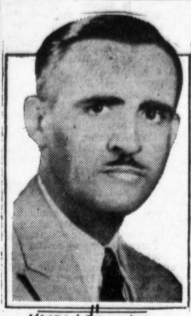

The prospects for a good track squad are the best in several years in the Wildcat camp as several prospective stars are working out daily on the Stoll field oval. "Shipwreck" Kelly and John Heber, outstanding sprinters on the 'Cat cinder squad for three seasons, will be missed greatly, but Carroll Ball, a letterman from last year, Ellis Johnson and Stanley Bach may come along to solve the problem in the sprint.

Doug Parrish, flashy end on the football squad has been working out for several weeks and is near to top-form. He will run the high hurdles and pole-vault and, in addition, is slated for a berth on the mile relay team and will be used in the sprints if the other candidates fail to live up to form.

Frank Seale who put the shot for the Big Blue in 1931 seems to be the pick of the weight men, with Sam Tuttle, another member of the 31 squad, who throws the discus. Besides Parrish, Shive has Tom Cassidy and John Carter in the quarter mile and both are showing up pretty well although they have not reached top form at yet.

For half-milers Shively will depend on Armer Mahan and Joe Saunders who are both fast. Saunders, a letterman in 1931, and a capable man, was plenty good when he was a sophomore and seems to have lost none of his speed by the year's layoff.

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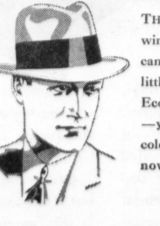
