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UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS PUT ON BROADER BASIS; COACH OF NATIONAL REPUTATION TO BE SECURED

Radical changes in the governing body of athletics have been made by the action of the Senate of the University of Kentucky upon the recommendation of the Senate Committee appointed by President McVey some time ago to investigate the athletic situation.

In accordance with the recommendations of the committee, the Athletic Association, which formerly had control of athletics passes out of existence and in its place an athletic council will be appointed by the president of the University and will consist of the president, the director of athletics, three faculty members, two students and three citizens of Lexington and Fayette county, either alumni of the University or men interested in the athletics at the University. The terms of all members of the council will be for a period of three years except those of the student members which shall be for a period of one year.

The council shall have full control of athletics, the president, however, retaining the right to veto. The duties of the council shall be to be responsible for the welfare and good character of athletics at the Univer-

sity; to formulate and direct the general athletic policy; to promulgate regulations for the awards of "letters" to the players on the various teams, football, baseball, men's basket ball, girls' basket ball, tennis and track; to pass upon the eligibility of players, in which case the student members of the council shall have no vote; to support high school tournaments; to take steps to attract to the University on as many occasions as possible the alumni; and to establish and provide for maintenance of a trophy room in which pictures, records of athletic teams and other trophies of athletic achievement may be kept. The Athletic Council shall have charge of providing proper coaches for the teams, and it is stated that a football coach of national reputation will be procured for 1920.

The investigating committee also recommends to the attention of the new council the building in the near future of a concrete stadium; the better equipment of the gymnasium and the building of a "K" house in which teams may be quartered during their respective training seasons, and fed at a training table under strict discipline.

Faculty Men Meet to Organize A Club

Members of the University of Kentucky faculty have taken initial steps to organize a "University Faculty Club." Dr. Glanville Terrell, dean of the Graduate School, was chosen chairman and Professor Enoch Grehan, head of the Department of Journalism, secretary of the preliminary meeting.

The club has been organized for social and cooperative purposes and may soon establish a club house for the benefit of unmarried men of the faculty.

Co-Eds To Contest Honors With The Boys

Spiked shoes and track suits are being ordered for the University of Kentucky Co-eds.

Beginning April, classes in refined track work, weight tossing, hurdling, high jumping and hockey will be added to the curriculum of women students at the University.

The University co-eds are going to enter track competitions in earnest and have booked contests with the University of Cincinnati and University of Louisville, to be played if those educational institutions have luck in their female track and field representations.

Psychology Club Elects Officers For The Term

Virginia Graham, Lexington, was elected president of the Psychology Club of the University of Kentucky at its initial meeting last Wednesday evening.

Elizabeth Card, Pineville; Catherine Reed, Marion; William Soward, Maysville, and Frank Tuttle, Lexington, were appointed to draw up a constitution and formulate by-laws for the club and submit them at the next meeting.

A student must have had at least one term's work in psychology before being eligible for membership in the club.

Geological Society Chooses Its Officers

James Hudnall, Riverside, was elected president of the Shaler Geological Society of the University of Kentucky for the ensuing term at the last meeting of the club.

The other officers elected were: La Fayette Herndon, Fulton, vice president; Glenn Tinsley, Hartford, secretary; and Walter Morris, Lexington, treasurer.

The society is composed of major students in Geology at the University.

Sigma Nus To Establish Fraternity Row

The first step towards the establishment of a Fraternity Row at the University of Kentucky was taken when the executive committee of the Board of Trustees leased a plot of ground, adjacent to the University campus owned by the University, to the Sigma Nu Fraternity to be used by them to build a Fraternity House. The lease granted to the Sigma Nus extends over a period of fifty years.

This leasing of the plot of ground is the direct result of the offer made last spring by the University to the various fraternities, to lease to them ground belonging to the University for the establishment of fraternity houses. The Sigma Nus are the first to take advantage of the offer, but it is expected that other fraternities will soon follow, and that a group of such houses will be erected on the University grounds, under University supervision.

Y. M. C. A. Scholarships To Ex-Service Men

Word has been received at the University of Kentucky that the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A. is offering scholarships to ex-service men who are in need of funds to continue their education. The amount of the fund allotted to each man is to be decided by the district committee.

University Students Are Eligible For Free Lands

Former service men may procure 160 acres of farm land in Wyoming, according to information recently sent out by the United States Department of Agriculture, and received here by students of the University of Kentucky.

A bill has been passed by Congress giving former service men sixty days priority in filing on land for homestead purposes and that privilege under this recent law, gives such men credit for time they served in the army, navy or marine corps during the Mexican border trouble or the World War. This service will count toward the three years' residence on the land required by law.

Daniel C. (Kit) Carson, Richmond, a sophomore at the University of Kentucky, left last Thursday night for Cheyenne, Wyoming, to file a claim on this land.

Carson re-entered school last fall after serving more than two years in the United States Army. Most of his service was in the vicinity of Archangel, Russia, as an officer of the North Russia Expeditionary Force.

Carson has promised to write several friends as soon as he arrives "out west" and tell them about the new lands and actual conditions there.

Porter Chosen Class Orator By Seniors

Goebel Porter, Dixon, has been chosen class orator by the senior class of the University of Kentucky, to take the place of Emery Frazier, who has left the class.

Porter has shown marked oratorical and forensic ability while in Kentucky, having been a member of the Varsity team which debated Transylvania last year and a member of the Union Literary Society team which defeated the Patterson Literary Society team in the contest for the Barker trophy last year.

Cats Lose Championship In Last Game of Season

The Centre College Colonels won the final basketball game of the season by defeating the University of Kentucky Wildcats, 20 to 18. The score stood 14-14 at the end of the game; the additional scores were made in the extra five minutes playing which was necessary to keep the game from ending in a tie.
