

Eight Receive Scholarships

Eight UK students have been named recipients of fire protection and safety engineering scholarships awarded by three state insurance groups, Dean D. V. Terrell of the College of Engineering has announced.

The scholarships, each valued at \$50, are for the school year beginning in September. Donors are the State Division of Insurance, the Louisville Board of Fire Underwriters and the Kentucky Association of Fire Insurance Agents.

Winners of the insurance division awards are Paul Wright Jr., James Holland, William Barkhan, Thomas McRoyolds, Blucher Allison and Clyde Brown.

William Bullock is recipient of the underwriters scholarship and George Fischer is winner of the insurance agents award.

Students Get TV Training

Three UK students are now receiving 10 weeks of apprenticeship training in television production at Station WHAS-TV, Louisville. They are Miss Anne Hall, Owen F. Kearney and Archie Lee.

The trio, all radio arts majors who have completed their junior years, are staff members of UK's FM station, WKBY.

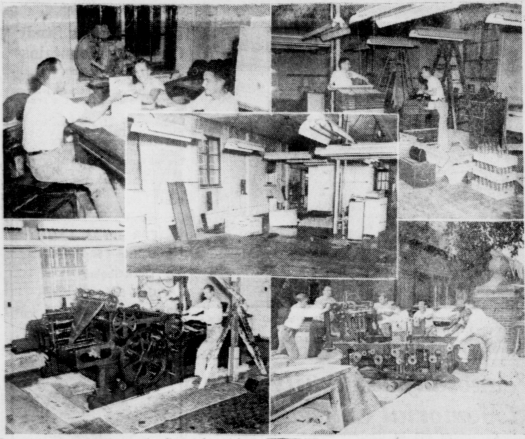
Having begun the second week in June, the students are working at the WHAS-TV studios where they will learn firsthand the principles of scriptwriting, film editing and other jobs connected with TV program production.

They will receive no salary, but two, Kearney and Miss Hall, have been awarded scholarships to help defray living costs. The scholarships were given by Guy A. Huguenet, Lexington.

This summer's training period marks the beginning of a program announced in April by which a limited number of UK radio arts students will receive television experience at the Louisville station. The University has no facilities of its own for training students in TV work.

Department Of Journalism Made School By Trustees

The UK Department of Journalism has been made a school by action of the University Board of Trustees. Dr. L. Niel Plummer, head of the department, was appointed director of the school, which will continue to operate within the framework of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Several reasons were forwarded for the change. One was that enrollment in journalism at UK is among the top 10 of approved schools of journalism in the nation. Others were that the department has gained national recognition through its professional progress; completion of the new Journalism building this summer affords an excellent opportunity to create a school of journalism; and creation of the school gives a more accurate description of the University's progress in journalism.

Established in 1914 under the direction of Booth Erwin, the school remained under his leadership until his death in 1937. He was succeeded by Dr. Plummer, a member of the UK staff since 1930.

The printing plant of the Kentucky Kernel, student newspaper, has been moved into the new Journalism building, and the entire building will be occupied in time for the opening of the fall semester. A formal dedication program will be held in October during National Newspaper Week.

Sen. Cox Elected President Of UK Alumni Association

State Senator Louis Cox, Frankfort, was elected president of the UK Alumni Association at the organization's annual commencement week banquet, May 21. He succeeded George Edwin R. Denney of Mt. Vernon.

Douglas Parrish, former Wildcat football and track star and now a farmer in Bourbon County, was named vice-president. He replaces George P. Hillen, Louisville.

Announcement of the election of three new members of the association's executive committee were also made. They were Homer Baker, Louisville; James Shropshire, Lexington; and Judge Grady M. Stewart, Louisville.

Senator Cox is president pro tem of the senate and serves as acting governor during absences from the state of Gov. Lawrence Wetherby. He attended the University from 1925-28 and was first elected to the senate in 1941. He resigned before his term expired to enter the armed services. He was re-elected in 1945 and again in 1949.

Parrish is a native of Richmond. Approximately 200 graduates and former students attended the banquet. Several members of the class of 1950 were present. They celebrated the 50th anniversary of their graduation and were presented certificates of membership in the Half-Century Club at commencement exercises, June 1.

Principal speaker at the banquet was Guy A. Huguenet, Lexington, member of the Board of Trustees.

4-H Week Highlight Is Wetherby Speech

Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby addressed 4-H Club members, their leaders, and county and home agents June 8, during the 4-H Week on the UK campus, June 5-9.

A former 4-H member in Jefferson County, Gov. Wetherby spoke at the opening assembly at Memorial Hall.

The state-wide style revue in which champion 4-H girls from more than 100 counties modeled their prize winning costumes was the Thursday night attraction in Memorial Coliseum. Dresses for school wear, dress-up occasions and party wear, and semi-tailored and tailored coats and suits were shown.

A 4-H club talent show featuring music, dramatics and other forms of entertainment, made up part of the evening's program.

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Group Singing during the week was led by George Campbell of Cincinnati, who, until 1948, led the singing at the convention for 10 consecutive years.

Demonstrations in home economics and agriculture took a large percentage of the time of club members during their five-day stay at UK. The girls had judging contests in goods, canning, clothing and home furnishings, while the boys engaged in a water management contest and visited the Experiment Station farm to note work in livestock and crop production.

A speech contest was a new activity for both boys and girls.

message that opportunities for hearings before the state budget committee and the legislative committee on appropriations be afforded the University; and that provision be made for the state to make or supervise audits of University finances; but that there be no further support of the state over the fiscal affairs of the University, except that modifications in University accounts, budget procedures, and other fiscal arrangements be made in consultation with the Department of Finance officials so as to reduce the expense in the long run of providing full budgetary data; and that the University should also be enabled to utilize state fiscal facilities, especially those of the State Purchasing Agent, to whatever extent the University Board of Trustees may deem appropriate.

76 Honored At Graduation

Seventy-six seniors were graduated with honors at commencement exercises June 1. The registrar's office said that 20 of these diplomas carried the notation "with high distinction," 10 "with distinction," 26 or higher for at least three years.

UK Accepts Five Gifts

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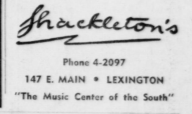
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
