of seventy on December 26, 1949, and under the regulations of the Board of Trustees, is to be assigned a change of occupation. Therefore, I wish to recommend that, effective January 1, 1950, Mr. Kinney be assigned to the preparation of a publication on agricultural resources of Kentucky and the preparation of material on state agricultural areas and production. Later, he will undertake a history of tobacco in Kentucky. Until other arrangements can be made, I also recommend that he continue his teaching assignments in Course 105, Advanced Crops: Tobacco and Cereals, and Course 106, Field Crop Improvement, in which latter course I should like to have him continue as long as desirable. Mr. Kinney has been in our employ since April 1, 1908, a period of 41-2/3 years. His

salary, at the age of 65, in 1944 was \$4600.00 a year. Therefore, I recommend a salary adjustment of 61-1/2 percent of \$4600.00, which is an annual rate of \$2829.00, to be paid beginning January 1 of next year.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of Dean Cooper and President Donovan was concurred in and Professor Kinney was placed on change of work at an annual salary of \$2829.00, effective January 1, 1950.

P. Promotion of Dr. Martin E. Weeks.

President Donovan stated that the change of work given to Professor E. J. Kinney created a vacancy as head of the Department of Agronomy, and that, upon the approval of Dean Gooper, he was recommending that Dr. Martin E. Weeks be promoted and made Professor of Agronomy and head of the Department of Agronomy at an increase in salary, effective January 1, 1950. He stated that Doctor Weeks had been with the Experiment Station and the College of Agriculture and Home Economics since August 1, 1937. He stated that Doctor Weeks is recognized as a highly trained and able research worker and has wide experience in all fields of agronomy.

Members of the Board heard the recommendation, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Dr. Martin E. Weeks was made head of the Department of Agronomy—teaching, research and extension, as well as Professor of Agronomy.

Q. Dr. Frank G. Dickey Appointed Dean of the College of Education.

President Donovan stated that he was ready to make a recommendation for a successor to Dean William S. Taylor, and read the following statement:

"After more than three months' consideration of various individuals, both on the campus of the University and in other parts of our country, for a successor to Dean William S. Taylor of the College of Education, I have at last decided that we have on the campus probably the best person for this position. All members of the College of

Education with the rank of assistant professor or higher have been consulted either by letter or by interview as to the person who should be appointed to fill this vacancy. Also, some of the administrative officers, including deans of other colleges, have been asked to express their opinion regarding the filling of this vacancy. A list of thirty-six persons from all parts of the United States has been Also, some of the administrative considered and the credentials of all of these have been examined with the view of finding the right person for this position. Two or three individuals have been approached relative to this position but in each case the person was already receiving a salary ranging from \$10,000 to \$14,000 per year and was, therefore, not interested. In considering other individuals we necessarily compared them with a member of our faculty now serving as acting Dean of the College of Education, and in each case a number of us came to the conclusion that Dr. Frank G. Dickey is superior to any of those persons under consideration. I have, therefore, decided to recommend the appointment of Dr. Dickey as Dean of the College of Education, to become effective January 1, 1950.

The Dickey was born in Oklahoma in 1917. However, his father and mother were native Kentuckians, as were his grandparents. When Dr. Dickey was twelve years of age, the family moved back to Lexington, Kentucky, where he attended public school, graduating from Henry Clay High School, Transylvania College in 1939, after which he entered the Graduate School of the University of Kentucky, from which institution he received the Ed. D. degree in 1947. He has taught in the Fayette County schools, Lexington City schools and in the College of Education of the University of Kentucky.

"Dr. Dickey is married and has three children. He belongs to the following organizations: K.E.A., N.E.A., Association for Supervision of Curriculum Development, American Association of School Administrators, National Association of Secondary School Principals, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, American Association of University Professors, Kiwanis Club and Kappa Alpha Social Fraternity. Dr. Dickey also is serving as State Chairman of the Secondary Commission of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools."

Members of the Board briefly discussed the recommendation of the President, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Dr. Frank G. Dickey was appointed dean of the college of Education, effective January 1, 1950, at the salary recommended by the President.

R. Election of Alumni Member of Board of Trustees.
